Bank robber still unidentified

LONGWOOD — Longwood police continued to investigate a bank robbery at Great Western Bank on Wednesday. Police have still not learned the identity of the man video taped by security cameras during the robbery. Assistant Police Chief Terry Baker said this morning, "We are still waiting for someone to see the man's photo and possibly identify him, but as of early today we haven't had any calls."

The robber escaped with an undetermined amount of money following what police said was a calm and polite robbery of the bank at 3:42 p.m. Wednesday. No one was injured in the incident.

On the waterfront

Studied for 83 years, lakefront development near

Part 1 of two parts. Part 2 will appear Sunday.

SANFORD — Work on a master plan for development of Sanford's lakefront continues with suggestions wide and varied.

"We should bulkhead the waterfront, thereby making available hundreds of the most desirable building lots for both business and pleasure. A boulevard on the lakefront connecting with the Lake Jesup boulevard would provide one of our most valuable assets."

The quote was not from this past week's meeting of the Waterfront Development Steering Committee. The suggestion was made on Nov. 14, 1911, by the Commercial Club of Sanford, according to city museum staff research.

Although the bulkhead has been constructed, what to do with the nearby land remains a topic of consideration.

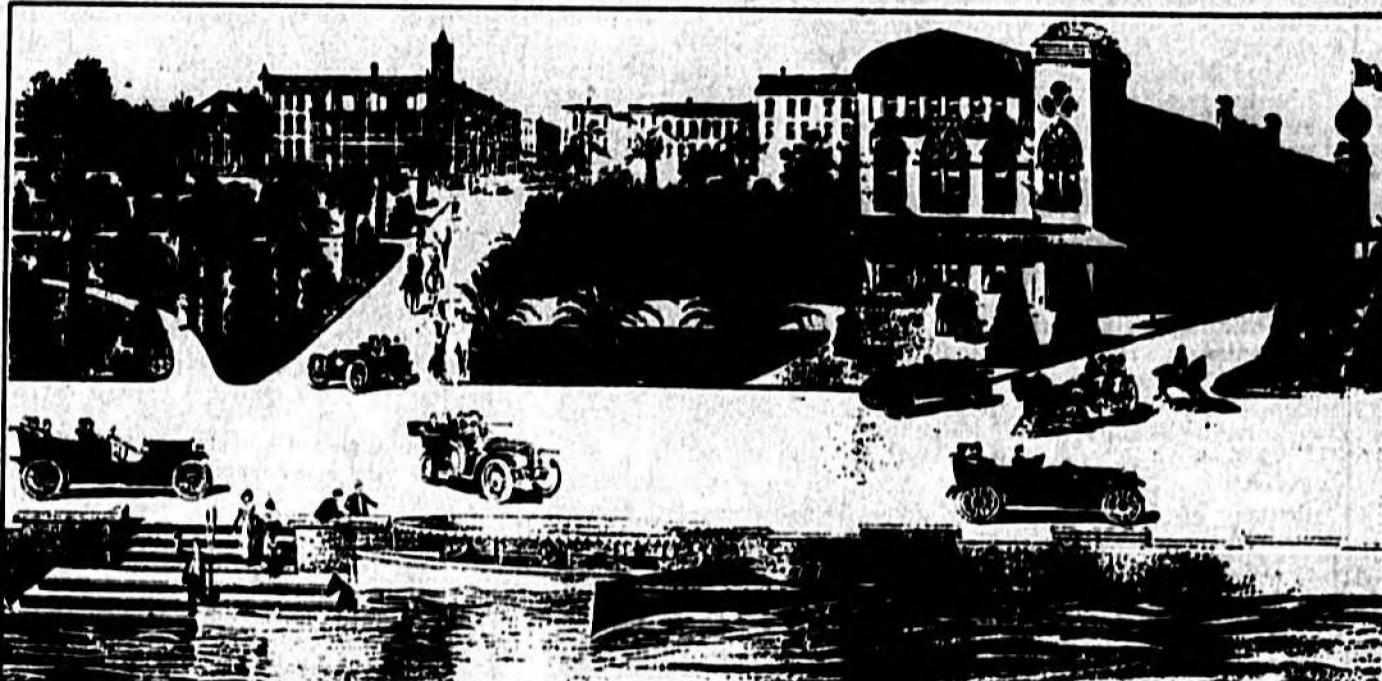
The Lake Monroe Waterfront Master Plan Steering Committee met to continue working on development concepts Wednesday afternoon. It was the group's fifth meeting.

"It was an excellent meeting," said City Planner Jay Marder. "I feel as though we got quite a bit of work accomplished toward determining the steps we should follow next."

The committee has already produced many documents containing proposals advanced for lakefront development through two separate meetings open to the public.

In one of the documents, suggestions proposed in 1992 by Andrea Duany were included. "We have

Duany's lakefront plan calls for much commercial development

SANFORD — One proposal in the hands of the waterfront development committee was authored by world-renowned architect and historic town planner Andres Duany. Duany recommends commercial development of the lakefront.

In April of last year, Duany, hired by the Sanford Historic Trust, supplied the Trust with copies of his plans for preservation type development of the historic districts of Sanford.

Lakefront buildings should have an arcaded first floor for restaurants and shops, and at least three floors above designated for apartments.

Fraud is discovered; AAA fires 1

HEATHROW — A spokesman for the American Automobile Association said Thursday no holders of temporary overseas auto policies were uninsured despite discovery this week of a five-year scheme defrauding them of nearly \$120,000 in refunds.

"No one was uninsured," said AAA spokesman Jerry Cheske. "AAA stands behind its policies, whatever it takes. Fortunately, no policyholder was affected by this."

A 31-year veteran AAA manager was fired Wednesday after he was confronted with the scheme, according to a report filed with the Seminole County Sheriff's Office by AAA Audit Manager Charles Covington. No charges have been filed against the man, a resident of Lake Mary. Sheriff's spokesman George

Lake Mary puts hold on service fees

LAKE MARY — Developers and homeowners building in Lake Mary got a break last night when city commissioners postponed action on a service fee proposal that would have increased the cost of new construction.

