Dr. Buhman's Son Is Filling Pulpit For Special Meet Here

Rev. A. B. Buhman, son of Dr. W. P. Buhman, who is holding a series of special meetings this week in the church annex, was greeted by another good-sized congregation last night. The services, held each night at 7:30 o'clock, are under the auspices of the Epworth League.

Following the meeting tonight, Rev. H. J. Haslinger, presiding elder for this district, will conduct the third quarterly conference with officers and members of the church present. Louis E. Rietze, president of the Epworth League, today extended an invitation to the public to attend the special services.

Rev. Buhman's text Monday night was taken from the Epworth League benediction, "so teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom."

The minister described the lack of seriousness, with which many persons face life and pointed to man's responsibility to God. "Numbering our days" was interpreted as the weighing of the value of time.

Rev. Buhman described the wisdom mentioned in his text, as the "spiritual wisdom whose beginning is the fear of the Lord."

Markell Urges Advertising For Aid Of Farmers

(Continued From Page One) manager. It is highly advisable and practically necessary to secure the services of an advertising agency to map out an advertising campaign. There are agencies which have devoted years of careful study to problems of this character and their cooperation is indispensable. Furthermore, there are no direct charges for their services as the advertising agencies' compensation is received in the form of a percentage of the advertising which they place and is paid by the newspaper magazine and bill board owners.

A fund of around \$150,000.00 would not be sufficient to pay for a year round national advertising campaign, but it would enable us to accomplish some valuable publicity in our main sales territory, that of the Mississippi River during the five or six months of the year when Florida is supplying the bulk of the celery consumed in the United States. A study of our distribution area during the past few years shows that 95 per cent of our celery is consumed in the eastern half of the United States and Canada. This is our logical market. We can reach this territory at lower cost than can our chief competitors in California and it is here that more than three-fourths of the population is located.

Our great need at present is not to find new markets, but to increase the consumption in the markets we are now supplying. If we could develop the same per capita consumption of celery in New York that we now have in Sanford and a few other places where celery is well known, we could dispose of Seminole County's entire crop in that one city. Such an increase in demand, however, can only be developed by an educational campaign extending over a considerable period of time. It can be done if we have the vision, energy and the will to see it through.

During the next six months, the question that will be uppermost in the celery growers' mind is, what are the prospects for next

season's market. Without attempting to be a prophet, the writer feels justified from past experience in predicting that if the anticipated increase in celery production occurs without a corresponding increase in consumer demand, we can look for a very low average market. Are we going to wait for the verdict or shall we avail ourselves of this opportunity to lay the foundation for a means of increasing the demand for our celery in advance of its actual production? It is up to the growers of Seminole County to answer this question.

