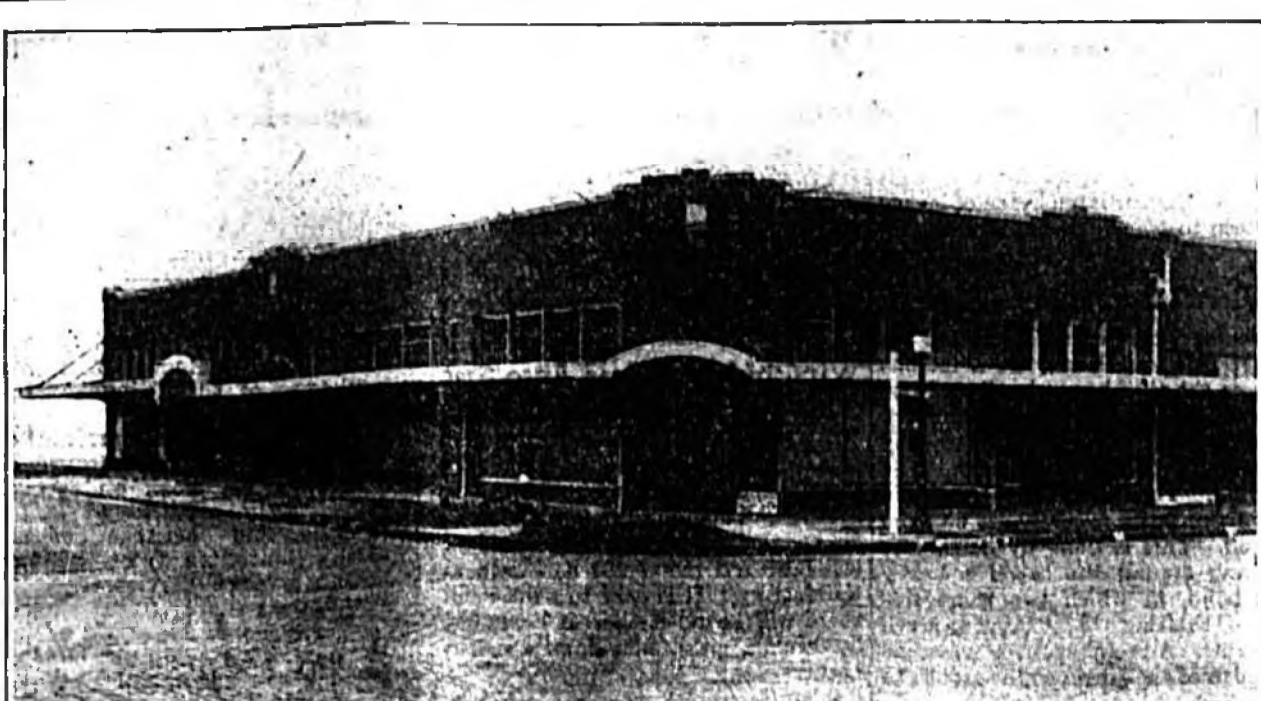

UNIFORM FRUIT HAMPERS URGED BY ECONOMISTS

Annual Loss to Shippers From Use of Frail and Varied Forms of Crates Is Estimated at \$10,000

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Nov. 21.—Adoption of federal standards for hampers, round stave baskets, and market baskets, prepared after an exhaustive investigation, are being urged by the United States department of agriculture. So many different sizes and types of these containers for fruits and vegetables are in use, it is declared, that it is practically impossible for a purchaser to know just how much he is getting when he buys a hamper or produce. It is estimated, for example, that one-third of the so-called half-bushel hampers manufactured today are short measure. Almost thirty million hampers are used annually, the department states.

In addition to the large use of hampers, there are said to be 20 different sizes of round stave baskets in general use, whereas six would be sufficient. Approximately twenty million of these are manufactured annually.

