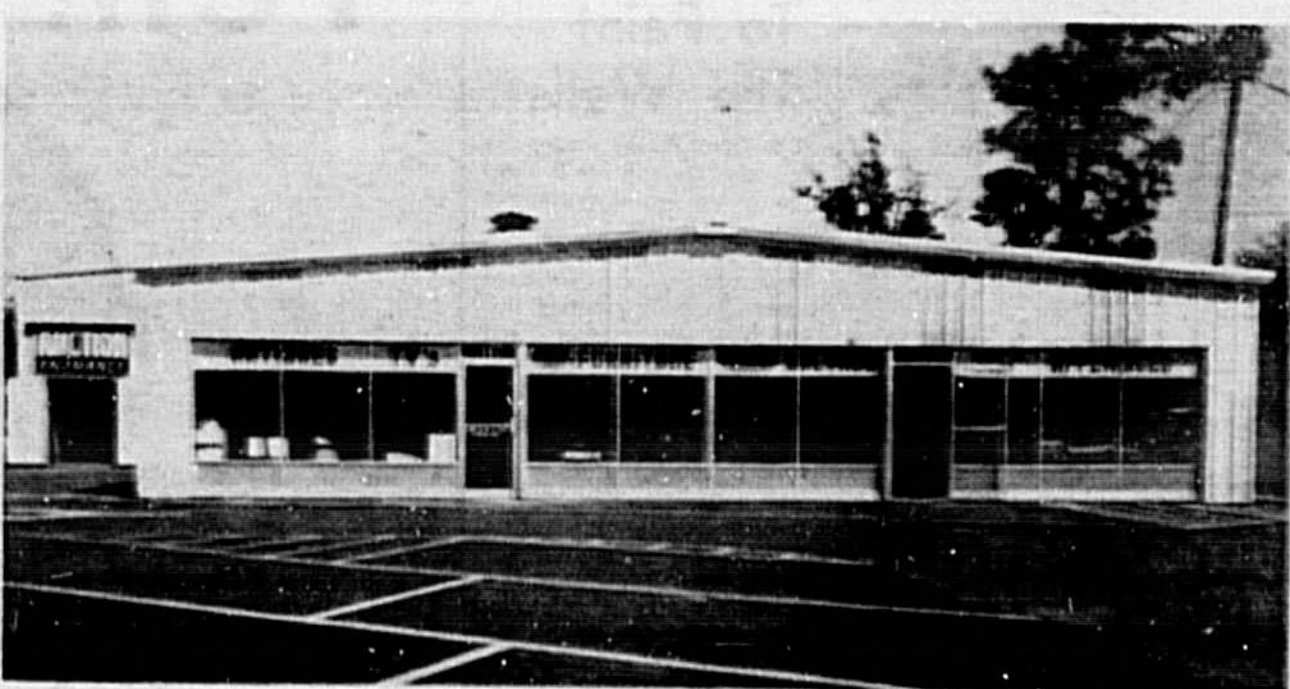
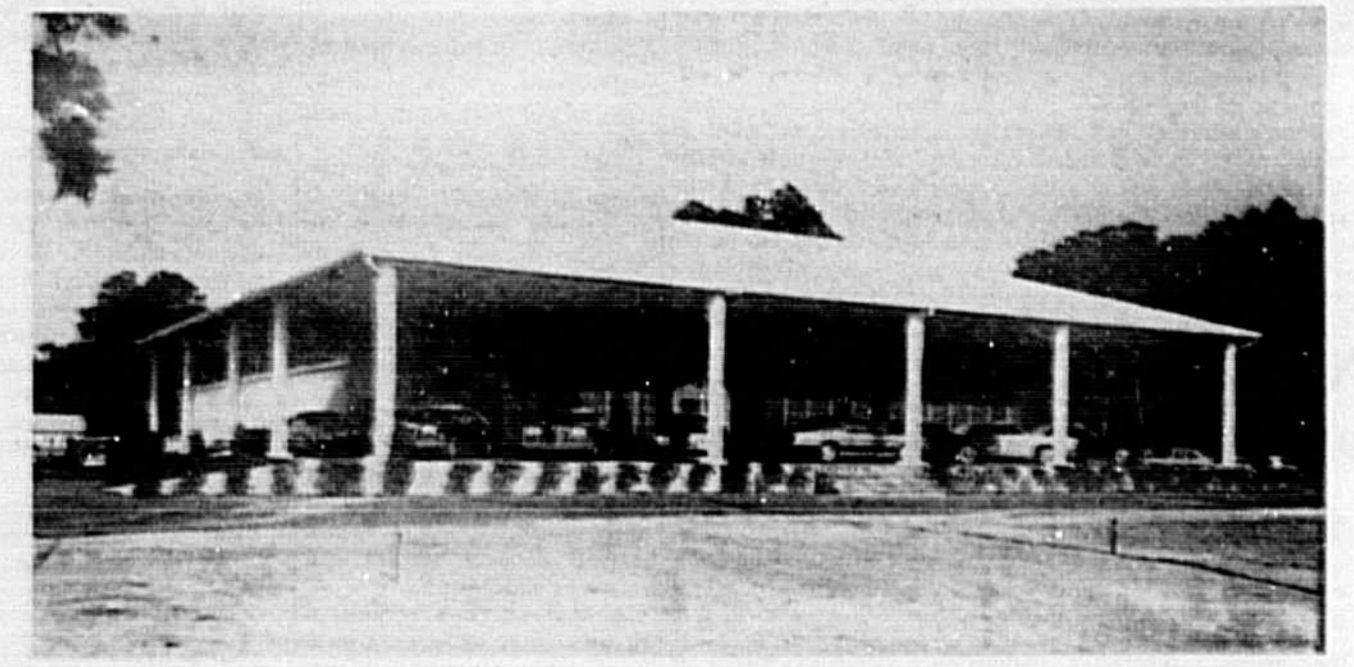