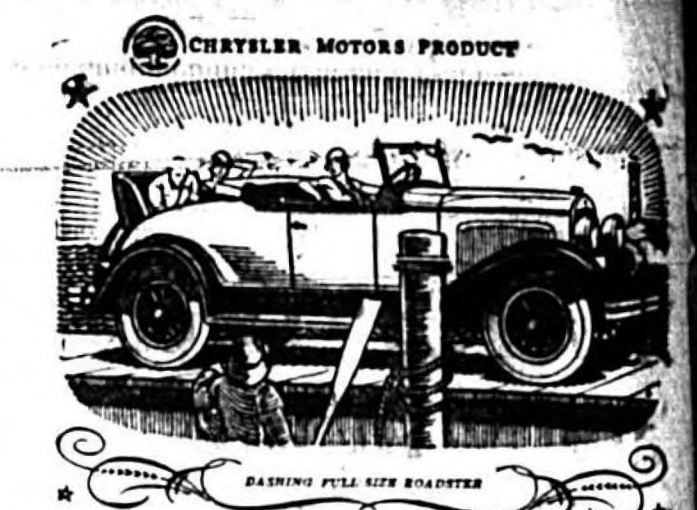

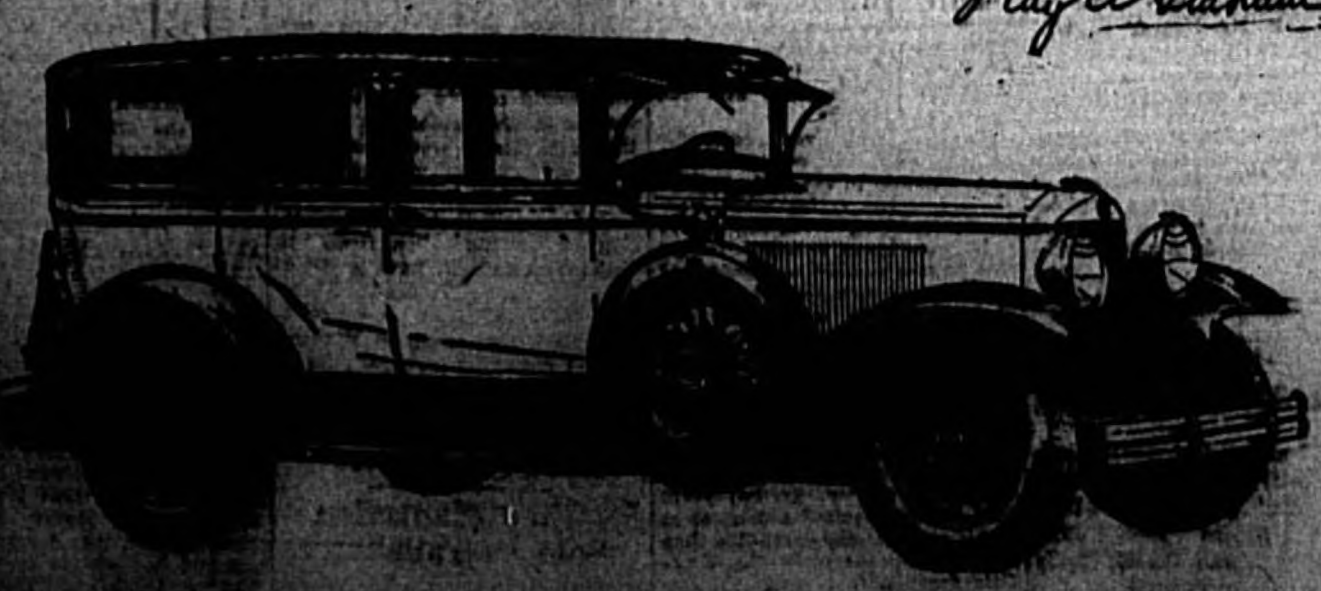

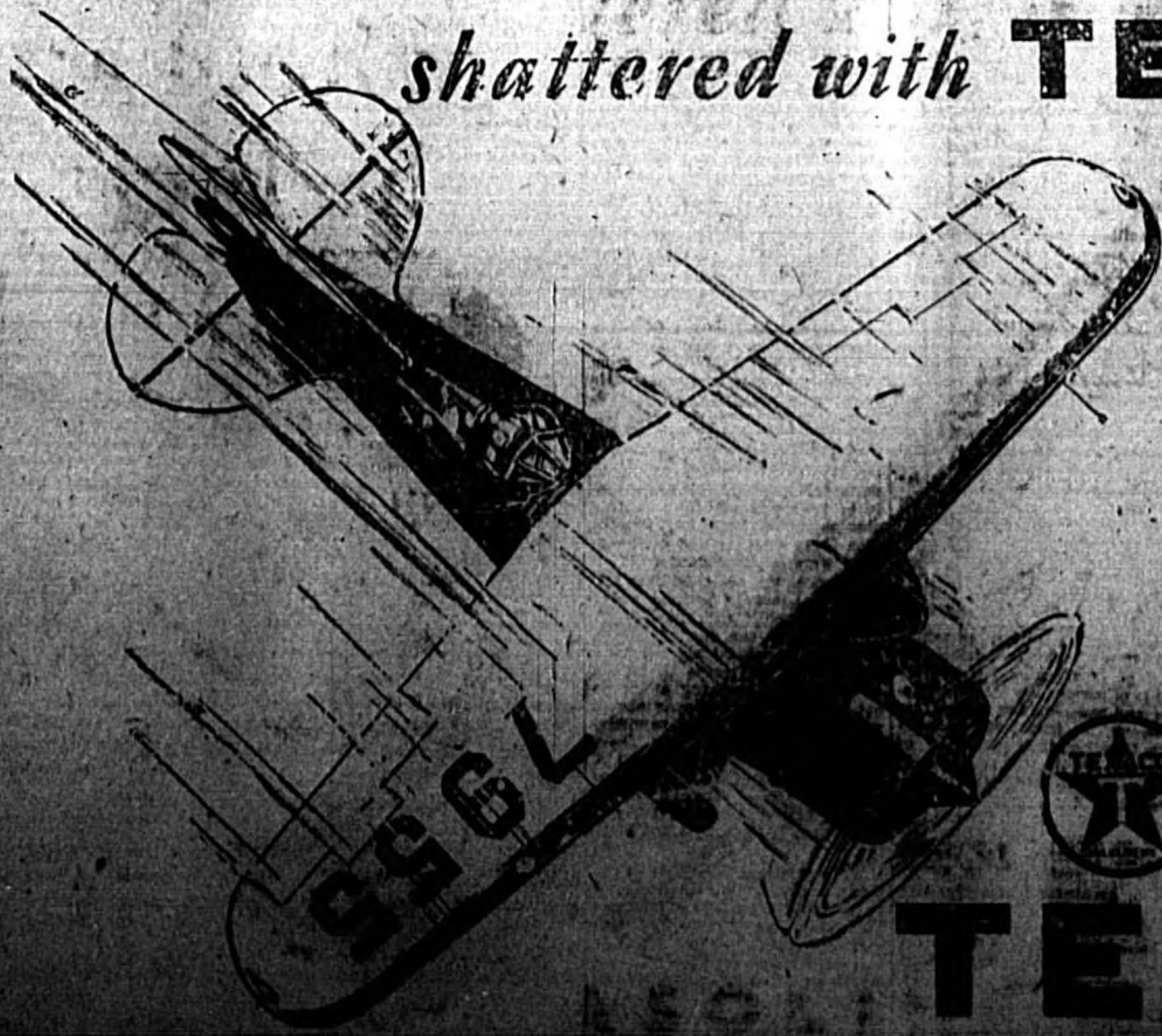

GAMBLING FEVER
SEIZES WORKERS
IN ALL ENGLAND

Modern Devices Serve
To Take Money From
British Wage Earner

LONDON, Mar. 12 (INS)—
Horse racing, greyhound and
cricket football, lotteries, raffish
slotting machines, dart throw-
ing, billiards, twenty-one, two
dog, poker and other азарт
horse racing.

These are a few items from the
seemingly endless list of modern
day gambling devices, which is
serving to take a substantial sum
out of the pockets of almost every
wage earner, no matter how mod-
est, from one end of England to
another. So far, the fever of
gambling spread that no one is ex-
cept it would be safe to say that
the large majority of men and
women in this country hazard some
sum, large or small, upon the al-
tar of chance each week.

Foreigners visiting England are
amazed at the public interest ex-
posed here in horse racing. The
sport of kings has degenerated into
a public lottery, where an bet even
down to the lowly sixpence
(twelve cents) is eagerly accepted
by the bookmakers.

Having Favored
Servant girls, manual laborers,
factory workers and all the rest of
the countless class of small wage
earners in England, are aim at
without exception devotees of the
race track, although their actual
contract with horses may be re-
stricted to an annual excursion to
Epsom Downs on Derby Day. Some
proportion of their income goes
each week in an effort to capture
the elusive prize that this sort of
gambling offers.

comes greyhound racing, which
when it was still a novelty a year
ago, attracted more customers

Year Around Sport
Hundreds of thousands of these
tickets are sold every week through-
out the year and as the odds are
always with the proprietor, con-
