Guns, Ammo For 8,000 Disappeared From Bases

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Pentagon study says enough weapons, ammunition and explosives disappeared from U.S. military bases around the world between 1971 and 1974 to outfit approximately 8,000 men.

The report also raised the possibility that the outlawed Provisional group of the Irish Republican Army and other terrorist groups may have received some of the stolen materials.

The report, conducted by the Army Physical Security Review Board and released Monday by Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wisc., said approximately 6,000 weapons and 1.2 million rounds of small arms ammunition or explosives were lost.

"These losses would equip approximately 30 combat battalions with a basic load of small arms and munitions," according to the report, which was turned over to then Army Secretary Howard H. Callaway on March 10.

Socialists Choose Nominee

MILWAUKEE (AP) — The Socialist Party USA has chosen former Milwaukee Mayor Frank P. Zeidler as its 1976 presidential nominee under a banner inherited from Eugene Debs and Norman Thomas.

The party, which nominated Zeidler during its national convention Monday, calls itself the legitimate heir of the Socialist party, which has not fielded a White House candidate since 1968.

Zeidler, 62, is chairman of the party which he helped reorganize a few years ago. Delegates nominated Quinn Brinen, 41, a Chicago teacher, as his vice presidential running mate.

U.S. Stimulation Asked

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States and other major world economic powers must do more to stimulate their economies and help bring the world out of recession, says a top official of the International Monetary Fund.

Johannes Witteveen, director of the 17-member IMF, told its annual meeting Monday the present rate of economic recovery in the world may be too slow and may leave most of the world mired in recession.

He said although individual countries may feel they are doing enough, they must look at the problem in a "global context" and take into account the economic difficulties of smaller nations that depend on the big powers.

Recession, Illness Linked

CHICAGO (AP) — More mental illness, more physical illness and more crime grew out of economic recession, says a group of social scientists.

And they said the cost of these consequences is greater than would be the cost of programs to create jobs.

Government officials look only at the direct economic impact of unemployment, they told the annual convention of the American Psychological Association on Labor Day.

Arab Pockets Bribe

WASHINGTON (AP) — A prominent Arab financier contends he prevented the Northrup Corp., a major U.S. military contractor, from bribing Saudi Arabia's air force chief by keeping the money for himself, the Washington Post has reported.

"I stopped a bribe. I put it in my pocket," Adnan Khashoggi was quoted as saying in a Beirut interview published in the Post's Tuesday edition.

Northrup last June gave Senate investigators documents that accused Khashoggi of demanding a \$250,000 payoff for Gen. Hashim M. Hashim, now retired.

Airline Strike Continues

MIAMI (AP) — Negotiations between National Airlines and the carrier's striking flight attendants have ended in Washington, but there was no indication that an end to the walkout was near.

The 1,200-member Association of Flight Attendants struck National Tuesday after talks Monday ended in a 13-month negotiation deadlock broke down temporarily.

The flight attendants are seeking improvements in a wide range of areas, including salary, fringe benefits and working conditions.

Loebster Boats Reported

NASSAU, Bahamas (AP) — Bahamian officials have reported spotting by police patrol boats in the western Bahamas allegedly pulling lobster traps in Bahamian waters.

The officials said they had ordered a 60-foot police boat with three-inch cannon to pursue the boats sighted Monday.

Coast Guard officials in Miami today said they had not been informed of any arrests.

'Jaws' Spurs Business For Shark Meat Vendor

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The movie "Jaws" might be an anomaly to some seashore resort operators, but Preston Battistella figures it's going to give his business a shot in the arm.

The New Orleans seafood vendor says he sold about 150,000 pounds of shark meat last year, but he expects sales of some 200,000 pounds this year, partly because "Jaws" has caught the public fancy.

Most of Battistella's shark meat comes from sand and dog sharks brought in by Gulf fishermen, who throw the 4-to-6-foot fish away a few short days ago.

"People are shark conscious now," Battistella said Monday. "In some areas, the movie has stimulated sales. In other areas, it has hurt."

"It's a matter of educating the public that you can't always eat the highest priced fish. You can't ignore the ground meat of the seafood industry."

Battistella said he supplies 200 pounds of breaded shark filets to New Orleans public schools for their lunch programs this year. They have used shark filets as a base for gumbo.