Blackburn Pleas Heard By Jurist

Motions are being heard today at Melbourne before Judge Tom Waddell Jr. in the case of Harlan Blackburn, charged jointly with Clyde Lee and Matthew Smith with two counts of conducting a lottery.

Blackburn's case was originally scheduled for trial in Orange County and stemmed from a raid conducted in Orange and Seminole Counties in May, 1970.

Orange County Solicitor Rom Powell dropped the charges in order to keep Blackburn from going to trial on April 19 under change of venue to Key West, where Powell contended the state could not receive a fair trial due to the fact that residents of the area view bolita as an innocuous recreation.

Subsequently charges were filed in Seminole County by State Attorney Abbott Herring. The trial for the trio has been set for this Monday, May 3.

Blackburn's attorney, Edward Hanlon, who successfully defended him in a morals case last May, is arguing motions for the court to require the state to name a "confidential informer," a motion for severance (a separate trial for Blackburn) and presumably a motion for continuance, since the case is tentatively listed on the criminal court docket for Monday. The state's case is being prosecuted by Powell, appointed as special prosecutor.

A motion for change of venue was denied by the court yesterday. The defense had contended that due to widespread publicity the defendant could not receive a fair trial in Sanford. Hanlon also contended that Blackburn's arraignment that in cases of conjunctive charges in which two counties are involved, the defendant has the right to elect in which county he is to be tried.

Man, Wife Shoot Each Other Oviedoans Wounded

A 70-year-old Oviedo man and his 68-year-old wife were treated for bullet wounds received Thursday after the pair shot each other, according to Lt. L. J. Kris, chief county investigator.

Tenant Kris reported an argument between James Ashe and Sadie, his wife, was ended when the woman shot her husband in the left leg with a .22 caliber slug, and he retaliated with a slanting blast from a .410 gauge shotgun into his wife's chest and stomach.

The detective said both were removed to Winter Park Memorial Hospital for treatment but the man was released while his wife was admitted. The hospital this morning listed her condition as "satisfactory."

