

Raceway Tax Boost Sought

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Bills aimed at giving the state a bigger tax take from dog tracks and jai alai frontons were introduced in the Legislature Monday by Rep. William O'Neill of Marion.

One of the measures would repeal the special daily operational cost allowance given dog tracks before the state takes its taxcut. It would also

provide a special daily fee for small tracks with a pari-mutuel pool of \$35,000 a day or less.

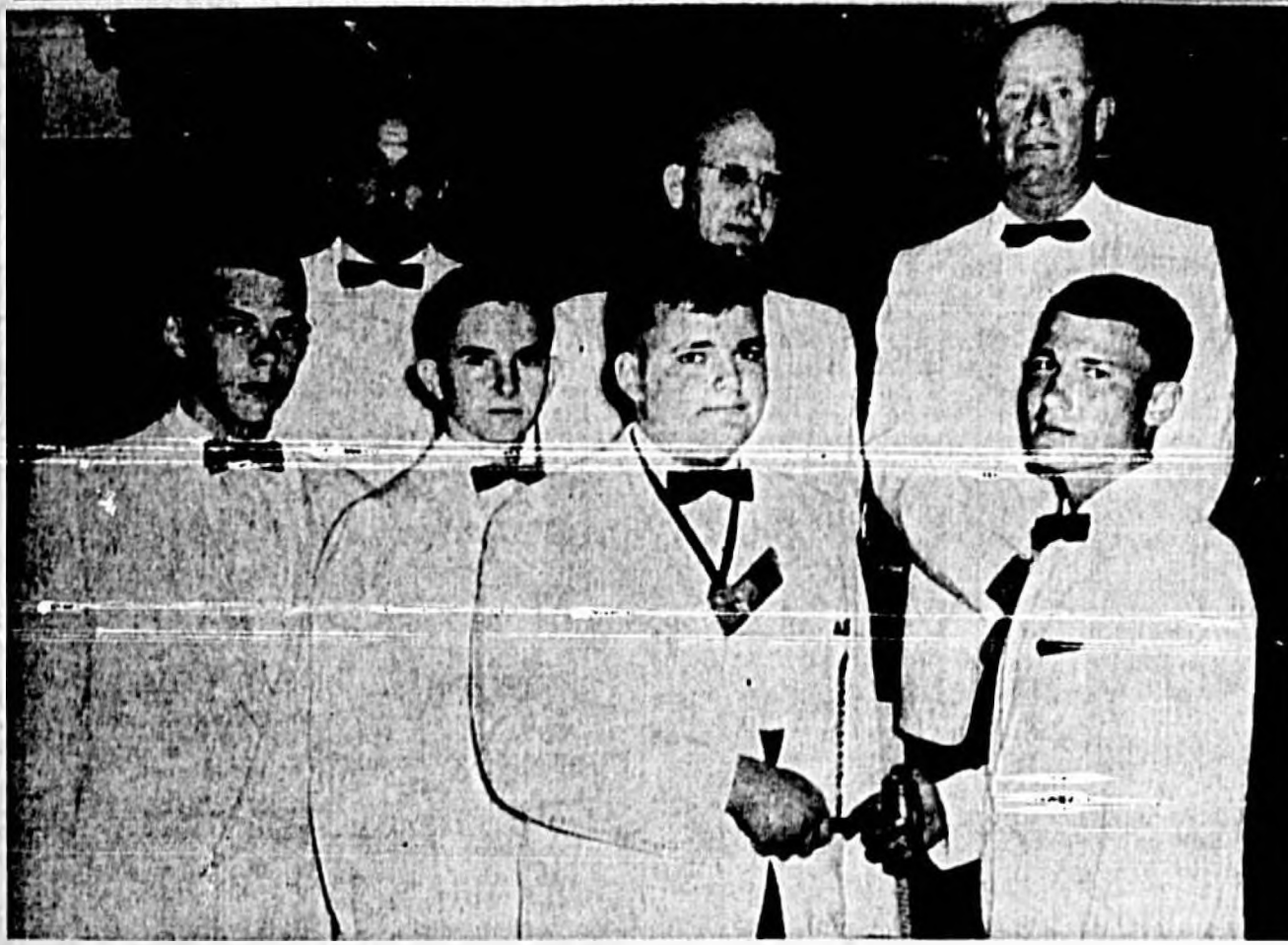
Currently tracks with a pool of \$25,000 or less pay taxes on a flat fee schedule starting at \$150 a day for pools up to \$20,000, to \$400 per day for pools between \$24,000 and \$25,000.

