# She Helps Her 'Blind' Students 'See'

Going to school can be quite an adventure — but what if you are unable to read the textbooks, see the blackboard or identify much of anything beyond a possible blurry contrast between light and dark areas of the world around you?

That is the problem of the students in Joyce Husted's class at South Seminole Middle School in Casselberry. The students are all "legally blind."

"To be qualified for the vision program a child must have eyesight of 20/200, at the best correction. That means a child can see at 20 feet what others can normally see at 200 feet, and that the vision cannot be improved past this point. The child must also have less than 20 degrees vision in either side of the area directly in front of him," Mrs. Husted explains.

This year all of the children in Mrs. Husted's class have at least some vision, so she has no one using Braille equipment. The equipment that pushes letters into paper so they can be read with gentle touches. But the county has such equipment if it is needed by Mrs. Husted or the other two teachers in the vision program.

Mrs. Husted, who lives with husband, George, in Casselberry, went through some special experiences learning to teach visually handicapped youngsters.

"I was in the training program at Florida State University, which has the vision program for most of the southeast," she explains. "We got some theory and a lot of practical knowledge," Mrs. Husted says.

"Now that the child is enrolled in her class, according to Mrs. Husted, all his teachers report he is much more active in class. "And his reading is making rapid progress," Mrs. Husted reports.

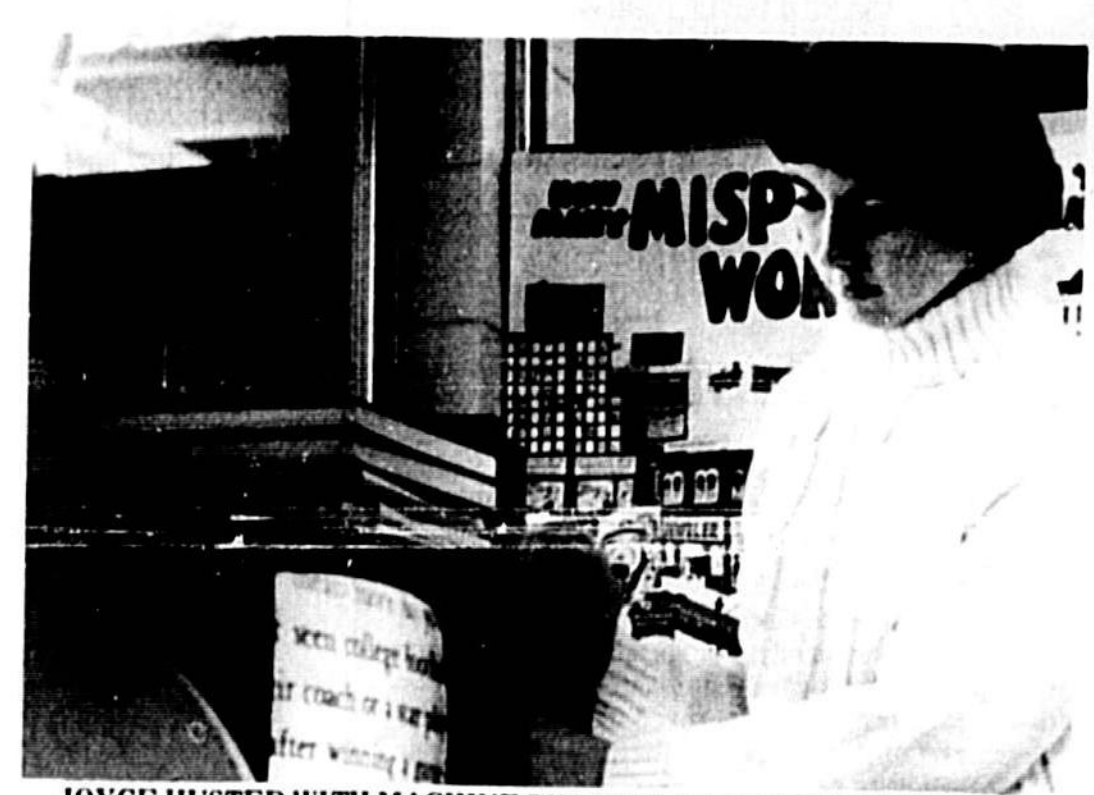
Children in the vision program not only take in ordinary classrooms, but go on field trips with their class, and with the vision program.