Kris said neither husband nor wife would take a warrant against the other. Therefore, at the present time, no charges have been filed by county authorities.

According to the detective, Constable Chester Boyd received a call to come to the Ashe home on Johnson Hill. Upon his arrival, Kris said Boyd was met by the woman, who staggered from the house asking to be taken to a doctor. Noting the woman's bloody chest Boyd took her to the hospital, while Richard Laese, Boyd's deputy, was dispatched to the house, where he found Ashe with a battered head and blood coming from his leg wound.

An ambulance was called to remove the man to the hospital while Kris was called with Robert Grant, county identification man, to begin an investigation. By this time, Kris said, the man had been returned from the hospital and returned home to re-visit the bizarre happening to the detectives.

The detective quoted Ashe as saying his wife became angered after he refused to tell her where he had been for several hours that morning, and struck him over the head. While he was getting his shot gun, the woman obtained a pistol and hid behind a door. When Ashe entered the room, Kris said she shot him in the leg and he returned the fire with the pellets striking the woman in the chest and stomach.

Powers Trial Continued

The trial of Ronald Powers, charged with second degree murder in the death of his 18-month-old stepdaughter, Lana Bennett, again has been continued, with no date being set.

Motions in the case for continuance were filed on April 28. A previous motion for continuance was filed on April 7, with an order entered on April 22 setting the trial for Monday, May 3. The case was originally

set for trial on April 12. Depositions were taken April 1 from Mrs. Charlene Powers, who entered a guilty plea to manslaughter last month. Mrs. Powers had also been tried on second degree murder charges, and entered the plea as her emotion packed trial was nearing its closing moments. She was released upon her own recognizance and is under pre-sentence investigation.

Powers is also charged with assault and battery on his wife, stemming from an incident last Thanksgiving. Powers is under \$50,000 bond.

Judge Tom Waddell Jr. granted the continuance at a request of defense attorney Mack Cleveland, who said that he was involved in other legal matters.

County School Supt. John Angel has replied to a U.S. Justice Department assistant attorney general for civil rights over allegations that the county school system is discriminating in personnel practices.

Supt. Angel disclosed a copy of his reply to discrimination complaints from Jervis Leonard, U.S. Justice Department official who dispatched Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) agents here to investigate complaints from various school staff members.

The educator told Leonard the conclusion he had reached regarding discriminatory personnel practices were not founded and were predicated on a questionable attempt at investigating complaints.

"I am sure the agents sent to were good men. However, their comments on what they saw and heard indicated to me that the complaint was illegitimate initially," Angel wrote.

The above quotation was in reference to statements from FBI agents that they could find "no problems" after the agents talked with various school staff members.

In an April 9 letter to School Board attorney Douglas Stenstrom, Leonard claimed that the school system was violating the federal court order which desegregated the school system and demanded school officials advise him by May 3 how black coaches removed from the Crooms High School staff would be used in the 1971-72 year.

"You make the point that eight of 12 head coaches are not certified to teach physical education, May I point out that physical education is not a prerequisite for coaching in Florida schools," Angel stated.

Angel stated coaches were employed by a principal based on the applicants' record, experience and apparent capability to do the job.

The superintendent made it plain to Leonard that it was necessary to transfer some of the former all black Crooms coaching staff in order to achieve the proper ratio of black to white teachers in school, which is in keeping with the desegregation order of U.S. District Judge George Young.

County School Supt. John Angel has replied to a number of requests and demands made by a group of concerned black citizens earlier this week in the aftermath of a picket line that was thrown around Goldsboro Elementary School protesting a rumored replacement of a retiring black principal by a white principal.