The flat fee schedule would provide additional fees, under O'Neill's bill, ranging to a top of \$1,750 for pools

between \$34,000 and \$35,000. Tracks with pools in excess of \$35,000 would be taxed at seven per cent from each pool.

Result of the proposal would be to raise in excess of \$1.3 million in taxes for the state.

Another bill tossed in by O'Neill would put the tax for jai alai frontons on the same scale as those for dog tracks.

Economy Moves On 3 Fronts, Rotarians Told

Economy moves on three fronts—the consumer unit, the public sector (or government spending) and the private sector (capital formation) Economist Ted Johnson of the Florida Power and Light Company said Monday.

Speaking to Rotarians at the kick-off of Industry Appreciation Week in Sanford and in Florida, Johnson painted a bright picture for the future economic future of Florida and Seminole County. Johnson, who is a research analyst for FPL, out of Miami compared businessmen with a traveler, who every now and then wonders if he's on the right road.

He went on to illustrate his optimistic forecast with what he called "economic roadmaps," using Florida's steady and unwavering 100 year growth as a yardstick and comparing Florida with California whose growth chart has paralleled Florida's although it started 30 years sooner.

"Florida has consistently doubled her population every 20 years, ever since the Civil War," Johnson said.

He predicted a population of 7 million in the state in 1970, or a growth of 2 million additional people in the state during the 1960's.

In answer to charges that have been made that the large market is a "poor market" because of the number of retirees in the state, Johnson pointed out that of the one and a half million persons who have moved into the state in the 1950's there were the following percentages:

Fifty-five percent were in the working age group. Thirty percent are in the school age or pre-school age group.

Only fifteen percent are in the retired age class.

"Here are some things to think about when you view the Industrial Exhibit here Tuesday," Johnson said.

He pointed out that the most important consideration that manufacturers now have is personnel.

"Today's employe who likes his job and his surroundings can boost business. The employe looks for good living conditions, good working conditions, good educational facilities, good shopping facilities, medical facilities, religious facilities and one of the most important aspects... recreational facilities."

"Your area can offer all of the things to industry," he said.

Bills introduced today in the State Legislature seeking establishment of a "new college in the Orlando-Daytona-Canaveral area" have the full support of the Seminole Chamber of Commerce, said Douglas Stenstrom, chairman of its long range committee on education.

"We are in full support of the two bills mentioned in this following UPI dispatch," said Stenstrom:

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—A bill authorizing four new colleges for Florida was introduced today by Sen. John E. Matthews, of Jacksonville.

The bill calls for two-or four-year colleges in Duval, Dade, Escambia-Santa Rosa and the Orlando-Daytona-Canaveral areas.

Matthews' bill, interpreted to halt creation of new graduate universities, would authorize the Board of Control to establish branches of existing universities in other areas.

Stenstrom continued: "We are hopeful our legislative delegation will be able with other legislators from this area to establish a university in this locality and, especially, to obtain an adequate appropriation for it. We have stressed this thought with our legislators."

Chances are excellent of a two-fold effort for educational facilities in this area, Stenstrom reported. One for a new university for undergraduates and the second for a graduate facility for space scientists and engineers as an extension service of the University of Florida engineering college.