They study not only reading, but manners, how to act in social situations.

"Some people withdraw when they cannot see, and some become overaggressive," Mrs. Husted says. "So what I try to tell them in class is that what they have to contribute is valuable."

If parents think their child may have a vision problem, or if teachers feel there is a significant problem, then a vision screening should be requested, according to Mrs. Husted.

There is a form to be filled out by the child's doctor, a panel to judge a child's eligibility. Children adjudged almost, but not quite eligible for the program, may receive special consideration if the parents request it, according to Mrs. Husted.

## They Don't Pull Punches At This School To Help Kids Earn Points

Some schools stave off things like pencils and composition books.

The one at Rosewald Exceptional Child Center is more likely to sell sunglasses, jewelry and soap.

None of it costs a dime—not in cash, that is.

What it does cost is straining, pushing, pulling, heart-breaking effort, conquering some bad habit, or learning to do something special like feed yourself.

The students at Rosewald, in Altamonte Springs, come from all over Seminole County. They range in age from 5 to 21, and their problems include multiple physical handicaps, emotional or mental disorders.

Once the families of such children might despair of finding help for them—or even of the fact that they could be helped. Now they can find that help in public school. An important part of that help at Rosewald depends on the school store.

Mr. and Mrs. Jack Wagener operate the school at Rosewald, the school their son attends.

"This is not a giveaway program. Each child at Rosewald earns points on a punch card which he uses at the store instead of money," Mrs. Wagener explained.

"We distribute the punch cards to teachers each week, and each child carries his card from class to class. The teachers, the home economics and physical education instructors, speech therapist, bus driver, all punch the card when a child accomplishes something special," Mrs. Wagener said.

"Everybody who works with that child is responsible for seeing whether a child deserves any punches."

Mrs. Wagener recalls an example of how effective the punch card system can be: "We had one child who used very offensive language. The teacher withheld punches on his card until he began to use more self-control. He was not allowed to stop if he did not behave properly."

Other goals a child might have to accomplish to earn shopping points include learning to feed himself, learning to push his own wheelchair, or becoming toilet-trained, according to Mrs. Wagener.

There are 150 students at Rosewald, and 78 of those are able to share in the store, which the Wagners open every Friday.

"We have everything from tiny toys at five point values to crayons and coloring books at 20 points, to Flair pens and magic markers for 15 points a set," Mrs. Wagener said.

There are more expensive items at the store as well. Mrs. Wagener said, and those higher-priced things like shaving lotion, flashlights and eight-track tapes are used in another learning effort by the children.

"The children are taught to look at their cards, try to read the number of points they have, and associate that with the items they can afford. But, when they cannot afford something we buy a layaway plan," Mrs. Wagener says.

Children buy gifts for others almost as often as they buy for themselves, Mrs. Wagener said. The Wagners and other parents say the new behavior which the children learn at school, as well as work to earn points for shopping, carries over into their home lives as well.

But the store, which sells mostly new (and occasional good quality used) items is having a serious problem right now—and it may have to close.

"The store has been in operation for a little over a year now. Up to this point our parent-teacher organization has been able to finance it, but it costs \$60 a month to keep it open," Mrs. Wagener said. That amounts to less than 20 cents per child per week to operate the facility which is making such drastic improvements in the lives of the children at Rosewald.

"We are a very small group, and we are rapidly running out of funds," Mrs. Wagener said. She and the other parents of children at Rosewald want very much to see the store continue.

"What we really would love would be to find some civic groups which would like to each be responsible for funding one month, so the store could stay open through the summer program as well," Mrs. Wagener said, "but we would also appreciate contributions of items which might be sold in the store."

Items which are particularly popular in the store include records, which the \$60 monthly simply won't cover; wallets, fancy soaps, and sunglasses, according to Mrs. Wagener.

Another thing besides the store that makes Rosewald special, according to the Wagners, is "the warmth, the totally dedicated teachers." Mrs. Wagener said the teachers have contributed to the store from their own pockets in the past.

version tables on the test?