Directing his reply to Rev. J. E. Conley, one of a group that met with the superintendent in preliminary talks over school problems, Angel pointed out the school district operates under

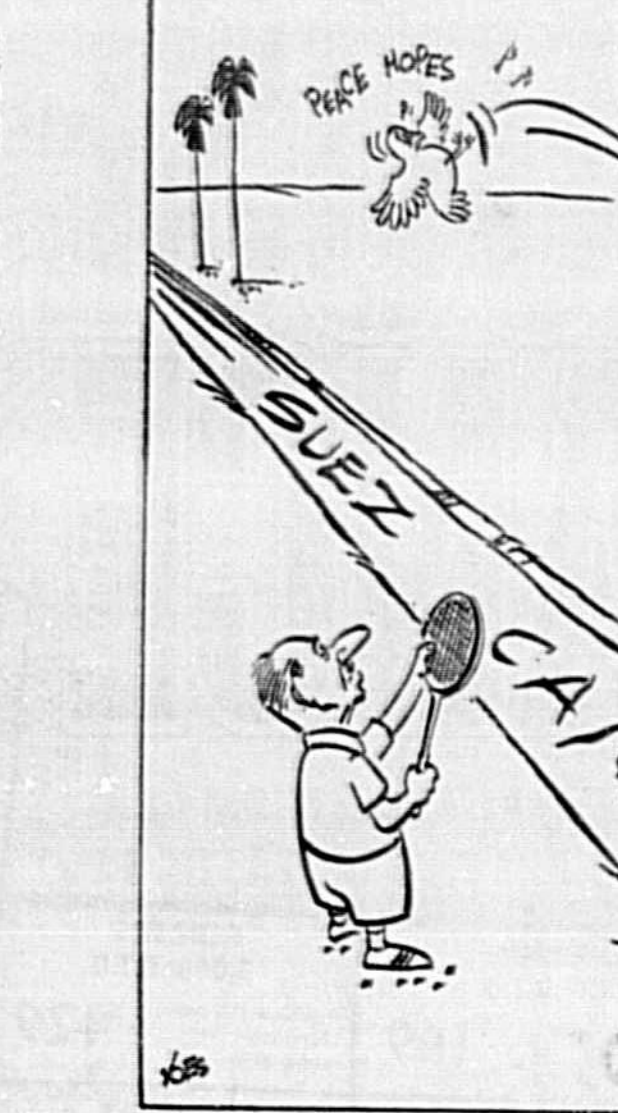

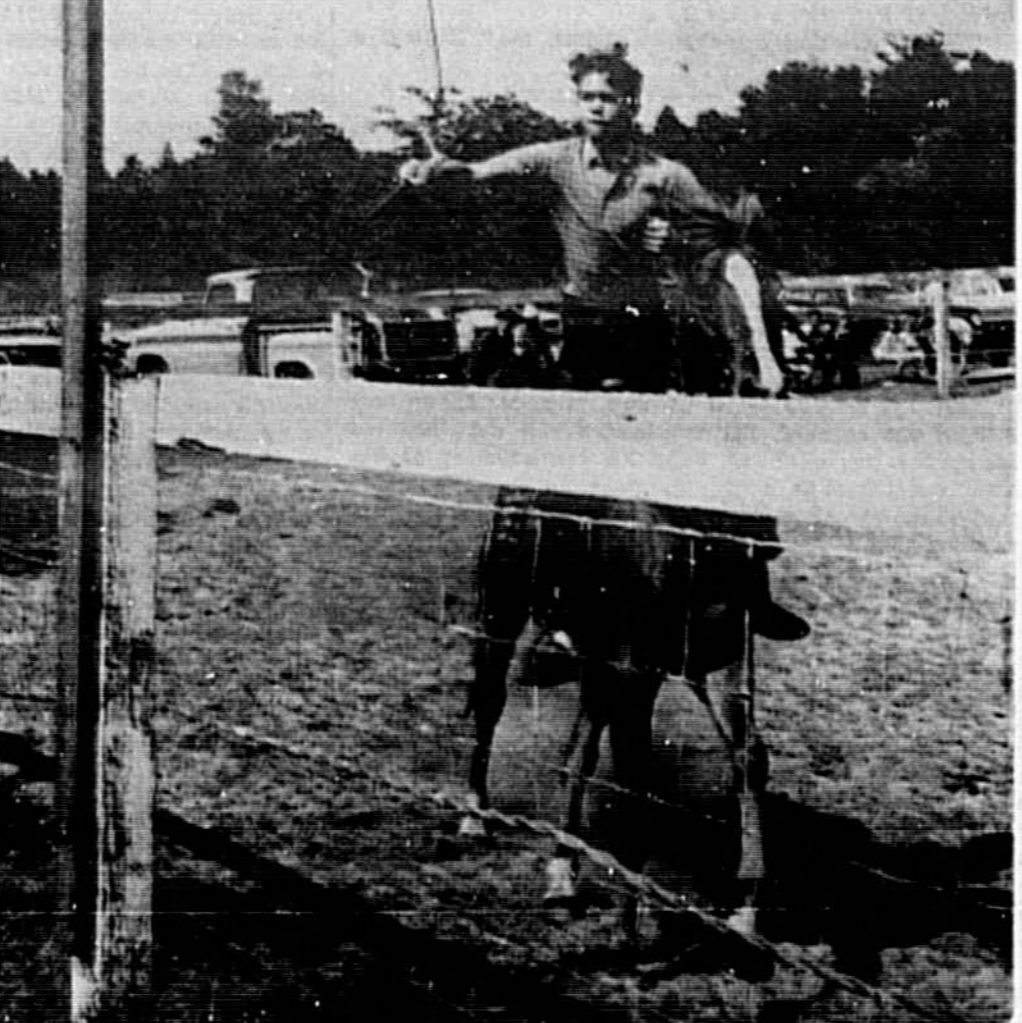

3 Suspects Will Plead

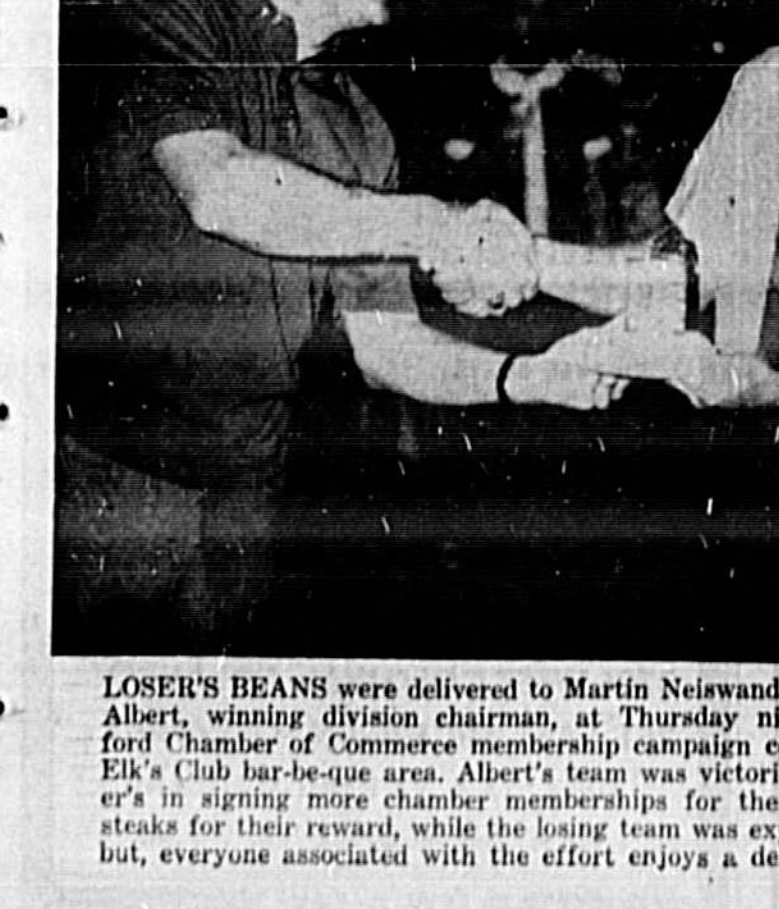

Peaceniks, Cops Clash

Washington Vehicular Traffic Snarled

WASHINGTON (AP) — Thousands of anti-war demonstrators trying to paralyze the nation's government clashed repeatedly with police and snarled rush-hour traffic on some city streets today. But a strong show of federal troops kept traffic flowing across a major bridge in the capital...
Three hours after sunrise, more than 2,000 protesters had been arrested by flying squads of policemen wielding billy clubs and firing volley after volley of tear gas. National Guardsmen were deployed to aid police, and helicopters filled with about 200 Marines landed on the Washington Monument grounds...
Demonstrators appeared to have been thwarted in two of their major objectives—blocking four Potomac River bridges and marching on the Pentagon...
But the protesters tied up traffic in the Georgetown and downtown areas by hurling debris—and in some cases themselves—onto the streets in dozens of locations. Some vehicles were overturned and others set afire...
The demonstrators were all young men. However, there was a considerable sprinkling of young women...
