Ford Says Environment Must Balance Economics

WASHINGTON (AP) - Proposing "a detente with nature," President Ford pledged today a firm commitment to cleaning up the environment but cautioned he must balance that against economic considerations. Ford was flying to Ohio to dedicate a \$30 million National Environmental Research Center in Cincinnati, address a White House conference on domestic policy there, then appear in Cleveland at a Republican fundraising dinner.

In his text for the dedication of the research center built by the Environmental Protection Agency, Ford said, "You have my pledge that this country will remain firmly committed" to seeking a cleaner and healthier environment.

"As long as I have anything to say about it, this country's symbol will never be an empty beer can in a river of garbage," Ford declared.

Back To Work, Court Says By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

While many New York City sanitationmen virtually ignored a court order that they begin collecting thousands of tons of garbage, city firemen have begun their own job action in response to massive budget-induced layoffs ordered by Mayor Abraham D. Beame.

Beame, a Democrat on the verge of an agreement with state Senate Republicans in Albany to get more taxing authority for the city, said late Wednesday that about 100 garbage trucks were to be on the streets by morning following the back-to-work court order against the 10,600 striking sanitationmen.

But a spokesman in the Sanitation Department said early today he could not confirm that a single truck was being used. Normally, 800 trucks make daily collection

Uniformed Sanitationmen's Association officials claim they have been urging their members to end their wildcat strike. Union chief John DeLury has said of the workers, "I can't control them."

TAMPA (AP) - Former Sen. Edward Gurney says that when he first learned of illegal fund-raising in his name, he didn't immediately report it because he was afraid it would be leaked to the press, embarrassing him and the Senate Watergate Committee. Gurney, testifying Wednesday in his bribery conspiracy

trial, said that he later made up his mind to go to the Justice Department. But he said he first went on vacation to collect his thoughts. "This was an horrendous period in my life," the ex-Re-

publican lawmaker told his federal jurors. Gurney, 61, who has denied all seven criminal charges against him, was to return to the stand for crossexamination today in the 5-month-old trial.

Dr. Stuart Cahoon said Wednesday that he had asked Dr. Peter Ivory, superintendent of the Florida State Hospital at Chattahhochee, to investigate the incident. Dr. E. Arthur Larson, a Florida State Hospital psychiatrist, told Wise Productions, an independent capital television and radio news bureau, that 15 to 20 aides forced the patient to the ground and at least one of them punched him in the face.

Altamonte Adopts Road Paving Project

Herald Staff Writer

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - A resolution noting the city's intent to enter into an interlocal agreement with the Seminole County Commission for the paving of Montgomery Road has been adopted by the City Commission.

Commissioners Tuesday agreed to county terms providing for \$100,000 to be paid in advance to the county, with a second payment of \$40,000 30 days later and the final payment of \$25,000 within 60 days.

Floyd said the only city problem with the project is the final \$25,000 payment. He said \$140,000 of the costs will be borne by owners of large properties abutting the road and paying the sums in advance. He said he expects within the next few days to have the first \$100,000 deposited in a special escrow account.

The \$25,000 balance could be collected via a front assessment of owners of smaller properties abutting Montgomery Road, Floyd said

The project was originally estimated at a cost of \$175,000 but county commissioners recently agreed to cut the costs by \$10,000. sewer lines for maintenance.

In other business, the City Commission: - Agreed to ask the state Department of Transportation to ban all parking on SR 436 from Newburyport Road west to Interstate 4. Resolutions were adopted asking immediate action to ban parking on SR 436 at Newburyport, Hermits Trail, Forest Avenue and at the Florida Hospital North entranceway.



Development Plan A Good Beginning

Announcement of plans to open offices for the proposed Downtown Development Authority and begin a city-wide survey to gain input from residents on the redevelopment of downtown Sanford is a welcomed one.

It means that the Downtown Development Steering Committee is moving on a course that could open the way to a revitalized downtown business district

Sanford City Commissioner John Morris, who is steering committee chairman, said in making the announcement that the step is a tiny one, but indicated he felt any move was better than none at

Actually the step is a giant first of many steps to come during the next several months. The appointment of an executive director - Sanford's Sara Jacobson - will do much to help the redevelopment operation.