STUDENT: There were, but they didn't show us how to use them. This is our first year learning anything about metrics. When we took the test, a lot of students just didn't know how to take the conversion tables and apply them.

EVENING HERALD: Exactly where do you think the problem is that caused you to fail the Functional Literacy Test?

STUDENT: It's not at home. It's right here (panel member pointed to self). I like — I used to go home and my parents would ask me if I had any homework, and I would tell them no, but I did have homework.

STUDENT: I think teachers should spend more time with their students.

STUDENT: I think I'd split the blame down the middle, half on the students and half on teachers. Students are not studying regularly, and teachers are not giving enough help.

Students in Seminole County schools can study many things: reading, writing, arithmetic are only a little bit of what is going on — especially in classes for students with physical, mental or other handicaps... and those who are legally blind. 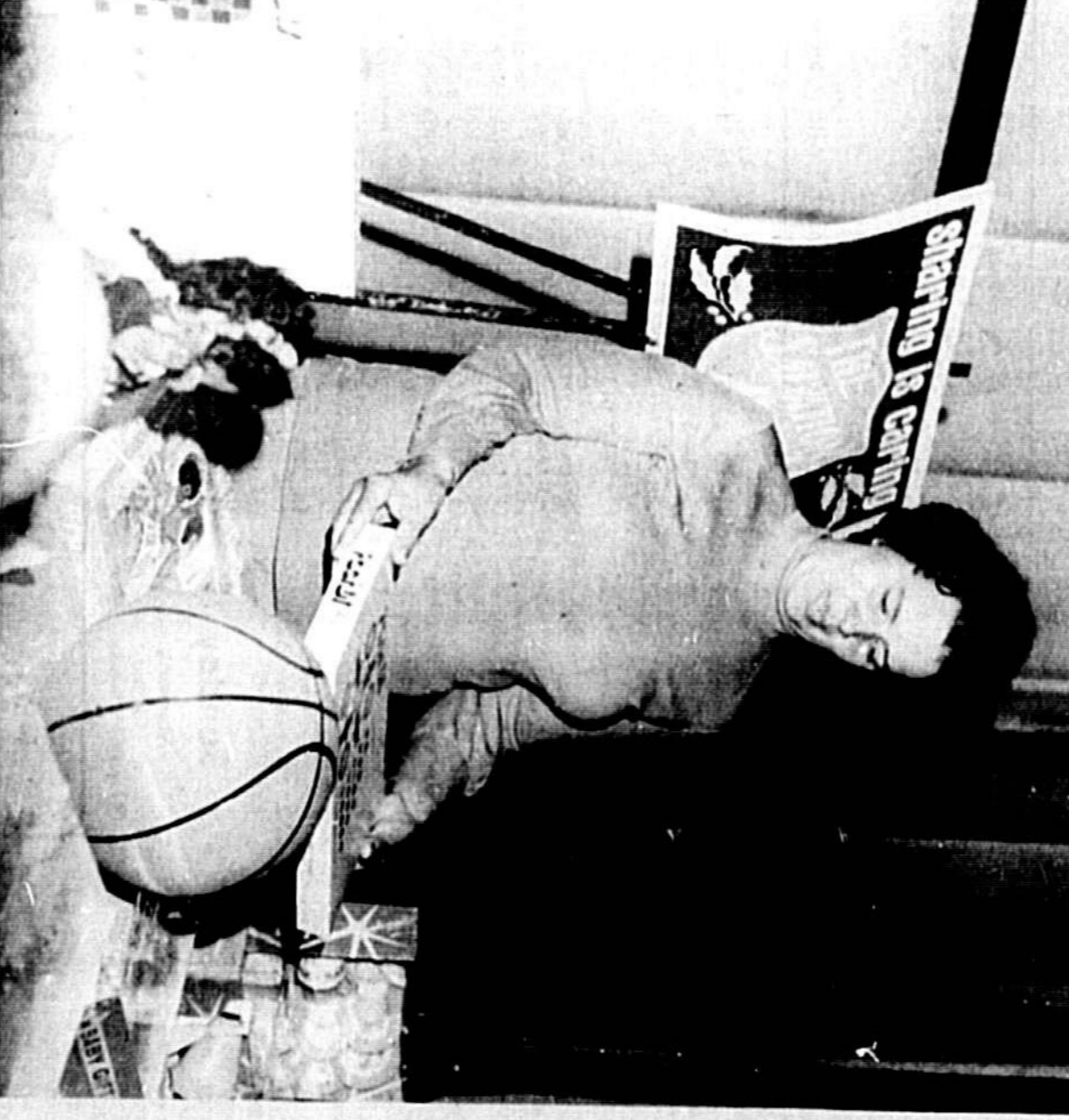