However, the attorney warned that unless the "matter is carefully handled we could lose both." He emphasized that all legislators of the East Central Florida area "should work in harmony" and that "if not steered very carefully other legislators may turn down any appropriations for university extension facilities."

Mississippi Near Law Breakdown?

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A "complete breakdown of law and order" that the U. S. Civil Rights Commission wants President Kennedy to cut off all federal funds to the state.

The commission told Kennedy Tuesday that "open and flagrant violation of constitutional guarantees . . . has reached the point of crisis" in Mississippi.

The bombings, shootings, falling and withholding of federal surplus foods for children "affronts the conscience of the nation," the commission said.

The commission praised the administration's "strong and

vigorous" prosecution of law-breakers in Mississippi. But it said that the "pattern of unlawful activity shows no sign of abating" and the time has come for tougher action.

The investigation and advisory group suggested that the President cut off all federal funds going to the state. In the year ended June 30, 1962, these came to \$650 million in the form of grants-in-aid, military contracts, civilian and military payrolls and loan programs.

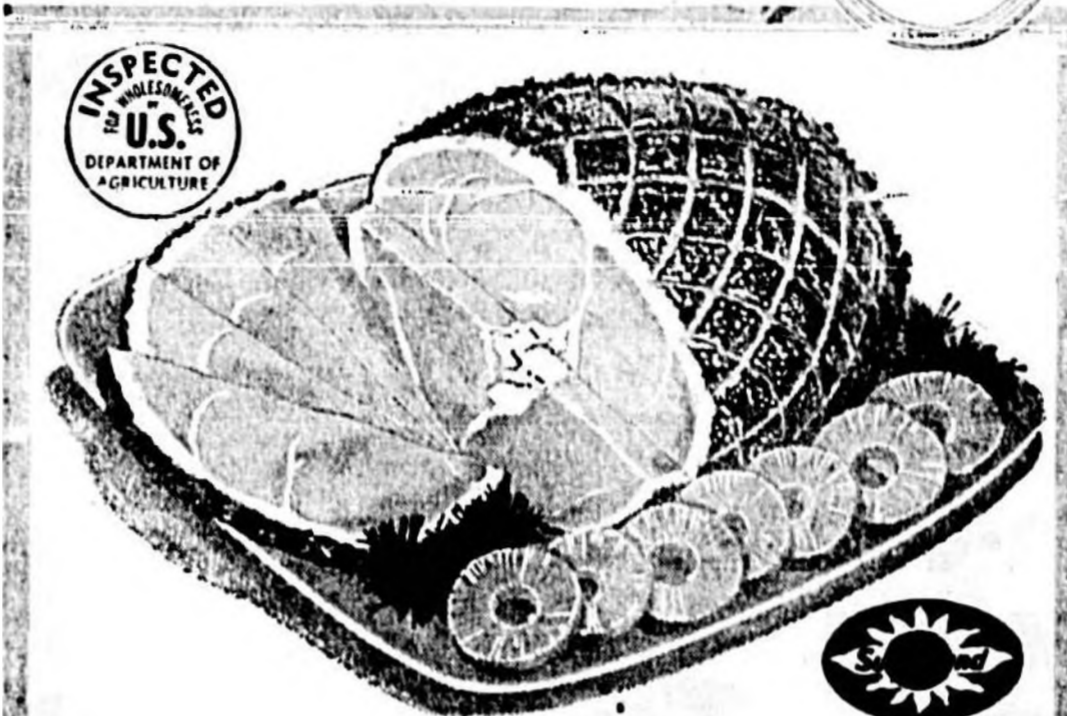

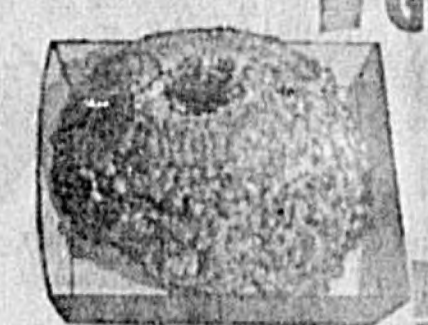

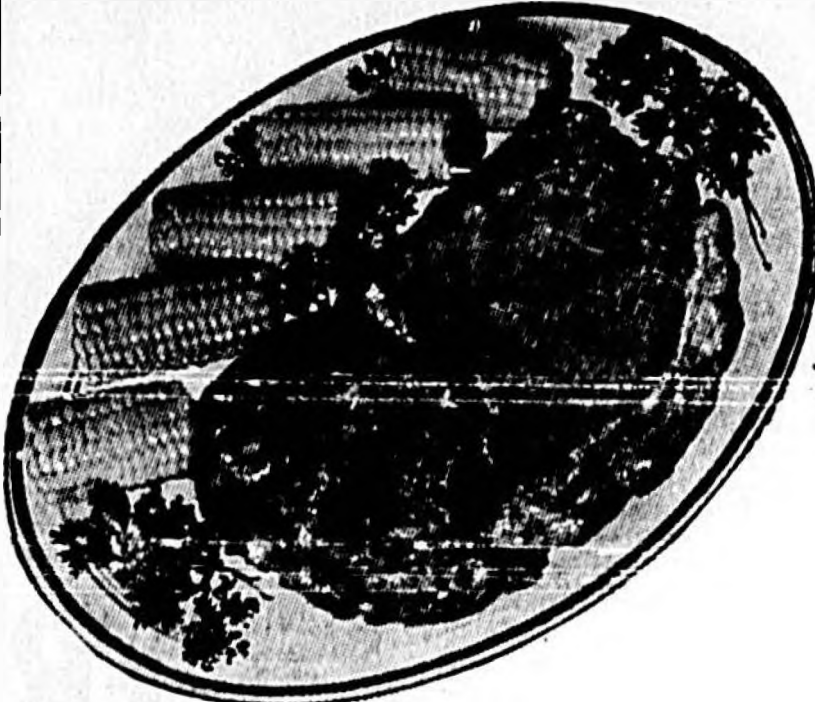

Public Defender Bill Okayed

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The public defender bill, which would provide court defense for the needy in Florida, was passed by a Senate Judiciary committee Tuesday and sent to the calendar.

Chief Justice B. K. Roberts of the State Supreme Court said the courts should suggest a "bare bones" budget of \$305,700 as the state's expense for the program during the coming biennium.

