NATIONAL BOY SCOUT WEEK JUNE 8-14 THE CITY'S ORGANIZATION IS COMPLETE

PROPOSED ELECTRIC MAIL SERVICE MEETS WITH HEARTY APPROVAL

BEING ENDORSED BY LEADING CITIZENS AND BUSINESS MEN.

The business of the country is now seriously hampered by an utterly inadequate post office service, not due to lack of efficiency, but to demands with which even increased equipment and efficiency could not keep up. A similar condition in England required three years to get order out of chaos.

A new postoffice service is now available which, if adopted by the authorities will largely relieve this condition. It is Electric Mail. This service handles the letter or card at both ends by the post office just as letters and cards are handled now, but the contents are transmitted by wire between terminal post offices. The Electric Mail is the last word in post office service, as practically all other means of transmission but the wire are now in use.

The Electric Mail will use the Teletype system of Automatic Rapid Telegraphy. This new service is possible because of the general efficiency and especially the word carrying capacity of the Teletype System—1,000 words per minute on one wire.

How It Works
Write a letter, put it in an envelope, seal it, write "Electric Mail" on the outside and affix 25c in postage stamps for the first 50 words or less, with 5c for each additional 10 words or less.

Get the letter to the post office just as you would any other letter, using the rural delivery mail box, the street corner box, or the mail chute in your building. If you wish to save time, send it directly to the post office.

In the post office the stamps are cancelled, the contents of the letter wired to the distant city, there type-written, put in an envelope, sealed, properly addressed and delivered by carrier or put in post office box or general delivery, as in any other letter.

If 10 words will serve your need write 10 words on a card, and attach 10 cents in postage stamps—all else same as for letter.

10 cents additional secures special delivery for either letter or card.

This service will mean that you and your correspondent, hundreds or thousands of miles apart, can exchange 3 or 4 or more letters or cards during the business hours of a single day, as train time between cities, bagging, hauling, etc., are all eliminated.

Dr. Neal to Stay
The friends of Dr. Neal in Sanford and vicinity will be interested in the communication published below, written to Senator Fletcher from the Surgeon General's office in Washington which is very flattering to Dr. Neal's ability in his profession, but very discouraging as to an immediate discharge.

War Dept. Office of Surgeon General, Washington, May 28, 1919.

Hon. Duncan U. Fletcher, United States' Senate, Washington, D. C.
My Dear Senator:

I am directed by the Surgeon General to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of May 2nd with enclosure relative to the discharge of Thomas A. Neal, now on duty at Base Hospital No. 1, Fort Sam, Houston, Texas, and to advise you that the authority for the discharge of officers in the various departments is vested in the Commanding General of the Department, who has been directed by the Secretary of War to effect the discharge of all officers as rapidly as their services can be spared.

Your communication has been forwarded to the Department Surgeon, Southern Department, for his information in connection with the discharge of the officer in whom you are interested.

It is believed that your correspondents who think it is "unfair and unnecessary" to keep this officer in service are not fully informed of the task which the Surgeon-General has before him in the case of a large number of wounded and disabled who have been returned from overseas. The retention of the best qualified medical officers for further service in the care of these men appears to me to be as much of an obligation as the support of the recent Victory Loan.

FIVE HUNDRED ASSOCIATE MEMBERS ARE WANTED IN SANFORD

The President of the United States by proclamation has recommended to the people that they observe Boy Scout Week, for the purpose of strengthening the work of the Boy Scouts of America. This week is to be devoted to a national movement for the purpose of raising funds for the Boy Scouts of America and for recruiting additional members and Scout Masters. This movement is headed by Hon. W. G. McAdoo, formerly Secretary of the Treasury.

In Sanford we want to secure five hundred associate members of the National Council, who will help our local Scout Masters to get the best results out of Scouting for the boys.

