In laying out the Florida Trail, the prime concern was to avoid civilization as much as possible. Once the route was selected, it was divided into 26 segments. A section leader from the Florida Tralis Association was put in charge to survey, clear, and map each 25 mile long segment.

The segments aiready completed and ready for the hiking family is section 12 from Clearwater Lake Campgrounds to Juniper Springs, all in the Ocala National Forest. The path is four feet wide and clear of all undergrowth. Trees are blazed with red or bright orange paint every 100 yards or so. Every six or eight miles, which is a normal days hike, the trall is planned so there is accessibility by car in case you want to drive one of two cars ahead to a stopping point if overnight camping is not your thing.







Autopsy Today For Year-Old Girl against the infant's parents.

Results of an autopsy to be performed today on a one-year-old baby girl will determine whether there will be a change in charges now lodged

This was divulged today by Det. Sgt. William Lykens, who Sunday arrested Kathryn Leigh Kniffin, 20, and William Kniffin, 18, the mother and stepfather of little Minnie Lee Bell, who died early Tuesday morning of injuries.

Both parents were charged by Detective Lykens with unlawful punishment of a child and lodged in the Seminole County jail in lieu of \$10,-000 bonds after the baby was taken to Seminole Memorial Hospital Saturday night by the mother. A doctor on duty at the hospital called police and arranged to transfer the child to Winter Park Memorial Hospital where a surgeon attempted to save the baby's life early Sunday.

Little Minnie Lee died early Tuesday and a coroner was requested by the hospital to investigate the death but later Tuesday Fred Leone, assistant state attorney, ordered the body to be returned to Seminole Memorial Hospital for an autopsy to be performed by Dr. Arthur Schwartz of Daytona Beach.