The bill, introduced by Sen. Charley Johns of St. Johns and George Hollibaugh of Miami, would regulate the number of public defenders to 16—one for each judicial circuit in Florida. The number of assistants would be held to eight.

Under the committee-amended bill, circuits over 600,000 in population which presently qualify only Dade, would get two assistants. Those between 300,000 and 600,000 would get one, and those with less than 300,000 none unless provided for with county funds.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The U. S. Chamber of Commerce charged today that the first community that got federal depressed area aid had to agree in effect to help its new local industry block union organization of the factory.

Vets Spahn, Pierce, Musial Mathews Roll

Baseball may be a young man's game but you can't prove it today to a foursome of National League veterans with a total of 66 years of big league experience under their belts.

They're the Milwaukee Braves' Warren Spahn, 41, and Ed Mathews, 31, the San Francisco Giants' Billy Pierce, 36, and the St. Louis Cardinals' Stan Musial, 42.

Their average age is 38 but they're starting off the new season as frisky as the most ambitious rookies.

Spahn scored the 32nd victory of his career and Mathews became the eighth player in baseball history to hit 400 homers in the Braves' 8-0 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies Tuesday. Pierce extended his streak of consecutive wins at Candlestick Park to 14 with a 7-0 win over the Houston Colts and Musial became the first man to accumulate 6,000 total bases in the Cardinals' 4-3 triumph over the Pittsburgh Pirates.

The Cincinnati Reds extended the New York Mets' losing streak to seven games with a 7-4 decision and the Chicago Cubs edged out the Los Angeles Dodgers, 2-1, in 12 innings in other National League action.

