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Carrier Strike Against Japs Is Biggest Yet

357 Enemy Air Planes Knocked Down During Week-End As Japs Fight Back

(By Associated Press) Admiral Clark today said the past two-day strike on the southern Jap homeland was the most damaging ever made by carrier task forces. The only gain on the Okinawa line was the capture of Chocolate Drop Hill after a six-day battle which saw the Marines driven back three times.

Violent Jap counter-attacks involving flares, rifle butts and knives, have slowed American advances on Okinawa and Mindanao.

Admiral Nimitz announced 357 planes were knocked down by American carrier planes over the week-end. The Australians were slowed in their conquest of Tarakan Island off Borneo by heavy rains. On Luzon, the Americans pressed within 400 yards of Ipo Dam, east of Manila. Small gains were made in north Luzon beyond Baleta Pass.

Latest available reports estimated there still were 50,000 Japanese troops on Mindanao. MacArthur's communique indicated the bulk of these were pinned in Bukidnon province by the 40th and 31st divisions.

MANILA, Wednesday, May 16, (AP)—Fighting so savage that Americans attacked Japanese with bayonets, knives and their fists, with at least two Americans drowning enemy troops by holding their heads below water in a river, raged west of Davao City on Mindanao today.

The Japanese had fled westward from Davao toward rugged mountains inland but their retreat was slowed by rivers the Talaos and Davao, between which Gen. Basco's 1st Woodruff's famous Twenty-fourth Division had them.

DDT Experiment At W. Ranch Called Success

An experiment conducted several weeks ago by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in spraying of 450 head of cattle at the Ralph Wight ranch near Lake Jessup with a solution of DDT, seasonal new insecticide, was repeated again yesterday on the same cattle in order to destroy any larvae that might be present.

Race Track Funds Given To Counties

Tallahassee, May 16 (Special)—State Comptroller, J. M. Lee, has announced the distribution of \$2,000,000 of race track funds to each county from race track taxes.

With the lifting of the Federal regulation closing race tracks, several dog tracks are again operating and the State Comptroller states that it is possible that the entire amount guaranteed to counties—\$2,000,000—may be available from this source.

Today's distribution brings the total distributed to date to \$20,000 per county, leaving a balance due each of the several counties of \$18,000.

The Comptroller is also making a distribution to the Teachers Salary Fund in the amount of \$1,233,823.58, which completes the payment to teachers for this fiscal year.

With the payment of the deficiency appropriation authorized during the present session of the legislature, which amounted to \$2,725,879, this brings the total paid to the Teachers Salary Fund during this fiscal year to \$14,933,823.54.

Over \$55,000 In Bonds Are Sold In County

The 7th War Loan Drive Opened Officially on Tuesday in Seminole County, and already 17 percent of the \$ bond quota of \$22,000, or \$37,700 worth of bonds has been sold, it was announced by Edward V. Lane, director of publicity for the drive.

On V-E Day, it was reported by E. E. Kipp, principal of the Sanford Grammar School and the 7th V-High School that \$ bonds amounting to \$1,100 were sold at the school.

Seminole County's quota for the drive amounts to \$275,000. Mr. Lane reported that some towns have already sold their \$ bond quotas, among them being Bunnell and Seffern.

He urged that buyers buy their bonds today and not put it off until tomorrow, and pointed out that the Japs do not get out of their fighting. "We've got to go to it," he said, "the fight is on."

Victory Seen By Democrats On Tariff Vote

Sweeping Re-Organization Of Government Agencies By Truman Predicted

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 16, (AP)—The House Ways and Means Committee voted today to give the President new authority to reduce tariffs in international trade agreements.

WASHINGTON, May 16, (AP)—Democrats predicted victory today in the first congressional test on major legislation the Administration says is essential for post-war international economic cooperation. The House Ways and Means Committee called for a showdown vote on a bill giving the President broad new authority to reduce tariffs in reciprocal trade agreements over the session.

Senators said they would announce a new program of reorganization to absorb the present agencies into regular departments of the government. The bill would include:

Produce Sold At Market Declines

A decrease in the amount of produce sold at the market during April as compared with the same month in 1944, is indicated in recent figures given out by H. L. Lehman, market manager. Gross receipts, on the other hand, were higher.

During April, the report shows that total units and sales of Florida produce were \$1,900,000 and \$2,271,100, or out of state produce, 950 units, a total of 100,821 units. Total gross receipts were \$305,925.

