(Continued from page 1) the subject of creating east and west side drainage districts, a committee of the following growers were appointed to look into the matter thoroughly and determine what may be done and how it may be done. Forrest Lake, John Meisch, Henry Nickels, Rex Packard, Foster and Smith.

It was said that several years ago an attempt was made to secure the drainage districts in and around Sanford. About 75 per cent of the growers were in favor of the plan, it was said, but the remaining 25 per cent raised more fuss than did the larger proportion and nothing ever was done.

Members of the Inland Waterways Committee were reminded that there will be a called meeting in Orlando this afternoon of the waterways body. It is understood that several representatives of the Sanford chamber will attend the meeting.

City Commissioner Kirtland Perkins, of St. Augustine, was present as a visitor and spoke to the local body about his city. He stated that St. Augustine was probably unique in the fact that it had no bonded indebtedness and has assets of about \$225,000.

Other visiting speakers were Eugene Masters, city manager of St. Augustine and H. M. DeMontmolin of Palatka.

William S. Royall of the Royal Ice Cream Company, spoke to the

body in regard to "patronizing home industry." He stated that in his business he was putting forth every effort to supply a superior quality of ice cream for sale in this and other cities but that for some reason the local retail dealers were not giving him a fair trial; that they were buying ice cream from an Orlando house.

He urged the Sanford chamber to give some support in this matter inasmuch as the purpose of the commercial organization is for the promotion of the patronage of home industry and the support of local trade. He stated that he did not buy his cream from Sanford dairymen because they have the required butter fat. He stated he would be willing to pay more for cream here to obtain the proper quality.
