

Wall Street Hit

There may have been something strangely prophetic in the partial destruction yesterday of one of the great financial structures of New York's Wall Street. This was

financial structures of New York's Wall Street. This was no bombing raid conducted by German fliers. It was not even the result of a shelling from German submarines lying off Long Island sound. It was some mechanical failure in the firing mechanism of a home defense anti-aircraft battery suddenly gone haywire.

The battery scored a "direct hit" on the 37th floor of the 40-story Equitable Building and sent pieces of brick hurtling down into the thickly crowded Broadway far below. Parts of a ledge and fragments of steel showered down on the exclusive Bankers Club where some of the nation's leading financial figures were dining. cars and fire trucks went into action and air raid wardens were called out.

This is not the first indication the country has had that Wall Street is tottering. Ever since the stock market collapse of 1929 there have been repeated evidences that all was not well in the financial community. Efforts to bolster its assets have apparently resulted only in increasing its liabilities. What market reverses and bond defaults

We learned in 1929 that the collapse of prices on the exchange spells the closing of a bank on Main Street and we may find today that the shattering of a cornice on the Equitable Building foreshadows at least the shaking of similar structures elsewhere. The system as a whole may stand the strain, but that remains to be seen. strain, but that remains to be seen.

We are told that the government debt will rise within year to the astronomical total of over a hundred billion dollars, that our taxes will be three times higher than this year. We see automobile factories and virtually all other factories ordered to produce implements of war ex-clusively on government contracts while dealers wonder what they will have to sell. We see prices fixed by gov-ernment order and wages regulated in Washington. ... This is of course the price of war. It is not our war.