Total units and sales for April, 1944 were 143,914, but sales amounted to only \$220,775.

Oranges were with most valuable in sales, 16,599 boxes bringing \$25,240. Celery was next in value with 9,763 crates bringing \$45,788, an average of \$4.69 per crate. Red bliss potatoes brought \$26,610 for 12,151 of the 50 pound sacks.

Cabbages led in unit sales of 50 pound sacks with 18,896 units sold and gross sales of \$19,840. Cucumbers brought \$23,103 for 4,284 bushel baskets. Iceberg lettuce brought \$18,939 for 4,073 crates. Beans were a money crop with 14,435 bushels bringing \$45,180. Tomatoes were still in demand and 3,550 bushels brought \$18,584.

Lieut. Orville Barks Liberated From Nazis

Lieut. Orville L. Barks, former Sanford physician, who was captured by the Germans during the North African Campaign on Feb. 1943, was taken to Germany as a prisoner of war, and who was recently liberated, has arrived in London, according to word received from Mrs. Barks by Mr. and Mrs. John Lee.

Lieut. Barks called his wife and son that he was well and happy and hoped to see them soon. During his stay at a German hospital, Lieut. Barks was able to assist Lieut. Harry Grimball of Sanford, who had a wounded leg, and who had parachuted from a bombing plane shot down over France. Lieut. Grimball was returned to this country later on the exchange ship, Orizabal, and has been home on leave.

Senate Approves Agreement Made Major Portion Of Caldwell Program

Government Gets Bill Started For Post-War Improvements

TALLAHASSEE, May 16 (AP)—Governor Caldwell's legislative program slipped into high gear in the Florida Senate yesterday and in the busiest legislative session to date the Administration obtained passage of major school, old age, assistance and post-war building bills.

The Governor also started his improvement commission bill for a post-war public works program to rally its supporters to some of its controversial points.

While the Senate busied itself with cleaning up many of the remaining major phases of the Administration program, the House spent almost all morning in re-amending the bill to legal and tax matters relating to summer-time sulky racing.

Completion of work on general appropriations bill for departments, institutions and agencies cleared the logjam of appropriations measures and the Governor's \$1,000,000 post-war institutional building program bill was one of the first to benefit.

The Senate passed the building program measure by unanimous vote and sent it to the Governor. Presumably only \$2,000,000 in State funds the bill authorizes use of Federal matching money and provides that some of the projects shall be:

• Tallahassee, May 16, (AP)—The Senate today passed SB536 by Senator L. F. Boyle, eliminating a requirement that the Seminole County budget be approved by the State Comptroller or the State Budget Commission. SB537 by Boyle authorizing the City of Sanford to convey municipally owned real estate to war veterans; SB535 by Boyle fixing the compensation of Seminole County Board of Public Instruction members at \$50 per month.

The campaigns in which Lieut. Swain and his unit, the veteran 435th Troop Carrier Group, have played a key role, include the battles of Normandy—for which the group was cited by the President—Southern France, Rome-Arno, Northern France and Germany. Commanded by Col. Frank J. MacNees, of St. Paul, Minn., the 435th group has hauled over 20,000,000 pounds of combat supplies to forward strips on the continent, at the same time evacuating thousands of wounded. Vital supplies dropped by C-47's of the 435th contributed to the heroic stand of the 101st Airborne Division at Bastogne, Belgium.

Overseas 19 months Lieut. Swain's unit is part of Maj. Gen. Paul L. Williams' U. S. Troop Carrier Force, air component of First Allied Airborne Army.

Moscow Radio Says War Criminals Trying To Break Up Unity Of Allies

(By Associated Press) The Allies faced a confused and delicate situation in the Austrian province of Carinthia today as a result of Yugoslav demands to that area. In the provincial capital of Klagenfurt, two district military administrations are now functioning. It is obvious that some agreement must be reached between the British Eighth Army and Marshal Tito's Partisans as to who occupies the area.

Referring specially to Reichsmarshal Hermann Goering and Field Marshal Karl von Rundstedt and Albert Kesselring as "Diaplores of Goebbels," the Moscow radio said "Nazi leaders now in Allied custody are spreading propaganda whose purpose is to break the unity among the three great powers that defeated Hitler's army."

The Russians continued to examine closely all bodies found in Berlin. No official announcement has been made that the bodies of either Hitler or Goebbels have been found.

