Germans Hurled Back 5 Miles In Battle North Of Paris, Allied Scarces Say

Berlin Reports Further Gains

TurkeyRe-Affirms Its Pledge Of Mutual Assistance To Allies

Supported by American-made bombers, Gen. Maxime Weygand's French pollus hurled the Germans back for five miles north of Paris, a French military spokesman said today, and the Allied line was reported holding elsewhere under the onslaught of 120 Nazi divisions. With the beleaguered French capital now declared an "open city"—technically inviolate against bombing and shelling— a French spokesman said the Britain's Aerial