siderable sums are made at the
expense of the public. The ven-
dors of these tickets strive to
show their purpose by pretending
to sell a "tip" on a football or
cricket game, and stating that the
competition itself is free to pur-
chase of the "tip." The police
however, were sufficiently astute
to see through this dodge, and have
declared the competition illegal
a mere gesture.

The low salaried working man in
England often finds recreation in
the old gambling games of Ameri-
can pioneer days—poker, red dog
and twenty-one being the favori-
tes. Stakes are unusually high, consid-
ering the low scale of salaries for
manual labor in this country.

There are all but isolated exam-
ples set forth to show how gam-
bling has gripped the entire popu-
lation of England, from the highest
to the lowest, exempting no
rich nor poor. The authorities can-
not much of the gambling on the
grounds that is consistent with
England's tradition "sportsman-
ship."

Greyhound racing is losing its
popularity and the book makers
a profitable sideline. But there
are many other hazards open to
people who wish to place some of
their money in the hope of mak-
ing a gain and one of the most
popular is the sporting competi-
tion.

Sale of tickets in these competi-
tions is prohibited by law, but the
regulation is disregarded so com-
pletely that it might just as well
not exist at all. The competitions
are not unlike the baseball pools
of the United States. The customer
pays a ticket on which are inscribed
the names of football or cricket
teams depending upon the season
and it is also stamped with the
names of three or four of the
members designating three of the
teams on the list. The tickets
usually cost threepence or fourpence

ticket win the greatest possible
number of points or runs, the hold-