The Boy Scout movement has the endorsement of the American Red Cross. In all Red Cross campaigns and in its current work the Red Cross calls upon the Boy Scouts frequently for services of different kinds, and have never called in vain. In all the Liberty Loan and War Savings Stamps drives, the Boy

Scouts were doing their bit. The funds raised during this campaign will be used to put the Boy Scout movement on a cash basis, and to provide for extensive field work among the boys.

There has been appointed a Citizens' Campaign Committee, and the members are the following: Mr. Roy F. Symes, Mr. H. G. Dieterich, Mr. R. R. Deas, Mr. H. C. Durbin, Mr. W. M. Haynes, Mr. H. R. Stevens, Mr. A. B. Wallace, Mr. R. M. Grovenstein and Mr. R. C. Bower, who will be assisted by the local Scout Masters. These men will call upon you during Boy Scout Week, and will except every person who is interested in the welfare of our boys to respond. "Invest in Boyhood to build Manhood."

So long as there are men in our community who are willing to devote part of their time to the welfare of your boy and my boy the fathers and mothers of our city certainly should be willing to lend them financial aid.

SEVENTH JUDICIAL CIRCUIT NOW COMPRISES SEMINOLE, VOLUSIA AND BREVARD COUNTIES.

The house this week passed the bill creating the Seventeenth Judicial Circuit out of Orange, Osceola and Lake counties, which leaves Volusia, Brevard and Seminole counties in the Seventh Circuit. As soon as the governor signs the bill and appoints Dave Sholtz as state attorney the Seventh Circuit will again be in "working order."

Assistant Attorney General Charles Andrews, it is understood will be commissioned as judge of the Seventeenth Circuit, while Joseph H. Jones, at present state attorney for the Seventh Circuit will be state attorney for the Seventeenth.

It is whispered around that Judge Perkins will tender his resignation to the governor as judge, that Dave Sholtz will be appointed judge to succeed Perkins, and that Murray Sams will be appointed state attorney to succeed Sholtz. Judge Perkins was asked about this yesterday and stated to the News that he was ready to resign, that he was awfully tired, but that he had talked the matter over and had decided to hold the office to which the people had elected him until the people had been given an opportunity to select his successor.—DeLand News.

Thousands of shows which have been given in France have only been put over in spite of almost superhuman difficulties. Now, however, with the period of demobilization forcing upon the Army new problems has a real spirit of co-operation been shown by the Army authorities. Therefore, General Pershing has detailed Colonel Kelly, from his own Staff, to act as entertainment officer for the A. E. F., which position places him as the liaison officer between the Army and the "Y" Entertainment Bureau in Paris. Theatres and large buildings are being taken over, mechanics supplied by the Army are putting them into operation and the "Y" is producing shows, given by soldier talent alone, and also dramatic and vaudeville performances and miscellaneous musical programs, the personnel of all of which must be recruited from this country.

Owing to the large number of men in the Army with entertainment ability, no effort is being made to send men from this side. Women, however, are wanted for these positions in large numbers. 125 must be sent out from this country every month, which will require the co-operation of every recruiting agency throughout the country. All entertainers are supplied with uniforms, life, accident and health insurance, transportation, and allow \$150.00 per month for living expenses in France.

The women should be preferably between the ages of 23 and 30, neat and attractive and possessed of a pronounced ability in their particular line. The field for entertainment now reaches from the coast towns in France right up and into Germany, for while the "Y" cannot do much with the Army of Occupation in the way of Canteen, it can supply entertainment and is doing so on an increasingly large scale. Storms Carry Birds to Far North.

Certain instances of birds found singly far to the north of their usual range are possibly to be explained by the whirl of our cyclonic storms. Arabian Hides Grade Well.

Arabian skins coming into the world markets through Egypt and the Sudan originate exclusively in Jeddah and places in the vicinity of Mecca. They embrace cattle hides, sheep skins, goat skins and camel hides, and are generally dry salted. Arabian hides are limited in quantity; the quality, however, is excellent.

No Such Word as Fall.

Painting on Brass.