A similar situation is said to exist with regard to so-called market baskets or splint baskets, of which many styles now in use are regarded as unnecessary and deceptive. The peck size has dwindled to one-fifth or one-sixth of a bushel, and the half bushel to 12 or 14 quarts, the standard sizes seldom appearing on the markets, the department's investigation showed.

Carriers in the United States report losses of \$10,000,000 annually in handling perishables, among the many causes given being rough handling, failure to stow shipments properly in cars, delay in transit, lack of proper refrigeration, and frail containers.

Transatlantic Air Mail Service To Be Expedited Report

PARIS, Nov. 21.—A movement to bring the air mail system of the United States into close co-operation with the transatlantic mail service was set on foot here recently by the Paris Post of The American Legion.

A saving of many hours on deliveries through the west, Legionnaires pointed out, may easily be effected by arranging facilities so that all foreign letters reaching America's air mail bases, and carrying the air mail seals, could be immediately forwarded to the planes for distribution. This plan would be of great value to American and foreign business houses in Europe engaged in shipping goods to the United States, it was further shown.

Under the present mail system, bills of lading must arrive at the destination before the goods can be delivered, and any delay in the forwarding of such documents very often means that the recipient must give bond for the goods until the papers arrive.

Post Office Clerks Urge Pay Increase

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 21.—Atlanta postoffice clerks are officially behind the nation-wide movement fostered by the National Federation of Post Office Clerks to demand action on the Kelly-Edge bill providing for a \$300 annual increase for postal employees soon after Congress convenes December 1, by seeking to force the bill's passage, notwithstanding its veto last June by President Coolidge.

The Atlanta clerks constitute local No. 32 of the National Federation of Post Office Clerks, listened recently to an address by Leo E. George, of Washington and Chicago, National Federation president, who told of a counter-effort being made to refer the bill back to a committee for redrafting. Should such a decision be reached it was asserted, it would mean a delay of at least a year in actual passage of the bill.

Gypsum Wallboard Is Manufactured In Large Quantities

PLASTERCO, Va., Nov. 21.—Recent opening of the Sheetrock wall-board mill of the United States Gypsum Company here means the launching of a new industry for the Southeast. The plant will manufacture 100,000 square feet a day of fireproof gypsum wallboard and will be the only one in the southeast producing this building material.

This plant was built to enable the people of the southeast to obtain better walls and ceilings at moderate cost. Before now they have had to pay high freight rates on wallboards made in the North, but this mill has easy access to the Atlantic Coast Line, the Seaboard Air Line and the L. & N., and through them to the Florida East Coast, Tampa and Jacksonville and all other railroads serving Florida.

Sheetrock consists of gypsum rock converted into sheets three-eighths of an inch thick and of size convenient to fit the studding of any room. These rigid, easily handled units, which can be sawed and nailed like wood, are used as substitutes for ship-lap and other interior finishes, making possible a higher standard of home-building.

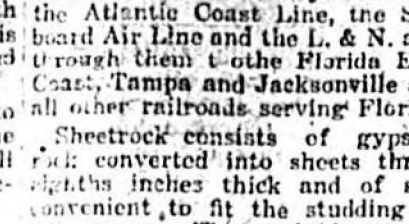

Frank Lossing Was Contractor On New Meriwether Block

The construction of the Meriwether building was under the supervision of Frank Lossing, local contractor.

Mr. Lossing stated this morning that the building had been erected according to the specifications and that it was being completed approximately on time. Only the heat material was put in the building and in every way it is one of the most modern and up-to-date commercial buildings in the city.

Mr. Lossing has been in Sanford only five years, but has been in the contracting business for a number of years. While in Sanford Mr. Lossing stated that he had constructed some of the city's largest buildings. During the recent season Mr. Lossing had the contract for erection of county schools at Lake Mary and Chulucota. He is also erecting a commercial building on Sanford Avenue.

Going back to the Meriwether building Mr. Lossing stated that the building had been so constructed that a second and third story could be erected on the foundation without any re-inforcement. Arrangements have also been made so that without the least trouble, a stairway and elevator may be installed.