Commissioners voted to table the matter, with most expressing unwillingness to add more charges to the cost of commercial and residential construction.

The charge would have been in addition to the impact fees already levied against new developments. It was to have helped defray costs of providing municipal services to new businesses and residents, before the property could be entered on tax rolls and produce income to the city.

In the absence of City Manager John Litton, the matter was pre-

Chiles presses for prison plan

Welfare windfall would add beds without tax increase

TALLAHASSEE — Gov. Lawton Chiles will continue to press for a long-term prison construction plan despite a \$100 million welfare windfall that would add thousands of beds without a tax increase.

Even his staunchest supporters, however, agree there's little chance a major tax increase will pass in the two-week session that begins Monday.

"This revenue will take some of the pressure off the need for new taxes," House Speaker Bolley "Bo" Johnson, D-Milton, said Thursday.

Also Thursday, Chiles and Johnson said there are no plans to address the cancellation of homeowners insurance policies over hurricane risks during the session.

Chiles said the move by Insurance Commissioner Tom Gallagher to issue a 90-day freeze on cancellations buys enough time for consideration of a permanent solution later this year.

"We'll look at what this moratorium does and see if that is the way to go now," Chiles said. "When we can get a plan there, we certainly want to address that. It's a tremendously serious issue in Florida."

The recovering economy and improved monitoring by welfare workers has led economists to drop Aid to Families with Dependent Children projections for next

year by 20,000 cases. That will produce \$78 million this year and next in extra cash, economists estimated Thursday.

The group plans to meet again Sunday to determine what impact that will have on Medicaid recipients, many of whom also get AFDC. Some budget officials believe the total in available cash could top \$120 million.

Chiles, in a meeting Thursday with Johnson, said the unexpected windfall will allow quick construction of extra dormitories at existing prisons, some new prisons and use of more drug treatment center beds. All told, Chiles said between 2,500 and 4,000 prison beds could be put in place "fairly quickly."

But the governor, who has advocated a cigarette tax increase to construct 21,000 beds through the decade, still wants a long-term construction program to reduce early releases of violent criminals.

"I don't want to see us do that unless we can do something meaningful on the back and show we're serious about construction of additional beds," Chiles said. "I still think that, to address this, we've got to look at a multi-year plan."

Johnson said House Democrats would be willing to support Chiles but wouldn't go out on a tax limb unless the Republican-led Senate was willing. The extra welfare money has only hardened the GOP stance against taxes. "I think we all have to sit down and

realize that the puff-for-the-prison isn't going to make it," said Rep. Carol Hanson, R-Boca Raton.

Chiles called the special session after vetoing much of a 7,000-bed plan passed by the Legislature. The governor also wants to change sentencing guidelines to ensure violent offenders serve at least 75 percent of their time and end release credits used to ease overcrowding.

Don Winstead, assistant Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services secretary for economic services, said the national economic recovery was largely responsible for the reduced welfare caseload.

Another factor, he said, was the ability of HRS workers to concentrate on eligibility of people for welfare payments once they got the troubled \$104 million welfare computer properly programmed last December.

Winstead said the reduction was nothing like the computer error that led to 235,000 people being removed from Medicaid rolls earlier this year. That led to a \$173 million windfall lawmakers used to balance the \$35 billion state budget for fiscal 1993-94.

Also Thursday, House Minority Leader Sandra Mortham, R-Largo, outlined a plan to pay for 10,105 prison and drug treatment beds by using \$29.7 million from the state's general fund, \$9 million in money vetoed by Chiles and \$20.7 million from the "rainy day" savings account. **See Related Editorial, Page 4A**

Judge's tirade results in new trial

PORT LAUDERDALE — A circuit judge's angry, profane tirade after a defense lawyer stayed in his chair to raise an objection during a trial last year resulted in a new trial for the defendant.

Broward Circuit Judge Thomas Coker exploded in anger and threatened jail time after defense attorney Kayo Morgan made an objection without rising.

"You know, I don't give a s--- whether you like me or dislike me or hate my guts," the judge told Morgan. "But you're not going to disrespect my robe."

On Wednesday, Coker's demand for respect brought a new trial for Morgan and his client, Carmen Alley.

The Fourth District Court of Appeal ruled 2-1 that Coker should have known better than to lose his temper in front of the jury.

Alley, who is accused of killing a pedestrian in a drunk-driving accident in 1986, will get a new trial — the third since her arrest. Her first conviction also was overturned on appeal.

27-year-old divorce case ends

PORT LAUDERDALE — C.B. Schetter's divorce case dragged on for 27 years to become the longest-running case in Broward County history — outlasting him by seven years.

A state appeals court ruled in the case Wednesday with the exclamation, "Enough is enough."

The dispute lingered through three appeals over the distribution of Schetter's estate, valued at \$750,000 in 1965, a year before he sued his wife Marcella for divorce.

"It is time to end this matter once and for all," the 4th District Court of Appeals said in its decision. "While court dockets are crowded, it does not take 15 years to secure hearings or even trials on issues."

The three-judge panel ordered a small, undisclosed portion of the original \$750,000 to be divided by a receiver between Mrs. Schetter and her ex-husband's estate after fees.

Drug racketeering trial may be delayed

MIAMI — The federal drug racketeering trial of prominent Bahamian attorney F. Nigel Bowe may be delayed until late October.

He was indicted in 1985 for running a continuing criminal enterprise, including accepting a \$250,000 bribe to act as a go-between for Colombian drug traffickers. He faces a possible life sentence.

Bowe was extradited Aug. 10, 1992, and was supposed to be tried in February. But he fired his attorney, and the trial was delayed until June 1.

On Thursday, his new lawyers, Rosemarie Robinson and David Markus, told U.S. District Judge James Lawrence King they needed more time to prepare for the case.