Major General Lucian Clay, central European deputy for the military occupation of Germany, said the Allied government in Germany is being formed by military and the Germans know it is going to be military.

In London, Prime Minister Churchill told the House of Commons it is the Allied intention the Germans should administer their country in accordance with " Allied direction." Less Than Half Of Local Landlords Are Registered

Approximately 750 persons rent or offering for rent, dwelling quarters in Seminole County will have registered today in the mass rent registration office at the Armory in Sanford.

David H. Davis, Area Rent Director, said today this afternoon. A mass check of registration cards revealed that the actual registration would fall short of the estimated 2000 which OPA rent officials expected to be registered today.

At the time, it was announced that E. C. Smith of Sanford has been named Area Rent Director for the Sanford rent control office which will open at 8:30 A.M. on each morning until 5:00 P.M. He will and Seminole County landlords in making the rent order actual at property and rent persons in the proper procedure in handling the adjustments of rents.

Persons who failed to register today, Mr. Davis said, may call at the Sanford rent office for complete instructions and help. The local rent office will observe regular local office hours six days a week, Mr. Davis said.

"The registration today went off smoothly," Mr. Davis said, "and the volunteer help of the local Price Fixing Board members made the registration possible. From now on, the local rent office will be able to take care of local rent problems. There is no use in worrying about the rent registration," Mr. Davis declared. "The form is simple and can be filled out, signed and filed in five minutes."

Under the rent order covering Seminole County, rents must now be no more than was charged on July 1, 1943, except in some rare cases, he said. Mr. Davis warned that failure to comply with rent regulations covering the rent registration of all dwelling units from which rent is received or offered for rent, may subject landlords to fines as much as \$5,000 and imprisonment to one year.

We see where someone has worked out a complete solution for the meat shortage. Eat more vegetables. We were afraid of that.

"Doodlittle Quits 8th Air Force" says a headline written by some dope. Wonder how America's fightingest airman would like that headline?

Twenty million counterfeit meat ration coupons have been discovered in a Brooklyn (N. Y.) basement garage. That may explain, at least in part, the meat shortage.

Florida post-war construction already in the blue print stage has reached 100 million dollars showing that some jobs will be available to returning soldiers anyway. There will be several million dollars worth of post-war construction in Sanford, not the least of which, according to population indications, will be a new hospital and a swimming pool. City and county commissioners will have to provide funds for such improvements.

Newspapers sometimes prove their worth after all. Down in Miami a young naval officer got back from overseas for a short leave couldn't locate his wife who had flown all the way from Spokane to be with him, and she couldn't locate him. So he asked the help of newspapers. "I know I'll find him in an ice cream parlor," she told them, "you just don't know how that man likes his cream." He saw the headlines on that story and both are now trailing clouds of glory.

While government officials vainly try to stem the rising tide of inflation by clamping down tighter than ever on price ceilings, spending most of their time chasing black market operators, the real root of the problem: The flood of money being continuously pumped into the public's pockets, goes unnoticed. Treasury figures show that currency circulation now totals some 50 billion dollars as compared with less than six billion dollars at the peak of the boom a little over 15 years ago. No wonder there is excessive bidding for limited supplies.

Termites

Termites, often called "white ants," are not ants at all, and in fact true ants are their enemies. They do, however, live in colonies of different forms, somewhat as ants do. They are small—mostly less than a quarter-inch long. The history of termites is long and their habits are curious and interesting. But the important thing to know is how to prevent their getting into buildings and their wreaking their ruinous tendencies which cost this country about \$40,000,000 a year. Proper methods of construction can keep them out of new buildings. Proper repair can get them out of old structures.

Two preventives come first: masonry foundations, from 12 inches to 18 inches above the earth's surface, and treatment of lumber before using. Termites must have access to the moisture of the earth. If their little tunnels, called by biologists "shelter tubes," are discovered by cutting across, and concrete or new wood treated with creosote, bichloride or zinc chloride is substituted for riddled old members, termites in the building will soon die and no new ones will enter.

There are plenty of ways to prevent their entrance—metal shields, concrete caps, chemicals. Wooden houses may be made as safe as masonry buildings. Department of Agriculture Bulletin 1472 gives the basic facts. The local library has or can get other books and pamphlets about these little pests.

Air Progress

The helicopter, which in operation functions as a sort of large-size humming bird, is nothing to laugh at in spite of its awkwardness. A little job that it did recently would, alone, pay for all the inventive thought and effort spent on it.