The "Mayday" demonstration had been billed in advance as a massive show of nonviolent civil disobedience, but even before dawn it turned into a series of hit-and-run clashes with riot-equipped police...
The police and military are keeping the upper hand but they are having their hands full," said a city hall spokesman...
Lining up the four major bridges linking Virginia with the capital were an estimated 2,000 marines and Army troops, standing almost shoulder to shoulder and holding rifles with sheathed bayonets...
During a normal rush hour, the bridges carry 75,000 cars. Traffic on the bridges was stopped at times, but generally it was about like any other Monday morning flow of suburban commuters heading for jobs in the city...
Hundreds of the commuters were caught in clouds of tear gas fired by police to disperse demonstrators in Georgetown (Cont. On Page 1A, Col. 5)

Airport Utilities Pact May Win U. S. OK

The City of Sanford may be allowed by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) to lease the Sanford Airport's electric and telephone lines on a 20-year arrangement to private utility companies, with the proceeds derived to be put back into improvements to the airport's sewage treatment system...
This was confirmed today by Sanford City Manager W. E. Knowles, who said the long bottleneck over the airport's utility problems with the FAA may have been resolved after a telephone conversation between the city manager and FAA officials in Atlanta and Washington...
FAA Refuses
Until Friday, the FAA has steadfastly refused to allow the sale or leasing of airport utility apparatus to private firms, despite the deterioration of the old equipment which was installed here when the airport was a part of U.S. Navy operation but has since been phased out...
Private utility firms have not been too happy over prospects of having to replace worn out equipment to supply services to a facility which they do not own or have a long term lease to enable them to amortize the costs of such improvements...
Now Knowles says the FAA has indicated it may approve a 20-year lease if the details are satisfactory...
The city manager proposes to lease the airport's utilities to Southern Bell for \$18,000 and Florida Light and Power for \$20,000 over 20 years with one-third down and 19 equal payments for the remainder...
Improvements Needed
Payments are to be used to make needed improvements to the airport's sewer system by linking it to the city sewer lines. At present the airport waste is being dumped into an open ditch at the airport...
If the proposed lease is approved by the FAA, the private companies will be charged with operating, maintaining and replacing worn equipment during the 20 years...
Knowles said he had discussed the proposal with both utility firms and they have indicated they will approve it...
"Now, it's up to the FAA and I think there is a good possibility for approval," the city manager added.