The judge said his first available date was after Oct. 25, and asked if Bowe, who is jailed without bond, was willing to wait. Bowe agreed.

Federal prosecutor Marcella Cohen objected, saying one witness from Europe was already in Miami for the planned June 1 trial.

King said he would rule soon on the delay.

Man pleads guilty in credit-card scam

MIAMI — The former owner of a rental car company pleaded guilty to a credit-card scam that federal prosecutors say cost customers and Barnett Bank out of about \$7.1 million.

Richard B. Goldberg, former owner and president of Celebrity Car Rental, entered a guilty plea Thursday to one count of making a false statement to a financial institution.

According to the September 1991 indictment, Celebrity had billed customers for either \$250, \$500 or \$5,000. The unauthorized billing of about 1,800 customers' credit cards totaled more than \$3.8 million.

Prosecutors said Goldberg knew about the fraudulent practices but made the false statements to Barnett Bank, which processed Celebrity's credit card business, to keep the bank from discovering it.

Goldberg faces up to 30 years in prison and a \$1 million fine when he is sentenced Sept. 10.

TV crime show subject arrested

STUART — An anonymous tip led to the arrest of a man recently featured on a television crime show who's wanted in Kentucky on a charge of first-degree murder.

Larry Edward Williamson, 42, on Thursday had a first appearance in court, and said he wouldn't fight extradition to Kentucky.

Williamson, who used the alias Richard Pepper while working as a cook at a country club in nearby Port Salerno, was being held without bail at Martin County Jail.

On Wednesday, Williamson was arrested without incident in the parking lot outside the apartment of an elderly woman for whom he cooked and ran errands.

Navy airman convicted in sexual assault case

JACKSONVILLE — A Navy airman was convicted of sexually assaulting an airman apprentice he supervised, becoming the second Navy man convicted of a homosexual sex crime this week.

Petty Officer 2nd Class Albert Ruggiero was convicted Thursday by a circuit court jury of two counts of sexual battery.

On Wednesday, a Navy court sentenced a USS Saratoga crewman to 30 months in military prison for sexually assaulting another sailor aboard the aircraft carrier.

Ruggiero, 32, was charged with raping the 18-year-old sailor, who is from Michigan, after a drunken party in December at a mobile home near Cecil Field Naval Air Station, where they are both based.

The verdict came down to whether six jurors believed the victim, now 19 and still at Cecil Field, when he told them Ruggiero raped him after the party.

Assistant Public Defender Gonzalo Andux told jurors in his closing argument that the victim's testimony and statements to friends and investigators were "laced with inconsistencies."

SANFORD — The Central Florida Zoological Society's Travel and Safari Club is scheduling two overseas trips for later this year. Registration is now open.

The Zoo's Director of Development, John Hughes, will be leading the first adventure trip August 20 through 31, to Kenya's wildlife preserves in Africa.

Researcher: Minority girls rejected most

TALLAHASSEE — Minority girls say they're rejected by classmates more often than minority boys, and the difference may be in their sports activities, a Florida State University researcher said.

Black girls in mostly white elementary school classes and white girls in predominantly black classrooms reported rejection by their peers more often than boys in the same situation, according to the study released Thursday by Janet Kistner.

An associate professor of psychology, Kistner said she asked 659 elementary school children about their relationships with classmates of the same gender.

Twenty-four percent of the minority girls said they experienced rejection by classmates, compared with 12 percent of girls of the majority race in the class, she said.

How should we pay for more jails?

More law enforcement and more jails cost money. Yet no matter what suggestions are made to raise funds, there are some who object.

Many smokers do not want the suggested 25 cents per pack tax aimed at them. As one local smoker said, "It should be something that everyone pays. I don't think the people who smoke or drink should be the ones to pay."

To help fight crimes specifically against tourists, hotel and motel owners have voiced objections to any increase in the tourism tax, saying they are already over-taxed.

Cities or counties suggesting they increase taxes with which to enlarge or better equip their law enforcement agencies are attacked by people who complain their taxes are already too high.

Many people want more jails. Any suggestion to build a new one however, will draw an onslaught of nearby residents resulting in sure-death to the career of any commissioner supporting the plan.

Law officers say courts are not strict enough. Court officials say the jails don't have the room for lengthy sentences.

Even the need for more jail space is questioned. Some people say we have enough, while others believe vacant government buildings and military bases could be used at a fraction of the cost.

The Florida Legislature will soon meet to consider several proposals. It will be interesting to observe, with special interest groups and lobbyists win support for their causes? Will legislators avoid supporting any tax increases?

Everyone seems to agree that Florida needs to fight the growing crime problem. Yet no one is willing to sacrifice.

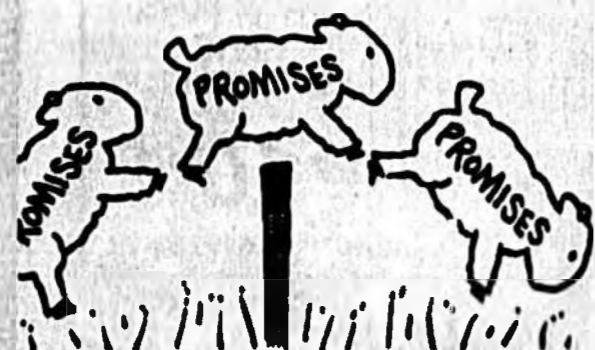

Boomers suffer from collective amnesia

To the class of 1993: We've bequeathed a cruddy world to you. Most of 1993's world is not of our doing, but much of it is a creation of our rigidity and bigotry. We're still fighting yesterday's wars — both at home and abroad.

For starters, you graduate at a time of prolonged uncertainty. One national consumer expert, Richard T. Curtin, says you've been living in a period of "diminished expectations."

You face a depressed economy, escalating political hostility, heightened class and ethnic tensions, the decline of the MBA as a ticket to corporate heaven, and the absence of something our generation took for granted: sustained optimism.