Word came to Manchester, N.H., that eleven Canadian fliers were marooned at an isolated spot in northern Labrador. It would have been an impossible rescue job for an ordinary airplane, because of the difficulty in landing and rising. One of the special merits of the helicopter is that it can descend and take off again by hovering in the air like a huge humming bird.

Well, a coast guard helicopter was dismantled in New York, flown north to distant Goose Bay, and re-assembled and the party set out for the remainder of the journey. 125 miles from civilization in a bleak and lonely spot. Arrived at its destination, the helicopter poised eight feet from the ground, dropped a rope ladder and, one at a time, drew up those eleven men and flew home with them. "Air Sea Rescue" had scored again.

This seems almost like a "Man from Mars" tale, but may soon be regular procedure in difficult and dangerous terrain.

Teaching Nazis

Speaking in general, barbed wire is useful only to keep horses and cattle and keep out enemies on the war front. But now it proves useful also to teach captive Nazis some of the facts of present-day life. Young German internees in Sweden are wisely being subjected to a course of history, in which the truth is told them about the world in general, including their own race and its achievements and failures.

At first the young Nazi students are inclined to jeer at their instruction, as propaganda and bunk. But gradually, as the instruction proceeds, they begin to learn that the bunk has been on the other side, and they are at least hearing the truth about their country and its adventures and crimes.

This procedure is obviously better than shooting or starving prisoners in the Nazi style, for eventually the enlightened ones themselves may become missionaries and convince others, and thus an incredibly ignorant generation of German youths may be civilized.

The Greatness of Churchill

WASHINGTON, May 16.—Know, reader, that you have seen greatness in our time. When on your radio you heard Winston Churchill in his hour of the authentic great of history. It would be a pity to lack awareness of this, to suppose you must turn to Gibbon and Plutarch to find heroic characters and exalted drama, to fall to realize that before our living eyes is grandeur of action and stature of personality as great as any that history provides. It would be tenable indeed to use the superlative and say that Churchill's greatness is unexcelled. If only by the immensity of the arena in which he spoke and fought, Churchill's part in this world war reduced the classic figures of Rome and Greece to the relatively inconsequent stature of actors in drama of minor scope.

Tragedy showed his stature. Greatness was within him. What brought out its finest form

was the stark descent upon him of the tragic moment when England had to stand alone. The fall of France in 1940 created the occasion at once for Churchill's greatness to emerge and for the momentous effect it was destined to have on civilization.

And now it has come to us to stand alone in the breach. . . . Bearing ourselves humbly before God, but conscious that we serve an unfolding purpose, we are ready to defend our native land. We are fighting for our selves alone; but we are not fighting for ourselves alone. Here in this strong city of refuge, which enshrines the title deeds of human progress, and is of deep consequence to Christian civilization.

We await undimmed the impending assault. . . . We shall not weaken or flinch. Neither the sudden shock of battle nor the long-drawn trials of vigilance and exertion will wear us down. . . . set us therefore embrace ourselves to our duties, and so bear

ourselves that, if the British Empire and its Commonwealth last for a thousand years, men will say "This was their finest hour."

Read those words of Churchill as of the dark days of 1940 and early 1941. Then realize that in the slow unfolding of time Churchill was destined to announce last Tuesday.

"Yesterday morning at 2:41 A.M. General Jodl, the representative of the German high command . . . signed the act of unconditional surrender. . . . The German war is therefore at an end. . . . God save the King!"

Observe the contrast between those passages—Churchill's moving eloquence when desperate danger was upon him, his matter of factness when victory came. That to be unmoved by triumph, but to be moved magnificently by struggle and danger—that was part of Churchill's greatness. Both were spontaneous reactions of his personality. When disaster threatened, he did not need to summon up courage, courage was as much a part of him as his arteries.

Part of Churchill's greatness was unique, the union in him of the doer and the seer, the gift of action with the gift of words. The combination is unusual, only rarely have been in high posts had at once the talent for responsibility and the talent for expressing themselves. Churchill will be quoted as long as Shakespeare. Within the scope of the subjects upon which both wrote, the mar of action was not inferior to the poet.


Shakespeare, writing a play about an English King who had

fought a battle two centuries before, and imagining what the king might have said to his troops, produced what is regarded as one of the most lofty battle cries in literature.

Once more unto the breach, dear friends, once more; Or close the wall up with our English dead.