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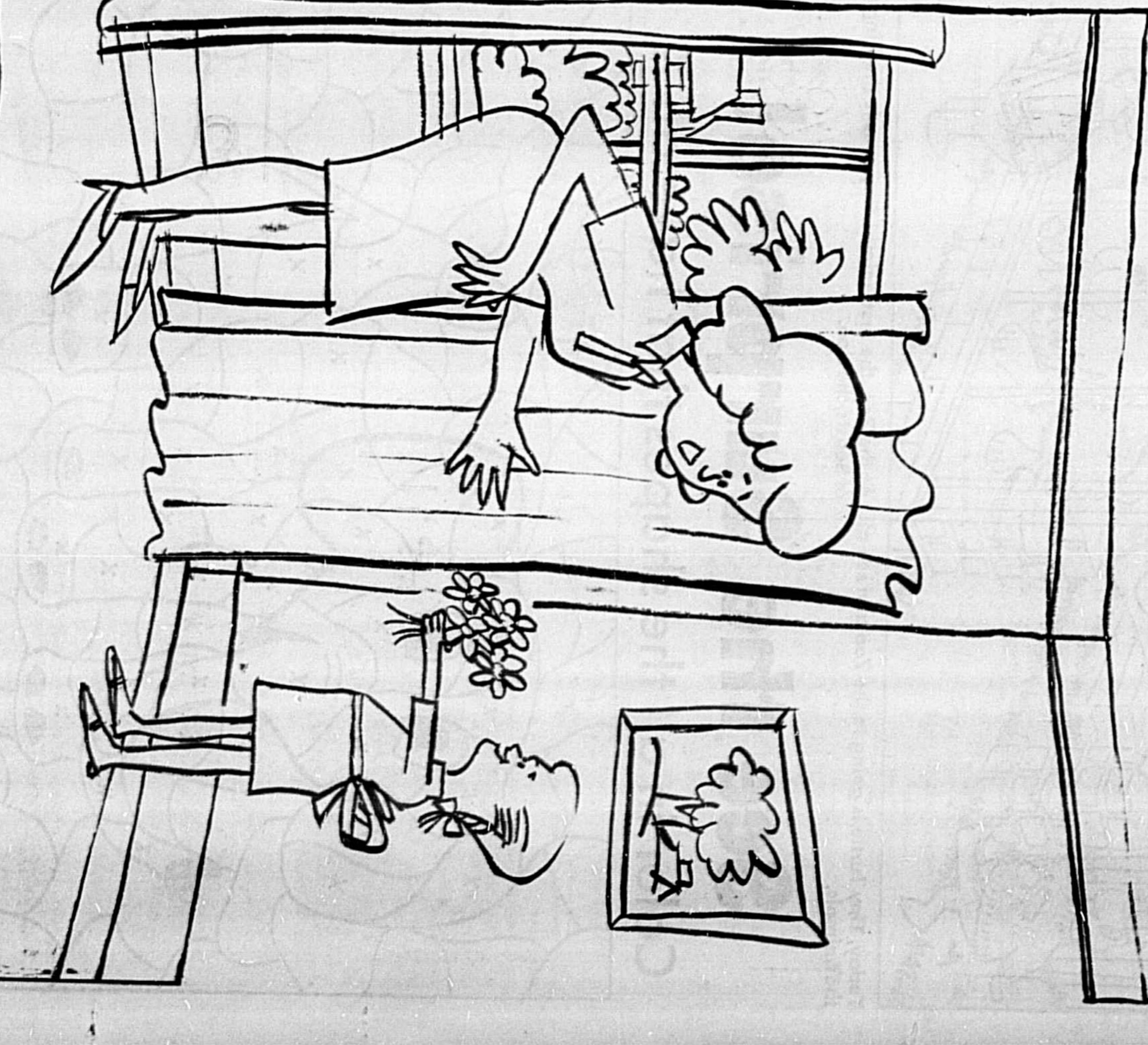

Three replacements were pointed today and "the others will be replaced in one way or another," Ed Wren, newly-appointed vice president in charge of public relations, said...
Wren refused to disclose the reasons for the resignations but said all were officials in the marketing and sales operations division of GAC...
The corporation, with an annual volume of \$2 billion, moved to Miami from Pennsylvania about a year ago and a new breed of executives was hired.

Three Plead 'No Contest' To Charges

Three men charged with drug violations withdrew a former guilty plea and pleaded "nolo contendere" (no contest) to a misdemeanor before Circuit Court Judge Tom Waddell this morning...