One of my students capsuled part of the problem in his final paper, "Generation X: The Lost Generation?" "Ever since this generation was born, the media have found fault with it. They declared war on America's youth," wrote Tristan Louis.

And they haven't let up yet. That's because both my generation and the baby boomers suffer from historical amnesia. We forget what a bunch of irresponsible knuckleheads we were at your age.

But I do think we had great love affairs with books and newspapers. You're in bed with

television. And newspapers are only your weekend assignments.

I can't fault you for not reading newspapers. Most of them are exercises in elitist arrogance. They spend as much time talking to each other as they do to you.

A few weeks ago, a sociology professor at Rutgers University, Jackson Toby, wrote an op-ed piece for the Wall Street Journal called "College Students Are a Poor Investment."

What nonsense. Are high-school graduates and functional illiterates better investments? Please!

Toby cited three students — one who didn't know what "allegiance" meant, one who spent most of her weekdays watching television, and a senior who

wrote papers filled with spelling mistakes (and wrote out the days of the week with lower-case letters).

His problem may be that he's not teaching in an academically superior university. In my classes at the University of North Carolina, I have the usual share of dull students. But when the Socratic dialectic is working, the classes soar.

Most of them write very well and several wrote, as Cyrano would say, magnificently. One student began his paper about a prominent Southern authority as "the Boswell of Southern culture." I rhapsodized about his lead. But when blank stares greeted me, I asked how many knew who James Boswell was. Nobody.

In another class, I cited the Thucydidean theory of history to explain the cycles of censorship, but his name touched no mnemonic chords.

So what! You kids have other cognitive strengths. Many of you play your computers as if you were composing a sonata. Your metaphors are audaciously eloquent.

Twenty-five years from now, you will have produced your share of scholars, corporate executives and humanitarians. Like Louis Armstrong promise, "It's a wonderful world." Make it even better. I know you will.

Base-closure: Choices tough

WASHINGTON — The Defense Base Closure and Realignment Commission is facing much tougher choices than it faced two years ago, and it now seems disposed to make some very hard decisions that have been ducked by the Pentagon.

Back in 1991, the commission considered closing bases not on the Pentagon's original list. At the last moment it backed away, because its statutory authority was unclear. Congress has since passed an amendment to the base-closure law giving the commission specific authority to close bases on its own initiative so long as it gives communities 30-days notice to allow them to be heard.

On May 21, the commission has scheduled a meeting during which it will vote on whether to add any bases to the Pentagon's list. It now appears virtually certain that more than a few bases will be added.

Actually, the commission has already added three bases to the original list: McClellan Air Force Base in Sacramento, Calif., the Presidio in Monterey, Calif., and Great Lakes Naval Station. The two California facilities were eliminated from the Pentagon list by Defense Secretary Les Aspin, who was under tremendous political pressure.

Many communities are defending its bases by presenting evidence that other bases should be considered for closure instead. In order to fully investigate this possibility, the commission needs to add these other bases to their list. Among these are the Portsmouth, N.H., shipyard; the Long Beach, Calif. shipyard; possibly the Norfolk, Va., shipyard; and the Ingelside, Texas, naval station.

The commission's biggest problem concerns maintenance depots. Each uniform service runs its own maintenance depots. The Pentagon has found that there is currently overcapacity approaching 50 percent. The problem is that each service fights to protect its own turf, and there is little cross-service utilization of maintenance facilities.

Eighteen months ago, Joint Chiefs Chairman Gen. Colin Powell decided to do something about it. He ordered all the services to get together and come up with a depot cross-utilization plan.

It didn't happen. The Marine Corps refused to take part, demanding that its two depots remain open. Powell simply threw up his hands, admitted it was beyond his power, and has left the commission to deal with the problem.

The commission has two options. It can force cross-service use of depots by closing a number not on the Pentagon's list. But some on the commission staff question whether they have enough data to make decisions on what should stay open and what should close.

The other option would be to remove all depots from this year's closure list, and order

the secretary of defense to do a study of cross-servicing, then wait for the 1995 round of closings to solve the problem.

Then, too, the Navy is in trouble again. Two years ago, the Navy did a slipshod job of deciding which bases to close. This year it overreacted, developing computer models and building a massive paper trail to justify the bases it has chosen to close or move.

However, the Navy is being attacked from all sides. Community after community has brought forward convincing arguments that the Navy has made decisions that defy rational explanation.

For instance, the Navy wants to move six major commands from office buildings in Crystal City, Va., near the Pentagon, and spread them over the country. The Navy says that over a 20-year period this will save taxpayers \$592 million.

However, auditors hired by Crystal City businesses have examined the Navy's numbers and make a strong case the relocations will actually end up costing taxpayers an extra \$216.9 million.

The Navy says it has developed "90 cubic meters" of data to support its base-closing decisions. But as retired Navy Capt. Robin White, who is fighting to keep the Charleston Naval Station open, noted, "If all that data is as bad as some I have seen on Charleston, then they have 90 cubic feet of garbage."

The commission's staff is spending a considerable amount of time trying to reconcile the Navy's data, and if the commission decides to make wholesale changes on any closure list, it will be the Navy's.

As outlined in the base-closure process, the secretary of defense supplies to the commission a list of bases the Pentagon proposes for closure or realignment. The commission reviews the list and has the absolute right to remove any base from the list if it finds that the Pentagon "substantially deviated" from eight specific criteria used to determine if a base should be closed.

On July 1, the commission sends its list to the president. He can approve or reject it in its entirety. He may make no specific additions or deletions. If he disapproves, no bases are closed.

Money pumped into closed bases

WASHINGTON — When the military of the world's last remaining superpower goes on a diet, there is still room for some splurging in the name of national security.