Imitate the action of the tiger: Stiffen the sinews, summon up the blood, Churchill's Call to Battle That was a man of letters, imagining what a leader in the eve of battle had said. But what Churchill said was actual. It was taken down in shorthand. Churchill was the fighting leader, and was his own poet. Shakespeare's battle cry was generated in the heat of imagination.

Churchill's in the heat of action and responsibility. As between the two—what Shakespeare imagined in his remote and sheltered study and what actually poured out of Churchill as he breathed the enemy—Churchill's words have the greater reality and the truer eloquence that goes with reality. "Come then: let us to the task, to the battle, to the toil. . . . We shall fight on the beaches, we shall fight on the landing grounds, we shall fight in the fields and in the streets, we shall fight in the hills; we shall never surrender. . . . Nuernberg was once called the toy headquarters of the world. . . . The baby fire in the United States in 1943 amounted to \$380,230,000.



A.L. Smith of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, conducted the spraying experiment yesterday.

Mr. Wight was highly pleased with the result of the experiment it was reported. For the benefit of other cattle men in the county who would also like to have such treatment given their cattle, Mr. Dawson cautioned that DDT was not commercially available at the present time, the supply being reserved for government use. He also pointed out that the spraying was an experiment and not a demonstration, and was made at the Wight Ranch because of the ideal conditions and facilities for such rounding up of cattle and spraying.

Henry Kaiser Is Pleased Over Results In Collecting Clothes For Overseas

NEW YORK, May 15 (Special Associated Press)—Henry Kaiser, National Chairman of the United National Clothing Collection, today announced that 200 communities have already gathered 1,800,000 pounds of clothing, shoes and accessories for overseas war relief.
He called the news "most gratifying." They were filed in local chapters in 1944, and the 724 communities which participated in the drive, he said, were tabulated at national headquarters up to and including May 9. The population of the communities reporting total 1,192,267, with gifts averaging 1.52 pounds per person.
Mr. Kaiser declared that the surrender of Germany means the release of millions more prisoners of war and of thousands of new draftees who will have to be clothed. "These millions will be added to the 125,000,000 destitute people for whom the clothing drive was originally planned." He expressed his confidence that this movement would inspire communities, chapters to attain the goal they have set for themselves and cities.
In the 724 communities organized by the United National Clothing Collection, 100 per cent of the communities reported gifts. In the 100 communities which reported gifts, the total population was 1,192,267, with gifts averaging 1.52 pounds per person.

Here's the inside story on why James Byrnes, late director of war mobilization and reconversion, gave horse racing a Christmas present when he "requested" that racing suspend from January 3 on.
In the Spring of 1944, the California Racing Board granted the Hollywood Turf Club a permit to hold a Summer meeting in July.
The Citizens' Manpower Committee of Southern California, including representatives of all war industry on the Pacific Coast, all labor, CIO, A.F.O.L., press and all civic organizations having anything to do with the war effort, protested to the War Department indicating that such a race meeting, if held, would seriously interfere with war production since Hollywood Park is in the Inglewood area where there are seven war plants.
Inglewood was regarded as a critical labor shortage area. Absenteeism was mounting and the transportation facilities already overtaxed.
The War Department took the position that there was nothing it could do, saying that it was a matter to be decided by civilian agencies. However, at the request of the Citizens' Manpower Commission, the War Department sent Col. Larry MacPhail, now president of the New York Yankees, to the Coast.
"At the suggestion of the War Department, the CMC made a survey in an attempt to ascertain whether the meeting should be held.
The result was that 99 per cent of the CMC members were opposed to the race meeting.
Other conferences were held between Hollywood turf officials and government agencies, including the Army, Navy, WPA and WMC. The racing promoters were told the results and they withdrew their application for the summer meeting and agreed to schedule a Fall meeting.
Lester E. Edwards, chairman of the CMC, informed the War Department that Hollywood Park violated its agreement when it decided to hold the Fall meeting without first consulting the CMC.

new California wagering record. The meeting averaged close to \$2,000,000 in daily wagering, the final tally being \$59,599,276.
"Racing will be resumed in Southern California on Dec. 30," said an announcement. That was supposed to be the reopening of Santa Anita Park in nearby Arcadia. The track had not been in operation since 1940.
It figured to be a bigger meeting than Hollywood Park. It took James Byrnes less than a week to realize the seriousness of the situation, and on Friday, Dec. 22, he "requested" that racing cease until the situation that brought it about was cleared up.
There was much speculation why the "request" was made. Many persons blamed it on conditions in general with emphasis on the Nazi break-through in mid-December in a fight that came to be known as the "battle of the Belgian Bulge."







