





The time of decision is approaching on the question of whether the federal government should guarantee substantial bankloans to Lockheed so production may be completed on the Tristar jetliners, on which the future of Lockheed Aircraft Corp. may well depend.

Help Lockheed

When Rolls Royce, the British firm, went bankrupt because of cost overruns on its contract to produce engines for the Tristar, Lockheed also became endangered.

It now is possible both can survive if the U.S. government assists by insuring some loans.

The British have agreed to inject \$288 million in state funds to produce the Rolls Royce engines. A 15-bank consortium is said to be willing to provide approximately \$400 million of the additional \$700 million that Lockheed must

The U.S. government is asked to underwrite the last \$300 million in required loans. This is not a loan, but an insurance policy.

There is only one reason why the Administration and Congress should support Lockheed that is acceptable - the nation's security.

Lockheed is a major defense contractor. which has contracts for four major weapons systems critically needed by the United States.

Additionally, it is likely that the collapse of Lockheed would be the beginning of a domino effect throughout the nation that also would send hundreds of defense suppliers into bank-

### May Win U. S. OK PAMELA SUE LAB

The City of Sanford may be allowed by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) to lease the Sanford Airport's electric and telephone lines on a 20-year arrangement to pri-

This was confirmed today by Sanford City Manager W. E. Knowles, who said the long bottleneck over the airport's utility problems with the FAA may have been resolved after a telephone conversation between the city manager and FAA officials

in Atlanta and Washington. FFA Refuses

Until Friday, the FAA has steadfastly refused to allow the sale or leasing of airport utility apparatus to private firms, despite the deterioration of the old equipment which was installed here when the airport was a part of U.S. Navy operation but has since been phased out. Private utility firms have not been too happy over pros-

pects of having to replace worn out equipment to supply service to a facility which they do not own or have a long term lease to enable them to amortize the costs of such improvements. Now Knowles says the FAA has indicated it may approve a 20-year lease if the details are satisfactory. The city manager proposes to lease the airport's utilities

to Southern Bell for \$18,000 and to Florida Light and Power for \$60,000 over 20 years with one-third down and 19 equal payments for the remainder.

Improvements Needed

Payments are to be used to make needed improvements to the airport's sewer system by linking it to the city sewer lines. At present the airport waste is being dumped into an open ditch at the airport. If the proposed lease is approved by the FAA, the private

companies will be charged with operating, maintaining and replacing worn equipment during the 30 years. Knowles said he had discussed the proposal with both utility firms and they have indicated they will approve it. "Now, its up to the FAA and I think there is a good pos-

sibility for approval," the city manager added.