Spahn pitched a four-hitter and struck out seven in winning his second straight game of the season and raising his NL career shutout record for left-handers to 56. Spahn now ranks No. 8 on the all-time winning list. Mathews' first homer of 1963 came in the seventh inning and lifted him into a select circle which also includes Babe Ruth, Jimmy Fox, Ted Williams, Mel Ott, Lou Gehrig, Mickey Mantle and Musial.

Pierce, who never has been beaten at Candlestick Park, pitched a six-hitter and fanned six. It was his first win of the season and the 20th of his 17-year career. Felipe Alou drove in two runs with a single and a double to lead the eight-hit San Francisco attack.

Musial contributed a single to the Cardinals' 12-hit attack, raising his career total bases to 6,000. Hall of Famer Ty Cobb ranks second to Musial on the all-time list with 5,883. The Cardinals trailed going into the last of the ninth when Duke Carmel tied the score with a homer. Dick Groat then doubled and scored on an error by Julio Goetz.

First Carling U. S. Site Set

NEW YORK (UPI) — The first Carling world open golf tournament with a purse of \$200,000 will be held in the United States, in August 1964, it was announced today.

A field of about 140 will compete in four rounds of individual stroke play following qualifying rounds in eight zones throughout the world, according to Henry E. Russell, president of the sponsoring Carling Brewing Co.

The journey, approved by the Professional Golfers Association of America, is open to both amateurs and professionals, Russell said. The top prize will be \$35,000, the largest in the history of tournament golf. Each participant will receive a minimum of \$450.

Russell said the course has not yet been chosen, but it will be "among the 10 best in the country."

Sam McDowell pitched a two-hitter and struck out 13 batters for the Indians, who tagged Claude Osteen for his first loss. Woodie Held and Johnny Romano homered for the Indians. It was McDowell's first complete game in the majors and his streakout total was the highest by a Cleveland pitcher since Herb Senz struck out 13 batters in a 1959 game.

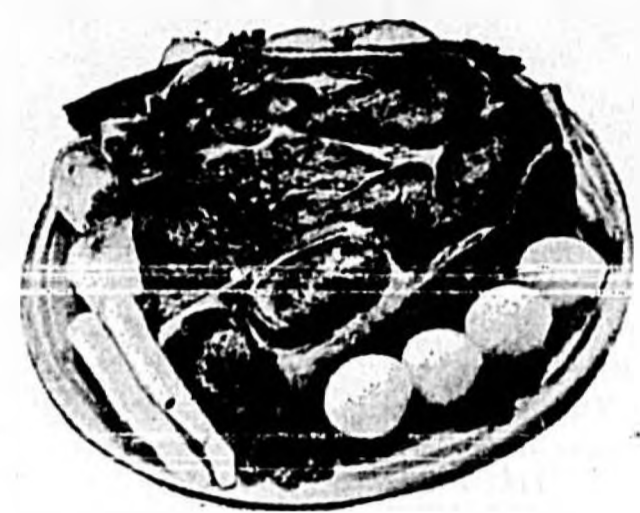

Good Canada Omen

The election victory of Lester Pearson and his Liberal party may or may not be quickly translated into command of the Canadian government. But if standard procedures are followed, it seems bound to happen.

Years ago the famous Mackenzie King held onto a minority prime ministership for roughly a year beyond an election. But the expectation this time is that Conservative Prime Minister John Diefenbaker is unlikely to cling to the reins after Canada's new parliament meets in a month and a half.

Ultimate triumph for Pearson, thus widely assumed, is of course hailed in the United States. For he is regarded as considerably friendlier to us than Diefenbaker. And he has stated flatly his willingness to accept U. S. nuclear warheads in the Canadian defense system.

It was this latter issue which precipitated the 1963 Canadian election. Diefenbaker's refusal to accept nuclear warheads produced a storm of feeling both pro and con. The test at the polls followed.