Ed Kennedy Is Ordered Back To The United States

Man Who Gave Unconditional Surrender Story Is Rebuked

PARIS, May 16, (AP)—Supreme headquarters discredited Ed-

ward Kennedy of the Associated Press Wednesday on a charge of breach of confidence in leaking prematurely the story of German unconditional surrender and ordered him to leave May 17 for the United States.

Morton P. Gudebrod of the Associated Press also was discredited for taking "an active part in the premature release of a news story" and ordered to return to the United States, but was granted an extension beyond May 17 by Brig. Gen. Frank Allen, Jr., chief of public relations.

Gudebrod is ill with pneumonia and is not expected to be dis-

charged from a hospital for two weeks.

Allen, with headquarters in London, had been suspended as a war correspondent in the European theater during the investigation because Kennedy's dispatch passed through the London bureau of the Associated Press.

Allen noted in a statement that "the Associated Press has published its profound regrets for distribution of the story in advance of its authorization."

"With this statement," Allen said, "this regrettable incident is

considered as closed by supreme headquarters."

Allen's statement was issued after Kennedy had been ordered to return to the United States.

"My conscience is clear in the matter I did about I considered to be my duty and informed SHAEF public relations in advance that I intended to do it. I am fully responsible for the action of Morton Gudebrod in this matter, as he acted under my instructions."

The text of the supreme headquarters statement:

"Investigation of premature transmission and release of the story of the unconditional surrender of German forces written by Edward Kennedy has been completed.

"The following actions have been taken as a result of the investigation and on the authority of the supreme commander:

"War Correspondent Edward Kennedy of the Associated Press, having deliberately violated a trust reposed in him by prematurely releasing through unauthorized channels and deliberately avoiding military censorship a news story concerning which he was pledged to secrecy, is discredited and ordered to return to the United States.

"War Correspondent Morton P. Gudebrod of the Associated Press, having taken an active part in the premature release of a news story through unauthorized channels, thus violating existing military censorship regulations, is discredited and ordered to return to the United States.

"War Correspondent Robert Bunnelle of the Associated Press, who was suspended, has been reinstated.

"The Associated Press, by publishing its profound regrets for distribution of the story in advance of its authorization.

"With this statement, this regrettable incident is considered as closed by supreme headquarters."

The Red Army: How It Differs From American

Russian Strength Is In Infantry Power Not In Equipment

By Wes Gallagher

PARIS, May 16, (AP)—The Red Army's strength lies in overwhelming infantry power which trumps light, but American and British armies are better equipped, more mobile and far more mechanized.

While much has been heard of the famous Red Army cavalry, nothing has been seen to compare with the flexibility of American massed fire control.

These are some of the conclusions drawn from observation in the field of the Red Army's strength in action as the Allied forces, some of the myriads, about it has been lifted.

Along the Elbe River, American and British military men have gained a pretty fair view of the Red Army in action as Germans fought the Russians right down to the river in clear sight of the Allied forces.

Equipment is Horse-Drawn. Here are some other impressions. Close Russian air co-operation with the ground forces did not appear to pack the hitting power of American and British efforts.

At great distances the Red Army has been able to cover its movements with the speed that American forces are able to make on the offensive.

A large proportion of Russian personnel and transports are in the infantry divisions. The Soviet strength in moving units at distances has been in the supply arrangements. The Russian live off the land, and this is what has been seen off the Allied lines.

The Russian Army seen thus far on the move looks like a bare, grubby camp, with soldiers huddled on running boards of captured cars, draped over the fenders and lying on wagons. But it is there.

It is easy to understand how in the heyday of the Luftwaffe German planes were able to tear Russian supply lines to pieces, but when the Red Army got air superiority this year, that just started rolling and never stopped.

The Russians did not use any C-47 planes along the Elbe to direct artillery fire, and it was not as accurate as the American fire. Rely on Ground Observers.

The Russians appeared to depend solely on ground observers to direct their artillery and mortar fire. In the final battle at Tangermunde both were extremely spotty against easy targets.

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U.S. Zone Of Occupation Given France

Fritz Kuhn, Former German American Bund Leader, Is Ordered Deported

President Truman today told the French Foreign Minister that the United States is willing to relinquish to France part of the American Zone of Occupation in Germany. The President, after a conference with Minister George Bidault, said details of the relinquishment have already conveyed informally to the French government and are now in the process of being formalized.

