#### Mexican dinner

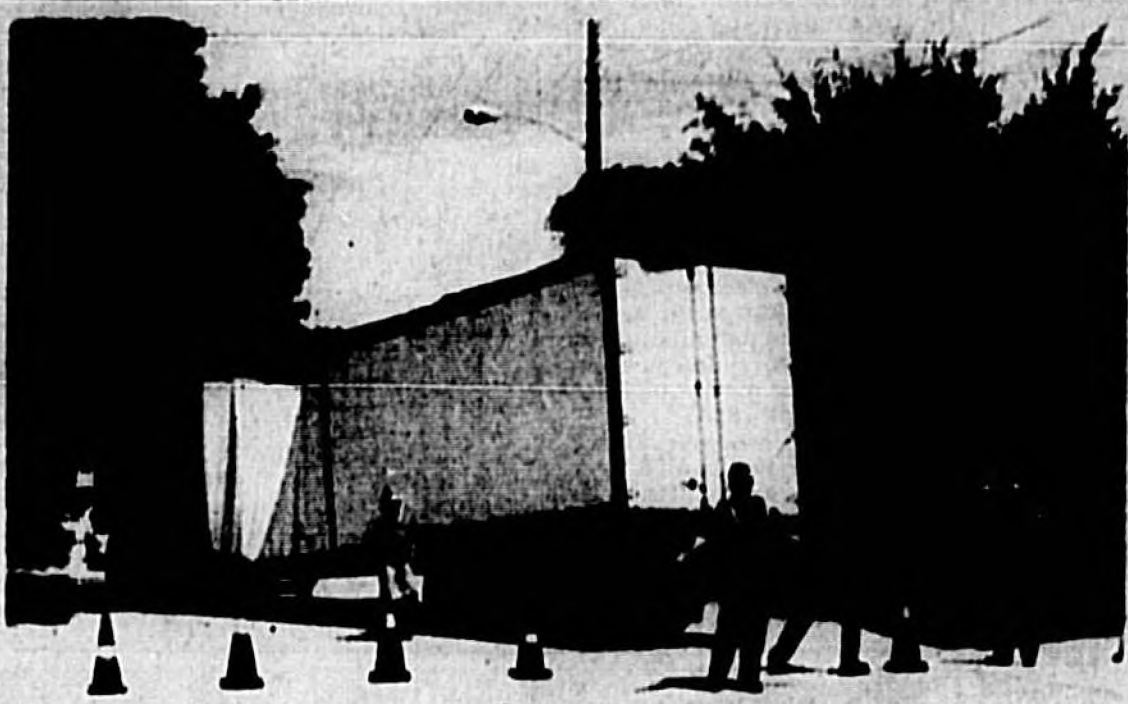

## Feds nab 2 suspects in multi-state fraud ring

United States Secret Service in association with the Seminole County Sheriff's Office Economic Crime Unit have arrested two suspects in a multi-state fraud ring. These suspects are thought to be working with a number of other people from Miami to Boston. Javier Gomez, 30, of 2899 NW 95th Ave., Coral Springs, and Martin Polendo, 34, of 1250 West Hillsborough Blvd., Deerfield Beach are the two prime suspects of the ring here in Florida. Both are being held without bond at the Seminole County Correctional Facility. According to reports, the ring work in pairs in the various states in which members operate. It is thought that this ring is part of a grand theft scheme that is costing a Colorado company called Money Gram Corporation about \$269,000 altogether. The way the scheme works is the ring members intercept phone calls from legitimate

## Banquet to benefit women's shelter

SANFORD — The Rescue Outreach Mission of Sanford has been helping homeless people and those down on their luck for many years in an overcrowded facility on 13th Street. The facility was used to house and feed men, women and children in a building that offered little room and even less privacy. With prayers and a lot of hard work, Mother Blanche Bell Weaver, who directs the mission,

recently oversaw the construction of a new facility down the street from the current facility. On Friday evening those who supported the project will join with members of the community in a Praise Banquet to celebrate the opening of the new Open Door Shelter for women and children. Weaver said she believed there needed to be a separate shelter for children and women where they could be separate from the transient men who will continue to be served in the older facility.