He has shipped shark meat as far as Ohio, and he is trying to develop a market for shark skin. A shark's skin is like leather when it's dried, and it can be turned into belts and shoes.

He sends 10 to 15 pounds of dorsal fins — the one that sticks out of the water — to Gunter Prens's Versailles Restaurant here each week as the base ingredient for shark's fin soup, considered a delicacy in the Orient.

Prens compares the taste to that of a clear turtle soup.

Federal Grand Jury Starts Hoffa Probe

DETROIT (AP) — A federal grand jury launches a probe today into the disappearance of ex-Teamsters union boss Jimmy Hoffa. U.S. Atty. Ralph Guy said he hopes to unravel the mystery by taking testimony from more than 70 subpoenaed witnesses.

Guy said the grand jury's work initially will be to investigate rather than to collect evidence for indictments.

Meanwhile, the FBI will attempt to maintain custody of an auto which agents believe may hold a clue to Hoffa's July 30 disappearance. The car belongs to Joseph Giacalone, son of reputed Mafia figure Anthony "Tony Jack" Giacalone.

A hearing on the car controversy is scheduled before U.S. District Judge Robert DeMascio.

The auto was being driven by Hoffa's foster son, Charles L. "Chuckie" O'Brien, on the day Hoffa vanished.

O'Brien is scheduled to testify Wednesday before the grand jury. Hoffa dropped from sight after leaving for a luncheon appointment at which he told his family he was to meet with the elder Giacalone at the Red Fox Restaurant in suburban Bloomfield Township.

Giacalone, however, denied that he planned to meet Hoffa.

O'Brien said that, coincidentally, he was driving young Giacalone's car in the vicinity of the restaurant on the day Hoffa disappeared.

Strike Approval Called Unlikely

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sponsors of legislation to allow strikes by government workers say they don't expect congressional approval for years because of public unhappiness with walkouts by police, garbage men and teachers.

Government officials look only at the direct economic impact of unemployment, they told the annual convention of the American Psychological Association on Labor Day.

Black Fruit Picker's Son Joins State Supreme Court

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — The son of a fruit picker is to be sworn in today as the first black justice in the history of the Florida Supreme Court.

Gov. Reubin Askew, who appointed Joseph W. Hatchett to the post in a historic move believed to be the first of its kind in the South, said he was pleased to present the former farmhand to the Supreme Court.

Chief Justice James Adams administers the oath of office and presents the black robe of a justice to Hatchett.

"I have the basic tools of a lawyer," Hatchett said when his appointment was announced in July. "I can analyze facts, research law, and put it on paper. I've been researching law for 15 years, looking at trial records and arguing cases."

11 Killed In Accidents

At least 11 persons were killed in holiday weekend traffic accidents in Florida, including an 11-year-old Miami girl who died in a fiery accident on a bridge between Miami and Key Biscayne, state troopers said today.

Teresta Perez was in a car driven by her father, Bernardo Perez, officers said. Perez lost control of the car, which hit the bridge abutment, bounced across the median and struck an oncoming car occupied by six persons, troopers said.

Perez' car caught fire, jamming traffic for two hours on the Bear Cut Bridge, officials said. Ten persons were injured in the Sunday collision.

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Public Service Commissioner Paula Hawkins says the PSC ought to quit studying the question and adopt "an equitable and sound way" today to fix telephone charges.

The issue on how to figure local and long-distance dialing in company profit was at the heart of the latest fight between Mrs. Hawkins, a Republican, and the two PSC Democrats, Chairman Billy Mayo and Bill Bevis.

Also on the agenda today was the PSC attorney's recommendation that the commission not take jurisdiction over fuel adjustment charges of municipal utilities and rural electric cooperatives. The commission was expected to accept the advice.

RIVERVIEW (AP) — Gary Putnam, who helped settle a Vietnamese family of four, says he couldn't offer them anything fancy. Just his time.

