Spectator Is Also Killed In Mishap Women Swoon At Sight Of Racing Accident; Victim's Wife Faints

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., Mar. 12.—(INS)—Thundering down the nine-mile speedway here this afternoon in an attempt to break the world's automobile speed record, Lee Bible, the driver of the American car, "The Triplex," skidded while he was going at breakneck speed and plunged into a sand bank.

Bible was streaking up the smooth sandy beach at a speed of 225 miles an hour when his car struck a wet spot, skidded violently to one side, bounded several times, and plunged into a hill. Then it rolled back on the beach.

The car struck a man and cut him in two. The first reports were that this man was named Travers and that he was employed by the Pathe Company as a cameraman.

SOLONS SPURN QUIZ OF THEIR LIQUOR HABITS

Wets and Dry's alike object to probe of sipping among lawmakers in Congress.

Refuse To Speak For Publication Investigation Would Discredit Congress Is Opinion Of Many

WASHINGTON, Mar. 12.—(INS)—Congress doesn't want any investigation of the "drink wet" vote dry habit on Capitol Hill. Suggesting that President Hoover's prohibition fact-finding commission investigate the manner in which Congress itself observes the law today, met with opposition among legislators.

Senators and representatives are sent here to represent their constituents, said one dry leader, who would be quoted "This is a representative government and not a personal government. It is wrong, of course, for senators and representatives to drink better liquor but they are sent here to represent their people."

An investigation of their personal habits would only tend to discredit Congress and would do no help in solving the prohibition problem. The President's commission should direct its inquiry to determine how prohibition enforcement can be improved.

There was one instance in the Senate years ago that demonstrates what I mean. Senator John Sharp Williams (D) of Miss., one of nature's noblemen, was a dry voter and the whole Senate chuckled about it.

That's how I feel about this "vote-dry drink-wet" question.

Another Murder Is Uncovered In Feud In Ranks Of Gunmen

NEW YORK, Mar. 12.—(INS)—The revelation that another New Yorker was murdered in Palm Beach just 12 days before Thomas "Fatty" Walsh, bodyguard to the late Arnold Rothstein, was shot down at Coral Gables added a mystery today to the internal feud that seems to prevail in the ranks of Broadway's army of racketeers and gunmen.

A rain of machine gun bullets killed Thomas Foley, 39, said to be a habitué of "Broadway's backyard." A wall of secrecy surrounds Foley's murder. It appears that he was shot on a lonely road just outside of Palm Beach but the police were unaware of his death until today when it was learned that his body was brought back here quietly for burial Monday.

Meanwhile, Demaris Dore plant club hostess, who named Ed Walsh, gambler, as the slayer of Walsh was still under police surveillance. Police Commissioner Whelan declared she would be kept under guard until it was determined whether her presence in Florida as a witness would be needed.

HOOVER POLICY TO SAVE OIL IS ENLARGED ON

Walsh Amplifies President's Plan Of Rigid Conservation Of U.S. Petroleum Reserves

Senator Walsh said he did not contemplate any new legislation to amend the Hoover policy of oil conservation.

Markell Urges Advertising For Aid Of Farmers

(Continued From Page One) manager. It is highly advisable and practically necessary to secure the services of an advertising agency to map out an advertising campaign. There are agencies which have devoted years of careful study to problems of this character and their cooperation is indispensable. Furthermore, there are no direct charges for their services as the advertising agencies' compensation is received in the form of a percentage of the advertising which they place and is paid by the newspaper's magazine and bill board owners.

A fund of around \$150,000.00 would not be sufficient to pay for a year round national advertising campaign, but it would enable us to accomplish some valuable publicity in our main sales territory, that of the Mississippi River during the five or six months of the year when Florida is supplying the bulk of the celery consumed in the United States. A study of our distribution area during the past few years shows that 95 per cent of our celery is consumed in the eastern half of the United States and Canada. This is our logical market. We can reach this territory at lower cost than can our chief competitors in California and it is here that more than three-fourths of the population is located.

Our great need at present is not to find new markets, but to increase the consumption in the markets we are now supplying. If we could develop the same per capita consumption of celery in New York that we now have in Sanford and a few other places where celery is well known, we could dispose of Seminole County's entire crop in that one city. Such an increase in demand, however, can only be developed by an educational campaign extending over a considerable period of time. It can be done if we have the vision, energy and the will to see it through.

During the next six months, the question that will be uppermost in the celery growers' mind is, what are the prospects for next

season's market. Without attempting to be a prophet, the writer feels justified from past experience in predicting that if the anticipated increase in celery production occurs without a corresponding increase in consumer demand, we can look for a very low average market. Are we going to wait for the verdict or shall we avail ourselves of this opportunity to lay the foundation for a means of increasing the demand for our celery in advance of its actual production? It is up to the growers of Seminole County to answer this question.