Republican senators torpedoed President Clinton's economic stimulus package amid complaints that much of the money would have gone to inner cities for amenities such as swimming pools and shopping facilities. But four years earlier, no one in Congress

raised an eyebrow when the U.S. Army spent more than \$300,000 to build a new physical fitness center at its Cameron Station facility in Virginia, seven months after the Pentagon had selected it as one of the first bases to close as part of base realignment.

Cameron Station is by no means an exception. While communities across the country have been devastated by defense cutbacks, some military installations have managed to add fat

at the very moment that the military is trying to tighten its belt. In most cases, funds that Congress appropriated for closure and realignment have been put to good use. But a series of internal audits by the Department of Defense Inspector General, reviewed by our associate Jan Moller, reveal an agency where taxpayer dollars are still being misspent in ways that range from wasteful to whimsical:

— At Pease Air Force Base in New Hampshire, which closed in March 1991, auditors discovered that telecommunications lines between the base and former President Bush's summer home in Kennebunkport, Maine, were still up and running long after they were needed. These were not just any phone lines — they were lines provided to the president by the Defense Communications System. In a new variation on the \$600 toilet seat, some of these lines cost \$10,000 per year just to operate. The auditors estimate that taxpayers paid a total of \$151,000 to maintain telephone links that nobody used. Five of the circuits in question were still up and running when the auditors arrived in January 1992, and were not shut off until the White House Communications Agency was told about the mishap.

— At Naval Station Pearl Harbor in Hawaii, construction crews continued working on new facilities to homeport the battleship USS Missouri, even after the Navy had decided to decommission the ship. The Navy awarded contracts to build pier and shore improvements for the Missouri in September 1990. Two months later, the Navy decided to mothball the ship, yet Pearl Harbor officials said the construction projects were already far enough along that to cancel them would have been an even greater waste of money. Auditors determined that the Navy could have saved \$53 million if the projects were delayed long enough to learn the fate of the USS Missouri, which hadn't been finalized when the construction contracts were handed down. Instead, the Navy canceled three smaller contracts related to the Missouri, which saved about \$6.5 million.

— Auditors also discovered that 10 projects being developed by the Army and Air Force Exchange Service and the Defense Commissary Agency were "not fully related to realignment." This included some "get well" requirements costing about \$11.1 million to improve existing facilities. Included in these "get well" funds was a request from Cannon Air Force Base for alterations to their dining facilities. The auditors questioned the funds after learning that Cannon's facilities were only 10 years old and had recently been furnished with several new amenities including ceiling lighting fixtures, a delicatessen and a bakery.

ment of the lakefront. Although Duany's plans are still in the process of being fine-tuned by the Trust before being brought to the city, his recommendations should be revealed.

Following his recommendation that the downtown Sanford area investigate joining the "Main Street" program, he had this to say about the lakefront: "Another thing that Sanford should consider, is using city owned land such as the post office parking lot, and other under-utilized sites that are along the lake. The lake is also an amenity. These sites should be used for buildings that have an arcaded first floor for restaurants and shops, and at least three floors above designated for apartments.

"If this land were owned by developers rather than the city, those developers would consider themselves to be wealthy simply by the ownership of this land. It is typical for municipalities not to realize the real estate value of what they can own.

"I urge you to prepare a very precise master plan, and then invite developers to do joint ventures with the city, thereby sharing the profits of development along this front.

"Sanford might end up with

enough profit in hand to do an extraordinary job with the rest of the downtown. In other words, instead of using the tax base, which is completely committed, or to go after grants that are minuscule amounts, Sanford should act like the private sector and take advantage of the assets that the City Fathers, in their wisdom, acquired for the city."

Duany also objected to the physical appearance of the Holiday Inn and Sanford Marina. "Although I admire these acquisitions of prime real estate, I do not have a very high opinion of the architecture the city fathers commissioned for the city," he wrote.

He also gave a comparison of Sanford to Charleston, referring to Charleston he suggested people who want to vacation there seldom talk about golf, the weather or the mall, they talk about the waterfront areas.

Duany summed up his suggestion by writing, "The way I am envisioning it, there isn't a waterfront in Florida as nice as the one that is possible here."

To date, the only Sanford commissioner who has spoken openly about commercial development along the lakefront has been Bob Thomas. He has suggested the city consider selling or leasing some of the property along the lakefront for use in

hotels, conference centers and other needs. "We have a valuable area here but all we are doing is using it as a recreation area," he said.

"If we had a convention facility, organizations such as the School Board, social workers, NAACP and many others wouldn't have to always go out of town to hold a large-scale meeting or convention," he said. "Look at the income this could help produce for the city. It would be a profit, rather than an expense for the taxpayers."

Thomas is the only commissioner to openly discuss his preference for commercial development along the lakefront.

Commissioner A.A. McClanahan said he prefers to have the lakefront area remain non-commercial. "I think it should be a passive recreational type of area designed for individuals and families," he said. "This area should become one of the focal points in the benefits offered by the city regarding the quality of life we offer."

McClanahan said he was opposed to turning the area into any commercial development.

Mayor Bettye Smith and commissioners Whitley Eckstein and Lon Howell could not be reached for comment.

Foundation knew such activities might occur at the tournament. McCarthy is founder of CRF, a child abuse prevention and support organization.

"This is the first time this has ever happened," said McCarthy. "We had no problems last year. I can't say what I'll do next year."

McCarthy said Club Juana was a sponsor of the tournament and provided entertainers as caddies. He said he did not find out about the alleged incidents until he received a complaint from a course-side resident.

McCarthy said if the incident occurred, it was done by one woman acting on her own. McCarthy said to his knowledge, no golfer has admitted to participating or seeing the incidents.

Sheriff's spokesman George Proechel said investigators are making inquiries into the complaints.

Deborah Wynegar, who lives next to the eighth hole at Sabal Point, said she saw four golfers taking practice shots into the spread legs of a woman with shoulder-length, dirty-blond hair sitting on the green Monday afternoon. She reported to Seminole County deputies that each time a ball rolled between the woman's legs, the golfer would yell "hole in one."

