## Soviets "Narrow" Nazi Escape Lane On Moscow Front

### Germans Admit Damage, Losses From Increased Offensive By British

LONDON, Mar. 14. (AP)—Broadcasting to the Czech people on the eve of the third anniversary of the German army's entrance into France, Dr. Edward Benes, president of the provisional Czech government, declared today that Hitler's generals "no longer believe in a German victory," and say themselves that "only a miracle could save Germany."

### RAF Bombers Maintaining a Growing Offensive, Attacked Cologne Heavily, The Germans Admit Damage and Losses

The Russians said they have "narrowed" the escape corridor for the German army on the Moscow front and the attack is rolling to the west. Smolensk, the Reds claim the slaughter of 14,000 Nazis on the northwest front during the past 15 days, while before Smolensk they have retaken 11 villages and killed 1,600 Germans.

The official publication of the Russian army, Red Star, declared that Russian army had so firmly entered the initiative that the new position would bring not only the long threatened German counter-offensive but rather a continuation of aggressive military operations in the south (where the German army is still in the process of retreat from the upper Dnieper) and fortified areas had been smashed and spoke of toe-to-toe fighting in the streets of Volozhin basin.

Wall Street Hit

There may have been something strangely prophetic in the partial destruction yesterday of one of the great financial structures of New York's Wall Street.

The battery scored a "direct hit" on the 37th floor of the 40-story Equitable Building and sent pieces of brick hurtling down into the thickly crowded Broadway far below.

Parts of a ledge and fragments of steel showered down on the exclusive Bankers Club where some of the nation's leading financial figures were dining.

Whether we like it or not, with the passing of Wall Street is going our whole capitalistic system. We learned in 1929 that the collapse of prices on the exchange spelled the closing of a bank on Main Street and we may find today that the shattering of a cornice on the Equitable Building foreshadows at least the shaking of similar structures elsewhere.

We are told that the government debt will rise within a year to the astronomical total of over a hundred billion dollars, that our taxes will be three times higher than this year. We see automobile factories and virtually all other factories ordered to produce implements of war exclusively on government contracts while dealers wonder what they will have to sell.

This is of course the price of war. It is not our war. We did not seek it. It was forced upon us. We must, and will, win it. If it is necessary to change the system for an all-out effort, we will do that too.

But it will not be the America of 1941. Nor the system which built the Equitable Building.

Work And Health

Andrew Conway Ivy of Northwestern University, in a paper on The Physiology of Work, has summarized the lessons the British learned after Dunkirk when men in British factories began to work a seven-day week (from 70 to 80 hours), according to Time magazine, as follows:

- 1) "An extension of the usual hours, except for a short period, does not yield a proportional increase in output."
2) "After an extended period of overtime has been discontinued, weeks are required before the original steady output is attained."
3) "More than 60 hours per week leads to lost time during work, increased absenteeism and sickness."

Said Dr. Ivy: "One day's rest in seven is essential. We cannot win the war with work alone. Work demands rest, good food, wholesome recreation."

## Russians Renew Mass Attacks On Nazis In Crimea

Successes Claimed By Reds As Fighting Battles In Snow