The mission also operates a day care facility for the children of homeless families. Weaver also offers academic assistance and transportation for the children who are living in mission facilities. While much of the building of the new facility for women and children has already been paid for by donations and other in-kind gifts, there is still a need for financial support for the facility. The Praise Banquet will be held at the Sanford Civic Center. See Shelter, Page 5c

## Consumers take note

TALLAHASSEE - Florida Agriculture Commissioner Bob Crawford today advised consumers to be alert to the cleanliness of mobile food carts, the sanitation practices of food handlers, and to the temperatures used to store food sold from lunch trucks. "Today, we all want convenience. Sometimes, the fastest, most convenient way to buy lunch is from a mobile vendor or lunch truck close to work," Crawford said. "Many lunch trucks are sanitary and store foods at temperatures that will keep them safe. However, some disregard safe practices." Consumers should always be observant to make sure that hot foods are maintained hot (at least 140 degrees F) and cold foods cold (at or below 41 degrees F). Food temperatures between 41 degrees F and 140 degrees F are in the danger zone for harmful bacteria to rapidly multiply. The number of bacteria that can cause illness (called pathogens) and the incidence of foodborne disease increase with temperature abuse of the food, unsanitary conditions of the facilities, and the practices of the food handler. Within the past several weeks, food inspectors from the Florida Department of Agriculture and

## Workshop to aid exceptional students

SANFORD — Students in exceptional education programs do not follow the same sorts of career or academic tracks as most other students. Because of their special needs, mentally challenged teens do not always make plans for what they will do after high school. Often, however, the students and their parents are not aware of the direction they should take after graduation. To that end, the Seminole County Public Schools are offering a post-high school planning workshop for those exceptional education students who are completing the 12th grade. The workshop is scheduled to take place at the Educational Support Center, 400 E. Lake Mary

Bldv. in Sanford on Wednesday, April 16. The schools will be offering students and their parents the opportunity to find out about what options are available to them for making the transition from the relatively-sheltered world of high school into the community of work and social survival. Information will be provided at the seminar about the variety of options which are available for students as they move from high school into the community as well as how to make the necessary connections to find work conditions. Many young people and their families see graduation as the end of the support system which has helped the students with disabilities be successful in high school and in life. In truth, district officials said, there are a number of organizations and agencies which can

continue to provide the kind of assistance that will smooth the transition into life after high school. That, they noted, is what the workshop is all about. At the workshop, representatives from area colleges and post-secondary training facilities will be available to address their entrance procedures and requirements. There will also be participation by community support agencies, including Florida Jobs and Benefits, the Social Security Administration, Vocational Rehabilitation and the Department of Children and Families. The April 16 workshop will be from 6:30 to 9 p.m. For further information, contact Joan Shalla, zone administrator for exceptional students support services at 330-0207 or the Supported Work Department at 323-8710, ext. 213 or 327.