The proposed survey of residents to learn their feeling regarding the redevelopment of the city's core is a very hopeful plan because it will involve not only downtown merchants and property owners, but every citizen in the city - all of whom will have a say in any plan to rebuild the district. The steering committee's decision to ask for input from the average Joe Citizen is one that should win friends in the search for a method to correct the sagging appearance of Downtown Sanford.

The survey is just one phase of many research programs which the development group plans to conduct - touching on all phases of a city's growth and progress. Each will add to the total picture.

And at the same time, the decision to consider the Lake Monroe waterfront as part of any special taxing district or development district is another strong move by the committee.

Morris feels by moving slowly - taking one step at a time - the steering committee will lay a foundation strong enough on which to rest full scale development plans.

It appears that the young commissioner has put thought into his direction and movement of the committee. The first steps - the opening of the downtown development association's offices and the city-wide survey - are ones which get the project off dead center.

They are directions which will give the steering committee a chance to develop a solid plan to present to all the merchants and property owners when they meet again with Jeno Paulucci, parttime Sanford resident and supporter of the redevelopment project.

"Jeno is a wonderful person," Morris said. "But he can't do it (the development project) alone. I find there is a sincere interest and desire among the downtown people to see this through. I am confident of success.

Morris - like many people in this area - is hopeful that the redevelopment program will become a full-blown Sanford effort. And that is the way it must be, if it is to be successful. Using any information and suggestions offered by Mr. Paulucci is fine, but the total picture must be a Sanford developed plan.

This outlook, plus the thought-out steps taken by the steering committee, should wax well in future plans for the redevelopment of Downtown

It is something that lends itself to success and offers a much brighter picture than ever before in turning the city around.

It is a beginning. Let us move forward.

RAY CROMLEY Physicians, Shape Up Thyselves

Almost every day there are reports indicating something seriously wrong in the medical profession

A spate of malpractice suits has pushed medical insurance rates for this hazard to prohibitively high levels.

Some suits are brought by patients who expect far more of their doctors than we have the right to look for at this stage of medical knowledge. They also disregard the fact that the best of doctors are still human, and make mistakes. Some suits are generated by hungry attorneys. But when these cases are eliminated, enough substance remains that it is clear the medical profession has not policed itself. The blame can be shared by government agencies, by the medical associations and by the medical schools. For today, considerable numbers of practicing doctors should be stripped of their licenses. Many others should be required to update their knowledge. Scores of hospitals should be better policed or shut down and barred.

I personally know of one doctor who attempted to collect the same bill three times from one insurance company. He was paid twice and caught on the third try. The insurance company did not catch him. A reporter did.

Prominent, highly respected doctors bill insurance companies regularly for visits they do not make. I know of cases in which the insurers were charged for hospital visits after the patient nvolved had been discharged and was at home, when she was seeing no doctor at all. Insurance men in and out of the government

ell me that these cases are not unusual. What brought this medical problem home to

me anew was the ultimate in absurdity. I was invited a few days back to a press conference sponsored by the prestigious National Academy of Sciences. The meeting seems to have been organized primarily to whip up public sentiment to get doctors to do their homework and keep up with scientific progress in a major medical

The question in my mind during this extended session was why these learned men could not go directly to the doctors. Why does this major scientific institution find it necessary to go to the press and the public to get doctors to do their

Some time back I ran into the same problem in a different field - deafness. When a child is born deaf, it is extremely important to learn this as early as possible. Tom Paine: Not Ideal, **But A Hero**

Most historians of the American Revolution are as one in believing the United States of today owes as much to the pen of Thomas Paine as to the sword of George Washington. Yet after 199 years of thanksgiving the popular sentiment forgets the former in favor of the latter. Where Washington is recalled as a sober, dignified champion, Paine's memory is faded by a thousand doubts and by unfortunate revisionizm. Nowhere is the callous historic treatment of Paine more evident, perhaps, than in his hometown. Here where the nation was born, largely because Paine summoned up the colonists consensus, the radical humanist is remembered as less a hero than a heretic markered trace remains of his lodgings, his work places, his hangouts. No experts or biographers are available here for his defense. He is not dishonored, exactly; neglected is the

To be sure, Tom Paine was never the ideal hero, the kind easily accepted for eternal memorials. An eccentric, wandering misfit for almost all of his life, he likewise specialized with one magnificent exception - in personal failures. British born, a secondary school dropout, he spent the first half of his life in hopeless personal and professional insolvency. He could not make it as a teacher, a grocer, a tobacconist, a sailor - and at age 37, owing to a fortunate relationship with Benjamin Franklin. and facing debtors prison, he fled Lindon for Philadelphia in 1774.