"He said the U.S. appreciated the part which France 'should play' in settling the questions of world interest."

Former German-American Bund leader Fritz Kuhn, last week deported to Germany as an undesirable alien, the Justice Department announced. The order was issued by the Board of Immigration Appeals. A native of Munich, he was convicted in 1939 of larceny and forgery involving bund funds.

He will be placed on a boat at a time to be determined by American military authorities in Germany, the Justice Department said.

Lieut. Col. Otto Skorzeny and a picked gang of Nazi assassins plotted last winter to kill General Eisenhower, Allied Headquarters announced today. Skorzeny, now captured, and his group kept the entire Western Front on the alert for months.

A London dispatch from Luenberg reported Himmler has been traced, and said the British Second Army could take him into custody anytime.



The driving force behind the plot to assassinate General Eisenhower was Adolf Hitler, who, 35-year-old Austrian hatchetman for Himmler.

His picked gang of assassins kept the whole western front in a state of alert for months last winter during and after the Ardennes battle, for the group had the mission of assassinating Eisenhower.

Previously, Skorzeny had won Himmler's attention by planning and carrying out the kidnapping of Benito Mussolini. He also was credited with kidnapping Admiral Horthy during the Hungarian crisis.

City Planning Group Reports On City Needs

Swimming Pool, Hospital And Sewage Disposal System Among Suggestions

The City Planning Committee headed by Lee Leasher, chairman, submitted its report at a meeting of the City Commission last night, calling for the construction of public rest rooms, storm sewers in Georgetown, a trailer park, speakers stand in Central Park, and plans for a swimming pool, hospital, nurses home, and a sewage disposal system, among making a number of other recommendations.

The City Planning Committee was created by the City Commission in June, 1944, for the purpose of making a study of the city and its future. It is composed of W. A. Leffer, J. L. Ingley, R. L. Cornwell, C. Howell, S. P. Deane, H. H. Coleman, R. W. Ruppert and W. A. Leffer, in addition to Mr. Leasher as chairman.

The committee's report in full is as follows: Our endeavor to aid the Mayor and Members of the City Commission:

As chairman of the City Planning Committee, I wish to make a report on its activities for the past 12 months.

By your action this committee was created in June 1944. With no particular guide for its procedure, the committee took on its duties with alacrity to recommend civic improvements and betterments for the citizens of this community.

Russia Is Reported As Planning To Enter War On Japan; Jap Cruiser Sunk

London announced that British warships and planes sank a Japanese cruiser Wednesday in the Malacca Strait, 470 miles northwest of Singapore. Allied airmen rained the Andaman Islands, guarding the sea-way to Singapore, and also the Bangkok-Singapore railway in the narrowest point of the Malay peninsula.

Washington reported a northern war plane's abortive drive toward U.S. airbase at Chikung in northern China, falling up as the Japanese retreated more than 100 miles.

The Japanese made Hanzai (Hankow) bases on Okinawa and Malacca, but an acknowledgment that the U.S. fleet is not far off. The Paris radio quoted British (Continued on Page Three)

Ancona Hen Makes ThreePointLanding

Equipped perfectly for a three point landing in the five weeks Ancona hen, property of Mrs. Louise Rourke of R. 1455 on the Country Road.

The hen, which was hatched at Mrs. Rourke's poultry farm, has two well developed wings and feet in the usual places and a smaller leg and foot midway about two inches toward the rear of the "hustler."

Hunt, operator of Hunt's Turedo Feed Store, to whom Mrs. Rourke loaned the freak hen, was of the opinion that the mother hen, which he killed the chick, must have got the idea of the "three point landing apparatus" by reason of watching the planes from the Sanford Naval Air Station sail overhead.

Edward F. Lane, rector, said that he would like the hen when it is full size, as he is very fond of "drumsticks" and would like three at one meal.

County Agent C. R. Dawson came forward with a more scientific explanation of the hen's triple landing gear by stating that "the genes got mixed up when the egg, from which the hen was hatched, was fertilized." Genes, according to Webster's Dictionary, are elements of the germ plasma believed to have an important part in the transmission, development, and determination of hereditary characteristics.

As far as character is concerned, the hen appeared quite normal and healthy otherwise, save for a born on its back.