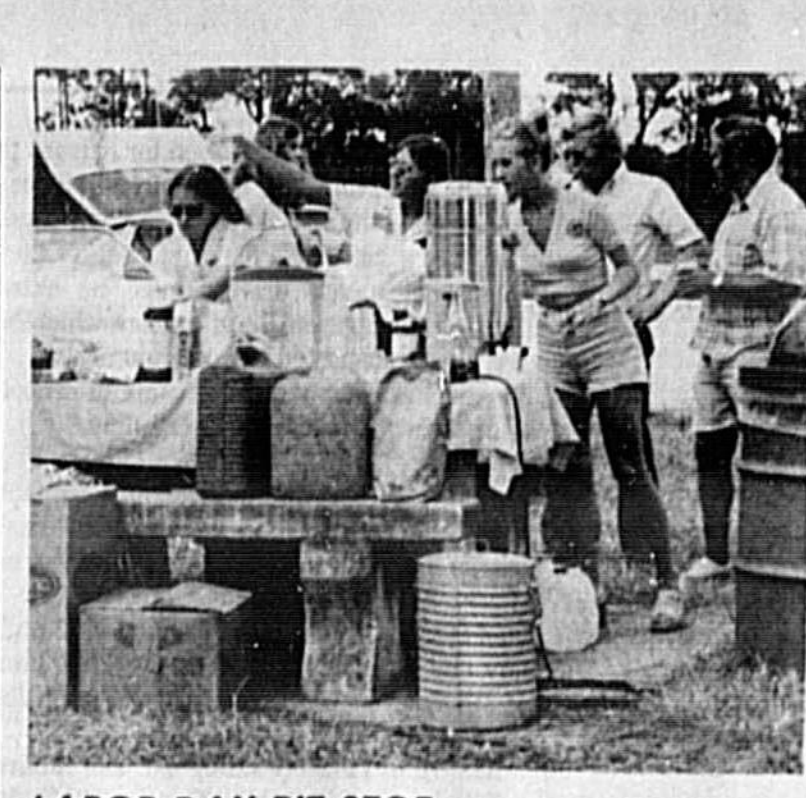
"We couldn't take them to the usual tourist spots around Florida," Putnam says. "But we taught them to drive, helped them find jobs and enroll in school."

CWA Claims Move Will Create Hardships Southern Bell To Transfer 58 Employees Out Of City

Fifty-eight employees of Southern Bell Telephone Company, mostly operators, will be transferred from their jobs in Sanford in October, 1976, a Southern Bell official said Tuesday.

The transfer, within the traffic department, is opposed by the Communication Workers of America (CWA) union representing more than 50 of the employees.

Plans to move the operator services functions to Orlando will not affect the downtown business office or the central office personnel which includes installation, repair and construction services, said

Tom Hunt, the company's Sanford office manager. Hunt said the transfer is an "efficiency thing" and "belt tightening" by Southern Bell and the result will be an "improvement" in phone service because the Orlando facility will provide "faster service."

However, Hunt said there will not be 58 jobs available in the Orlando office. Other alternatives for the operators and clerks will be to transfer to another position in the Sanford office or to transfer to a similar job for Southern Bell in another city, he said. Hunt also said attrition may eliminate some of the positions.

"I can't say everyone will have a job," Hunt said. "But the company will give the employees

every opportunity."

Glenn Meyers, vice-president of CWA Local 3113, said the union is opposed to the transfer because it will cause problems for the employees.

"It will create hardships on a lot of people," Meyers said. "But, look at the alternative."

"I'd rather see these people working in Orlando than unemployed in Sanford," he continued.

Meyers said he will "play it by ear" (the transfer which is 13 months away) "but I definitely don't like it."

Meyers said "nobody" could know the transfer will provide better service until the switch is made. "I'm sure the company is looking at it (transfer) from a service and economic standpoint," Meyers said.

From a "civic standpoint," Meyers said, "I hate to see people who are employed in Sanford taken out of the community."

Hunt said, however, the "economy of the community will not be affected that much."

Hunt said the employees will "spend their pay checks in the same places as before." He said that approximately 90 per cent of the 58 employees live in the Sanford City limits.

Hunt said employees have not been officially notified of the transfer and it is company policy to notify personnel of a change within 12 months of the switch. He said rumors of the transfer were circulating among employees.

Meyers said the transfer involved the "bulk of the traffic department" — long distance, information and directory assistance operators. Meyers said the operators make from \$120-\$180 a week, based on service time with Southern Bell.

CETA Funds Decision Delayed One Week

County Commissioners decided Tuesday to postpone until next week a decision on whether to transfer almost \$1-million in federal funds back to a Seminole County bank.

Commissioner Mike Hattaway asked if it wouldn't be "better" to have the full board present before voting. Commission Chairman Sid Vihlen Jr. was absent from the meeting due to illness.

