





Winston Churchill was so everlastingly right throughout the many years when he battled almost alone and unaided to prepare Britain for the inevitable conflict with Nagi Germany that whatever he may say now with regard to Russia, or anything else for that matter, deserves the spe-

cial consideration of all thoughtful people. And he says now that the best way to avoid war with Russia is to provide quickly the UNO with a military organization strong enough to enforce peace throughout the world and for Britain and the United States, pending that development of the UNO, to remain militarily strong themselves and to establish an alliance between the two great English speaking nations.

As for the alliance, we can't say that we agree as to its necessity. There are too many people in this country who do not like Englishmen and to attempt to establish an alliance except under the impulse of wartime dangers would so open up inherent prejudices and hostilities as probably to do more harm than good. But whether we like the English or not, and whether we have an alliance with them, we will be righting on their side, and we will be mighty glad to have them on ours, when the next war comes.

As to the likelihood of war with Russia Mr. Churchill says: 'I do not believe that Soviet Russia desires war. What they desire is the fruits of war and the indefinite expansion of their power and doctrines." In other words, Russia is following the path which Germany trod and which led directly to war. Germany did not want war either, you can be sure of that. All she wanted was complete domination of Central Europe, and ultimately the rest of the world, without having to fight for it.

It is plain enough now for everyone to see how Germany could have been stopped in the beginning without the loss of a single life. But back there in 1932 and 1933 Mr. Churchill was one of the few men in the world who saw, or nothing to be anxious.—Phil. 4:6. tells us, "I'm convinced that there is nothing they (the Russians) admire as much as strength, and there is nothing for which they have less respect than for military weak-