Later, Wynegar said her 14-year-old son returned home from his golf lesson and reported he and a 13-year-old friend had witnessed a woman with short blond hair expose her breasts to them at the nearby ninth hole. Wynegar said she believes the incident was intentional.

"(My son) said the men were cursing and saying things like 'I hate this blankety-blank hole,'" said Wynegar. "She pulled up her shirt and shook her boobs at them. I think the real problem here is, and I'm not prude and this is no reflection on the golf course, but my problem is what they did to these boys. Why did the Children's Rights Foundation allow something like this to happen?"

Wynegar said she also believes two women, not one, committed the acts.

Michael Pinter, Club Juana owner, could not be reached this morning. A Sabal Point manager contacted by Wynegar did not return telephone calls.

distributed these to all of the members of the steering committee," Marder said, "and while they haven't been singled out, I know they are still being considered as part of the overall plan."

"Duany focused a lot on commercial development of the area," Marder said, "and that's probably one of the next issues we will look into with the steering committee, to get some ideas on exactly what type of commercial development we might look into."

In the document pamphlets, a variety of proposals for lakefront usage are included, drawn from citizen participation meetings as well as input from members of the steering committee.

They have been listed by Ed Preston and Associates, hired as planning facilitators.

They include using the lakefront for naturewalks, fishing, picnicking, boating, and the enjoyment of wildlife such as bird and alligator watching. Among structures people have

suggested are fishing piers, bathrooms, an amphitheater, water fountains, and special event facilities.

Limited input has been made for business structures along the lake. They include a pub, hotel, restaurant, shops, and one suggestion for a developer to build a condominium near Fort Mellon Park.

"I don't get the impression that our group is singling out any particular type of development more than another," Marder said. "But the lakefront development is not a new idea. We didn't initiate it, Mr. Duany didn't start it. It has been going on for many years." He added, "And we will be looking into as many of those original ideas as possible before we come up with a final proposal."

The next move for the 20-member Waterfront Steering Committee will be to have itself established as an official body. Marder plans to bring the proposal for the organization's formation before the City Commission at a future meeting.

ented by Finance Director Randy Knight. "What this ordinance would do," he explained, "is to pay for police and fire protection and other city costs for buildings which have been constructed, but not yet placed on the tax rolls."

The fees would be imposed beginning on the date of issuance of the certificate of occupancy, and end the following Dec. 31. They would be assessed on a prorated daily basis.

Based on costs of fire and police services and other costs on a city-wide average, the interim proprietary fees were proposed at an annual rate of \$208 for a single family dwelling or each unit in a multiple family dwelling, \$248 per year for each sleeping room in a hotel, \$108 per year for each 1,000 square feet of space in an industrial

building warehouse, \$297 for each 1,000 square feet of retail or commercial space, and \$349 per year for every 1,000 square feet of office space.

Commissioner David Meador was the first to speak against the measure. "This constant seeking of additional fees has got to stop somewhere," he said. "This may be a short term solution but it won't benefit the city over the long term. I'm against adding any more costs to new developers and residents."

Commissioner A.R. "Doc" Jore asked Knight, "Just as an example, if this ordinance would have been in place before, what additional charges would we have placed against, for example, the new Builders Square?" Knight responded it would have been a service fee of approximately \$15,000 during 1992.

"That's about what I

thought," Jore said.

Commissioner George Duryea was the only supporter of the proposal. "I see this as bringing equity into the cost of city services," he said. "New buildings, even before they get on the tax roll cost money, and they should pay. I think these fees are very nominal."

"The way I see this," said Commissioner Gary Brender, "the city needs to be wowing new development by expounding on the services and quality of life. The cost of these services for development time is not going to make or break the budget for next year, so I believe we should hold off on the matter."

Mayor Lowry Rockett questioned what other municipalities are looking into a similar charge.

The commission gave a unanimous consensus vote and the matter was tabled.

Proechel said the complaint is under investigation.

The scheme apparently began in 1988 when the man worked for AAA at its former headquarters in Falls Church, Va. The man relocated to Heathrow when the company moved its world headquarters here in 1989, according to reports. About \$83,400 was stolen since 1989, according to reports.

According to a deputy's report, the man sold insurance policies that temporarily covered individual's vehicles which were imported or exported. When the

car arrived in the destination country, the insured could cancel the policy and receive a pro-rated refund. Cheake said the policy premiums averaged \$1,500.

According to the report, the man filed claims to the insurance carrier canceling the coverage. He allegedly would then forge the insured's signatures and sign the checks over to himself. The refund checks were allegedly then deposited in his own account, with some of the deposits made at an automatic teller at the AAA Building at Heathrow.

Excess TV violence has some viewers tuning out

WASHINGTON — While Congress blames television violence for contributing to the real thing in society, TV viewers are demonstrating they don't find violent programs all that entertaining.

The networks have provided a slew of attention-grabbing movies dwelling on murder during May, one of the four "sweeps" months each year when viewer ratings are used to determine advertising rates.

Congress has responded to complaints about TV violence with hearings: One was held in the House last week and another was scheduled today in the Senate. Top TV executives were expected to testify on their efforts to control the level of violence on television.

The public generally has responded to TV mayhem by changing channels, according to the A.C. Nielsen Co. viewer ratings.

Last week, for example, the top 10 shows, in order, were "Cheers," "Home Improvement," "Seinfeld," "Roseanne," "Home Improvement: Special," "80 Minutes," "ABC Monday Night Movie: Tommyknockers, Part 2," "Murder, She Wrote," "Coach" and "PrimeTime Live."

Perhaps the most violent show of the week, the 1989 theatrical movie "Lethal Weapon II," was 57th in the Nielsen's with a 9.4 rating. That means about 8.7 million of 93.1 million households tuned in, compared with 18.7 million for top-rated "Cheers."

