# Teachers: Expel year round school

## By VICKI Becommen Herald Senior Staff Writer

SANFORD - It is not a financial issue to

teachers. It is a matter of educational quality. Year round education, currently used in all Seminole County elementary and middle schools. has been hailed by the district as a money-saving panacea for the district. Officials cite rapid growth which has made it difficult to keep pace with the appropriate number of schools for all the students enrolled here.

They have said that the system is a temporary solution to the dilemma of the county's growth. The district will build schools as they can afford to do so and perhaps, many years down the road, they will be able to afford to return to the traditional calendar.

It has been a point of immense dissatisfaction among teachers, who say it does not allow students to get the education they deserve, since its introduction to the district in 1991.

On Tuesday evening, representatives of Seminole UniServe, the union which represents the teachers, will ask the school board to return to the traditional calendar and abandon their use of □See Teachers, Page SA

# Signs up Lake Mary OKs new sign codes

LAKE MARY - What may be the atrongest sign ordinance in Seminole County was approved on first

reading last night by the Lake Mary City Commission.
"We've been working on this for almost one full
year," observed City Planner Matt West. "What we have here is the result of many many committee meetings, workshops, and discussions over coffee. I believe it answers everything that has been brought

West explained that the new codes repealed all of the old ones. "Some of the main differences," he said. "is that ail electronic message signs are now banned, we have stronger regulations for reader boards which limit them to specific uses, and have allowed alternative materials to be used for sign bases."

He said the only exemption would be the Lake Mary Boulevard corridor, which will still be required to have brick planters and sign bases.

During the final few months of preparation, the new sign ordinances had been divided into three individual sections, separating the special requirements for signs on Lake Mary Boulevard corridor with the rest of the city. All of these have now been combined.

West said that the reader board section of the ordinance had been ammended to allow them to be used in the case of theaters, gas stations, convenience stores, churches, not for profit organizations, public buildings, public schools and drive-through restaurant menu boards.

There was also discussion regarding prohibitions against portable signs, banner signs and others.

The discussion was relatively short however, as was the commission in number. City Commissioner George Duryea was not on hand because of illness, and Commissioner David Mealor was not present for the earlier part of the meeting due to his connection with a special Leadership Seminole program graduation.

Mayor Lowry Rockett, along with commissioners Shella Sawyer and Gary Brender, subsequently voted unanimously for passage on first reading.

The June 1 meeting of the Lake Mary City Commission has been cancelled. Therefore, the commission expects the second and final reading of the sign code regulations will be held on June 16.

"These are the most restrictive codes of any municipality in Seminole County," Mayor Rockett □See Signe, Page SA

## Sheriff's office seeks continued accreditation

SANFORD - The operation of the Seminole County Bheriff's Office will come under close acrutiny beginning Monday. It's part of the requirements for continued accreditation.

A team of assessors from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies. (CALEA) is scheduled to arrive Sunday to begin examination of all aspects of the sheriff's department policy, procedures, management, operations, and support activities.

Verification by the team that the Seminole County Sheriff's Office meets the commission's state-of-the-art standards is part of a voluntary process to gain accreditation. Sheriff Don Eslinger said it is a highly prized recognition of law enforcement professional excellence. As part of the on-site assessment, agency

employees and members of the general public are being allowed to offer comments during a public information session. The session will be held Monday at the Seminole County Cooperative Extension Center auditorium, 250 W. County Home Road, at Five Points.

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#### Bond lobbylst sentenced

PENSACOLA — A former Arkaness bond lobbyist has received a 24-month sentence for bribing an ex-public utility official, but he may be able to reduce his prison time by

testifying about more wrongdoing.

Preston C. Bynum resigned as a lobbyist for Stephens Inc., a bond underwriting company in Little Rock, Ark., after be pleaded guilty in March.

U.S. District Judge Roger Vinson sentenced him Thursday to the minimum term under sentencing guidelines that ranged up

to 30 months.

The day before, Vinson had sentenced Terry Busbee, a former Escambia County Utilities Authority board member, to 27 months, also the minimum under his guidelines, for receiving bribes from Bynum and Stephens.

Bynum, 55, of Little Rock, could get a sentence reduction if he provides a federal grand jury with significant information before he reports to prison July 30, said Assistant U.S. Attorney Stephen Preisser.

The prosecutor declined to say what the grand jury was investigating but Vinson had pointed out Wednesday that investigators discovered other utility officials had been wined and direct and given levish vacations and gifts.