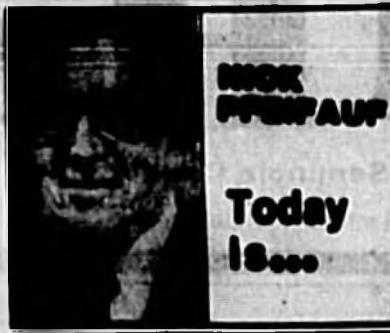

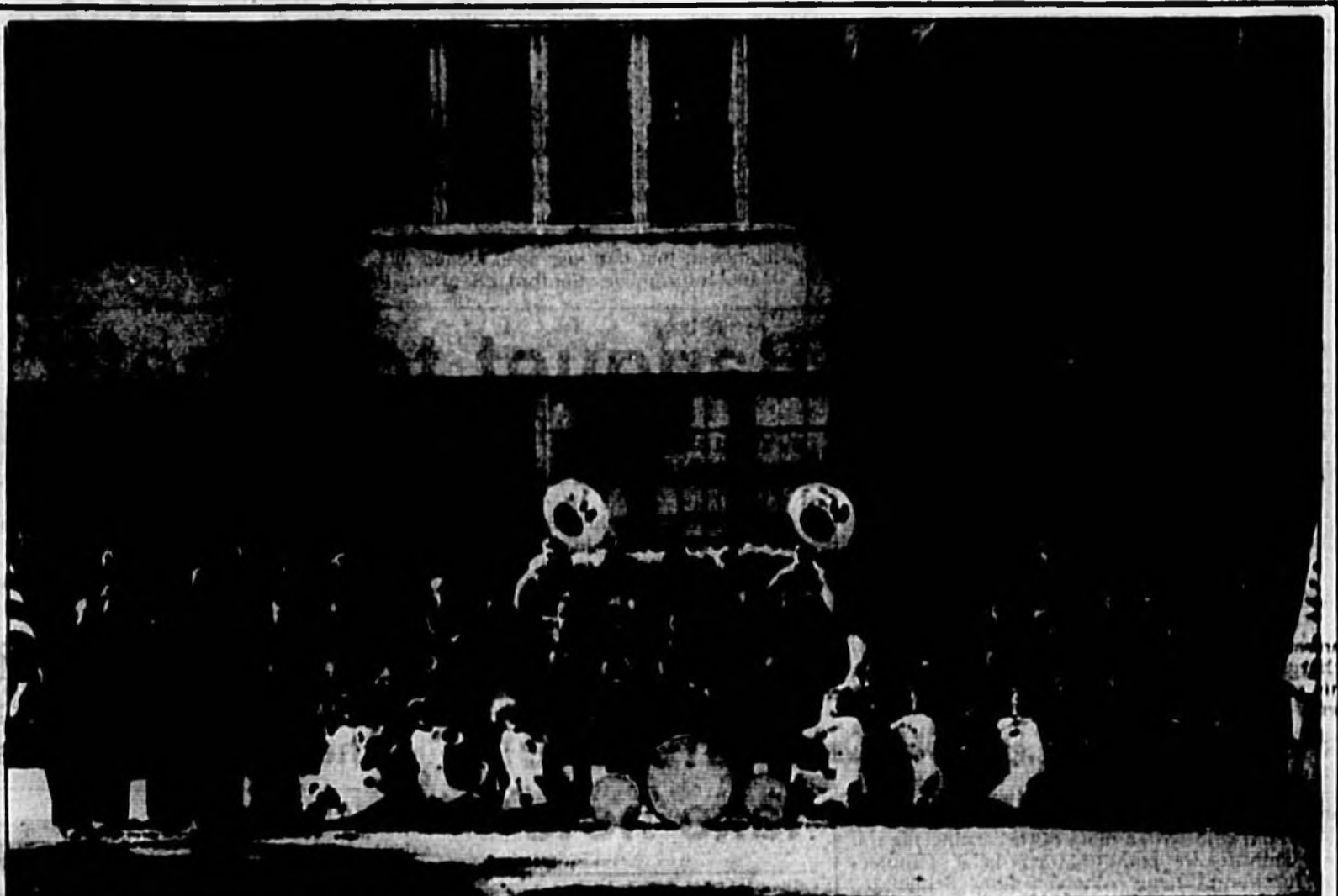

Having students shot before 7th grade

OVIDO — A new state law requires students entering the seventh grade to be immunized against the Hepatitis B virus and to receive booster shots for both Tetanus-Diphtheria and Measles.

The law requires the students to provide the school guidance office with proof of immunization in exchange for their schedule of classes for the seventh grade.

Immunizations are always available, of course, through private physicians or for free at the Seminole County Public Health Department offices in Sanford and in Casselberry.

District officials said they are aware that getting a student to the doctor or clinic is not always easy so they are doing what they can to make the immunization process easier for families.

In order to facilitate the immunization effort, the school district has offered weekend immunization times for parents who can not bring their child to other facilities for their shots.

Students need to have the three shots series for Hepatitis B, a booster for their Tetanus-Diphtheria immunization (unless they have proof they have had such a booster within the last five years) and an additional shot for their measles booster.

All of the shots must be completed before the students will be allowed to enter the seventh grade.

The next scheduled time for weekend immunizations at a school will be at Tusawilla Middle School from 9 a.m. until

noon on Saturday, April 12. Another session will take place at the school from 9 a.m. until noon on Saturday, Sept. 13.

Students who will be attending Tusawilla, Jackson Heights, Indian Trails and South Seminole middle schools will be served at that time.

Other immunization opportunities will be presented at schools in other areas of the county as well.