The week before on ABC, the weapons-oriented theatrical movie "Total Recall" lost out overwhelmingly to the nostalgic, relationship theatrical film "Fried Green Tomatoes" on NBC in the same time slot. "Total Recall" had a 13.1 rating

(12.2 million households), while "Fried Green Tomatoes" had a 23.8 (22.2 million homes).

Television and motion picture executives acknowledge that there is a perception of excessive violence on television and it must be addressed.

"I don't think there is any doubt that programs with violence can do very well (capturing an audience)," said Frank J. Biondi, president and CEO of Viacom, which owns the cable networks Showtime, MTV and Nickelodeon and local cable and broadcast operations.

But he said the issue is whether the dramatized violence is a true reflection of society or whether it's irresponsible.

"This is not a topic we are likely to wrestle to the ground" soon, he said at a Media Institute luncheon Wednesday.

Biondi and executives from ABC, CBS, NBC, Fox, Turner Broadcasting and USA cable network were called to testify before Sen. Paul Simon's Senate Judiciary subcommittee on the Constitution.

They and officials from the motion picture industry also will be sending representatives to a meeting in Los Angeles Aug. 2 to talk about reducing violence in programming. In response to a federal law that had been sponsored by Simon.

The television industry is defensive about its programming and follows guidelines for portraying violence.

Cartoons on ABC, for example, cannot show anything children could easily imitate, says Christine Hikawa, vice president for broadcast standards and practices.

No hitting, slapping, use of kitchen knives, hammers or other easily attainable weapons can be pictured.

O'Neal, Mourning top NBA All-Rookie selections

NEW YORK — Each year, the NBA draft is something of a dice game, a high-stakes gamble that college talent will translate smoothly to the pros.

This season, the bets paid off handsomely.

The All-Rookie team, announced Thursday, followed the order of the draft almost pick-by-pick, with five of the top six choices showing up on the first team.

They were led by Shaquille O'Neal and Alonzo Mourning, the draft's first two selections, who led turnarounds for Orlando and Charlotte. Both were unanimous selections, each receiving the maximum 52 points — 26 first-team votes from the 27 coaches, who chose first and second teams, but were not permitted to vote for their own players.

Joining them were Minnesota's Christian Laettner, the third selection in the draft, Washington's Tom Gugliotta, who was No. 5 and LaPhonso Ellis of Denver, chosen No. 6.

Jimmy Jackson of Dallas, the fourth pick in the draft,

did not sign with the Mavs until March 4 and still received three points in the voting by the coaches.

Chosen for the second team were Walt Williams of Sacramento, the draft's seventh selection, Robert Horry of Houston, Latrell Sprewell of Golden State, Clarence Weatherspoon of Philadelphia and Richard Dumas of Phoenix.

O'Neal and Mourning, no-brainers as the draft's top two picks, delivered immediate dividends for the Magic and Hornets.

O'Neal, chosen Rookie of the Year earlier, led all rookies with 23.4 points, 13.9 rebounds and 3.5 blocked shots per game and helped the Magic to a franchise-best record of 41-41. He kept Orlando in the playoff hunt until the final week of the season.

He shot .562 from the field, tops for all rookies and fourth best in the league, and set Magic single season records for total points (1,893), rebounds (1,122) and blocked shots (286).

Mourning averaged 21 points and 10.3 rebounds, second among rookies behind O'Neal, as the Hornets

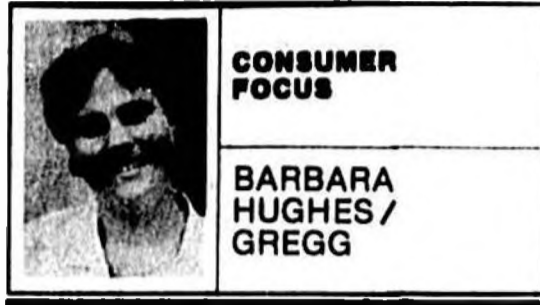

Beating the energy tax

Energy efficient investments recovered in 2 years

You can offset the proposed energy tax that may be phased in over three years beginning July 1994 by taking a few of the steps given below. In fact when you save energy, the energy tax becomes a bonus because you save that much more! H.R. O'Leary, Secretary of Energy, believes that "President Clinton's decision to propose a broad-based energy tax shows leadership and a deep understanding of the energy problems facing our nation. The proposal — a levy based on the energy or BTU content of the energy source — will have long-term benefits for all Americans."

- Replace leaky windows with energy efficient ones. Cost: \$160 on average per window.
- Increase attic insulation from R-11 to R-19 or R-30.
- Install continuous soffit attic vents. Cost: about \$30 per 10 feet.
- Install a solar water heater. Cost: \$800 to \$1800.
- Build a shading fence trellis or evaporative cooler around your outdoor AC unit. Cost: \$25 to \$350.
- Put motion detector light switches in bathrooms, utility rooms, and hallways. Cost: About \$15 per switch.
- Install a radiant barrier in your attic. Cost: about 10 cents per square foot.
- Cover east and west facing windows with solar screen. Cost: about \$35 per window.
- Find and seal leaks in your ducts.

● Replace standard light bulbs with compact fluorescents. Cost: about \$20 per bulb.

The cost of making these energy efficient investments is usually recovered within two years. They give more return for your investment than putting money in the bank would give. The energy tax would give them an even shorter payback period. For more tips, request a free energy survey from your utility company.

Another way to save money is to increase your air conditioning efficiency. The efficiency of your outdoor AC condenser/compressor unit can be improved with the following two projects. Project 1: Building a shading fence or trellis near the AC unit. This increases the efficiency of the AC unit by about 10 percent during peak periods by blocking direct solar radiation. Project 2: Building an evaporative cooler around the AC unit can increase efficiency as much as 15 percent by prechilling the air

as it enters the unit

The shading fence should be built at least three feet away from the unit to provide plenty of room for air flow and servicing. Picket fencing or latticework materials, supported by 4-by-4 posts and 2-by-4 crossmembers, work well for the structure. Add vines and ivy to complement your existing landscaping.