Leif Brown was the foreman on the Meriwether building and Mr. Lossing stated that a great deal of credit for the successful erection of the building was due to the management of Mr. Brown.

Roadside Farmers Breed Hens Wise To Ways Of Autos

BLOOMSBURG, Nov. 21. — Although the reason a chicken crosses the road never has been settled to the satisfaction of everyone, the fact that most fowls attempt to get on the other side of the highway is responsible for thousands of dollars loss to farmers in this part of the state, and many other sections. "Automobile mortality" is one of the chief sources of loss to poultrymen, it is declared, and two protective steps are being taken. One is the removal of the chicken pens to points far distant from the road, and the other the breeding of birds that have shown, under observation, a tendency to stay on their own side of the road when an automobile comes along.

Tests made with nearly 100 flocks of a certain breed revealed that a half dozen chickens, which went across the road. With other breeds there were less than a half dozen of entire flocks along the road which did not try to cross. Some of the farmers are not slow to realize the difference and are turning to those breeds which "stay put" and avoid the losses.

On farms along main highways the losses to flocks from motor cars has been as high as 25 percent. In some cases a single passing automobile has killed four chickens.

Disabled Veterans Master Crafts Requiring Skill and Science

Although handicapped by the loss of limbs or by other injuries suffered in the war, thousands of former serv-



ice men have been rehabilitated and completed courses in vocational training through the Veterans Bureau Special instruction and in many cases the use of cleverly adjusted artificial limbs and other appliances have enabled hundreds of crippled men to surmount tremendous obstacles in their fight to overcome the ravages of war.

Thousands have mastered trades and crafts requiring considerable skill and science, overcoming the loss of limbs by the use of special apparatus and by expert training. Of the approximately 70,000 men still being taught, from 1,000 to 6,000 are enlisted in each of the following occupations: accountancy, agriculture, book-keeping, engineering, dentistry, drafting, electricity, jewelry, machinery, seamanship, tailoring and law.

The bureau received in all 671,685 applications for vocational training of which 340,058 were accepted as eligible for the service. More than 150,000 men are receiving compensation from \$20 to \$170 monthly in addition to the schooling they are given.

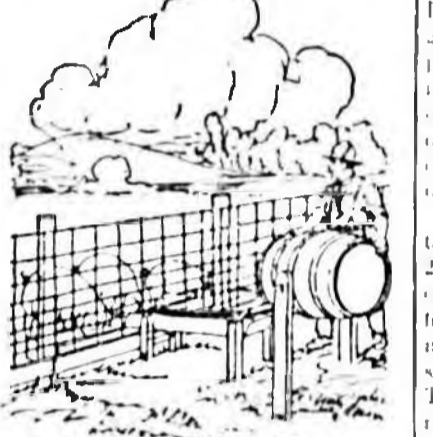

Ocean Mystery Is Seen in Island Covered with Cabbages

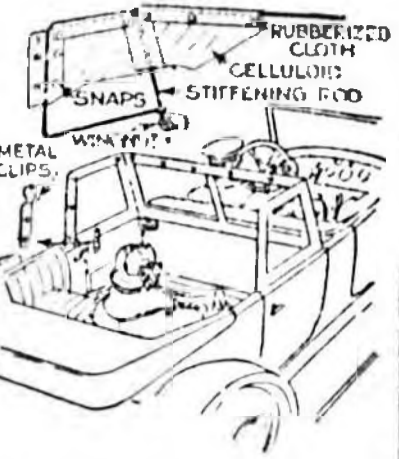

Barrel for Feeding Slops

Feeding slops, which are mixed together in a barrel, is quite a tedious task, as the stuff has to be dipped out of the bucketful. A much easier method of emptying the barrel is shown in the drawing. The barrel is pivoted between two posts, securely set into the ground. This is done by belting or screwing around the barrel a heavy iron band, in which two short sections of shafting are mounted to serve as pivots. Windshield for Rear Auto Seat

Windshields used on rear seats of automobiles are usually constructed of thin glass and require a substantial metal frame to hold them in position. This heavy construction can be avoided by making the shield of wood and metal rod as shown in the drawing. It is easy to adjust and there will be no danger of being cut by broken glass, should an accident occur.

