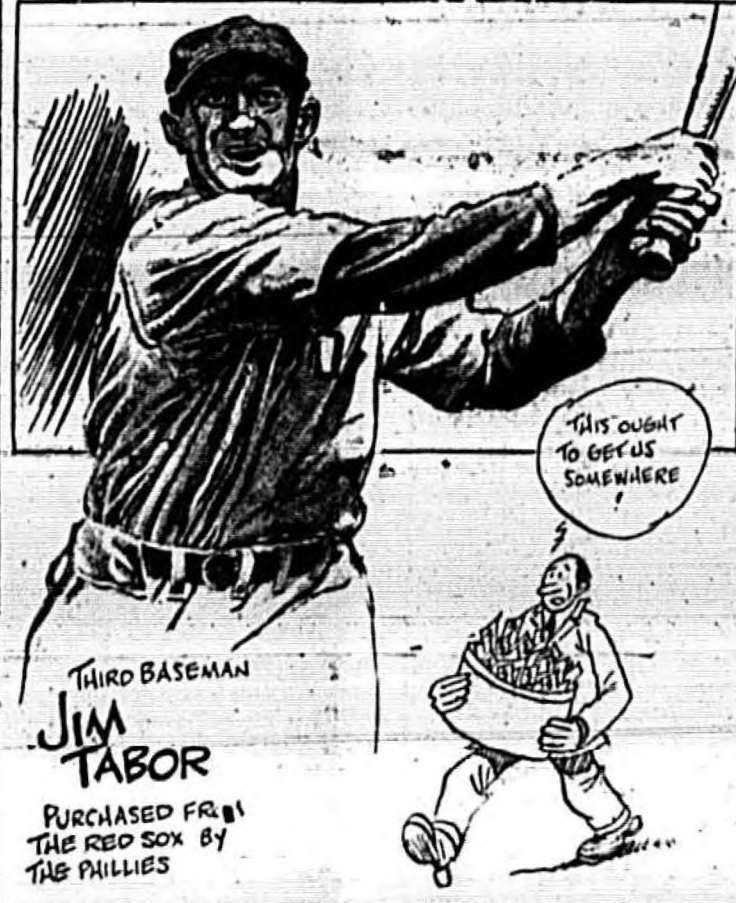

Greenwood Lake Training Camp Being Built To Order For Conn

GREENWOOD LAKE, N. J.—Billy Conn is going to like his camp in this little village. The place is being made to order for the fighting "Kid" who has plans for lifting the world's heavy-weight boxing championship testing on the brow of Joe Louis since 1937.

When the Irishman arrives April 1 to begin strenuous training for his June 19 date in Yankee Stadium, everything will be shipshape, even to the 40-foot cabin cruiser which undoubtedly will have the run of the lake.

Teddy Gleason, the man who got Conn interested in this section, is responsible for what is tantamount to an entirely new night hotel. The site is more familiarly known as Brown's Hotel since the name has been carried down through generations.

\$25,000 Refurbishing Project
Gleason has shelled out \$15,000 and will spend another ten grand before Billy begins belting sparring partners.

Teddy's first job was to spruce up the hotel interior. He had the exterminators in twice during his first six months, painted and re-modeled all 26 rooms in the hotel, brightened the restaurant with palm trees and indoor awnings and had numerous portraits of fighters painted in the barroom. Even President Truman has been "done in oil."

Gleason is building 20 steam heated cabins with a shower in each. Six of these cabins will be used by Conn's sparring mates. Dapce Hall is Indoor Gym.

The indoor gym, used occasionally for Saturday night dances, has a full size ring and will hold more than 1,000 spectators. At present the makeshift dressing room is a coat check but that situation will be remedied.

Indoor drills will be held during rain and cold. An outdoor arena seating 1,200 persons will be built between the hotel and the southern tip of the lake. When the summer season hits its full stride Gleason plans to promote boxing.

Conn's living quarters will be a smart looking chestnut log cabin less than a half mile up the road and back from the concrete high-way. The cabin cost Gleason \$3,500 but recently he turned down an \$8,000 offer to sell the place when Billy fell in love with it. The structure, complete with all modern conveniences, took Gleason six years to build in his spare time.

Plenty of Room for Roadwork
The setting is ideal for roadwork, too. There are numerous paths, and, if Conn feels the urge,

he can run around Greenwood Lake. It's only nine and a half miles long but a good 20-mile hike around it by foot.