"I accept responsibility for what I've done," Bynum told Vinson before centencing, "No punishment you can give me would be worse than what I've been through the last 10 or 11 months."

Afterwards he shook hands with the judge and chatted amisbly with him. Vincon later said Bynum just told him that he had wished they had met under more pleasant circum-

#### Pilot faces discharge

JACKSONVILLE — An honorable discharge has been recommended for a Navy helicopter pilot who told his superiors he was opposed to leading women into combat for religious and moral reasons.

A board of three Navy captains deliberated 36 minutes be unanimously recommending that Lt. Cmdr. Kennet Carkhuff, 36, of Highland Park, N.J., be removed from Navy. He is with an anti-submarine unit based at Management of the comments of t

Neval Station.

"I'm very disappointed in the decision," Carkhuff said. "I am confident of my shifties as a neval officer."

The recommendation now goes to Navy Secretary John Dalton. If Dalton approves the recommendation, Carkhuff can appeal to federal court, said his attorney Stephen Gallagher,
Carkhuff, a 18-year Navy veteran and graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy, was accused of substandard performance for failure to "support and execute" Navy and Department of Defense policies regarding women in combat.

Carkhuff told his commanding officers in August 1995 that he could not lead a helicopter detachment which had two women pilots because he did not believe that women should participate in combat.

"This has nothing to do with women in the Navy or flying helicopters. It has to do with the policy of allowing women in combat." Carkhuff said.

But it also regulates how much of the human body may be shown in public anywhere in the county by prohibiting such things as thong bikinis. T-back bathing suits or G-etrings.

The ordinance specifically forbids "dental floss or any other clothing or covering that does not completely and opaquely cover the anal cleft or cleavage of the male or female buttocks."

And it criminalises male genitals "in a discernibly turgid state" — even if covered.

state" — even if covered.

Federal cooperation was sought because Playalinda is on the Canaveral National Seashore and managed by the National

Park Service.

Park Superintendent Wendell Simpson and NPS officials from Washington told the commission they would cooperate with sheriff's deputies in enforcing the county law but would not deputies park rangers to make arrests.

County officials had been unhappy that Simpson and his rangers permitted nudiets, or naturiets, to migrate from a small isolated area of Playalinda into sections traditionally used by families and other beachgoers who are offended by nudity.

The park service "will honor whatever this commission adopts," Bob Deskins, associate regional director for operations, told the panel before the vote.

# Weltare computer Program approved for electronic payments

TALLAHABBEE — Florida's welfare recip-ients will eventually obtain food stamps and cash payments from automated teller machines and via other electronic means under legislation passed by lawmakers this

Florida is part of a national effort to stablish an Electronic Benefit Transfer program to distribute government benefits through automated tellers and point-of-sale terminals in grocery and other types of

Supporters say the paper-free process will streamline how government doles out welfare benefits and eventually, other types of payments such as veterans benefits, student loans and unsuppleyment incur-

ance. They predict it won't cost any more than the current process and will reduce fraud.

Critice, including the Rev. Jesse Jackson, counter that EBT is an untested system that doesn't thwart fraud and could potentially end up costing million of dollars more than

the current process.

On May 5, the last scheduled day of the regular section, lawmakers passed a bill that requires the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services to establish an electronic system and pilot projects in northern, central and southern parts of the state by July 1, 1996.

It expands significantly a law passed in 1993 that allowed HRS to create an electronic disbursement system for food stamp recipients.

ENT bill this year, said the law would force Florida to establish the system.

"The private sector responds very easily and quickly to change in technology. Government does not," said Clemons, D-Penama City. "This bross government to respond to now technology so we can deliver weifare benefits."

# Highway hospitality signs may be thing of the past

TALLAHABBEE — The hospitality signs that help motorists find gas, food and lodging along desolate stretches of Florida's interestate highways may become a thing of the past.

Last week, the Legislature passed a bill that eliminates a 10-year-old state program allowing businesses to display their logos on signs near interestate exits in rural areas.

Tourism industry leaders were squawking Thursday when they learned about the move by lawmakers. They said Gov. Lawton Chiles should veto the measure.

veto the messure.

"Why spend money to take something down that's already up? That's pretty stupid," said Bruce Nierenberg, a member of the Florida Tourism Commission and an industry consultant in Melbourne.

in Melbourne.