The framework is made of 1/2-inch brass rod bent to the shape indicated. Iron rod can also be used provided it is painted to prevent rust. Four pieces of 1/2-inch rod are cut to fit inside of the frame. These are sawed or planed to strips of heavy rubber or leather and tacked to the frame over the frame and secured by means of straps.

A good adhesive for gluing is called to cloth or leather is used. The having 2 parts of shellac, 3 parts of resin, 1 part of turpentine and 1 part of alcohol. 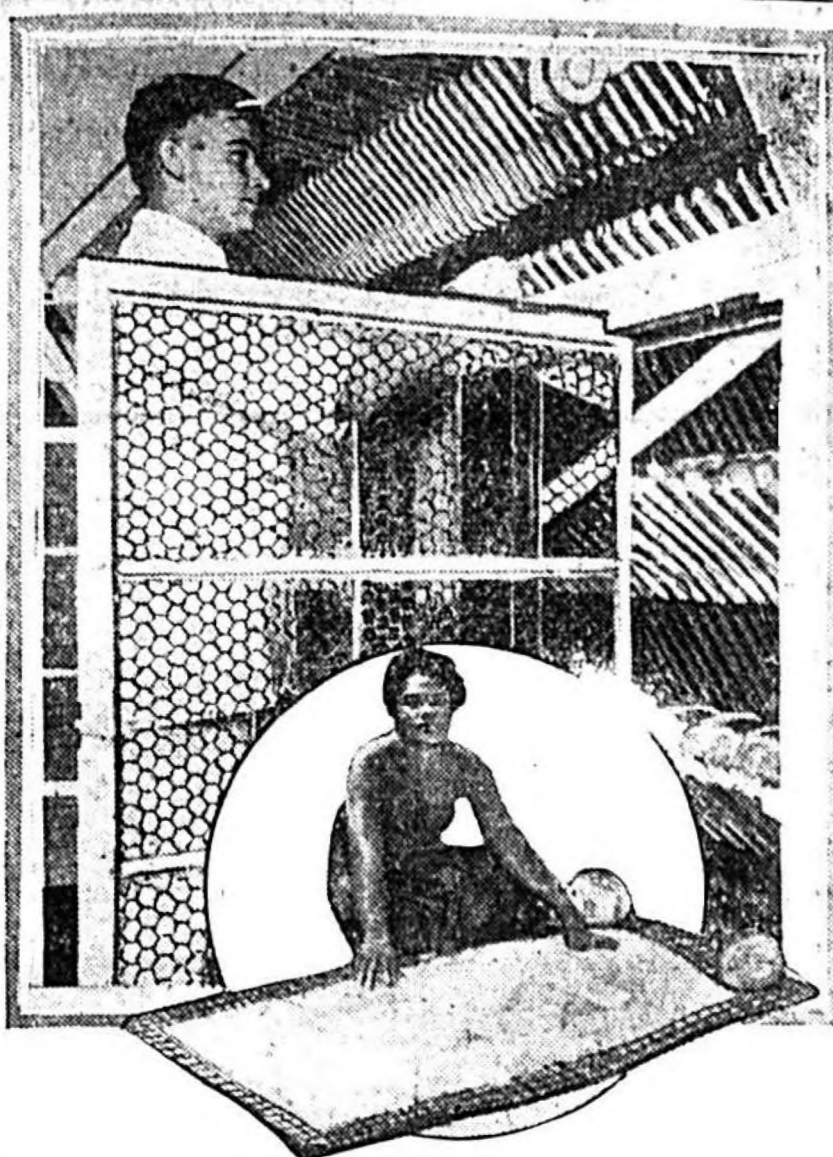