Though anti-Americanism played an important part in the campaign now concluded, many observers suggest it was not the decisive matter. Canada is plagued with a host of economic problems, and many voters evidently wish to let the Liberals have a crack at them.

Thus it would be improper to conclude that the Liberal party's gains are wholly and simply a sign that Canada rejects the anti-Americanism pronounced most ardently by Diefenbaker.

On the other hand, Canadians clearly did not act solely to emphasize their obvious resentments toward America. However numerous these may be, the voters appear to have taken the sensible view that any deep rift between two neighbors so close and so tightly intertwined strategically, economically and culturally could gravely damage both nations and the whole free world.

The Canadian outcome is not decisive. But it is a trend toward the good sense we must all hope will prevail in the long enduring comradeship of Canadians and Americans.

WASHINGTON (SEA) — March floods in Pennsylvania, Ohio and Indiana, more serious floods in Virginia, Kentucky and West Virginia, tornadoes in Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee—all these took 26 lives, injured nearly 1,000, destroyed 250 homes, damaged 22,000 families—15,000 of which have registered for disaster relief from the American Red Cross.

Adding up the losses in this manner gives the appearance of a major disaster, but with the exception of those on tributaries of the Cumberland and Monongahela in Kentucky and the Virginia, the floods were relatively small.

Preliminary estimates put damage in the tri-state area at \$12 million. Red Cross relief will be about \$3.7 million, or about 10 per cent of the total, according to Robert C. Edson, director of disaster services. This is about one-third of the \$10 million Red Cross budgets annually for disaster relief.

In addition, the organization has a \$20 million revolving reserve fund for major disaster years like 1935. East coast hurricanes and the northern California-Oregon floods of that year required disaster relief of \$20 million.

Red Cross gets a nationwide response in contributions after the big disasters, but smaller disasters create

a demand for relief services that are important but not as well publicized. This year's goal is \$95 million. Last year a record \$87 million was raised.

About 1,200 of the 3,600 local Red Cross chapters get their money through United Fund drives. The other 2,400 depend on local campaigns, in which giving is stimulated by disaster news.

The greater part of relief work in a disaster area is done by state and local organizations—the national guard, state and city police, firemen, veterans' organizations, churches, schools, hospitals, service clubs and individual volunteers.

But in what has become almost a standard operation more or less taken for granted, Red Cross chapters have become the focal points around which community resources can be mobilized. National Red Cross headquarters moves into a disaster area principally to provide long term relief.

It will finance the rebuilding and repair of homes, replacement of furnishings swept away by flood or destroyed by fire or tornado. It will pay emergency doctor bills and meet other expenses beyond the resources of the family to bridge its disaster gap.

What most people do not realize and find it difficult to understand is that this Red Cross assistance is an

'Rocky' Unacceptable

The rambunctious Conservative party of the state of New York has pronounced Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller unacceptable as the 1964 Republican presidential nominee.