Unless care be taken to have the surface absolutely clean, considerable difficulty is encountered in attempting to paint over polished brass. To insure a satisfactory job the brass should first be scoured with a mixture of salt and vinegar to remove all grease, after which the surface should be washed with hot soap suds and wiped dry with a clean rag. Thereafter the paint may be applied without risk of its running while wet or chipping off after it has dried.

They were so much in earnest about it that the Y. M. C. A. decided to start its first class in practical arts in France. B. H. Morrison, formerly an instructor in the States Teachers' College of Greeley, Colorado, was sent for to take charge of the class. The first real impediment to intellectual research among the buck privates presented itself when it was discovered that there wasn't so far as any could find out, an American book on applied mathematics in all France. There were the French ones, of course, but none should be expected to study French and Mathematics simultaneously. It really isn't well to mix drinks from the fort of learning in that way. Mr. Morrison, however, was undaunted by the absence of textbooks and volunteered to teach without them until the ones which were wired for immediately could arrive from the good old U. S. A.

"Y" To Use Candy To Fight Alcohol "Over There"

Association Men Will Fight Demon Rum With Proper Method—The Sweet Tooth Compete Against Wine Shop

Paris—(By Mail)—A sugar-coated government has no idea of dandy American Expeditionary Force is the "Y" now being driven for in the mark-time period of the armistice and demobilization, with fighting gone and the American fighting men suddenly turned into a uniformed tourist-seeing France. Peace, as has been quoted often, has victoriously over the evil in France which beset an idle army demobilized. Incidentally, the Y. M. C. A. has gone into competition with the wine-shop, as this story will relate.

During the period of demobilization, the Y. M. C. A. will have an even greater responsibility than it has had while the war was on. The soldiers here had the instruction of being in the fight—or backing up the fighters—to see them. They also were extremely busy and their time for recreation and for spending money was limited. But there has been a let-down since the armistice was signed, and the men in olive drab are waiting for transportation home.

One of the most important things the Y. M. C. A. expects to do during the demobilization period is to enter into active competition with the French wine shops. No, the Red Tint is not going into the saloon but into the Y. M. C. A. According to medical reports, this is the best kind of ammunition to use in a battle against the more or less well-known Demon.

Heavy drinkers don't care for sugar and heavy consumers of sweets usually pass up the "boozes." So by playing the soldiers with candy, chocolate, chewing gum and cookies, the Y. M. C. A. expects to reduce the consumption of alcohol very materially.

Soldiers Overseas To Serve For Y. M. C. A.; Fewer Men Go From U. S.

General Pershing Tells Y. M. C. A. to "Take Their Pick" From Men of A. E. F. Which Cuts Down Recruiting Program in This Country

Atlanta, Ga., Jan.—The offer of General Pershing to release officers and men of the A. E. F. from military duty in order that their services might be utilized by the Y. M. C. A. resulted in the recruiting of a large number of soldiers for "Y" work, and naturally resulted in a decrease in the number of men being sent from this country overseas.

Up until the time General Pershing's offer was made, the Y. M. C. A. had some extensive recruiting for the purpose of sending a large number of workers overseas. But while it was learned that workers could be secured for France—most well fitted for the conditions—the services of many men in the United States were not needed, other, points out that the generous offer of General Pershing is only an indication of the high esteem which is held for the Y. M. C. A. by the United States government and by the leader of the American Expeditionary Force.

Castro Made Sure of Salary.
President Ebert will draw his salary every month, like President Wilson. President Wilson is paid every three months. Castro, who was president of Venezuela from 1909 to 1918, used to make the treasury pay him daily. When elected his salary was fixed at \$144,000 a year, payable monthly. On drawing his first monthly pay Castro told the minister of finance that henceforth he must send him \$400 in gold every morning. "That being the best revolution-riden land." During the nine years of his presidency exchequer funds often ran low, but the author's daily wage was always forthcoming, as he warned each successive minister of finance that failure to provide it would mean summary dismissal.