The plan to repeal the signs comes after state and local officials two years ago increased signs along highways in areas like downtown Mismi to help foreign visitors find their way and avoid becoming targets of criminals.

State transportation officials proposed eliminating the logo program as part of the 25 percent budget cuts demanded earlier this year of all state agencies by Senate Ways and Means Chairman Mario Diaz-Balart, R-Mismi.

stehded in legislation sponsored by Diss-Balart and passed by iswmakers last Thursday to enact budget outs and next year's \$50 billion state spending plan.

Diss-Balart did not return a phone message seeking comment Thursday.

For the past five years, businesses have had to pay to erect new signs and the costs are amortised over several years. Businesses who advertise on signs erected before then pay \$250 a year.

Logo signs dot about 76 interstate interchanges around the state.

The program cost about \$350,000 to administer this year and has nine workers, whose positions will be eliminated. About \$200,000 comes from state dollars and the balance from fees paid by businesses, said Ken Towcimak, the DOT's right-of-way administrator.

Legislation calls for the signs to be taken down as permits expire and as other businesses recover the costs of erecting the newer signs. Toweimak said some signs could be standing for a year or more while others may come down later this

Tourism officials said eliminating the signs wasn't a good step for the industry.

# Blacks colleges

#### THE MESONATED

TALLAHABBEE — Plorida's colleges may have legally integrated many years ago, but more than 90 percent of black students in the state system still shy away from the state's major universities.

In fact, only about 5 percent

in fact, only about 5 percent attend flagship universities like the University of Piorida and Piorida State University.

And despite decades of effort by officials, blacks and whites

throughout the South are still going to college separately, ac-cording to a report by the cording to a report by the Southern Education Foundation released Wednesday, the 41st anniversary of the historic Brown vs. Board of Education decision by the Supreme Court.

"Of the 12 states in the South, not one has achieved an acceptable level of desegregation," said Robert Kronley, the report's project director, "The figures in Florida are hor acceptable."

in Florida, more than 9 of 10 black students still choose to enroll at a community college or at historically black Florida A&M

Seventy-eight percent of Flor-ida blacks who attend public college attend a two-year college. No other Southern state has such a high concentration of black students in community colleges.

University.

"We have no magic number," said Alan Stonecipher, a spokesman for the Board of Regents. "We're engaged in a revolutionary process to make our campuses look more like the state of Florida.

For 16 years, Florida's public higher education has been operating under a desegregation agreement with the U.S. Department of Higher Education to ensure that blacks have full access to historically white universities.



## Black role models on television

WASHINGTON — On a recent Tuesday at precisely 8 p.m., Erin West, 14, rushed into her Glenarden, Md., living room, made straight for the TV and started flipping channels. When she reached CBB, she stopped.

But she didn't see "her" show.

Thinking she'd gotten the networks confused, Erin switched to another channel, then another frustrated, she called to her mom:

"Ma, doesn't 'Under One Roof' come on tonight?"

tonight?"

Erin's mother, Carol, said she'd noticed earlier that "Roof" — an hour-long drama starring African American actors James Earl Jones and Joe Morton as a father and son who blend their households — ween't scheduled for its usual Tuesday slot. The next day, they heard the show had been canceled.

How, the Wests wondered, could that happen? How could a show that all of their friends love just disappear?

Why would CRS abandon one of the few shows about African Americans that "just seems real"? wonders Erin; a ninth-grader, "If I like a show, they take it off as seen as I start watching it every week, it gets on my nervee."

"I was so meet," school Carol, S6, an employee at a local hardware chain, about the disappearance of "Roof."

disappearance of "Roof."

"We've cried together over it. ... It's one of few things we waich together, have the same views on: ... Not that shows like (raucous Fox attem) "Martin" are bad — it's fine for us to make facis of curselves on TV. But here's a nice program that's realistic — I can't believe a show that good, with positive role models and aericus issues, oan't survive."

In fact, "Under One Roof," which sired March 14 through April 18, wasn't canceled—the show was a "short-flight," or limited-run, series for which CBS ordered only six episodes. Such brief "tryouts" aren't uncommon for series that networks deem promising. Occasionally with such programs, says one media insider, "lightning strikes—"Dallas" started as limited rus, and suddenly everyone loved it."

Not as many loved the critically lauded "Roof," which during its run sveraged a 7.8 rating in a system in which double-digit ratings are usually required for survival.