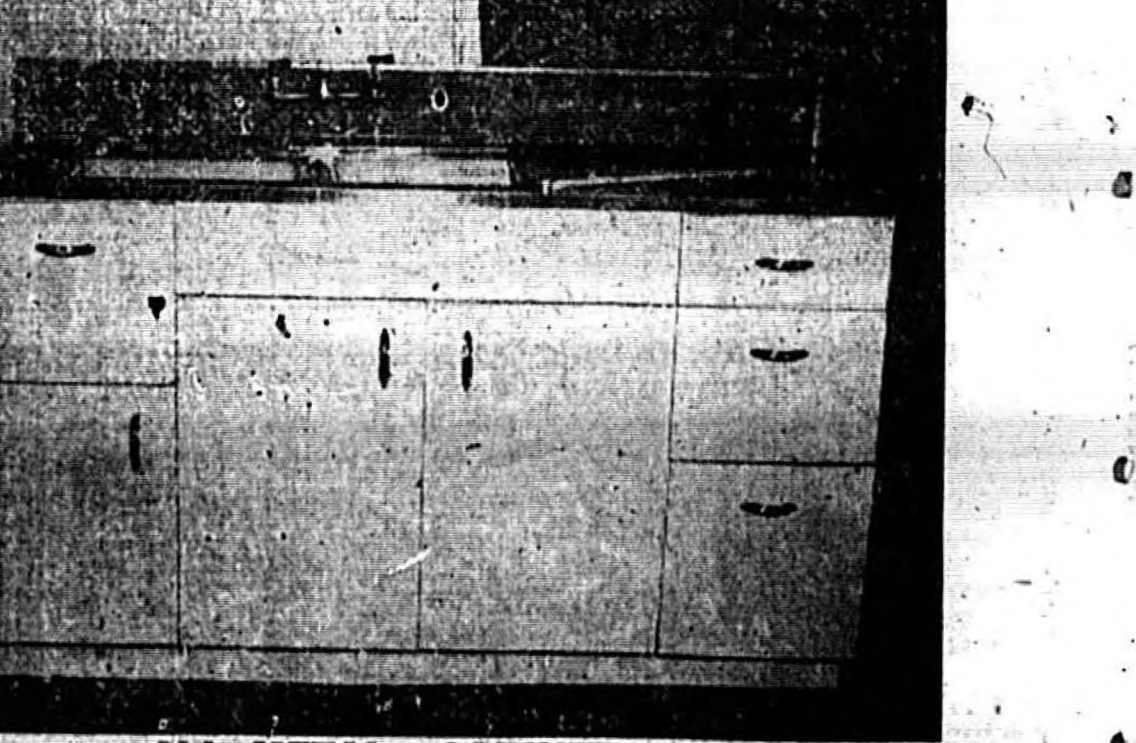

Churchill Ignores Russia In Address

Urges U.S., Britain Stand Together In Address Before Virginia Legislature

RICHMOND, Va., Mar. 8. (AP)—Winston Churchill ignored completely Russia and Communism in an address delivered today before a joint session of the Virginia legislative session. Nor did the former British Prime Minister refer directly to his appeal three days ago in Fulton, Mo., for creation of a strong Anglo-American military alliance.

Churchill called upon the people of Britain and the United States to stand together "in defense of those causes we hold dear." Said Churchill:

"Above all, among English-speaking peoples, there must be the union of hearts based upon convictions and common ideas. That is what I offer. That is what I want. In these last years of my life there is a message of which I conceive myself to be a bearer. It is that we should stand together."

However, says Churchill, this proposed standing together of Britain and America should be in malice to none. "In greed for nothing, but in defense of those causes which we hold dear, because we believe they mean the honor and the happiness of long generations of men."

Churchill then remarked that only the other day he had read an English nobleman's suggestion that Britain would have to become the 40th state in the union. But, too, Churchill said yesterday he had read an editor's opinion that the United States should not be asked to reenter the British empire.

Fire Aboard Queen Elizabeth Put Out At English Port

SOUTHAMPTON, Mar. 8. (AP)—A fire aboard the 35,000-ton liner Queen Elizabeth was brought under control today after a 90-minute battle. Before the blaze had been extinguished tons of water had been poured into the ship's hold.

Officials of the Cunard Line, owners of the ship, said that damage was not extensive.

The fire broke out in the hospital bedding store and the principal damage was in the hospital ward and on the promenade deck.

The heat twisted steel work and filled cabins and passageways of the liner.

Southampton and Southern Railway police immediately began an investigation to determine the origin of the fire.

The Queen Elizabeth arrived at Southampton from New York last Wednesday. The voyage was her last as a troop transport and she was docked at Southampton for refitting to enter the north Atlantic passenger service.

During the past five weeks fires have occurred on 13 ships in British ports. Special agents from Scotland Yard have been alerted to be on the lookout for sabotage.

Coleman Outlines Activities Of Chamber Of Commerce To Jaycees

"The state in general and Sanford in particular are on the threshold of a prosperous era," declared H. H. Coleman, president of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, last night during an address before the Junior Chamber of Commerce held at the City Hall.