Even now it is difficult to envision an immigrant less likely to succeed. Paine was a drunk, an indolent, he was without specific skills and also unreliable. Yet in just over a year he constructed the 79 pages of Common Serse which became the gospel of American independence. Until that point colonialists were hardly united as to separation from Britain, and even many niiitants wavered on all-out war. But Common Sense became the best seller of its time equivalent sales today would be 45 million copies) and the issue was joined. Philadelphia authorities say Paine's character had nothing to do with the rejection of his bust; rather, it was removed because it 'lacks authenticity", that is, it was not an original fixture in Independence Hall. Perhaps. In any event its rejection is fitting, for such was the story of the man's life.

He demanded the United States of America, and got it. He proposed equality of races, social security, and public education, and they teo eventually came to pass. But though his ideas have been accepted, his person has not. We prefer our heroes to be handsome and God fearing and to bathe every night.

Today Tom Paine's bust sits in the obscurity of a private office here, a remainder that this allible man taught us much, but not enough.

Kidnaped Colonel Sought; Beirut Fighting Eases

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - Security forces searched Beirut for a kidnaped American Army colonel today as the government reported another ceasefire in the week-

long street fighting that took at least 277 lives. A security officer said all Palestine guerrilla organizations denied any knowledge of Col. Ernest R. Morgan, a member of the U.S. military aid mission in Turkey who was seized at the height of the fighting Sunday afternoon. Morgan, 43, of Petersburg, Va., was stopping for the night in Beirut on his way back from a meeting of the Central Treaty Organization in Pakistan. The manager of his hotel said he insisted on driving to the airport to "buy some magazines."

"We warned him not to go, but he became quite angry and said no one could tell him what to do," the manager

Morgan's taxi driver reported that a group of armed men dragged the colonel out of the car at a roadblock near a Palestinian refugee camp. Although Morgan was not in uniform, another source said the men told the driver he was "an American general" who had come to supply the right-wing Christian Phalange party, whose private army was warring with leftwing Palestinian guerrillas and the Lebanese Moslem faction supporting them.

Gandhi Raps Conservatives

NEW DELHI, India (AP) - Prime Minister Indira Gandhi seems to be hinting that she wants the United

States to resume economic aid to India. In a speech Wednesday to young members of her Congress party, Mrs. Gandhi denounced conservative Indian politicians who she said for the past two decades had urged the United States to halt economic assistance to India because of its socialist policies. "This was not a minor thing, but a deep-rooted con-

spiracy to remove India from the socialist path she had chosen," Mrs. Gandhi said. The day before, she told a group of visiting American

schoolteachers that her government wants to improve relations with the U.S. government and hopes President Ford will not change his plans to visit India later this U.S. economic aid to India was suspended in 1971 when

the Nixon administration backed Pakistan in the Indo-Pakistani war that resulted in independence for Bangladesh. Since independence in 1947, India had received \$10 billion in U.S. aid.

Women Urge Wide Reform

MEXICO CITY (AP) - The first International Women's Conference has ended after urging a thorough reform of society's customs, laws and attitudes to enable women to be equal partners with men in charting the future of the world.

The conference recommended that the United Nations hold another such meeting in 1980 to assess progress. In a declaration of principle adopted shortly before the twoweek conference ended late Wednessiay, the delegates also said a redistribution of economic power from rich to poor nations is necessary to improve the status of women. Inequality of women and men is closely linked to the poverty which imprisons most nations because of the "profoundly unjust world economic system," the

declaration stated. It was approved by a vote of 89-2 with 18 abstentions. The United States and Israel voted against the declaration, which contained a condemnation of Zionism along with imperialism and colonialism.

Official Gets Death Threat

VIENTIANE, Laos (AP) - An armed Pathet Lao guard threatened to kill the acting director of the U.S. Information Service in Vientiane today when the American tried to enter his office.

The American, Lawrence C. Daks, said the guard shouted, "Get out or I'll kill you!" in Lao as he chambered a round in his AK47 assault rifle.

Daks, a Lao-speaking veteran of service in Vientiane, retreated. He told Western newsmen accompanying him that the threat was probably a "personal reaction" rather than the result of orders from Communist Pathet Lao officials who now dominate the Laotian government.