But CBS did have some investment in the show's success. Its Triseday time slot had been formnerly occupied by "Rescue 911," the network's most posular show among blacks, according to CBS. Also, the network made the unusual move of hiring as outside firm specializing in minority communities to publicies "Roof" is major markets.

But Erts and Carol West's feeling — that their show was dissed by profit- and ratings-obsessed appropriately unconcerned with the impact of their programming on minorities — is community's general suspicion that ratings-



Teachers have expressed their displeasure with the schedule, but under state law they are not permitted to include the matter of student attendance days in their contract negatiations.

"So we are going to ask them

to consider what the teachers are eaving and to put an end to (year round education) as quickly as possible," Parker said.

She noted that teachers across the district took part in an essay-type survey in which the respondents were overwhelmingly opposed to the schedule.

Teachers said they oppose both multirack and single track year round schooling, she noted.

Year round education has students in school for six weeks and off for three weeks instead of having twelve weeks off in the cummer. Such a schooline was touted as a way to decrease review time for students at the beginning of each school year.

"Teachers have found, however, that they are having to epend more time in review at the start of each new massion and that they are having a more difficult time covering all the material." Farter pointed out.

Some teachers on the multi-track calendar are required to move their classroom every three weeks in order to ensure enough classroom space in the school. Such a discussion has

enough classroom space in the school. Such a disruption has caused problems for both teachers and students. Perhans said. "Students need stability and continuity in their lives," she said. "The year round calendar.

One of the biggest problems with both the single and the multi-track calendare. Parker said, is that teachers are not given work days which are student non-attendance days.

Teachers use those days for planning, for grant-writing, for working on projects with other teachers.

# 'Bewitched' star Elizabeth Montgomery dies of cancer

LOS ANGELES - Elisabeth Montgomery, the

housewife-corceress who cast spells with a twitch of her nose in the enduring altoom "Bewtiched," died after battling cancer.

Montgomery died Thursday at home about a month after surgery to remove a tumor. Reference books and news clippings put her age at 62, but her family said she was 57. Her family did not disclose the type of career.

"Bewitched," a comedy that ran on ABC from 1964 to 1972, was one of the network's biggset hits and Montgomery's only TV series. She starred as Samantha, a witch who tries to avoid

using her power to please her often examperated mortal husband, an ad executive.

The popularity of "Bewitched" has proved durable: Reruns of the sitcom are among the highest-rated programs on Nick at Nite, a cable Tv channel.

Montgomery's post-"Bewitched" career focused on TV movies, including "Deadline for Murder," broadcast on CBS just last week. It was her second TV film based on the career of reporter

The daughter of Hollywood star Robert Montgomery also appeared in a few films in the 1980s and '60s, including "The Court-Martial of Bully Mitchell." But television was her medium of choice.

His other movie roles included a supercitious conductor in "The Money Pit" with Tom Hanks, and a psychotic killer opposite Bruce Willie in "Die Hard." The two had studied together at the Bolehot, but an angry Godunov said his old friend "threw me away like a potato peel,"

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# Pain of gastritis

DEAR DR. GOTT: I recently had an acute attack of gastritis and was sent to the emergency room with severe upper stomach pain resembling a heart attack. Please give me some information on this condition.

on this condition.

DEAR READER: Gastritis (inflammation of the stomach) is a
common consequence of certain
viral infections; it is also a
manifestation of food potenting.
It can result from some medications, notably anti-inflammatory
drugs, such as Motrin and
Naprosyn, that are frequently
used to treat arthritis and minor
pain.

Gastritis stimulates the nerves leading from the stomach, pro-ducing upper abdominal or chest discomfort that the brain cannot distinguish from the coronary pains of angine or heart attack. Other disorders that may mimic cardiac pain include sortic

aneurysm, pancreatic inflammation and galletones.

These afflictions can be differentiated using tests, such as cardiograms, X-rays and blood examinations.

examinations.




South won trick two with his heart ace, drew trumps and took the diamond finesse. However, East won with the king, cashed the heart queen and returned the diamond 10. South couldn't avoid the loss of another trick: one down.

As North pointed out, South should have left the diamond finesse alone, taking a ruffing finesse in clube instead. After winning trick two, he should have played a trump to the dummy and called for the club king. Assuming East covers with the ace (a card with which he is marked by West's opening lead). declarer ruffs, returns to dummy with another trump and plays the club 10, discarding a diamond from hand. West wins with the queen, cashes the heart jack and switches to a diamond. However, declarer wins with dummy's ace and discards his last diamond on dummy's established club eight.