Hattaway's comment came after Commissioner Dick Williams said he "ought to rescind (the previous motion) or transfer the funds back."

Williams had his motion to transfer the funds back to a county bank placed on the agenda for next Tuesday's county commission meeting. Commissioners Williams, Hattaway and Harry Kwiatkowski voted Aug. 28 to transfer almost \$1-million in Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) funds from ComBank in Casselberry to the Southeast First National Bank of Maitland—an Orange County banking facility.

Higher Fines Sought

If Sheriff John Polk has his way, Seminole Countyans tagged with traffic tickets and other violations will shell out an additional dollar.

The tacked-on dollar, the sheriff says, will be used to train his lawmen.

Polk asked the Seminole County Commission Wednesday for permission to add the \$1 to fines imposed in county courts.

Commissioners weren't totally convinced.

"I'm not sure for what court," Commissioner John Kimbrough said.

Commissioner Mike Hattaway said it "would increase fines."

Polk said some cities — including Sanford — already add an additional \$1 to pay for such things as law enforcement training.

Actually, a total of \$3 is added at present. One dollar goes to the state, a second dollar goes to legal aid and some cities add a third dollar.

Polk said it will "reduce the sheriff's training budget."

The sheriff said he will "sit down with judges" to ensure their compliance before reporting back to the commission at next Tuesday's meeting.

By law, Polk said the additional dollar can be added onto fines.

He said the only approval needed from the state would involve the type of training given Seminole County officers.

The \$1 which goes to the state was levied for construction of a police academy.

Public Works, Circuit Court Funds Fall Short County Commissioners Told Of Departmental Cost Overruns

Several department heads have informed a disbelieving Seminole County Commission of thousands of dollars in overruns for the 1974-75 fiscal year.

The director of public works, Bob Andrew, informed the commission at Tuesday's meeting he will need an additional \$23,000, and Ashby Jones estimated it will take an additional \$15,000 to \$20,000 for court reporters and court-appointed attorneys. Jones is deputy circuit court clerk.

"Why should we pay? Who keeps spending the money?"

County Commissioner Mike Hattaway asked Jones. "The state attorney (Abbott Herring) orders the court reporters," said Jones.

The fiscal year ends Sept. 30.

"Who levies the taxes?" Hattaway then asked. "Does he (Herring) levy the taxes?"

The commission voted to pay a \$5,000 overrun for July and a part of August. Commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski voted against payment.

Meanwhile, in public works, Andrew told the commission that gas, oil and repairs will cost an additional \$11,000 and \$12,000 will be needed in the sanitation department.

Hattaway, who was Acting Chairman, asked Commissioner Dick Williams to check into Andrew's requests and report back to the commission.

Commissioner John Kimbrough told Andrew no "big fat" contingency fund will be available in the 1975-76 budget for cost overruns. He advised Andrew to take a look at rates charged for dumping to see if revenue next year will meet expenditures.

Williams told Andrew he needed "additional revenue."

Andrew informed the commission he already had an additional \$23,000 placed in the 1975-76 budget to cover added expenses.

Sanford still has "no firm commitment" from the Seminole County Commission regarding its \$15,000 share toward the \$125,000 study required for the federally sponsored regional sewer plant project for North Seminole County including this city and Lake Mary.

Sanford City Manager Warren E. (Pete) Knowles said this morning a special meeting has been called for 7:30 p.m. Sept. 11, with the three-man area sewer committee to determine the county's interest in a joint effort to develop the plant. "We're going to try to get a firm answer out of the county," said Knowles.

He said the agenda mailed Tuesday includes a report on the cost distribution and the \$93,735 federal grant towards the study, as prepared by Clark Dietz & Associates of Sanford, a city hired engineering consultant firm.

The sewer committee includes Chairman John Morris, County Commission Chairman Sid Vihlen Jr., and Lake Mary Councilman Harry Terry.

Knowles said some of the county commissioners have told him the county already had budgeted \$15,000 for the county's share of the study. But Vihlen, in an Aug. 14 letter addressed to Morris and Knowles, said the county "supports the continuance" of the planning effort but prefers to select its own engineering consultant.

"If we don't do this study and the paperwork together, then each area will have to do it individually. It's cheaper for everyone with the joint effort, but we have run into some administrative snarls with the county," said Knowles.

Knowles said the city completed a cost and location study in February for the project. The present "info-infiltration" study is the second one required.