A parent or guardian must accompany the child for the immunizations and must sign a permission form at that time. An immunization record must also be brought at that time.

Consumer Services have collected prepackaged perishable foods, such as sandwiches and meat pies, from lunch trucks and the food processors that prepare the foods for the lunch trucks.

Some foods were found to contain *Listeria monocytogenes*, which can cause severe illness in certain individuals. The very young, very old, pregnant women, and immunosuppressed are at risk from this disease-causing bacteria. Symptoms may be limited to fever, fatigue, nausea, vomiting and diarrhea. However, these symptoms can proceed to a more serious illness. No illnesses have been reported from the consumption of these foods.

When *Listeria monocytogenes* is found in ready-to-eat foods, the firms that produced the contaminated products are required to stop all production and conduct a thorough cleaning and sanitizing procedure under the oversight of food and meat inspection personnel from the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. After the cleaning and sanitation procedures are completed, products may not be sold until they have been tested and found to be free of pathogenic bacteria.

"It is much more difficult to oversee compliance of mobile lunch trucks than for permanent food establishments at fixed locations," Crawford said. He urged consumers who have concerns regarding the safety of food on a particular lunch truck to ask questions and

obtain the following information:

- Ask to see the permit or license to operate a mobile food unit. The truck must have a current Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services or Florida Department of Business and Professional Regulation (DBPR) permit and decal posted on the truck.
- Lunch trucks permitted by the Department of Business and Professional Regulation can carry both prepackaged foods and ready-to-serve foods (food that is served or dipped by the driver. These trucks have handwashing and waste disposal facilities on the trucks.
- Lunch trucks permitted by the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services are allowed to carry only prepackaged foods, such as prewrapped and labeled sandwiches.
- The drive/food handler should use good sanitary food handling procedures and have clean hands, clean clothes, etc.

- Hot food must be maintained hot (140 degrees F or higher).
- Cold foods must be maintained cold (41 degrees F or lower).

All prepackaged foods should be labeled with the name of the manufacturer or the distributor, and the ingredients must be listed.

If you have questions or concerns regarding particular lunch trucks that you encounter, get the permit information and the vehicle tag number, then contact the Bureau of Food and Meat Inspection at 1-800-HELP FLA to register a complaint.

customers to the Money Gram office in Brooklyn, New York. These ring members access PIN numbers so that they can wire money from Money Gram locations in the various cities they operate. The members keep a portion of the money they get while the rest is wired to New York.

Gomez was arrested at Albertson's Supermarket at 2631 State Road 434 in Longwood. Polendo, according to reports, was with Gomez at the time. Gomez was charged with grand theft and uttering a forged instrument. He was trying to cash a fraudulent Money Gram at the store. Polendo was arrested when deputies found a small bag of cocaine in his car.

The United States Immigration Service is also working with the Sheriff's Department as well. Polendo admitted to being an illegal alien from Mexico and Gomez is suspected to be an illegal alien

from Columbia. The report said that Gomez had several alien I.D. cards and driver's license in different names in his possession.

A representative of Money Gram security will meet tomorrow in Orlando with Sheriff's Office investigators as well as Secret Service agents and Immigration Service agents. At that time, the case will be turned over to the Secret Service for further investigation.