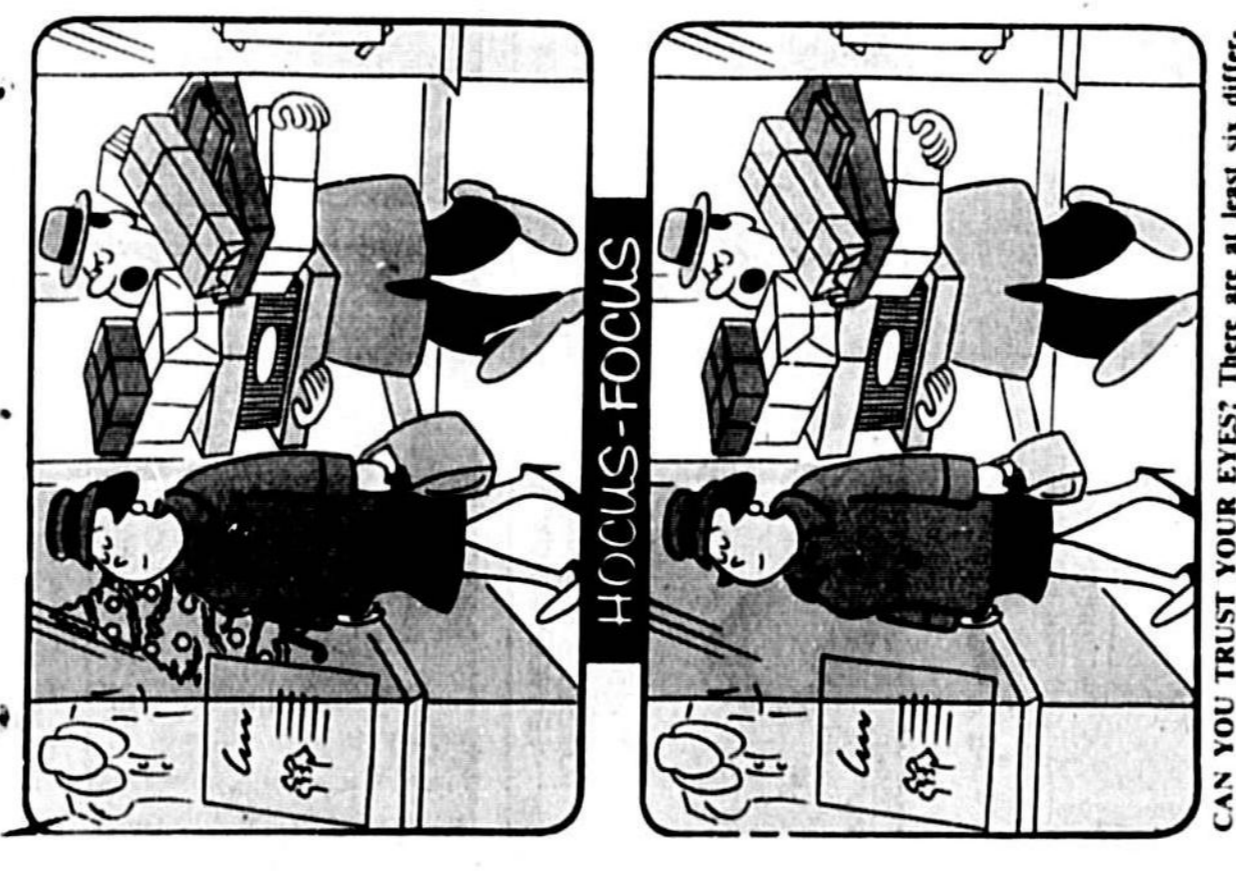

The Salvation Army's Christmas workshop, which is held at the Salvation Army center at 700 W. 24th St., begins to take on the appearance of Santa

