WILLIAMSTON, Mass., Aug. 8. Dr. Tyles Dennett of Washington, speaking here Thursday at an open conference, declared that President Roosevelt was perhaps the first American statesman to perceive clearly that the far east question is largely a phase of European politics and that the weight of his influence in a warning to France and fluence in a warning to France and Germany quite possibly prevented a European conflict of world mag-nitude.





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