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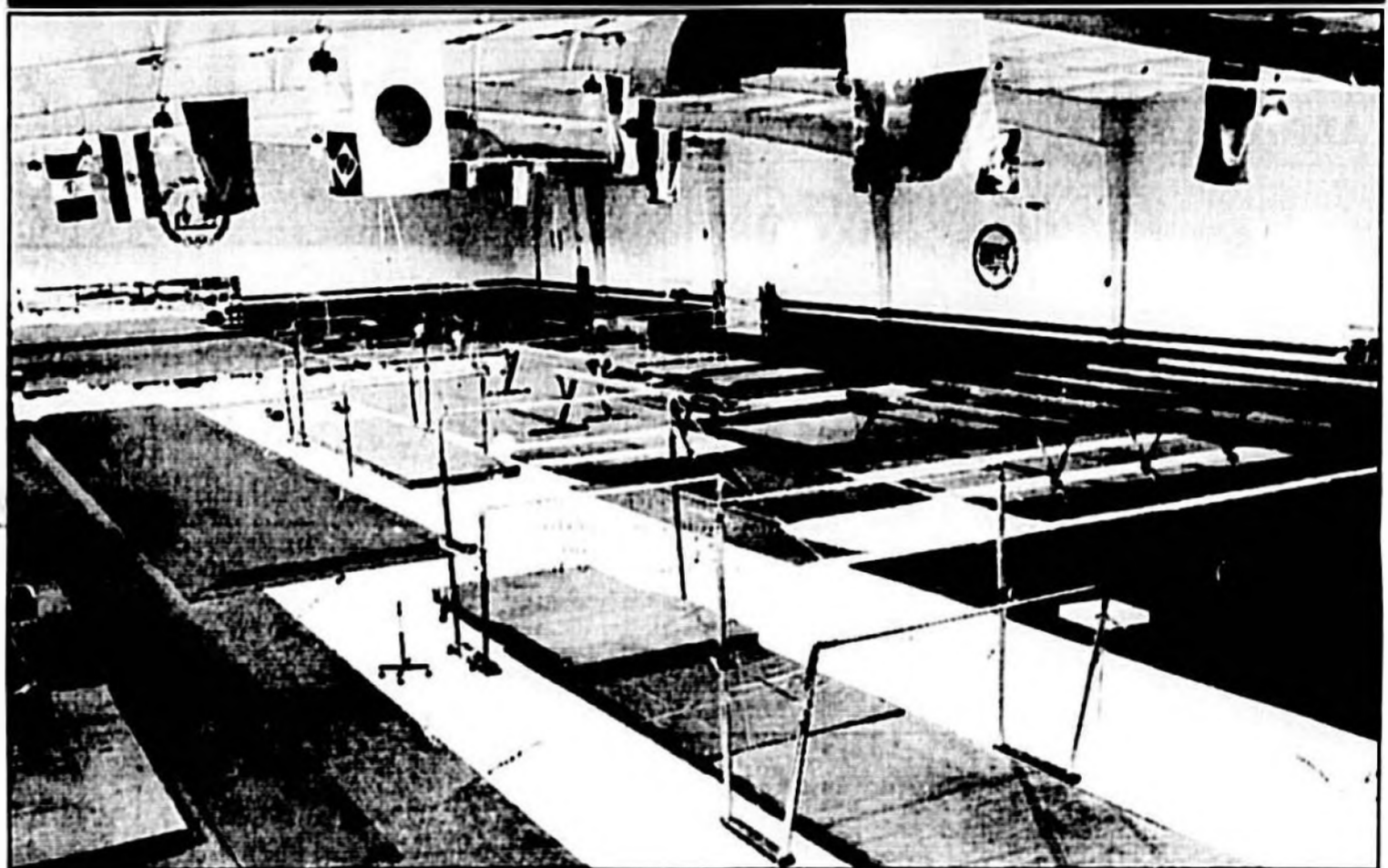
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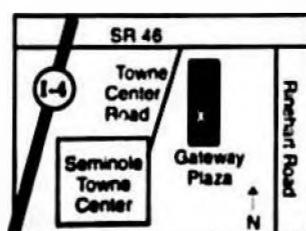

At a time in the season when teams are striving to reach their peak levels for post-season play, the Magic is on a three-game losing streak after an embarrassing 105-93 loss to the lowly Philadelphia 76ers at the Orlando Arena before a sellout crowd of disgruntled fans who let their feelings be known as the Magic trudged off the court after the final gun.

"No, it's not broken," Scott said, refusing to second-guess his decision to play.
Philadelphia came in playing some of its best basketball of the season, having won three of its last four including a win at Detroit Sunday. The Sixers kept the game tied at 23 after the first quarter, behind a surprise 10 points from Mark Davis, a second-year player out of Texas Tech. Davis ended the game with a career-high and team-high 27 points.
Armstrong provided a spark off the bench for Orlando in the second quarter, draining a three-pointer and suffocating Sixers' point guard Allen Iverson, and Orlando led at the break before Philadelphia overwhelmed the Magic in the fourth quarter.
Orlando is experiencing a slump at the worst possible time. Only 10 games remain in the regular season and all hopes of catching Charlotte for the sixth slot are fading fast.