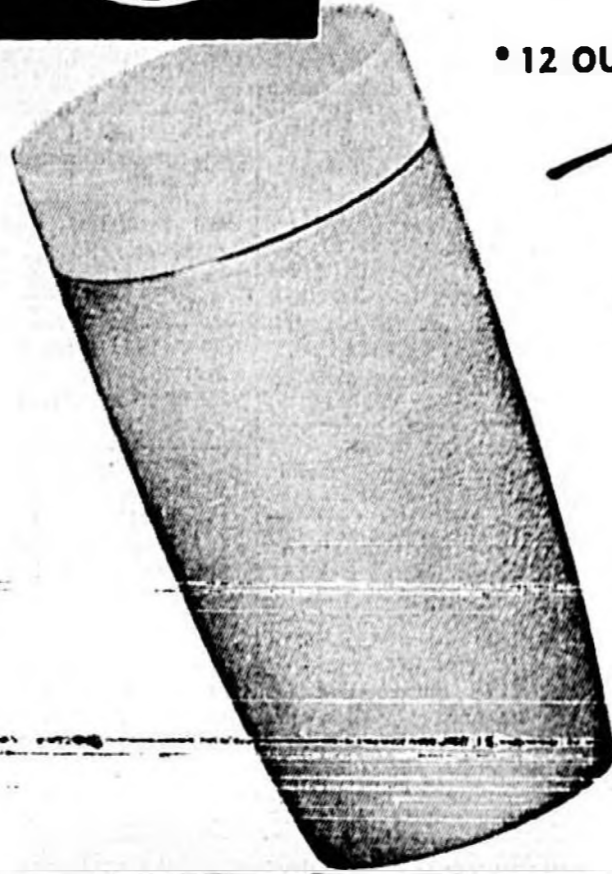

Teacher Award Repeal Nearing Death Knell

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A bill to repeal the controversial \$100 competency award for Florida's outstanding teachers got the approval of two legislative committees Wednesday.

The Senate Public Schools Committee pushed through the measure to kill the program of giving \$100 extra to the top 20 per cent of teachers in each county.

The measure was also pushed through the House Committee on Public Schools. The present law also provides that to be eligible, a teacher must score 600 on the national teacher examination.

"I am asking for a salary reduction," said Mrs. Edna Tait, Tallahassee, president of the Florida Education Association. She said the law is unfair in that it discriminates against teachers who have been in the Florida system for 25 years yet cannot pass the test.

Under a bill passed into a subcommittee Wednesday, the Legislature would wield much more control over the issuing of bond and revenue certificates in the state.

The proposal, by Rep. Charles Hodley, Panama, was shown into the subcommittee by the Constitutional Amendments Committee of the House.

If passed the measure would give the lawmakers control over big university bond issues and other long-term bond programs now administered by the Cabinet and the State Budget Commission.

The House committee also passed and sent to the floor a bill which would give members of the proposed Board of Trustees for Higher Education nine-year staggered terms.

Both of the bills would require a passing vote by the people of Florida if they were passed by the Legislature and signed by Gov. Farris Bryant.

Three routes for the proposed waterway between Sanford and the Atlantic Coast, with a priority recommendation on one, were being submitted this afternoon to the St. Johns Indian River Navigating Committee. Estimated total overall costs ranged from \$11 million to \$13.5 million.

The preliminary engineer's report was being submitted to the committee at a luncheon meeting by Harold Scott, of Reynolds, Smith and Hill, Jacksonville, at the Mayfair Inn.

Scott, after a study of previous surveys, aerial photographs, summaries and other field trips, presented three plans for the committee's consideration:

1. —Ellis Canal, south of Florida State Road 50.

2. —Sanford-Flintville Canal, south of Florida State Road 16.

3. —Maytown Canal from Lake Harney in the northern end of Indian River.

Scott recommended the third route, the Maytown Canal, estimated to cost \$11 million for an eight-foot project or \$14 million for a 12-foot project.

"The Maytown plan," Scott reported, "provides in Lake Monroe and follows the St. John River to the north end of Lake Harney, and from this point east to the north end of the Indian River to intersect

the new alignment of the Intracoastal Canal from Indian River to Oak Hill. The plan includes either an eight-foot or 12-foot by 100-foot canal, two navigation locks 60 by 250 feet, railroad drawbridges, four-lane bridge at U. S. Highway 1, two-lane bridge south of Maytown and other items.

"This plan," the engineer continued, "allows an alignment about 10 miles shorter than the Ellis and Sanford-Flintville proposals. The first cut passes through land elevations up to 25 feet. This will require construction of two locks to avoid overdrainage and excessive excavation costs. However, the canal would serve for water control purposes. It was considered that the summit pool would be maintained at elevation 15 feet above mean sea level. Boat lifts would be provided at each lock for passage of small craft in lieu of using the locks."