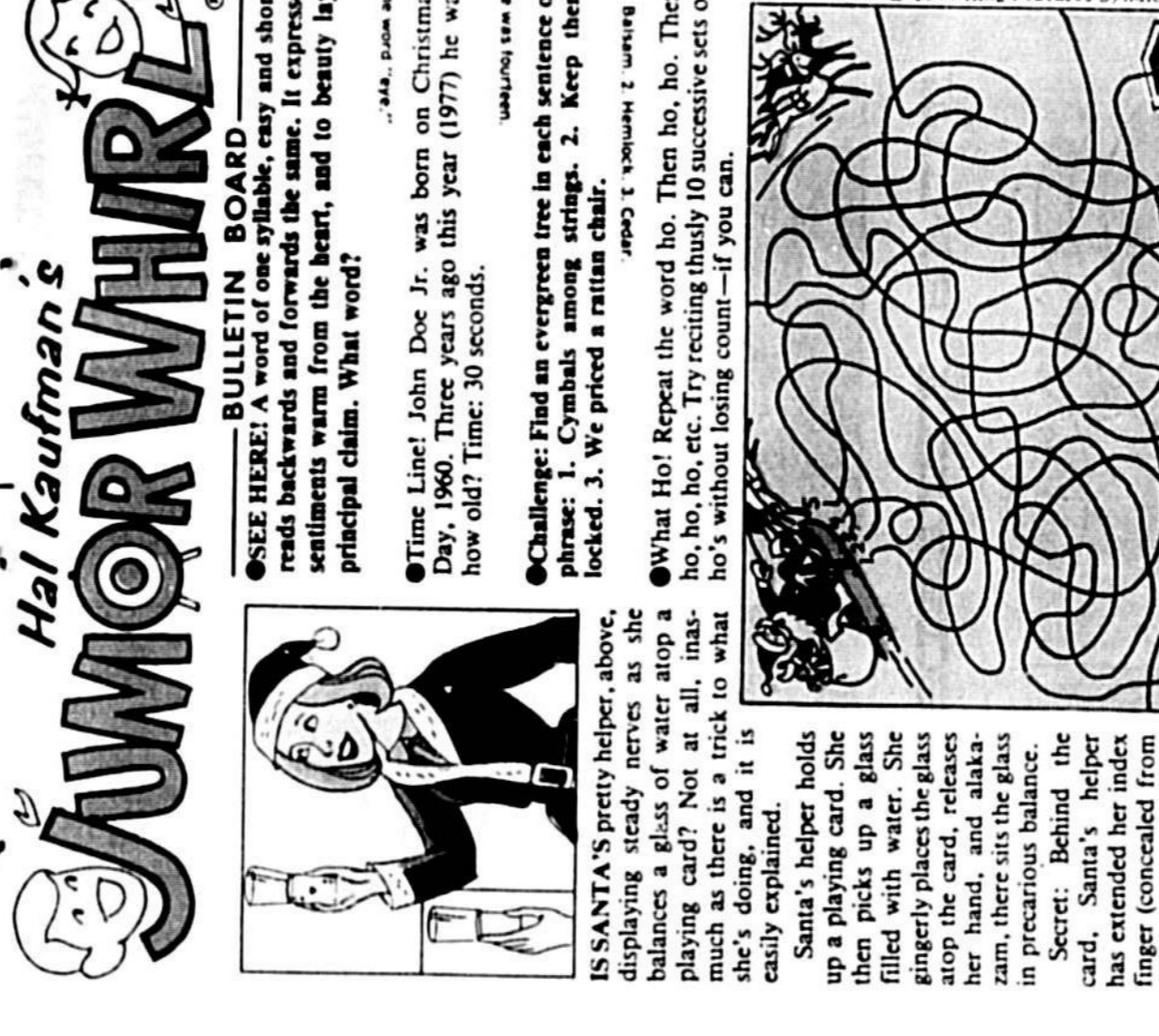