Dr. Dame Reports Increase In Rabies Among Local Dogs

It seems that human diseases are not the only ones that increase during the stress and strain of war. There has been a noticeable increase in rabies (hydrophobia) in both dogs and humans," writes Dr. Leland H. Dame, director of the Seminole County Health Unit in the Marine Corps Bulletin, the Seminole chief.

Two children have already died a horrible death in Florida and some have been reported to other states from this disease, he stated.

"Rabies have again been reported among the foxes in Georgia," he pointed out. "Their carcasses are being found showing a mild epidemic of the rabid disease. Several years ago thousands of foxes died in one year from rabies in the State of Georgia. Rabies had been practically eradicated for several years, but a wild dog or two dog caught. Anyway, this gets us down to the fact that we are having a mild epidemic of it around Sanford. Several children and one adult have been bitten recently here. Upon investigation it has been found that at least three of these bites were by mad dogs."

"The heads of two dogs sent to the state laboratory for diagnosis and both proved positive. Several other dogs that were sick with some symptoms of rabies have been killed and reported to us until too late to send the heads off. In some instances the dogs have been killed by shooting into the brains with shot guns. This mutilates them so until they cannot be examined."

"For years and years it has been advertised to the public and sought to individuals not to kill the animal. If the animal is suspected of having rabies, or if the animal bites one without provocation, it should be chained or shut up in a tight stall or box. If the animal has rabies it will become plainly diagnostic within a few days and die within ten days. These signs give anyone time to start and take the treatment. Only in cases where the animal is large and vicious should it be killed. Even then, these dogs may be shot up with little danger."

"The City of Sanford is now calling for treatment of all dogs with the preventive. This preventive is good in about 80 percent of cases, thus eliminating danger to that extent. All dogs worth keeping are worth the small expenditure of having them protected. Do not kill suspected dogs. Report them to the Health Unit or the City."

Rabies investigations for the year so far, all made during April, totalled five, according to the pamphlet.

Heroic Action On U.S. Carrier Gets Ship Back To Port

Over One Thousand Casualties On Ben Franklin When Hit

PEARL HARBOR, April 8. (AP)—Starting from a cloud dead ahead of a fast carrier task force only 64 miles from Japan, a Japanese dive bomber struck the U.S. aircraft carrier Franklin and set off one of the most great episodes of heroic action.

In the next 10 hours almost 100 tons of explosives and more thousands of gallons of aviation gasoline were fired out from the great carrier as it steamed out of control straight for Japan.

She suffered because of a 1,200 ton bomb, which was a third of her total weight, by Nap. dive bombers attacking her.

But she escaped and finally reached an American port to have her hurts repaired. "So valiant" and to get ready to fight her enemies again.

772 Men Lost

Ceiling Prices On Meat To Be Frozen For Six Months

WASHINGTON, May 14. (AP)—Member of Congress said today the government is likely to freeze all ceiling prices on meat for at least six months.

The price ceiling freeze would be a seasonal measure of the government to raise or lower cash prices, described as the key element of a rechecked program by the Federal Reserve Board, Director of Food, M. Vinson, and other government officials to break the growing meat shortage and black market.

Having just made changes, the program as reported by legislators would include their other food producing incentives.

A 10 percent per hundredweight increase in the price of cattle would be permitted until they develop into prime beef.

A requirement that all cattle worth \$125 hundred be sold direct to slaughter plants, intended to keep a supply of good meat moving to market.

Non-congressional sources connected with the planning job said the program outlined was the one most in consideration, but no final decision on the subsidy program.

The new Vinson program expected before the end of this week probably will scrap much of a 10-point meat policy issued several weeks ago. The 10-point program failed to break the beef shortage and 4 million head of some cattlemen complained that it forced them to take losses on their stock.

Vinson, War Food Administration, said representatives of the OPA, Community Credit Corps, and other Government agencies concerned with meat supplies have been working on the new meat program for more than a week.

The ceiling price regulation would require that the Government hereafter give six months notice of intention to shift prices at any level of meat marketing from stock ranges to the butcher counters.

Apparently dropped from the new program is a suggestion for fixing quotas at the big cattle markets, allocating live cattle from the range to certain market areas. Cattlemen objected that they could not split up their shipments among markets and could not risk sending beef to market only to find that market already at a quota ceiling and unable to buy.

"Don't think because Germany has surrendered that you should stop buying bonds," he advised. "Now is the time to buy to help defeat the Japs and the more bonds you buy and the quicker you buy them, the sooner your boy or your husband or your brother will come home to you. Buy that bond today."