The evaporative cooler design is based on six-inch thick cellulose media pads by Munters. The pads are positioned in a galvanized sheet metal case four inches from the AC unit's air inlet grilles. Water is pumped by a 1/16 hp pump from a sump tray located beneath the pads to a spray bar over the pads.

The spray bars are 3/4 inch PVC pipe with 1/16 inch holes spaced every 4 inches. The condensing unit fan draws air through the wet media pads and into the inlet grilles on the side of the unit. A demonstration unit is in operation at UF's Energy Research and Education Park in Gainesville; detailed construction and performance reports are available from Florida Energy Extension Service (FEES), 904/392-5684.

The demonstration unit uses about one gallon of water per hour. It was built using \$348 in materials, including \$225 for the media pads. It has been suggested that foam-packing "peanuts" would be a low cost alternative to the Munters media pads; this has not been verified by Energy Extension Service.

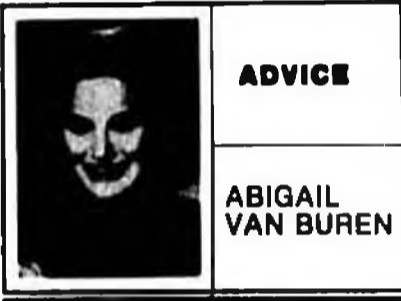
Almost everyone asks, "How old is she?" I finally got tired of answering that question, so I asked, "Why do you want to know?"

Suspicious girl needs confronting

DEAR MARY: Many days when I come home from work, my daughter, age 16, acts really strange, almost as though she's trying too hard to be pleasant and cooperative. My gut feeling is that she and her girlfriends are smoking pot after school. That scares me half to death, but I don't know how to go about confronting her. If I ask her directly, I know she will just clam up and get defensive. I keep thinking that if I just overlook the whole thing, she may wise up and stop on her own. I hate to confront her when I really don't have any proof, just a mother's intuition. What's the next step?

DEAR HUNCH: One of a parent's most valuable allies is that intuitive sense that something is wrong with the way their child is responding or behaving. Timid parents will close their eyes and hope the problem goes away by itself — IT NEVER DOES!

Once you are willing to acknowledge that your teenager may have a drug problem you must prepare for the next step which is confronting your child. You will be wise to develop a plan for this confrontation which includes a professional evaluation. Otherwise, she is likely to

respond to the confrontation with out-and-out denial or else empty promises to never do it again.

Above all though, it's important to break the conspiracy of silence which feeds the denial process. Bring your suspicions out into the open, then be prepared to act. Remember that trust and the right to privacy must be earned by your child.

If she is behaving in such a way as to violate your trust, you have the right, even the responsibility, to search her room or do whatever else is necessary to determine if she is involved in the illegal use of any substance.

Make your plan and get moving!

Medication controls yeast infection

DEAR DR. GOTT: What can be done for a yeast infection? I recently underwent surgery and took an antibiotic that apparently caused the infection. Now I've been told to take another drug to control the yeast infection, yet I am concerned of the further potential side effects.

resistance to infection, menstrual irregularities and mental disturbances. This is Cushing's disease, which is diagnosed by blood tests and X-rays showing the pituitary tumor.

DEAR READER: Yeast and bacteria exist together, in a delicate balance, in many parts of the body, including the mouth, intestinal tract and vagina. When a patient receives antibiotics, this symbiosis may be upset because bacteria are killed, whereas yeasts are free to grow. This can cause a yeast infection.

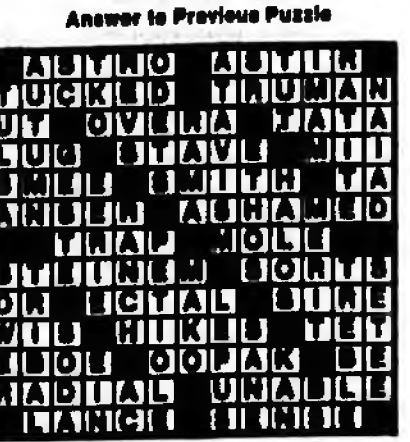
Treatment consists of surgery to remove the adenoma, thereby returning the adrenals (and the pituitary) to normal.

Because the pituitary gland lies deep in the brain, this

operation is technically difficult and should be performed only by a qualified surgeon, who is experienced at this kind of procedure. In my opinion, a large, teaching hospital is your best resource.

Such an infection is easily treated with anti-yeast prescription drugs, such as Mycostatin. There are several over-the-counter remedies for yeast vaginitis, including Monistat and others. These preparations have no significant side effects. They merely re-establish the yeast/bacteria balance. Your doctor is treating you appropriately.

How do you view chance? We hear stories about people being incredibly lucky; for example, someone who wins a multi-million-dollar lottery. But someone else loses 20 straight bets at the race track.

evidence — East's overall and West's lead with the heart jack in the dummy — points to West's having started with a doubleton heart. And if West has the spade queen, he will overruff at this trick. Then later someone, presumably East, will take the spade ace to defeat your game. So start by assuming that East has the spade queen. But does that really help? They still ruff to collect two spade tricks.

In bridge, you will sometimes feel that your contract has no chance of making. But you shouldn't just shrug your shoulders and accept defeat as inevitable. Hunt assiduously for a lie of the cards that allows you to sneak home, turning apparent bad luck into veritable good luck.

There is one faint chance. Ruff the third heart with the spade jack. Let's assume West defends well by discarding. Now lead a low spade and call for dummy's king.

Without peeking at the East-West cards, decide how lucky you feel in four spades. West leads the heart queen: three, seven, two. He continues with the heart four, eight, king, nine. East now plays the heart five. How do you continue? Things look grim. All the

If it is your lucky day, East will drop the queen. Then you return to hand in a minor and play a spade toward dummy's 10. Don't overlook any chance, however remote, to make your contract.