The committee heard Scott further. "The various plans were studied for a navigable waterway from Sanford to the Intracoastal Waterway in the Indian River. Each has certain favorable and unfavorable features."

"The Maytown Canal plan was selected as being more feasible. It passes through an undeveloped area, except in the vicinity of U. S. Highway

1. It is believed that an alignment can be selected in that area that will result in little conflict with agricultural endeavors. This alignment is slightly lower in costs than others considered. The relocation of the Intracoastal Waterway through the north end of Indian River makes the Maytown Canal alignment possible.

Scott informed the committee that the "next step in considering the canal as a possible project would be to follow the outlined procedure and obtain funds for a preliminary design report. Such a report would include topographical and hydrographical surveys, soil investigations consisting of borings about every half mile, preliminary designs of the locks, bridges and other structures, study of availability of water for lockages, line drawings and a more accurate estimate of costs."

The report can be completed for a cost of \$94,000, the engineer said.

Scott recommended that the Maytown Canal be considered, using two 50 x 50-foot locks and an 8 x 100-foot canal (plus 1-foot overdepth). A canal having these features, he said, would serve navigation adequately for many years. When the demand justified greater depths, the canal could be deepened without any difficult problems.

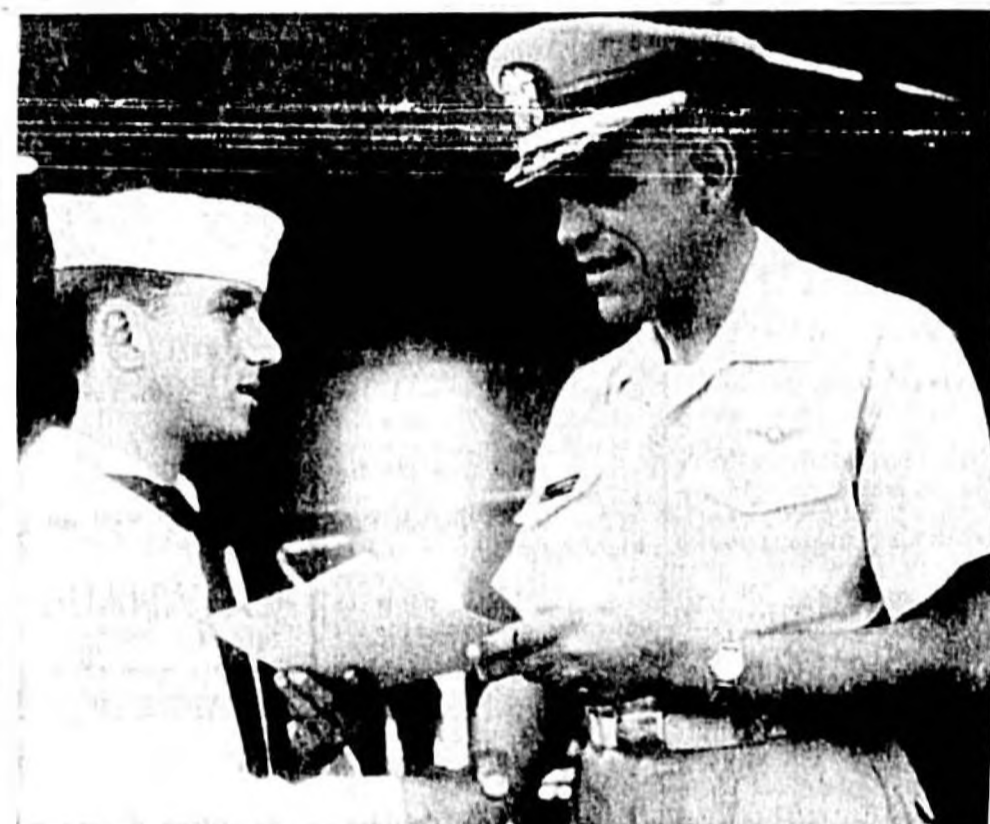
