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Service Without Pay

GARNER GIVES GUARANTEE OF CO-OPERATION

(Continued from Page One)
The billion dollar tax bill balance the budget.

Senator Long (Democrat, Louisiana), demanded greater taxes on the wealthy. He was answered by Senator Harrison, of Mississippi, ranking Democrat of the financing committee, who called for non-partisan action.

Harrison and Robinson of Arkansas, the Democratic leader, both declared against revival of the war-time surtax rates of 65 percent on higher incomes. The wealthy Senator corners, of Michigan, from the Republican independent wing, proposed such legislation.

The opening debate showed the Democratic leadership standing by the general provisions of the measure passed by the bipartisan coalition in the House with signs of a fight by a group of Republican and Democratic independents.

Speaker Garner's comment on the President's message was: "All I've got to say is if the President tells us what he has in mind, we'll pass the bill."

"To balance the budget," President Hoover wrote, "for the year beginning July 1 next, the revenue bill passed by the House of Representatives necessitates that there shall be a further reduction of expenditures for the next year of about \$200,000,000 in addition to the reduction of \$329,000,000 in expenditures already made in the budget recommendations which I transmitted to the Congress on Dec. 9."

"It is essential in the interest of the taxpayer and the country that it should be done. It is my belief that still more drastic economy than this additional \$200,000,000 can be accomplished. Such a sum can only be obtained, however, by a definite national legislative program of economy which will authorize the consolidation of governmental bureaus and independent establishments, and beyond this, which will permit the removal of long established methods which lead to waste; the elimination of the less important activities; and the consolidation of the government not essential to the public interest in these times."

"These two agencies cannot be accomplished without far-reaching amendments to the law. We need repeal of existing law which requires carrying on of functions not absolutely essential for the present. This means that we should undertake a definite, separate and coordinated program of economy legislation which will enable the executive and the appropriation committee to achieve the result desired."

Power Trusts And Banks Charged As Against Roosevelt

BOSTON, Apr. 5. (A.P.)—Mayor Curley yesterday said the "power trust interests" and the "banking fraternity" were two agencies bitterly opposed to the election as president of Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Speaking over the radio to a half of Roosevelt's candidacy Curley said the democracy of the nation apparently unanimously favored the nomination and election of Roosevelt until within the last 90 days.

"There are two agencies," he said, "that are bitterly opposed to the election of Franklin D. Roosevelt, and for the sole reason that they have been unable to dictate to him our control of the power trust interests, the other banking fraternity."

"These two agencies, out of a clear sky have developed an opposition to the candidacy of Roosevelt. That is responsible for the failure of our movement in many states, and is responsible for the defeat of Roosevelt."

The extravagance by the Martin administration, Harder brought in the former governor of Wyoming.

"Just as an instance of the extravagant way in which the funds of the state were handled may I refer to one small item," he said. "It isn't large and yet it illustrates the type of extravagance which characterizes the administration of my opponent. In November of 1924 I had some 25 or 30 governors in Florida attend the governor's conference. We took them around over large part of the state and they were our guests from the time they arrived until they went away. I did not spend one dollar of the state's money entertaining them."

"In February of 1927 one ex-governor from the state of Wyoming came to Florida and my opponent entertained her at the cost of the taxpayer's \$958.72. The bill is on the comptroller's office and was paid on May 21, 1927. This bill includes such items as \$444 for hotel, cafes and food; telegrams and telephone calls, \$128; automobile mileage \$106.72 and incidentals (supposedly tips), \$148. Harder insisted the time had come to 'get our feet on earth again.' He said the practice of constantly enlarging government activities must cease, that people in their home and business had cut out luxuries and they ought to be cut out of the state.

"The chief asset in Florida is real estate, homes, farms, business houses," he said. Every citizen should be encouraged to own his own home, but with the present high taxes he can hardly afford to do so. Business houses can hardly be rented for enough to pay taxes and insurance. Real estate today is frozen with high taxes. The cost must come down."

Harder said he proposed to have some personal supervision of state banks if elected. He paid "his respects" to Martin frequently during his speech.

Atterbury Calls For Better Deal For U.S. Railways

NEW YORK, Apr. 5. (A.P.)—An opportunity to "participate more equitably in the country's prosperity," is asserted for the railroads by Gen. W. W. Atterbury, president of the Pennsylvania railroad corporation, in its annual report issued yesterday.

The report shows that the Pennsylvania, one of the world's largest railroad systems having assets of \$2,170,000,000, had its assets in 1931 since its emergence from federal operation after the war. The road earned \$19,541,000, a decrease of \$19,525,000 compared with 1930, equivalent to \$1.19 a share on the common stock of \$40 par value against \$3.28 a share the year before.

"The unattractive condition in the railroad industry, while accentuated by the present depression, are due to the fact that during periods of expansion, the railroads have not been permitted, because of inadequate rates, restrictive legislation and subsidized competition, to participate adequately in the country's prosperity, all of which emphasize the unsoundness of existing methods of governmental regulation," says General Atterbury.

"Intelligent consideration of the railroad situation should result in such legislative and regulatory relief as will bring to the railroads economic equality of opportunity to engage profitably in any kind of transportation service that will most benefit the public."

DARROW DROPS 1ST ROUND IN HONOLULU CASE

In a move to obtaining a jury which would be unbiased despite the widespread discussion of the case, Early questioning of jurors brought up the question of whether Kahahawai was guilty or innocent of the attack of Mrs. Masie last September. Prosecutor Kelley insisted it had no bearing in the case but Darrow argued that it might have a great deal of bearing.

Kahahawai and three others had been tried for the attack but were freed on bail when a jury was unable to agree. The body of Kahahawai was found Jan. 8 in an automobile driven by Mrs. Fortescue, Lieutenant Masie and Lord, found on ground at the Masie home, was arrested and charged with the attack.

Early, indication of a battle over justice was given in the examination of Henry Beckley, prospective juror and former member of the police force.

Beckley insisted that despite having formed impressions as to Kahahawai's death, he could return a fair verdict.

The six men seated include two Chinese, one Hawaiian, one Japanese and two Americans. The entire week is expected to be occupied in selecting the jury.

Darrow's clients listened intently while he questioned the Chinese, Hawaiians, Japanese and Anglo-Nazans. Mrs. Fortescue, wearing a maroon suit, sat in the front row of the courtroom a few feet from the family of the slain man.

Outside the court a crowd of curious Hawaiians, Chinese, Japanese and Americans milled about, unable to enter the small court where only 75 persons, with passes were admitted.

Mrs. Fortescue was accompanied by her sister, Mrs. J. L. Ripley of New York. Her cheeks were with out rouge and she appeared extremely pale but without emotion Masie bit his lip and appeared worried. Beside him sat Jones and Lord, both dressed smartly as civilians. Neither appeared worried.

On the same bench with the defendants sat the father, mother and sister of Kahahawai. They are typical Hawaiians, heavy and dark. The father, a motorman, wore hot-tempered glasses and shaved gum.

Mrs. Masie did not appear in the court but is expected to attend sessions when the taking of evidence is started.