"In fact," Mr. Coleman asserted, "Sanford has many natural advantages not found in other places," and he called on the Jaycees to continue their loyal support and cooperate to the fullest extent to put Sanford and Seminole County in the "enviable position she so rightfully deserves."

Describing the Chamber of Commerce as a promotional department of the city and county, Mr. Coleman said the group acts as a connecting link between the governing bodies and the public. "Actually," he remarked, "most of the work of the Chamber has to be done with the sanction of either the City or county governments."

Mr. Coleman termed long range planning important for a community and to be in a position to take care of conditions that arise from time.

Pointing out that among the items the Chamber of Commerce is handling that has required a great amount of time to develop is the port of Sanford, Mr. Coleman outlined the program that has been accomplished to date on the project. He reported that a further improvement of the channel of the river to 12 feet has also been requested and added that the project has been given the approval of the U. S. Engineers. He said it was hoped to have this project included in the next Rivers and Harbors Bill which may be formed during the current year.

"The deepening of the river," said Mr. Coleman, "adds up to one thing—a water route from eastern seaports into Sanford." To accomplish this, there must be established modes of transportation on the river, terminal facilities, handling and storage facilities, and the distribution of cargoes from Sanford. He pointed out that the city has the responsibility of providing the necessary facilities for such a project.

Canadian Loan To Britain Depends Upon U. S. Action

OTTAWA, Mar. 8. (AP)—Officials of the Canadian Finance Ministry say that Canada's proposed loan to Great Britain depends on whether the United States loan to Britain is ratified by Congress. The Canadian loan would be for \$1,225,000,000 compared with the American loan of \$3,750,000,000.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8. (AP)—Although President Truman today declined to express his views on Winston Churchill's proposal for a mutual British and American military alliance, he told a news conference today that "Britain was a prime minister was exercising the right of free speech in America in making a suggestion a few days ago during a speech in Fulton, Mo."

Mr. Truman asserted vigorously that the United Nations would not be allowed to collapse. He expressed confidence that Russia will go along with the efforts of the world organization to keep peace.

The Russian situation came up when Mr. Truman was asked what would happen if Russia declined to comply with the American request for the immediate removal of troops from Iran. That situation, responded the President, will be handled when it comes up.

President Truman made it clear today that a "Krug" will take over all the duties formerly performed by Harold Lanes when Krug becomes Secretary of the Interior on Mar. 15. The President told his news conference that Krug will be acting as acting administrator and in other continuing capacities in which Lanes served throughout the war.

The President told newsmen that there's nothing to the rumor that James H. Doolittle is ready to quit, that actually the Secretary of State has no intention of resigning.

Pearson, a assistant to Mr. Thomas, of Akron, Ohio.

Mr. Firestone, Mr. Thomas and Pearson flew from Akron to Jacksonville in a Firestone plane, and then joined Mr. Scott for a tour by automobile of the 29 company-owned stores in Florida after which they will enjoy a vacation at the Firestone home on Miami Beach.

Group Is Named To Investigate Railway Dispute

Action By President To Delay Walkout By 30 To 60 Days

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8. (AP)—President Truman has appointed a investigating board in the railway labor dispute. Automatically this action by the President scheduled to start Monday by the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters and Railroad Trainmen. Mr. Truman named three men to look into the grievances of the two railroad brotherhoods. They are Judge Earl Erickson of the Missouri Supreme Court, Frank M. Swacker, a New York lawyer, and Gilbert S. Watkins, of the economic department of the University of California.

The two railway brotherhoods had threatened a start of a progressive walkout Monday for five days' demands for higher pay and changes in working rules.

The President at his news conference pointed out that wage issues in the rubber and telephone industries have been settled. They have been settled, he declared, strictly on a collective bargaining basis, and in a manner satisfactory to both sides. He added, they were settled without any help.

At this point, Mr. Truman said there have been hundreds of such settlements by the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters and Railroad Trainmen, but he said that people who do the right thing will get as much publicity as those who are not.

The President stated that he has an intention of intervening in the General Motors strike as requested by Detroit city officials. He said he is making an opinion that there should be a settlement on the basis of a wage increase of 10 1/2 cents an hour as recommended by a fact-finding board. The President indicated that the settlement for basic steel, a raise of 12 1/2 cents an hour, does not necessarily set the pattern for the whole industry.

He is vice commander of both the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars posts, is a director of the Sanford Atlantic National Bank, and a member of the Rotary Club, First Presbyterian Church, the Masons, the Elks, and the Coast Guard Auxiliary. With Mr. Pope he lives in a large houseboat anchored on the river shore at Indian Mound Village. A son, Capt. John Pope, is stationed with the Army at Nuernberg, Germany.

Mr. McClelland and Mr. Clonts could not be reached today for comment regarding their candidacy.
