

Brother Of "Great Commoner" May Be In Running Again

LINCOLN, Neb.—(A)—Charles Bryan doesn't say yes and he doesn't say no, but the brother of the "Great Commoner" may be in the running again for governor in 1928.

He retired as mayor of Lincoln last spring, hided he was just about through with politics, the seat of the Bryans to leave politics after approximately 50 years of representation by one member or another of the famous family.

Now Charles W. Bryan recalling he said on his retirement from the mayor's office he had "one wood fight" left, thinks the occasion may be at hand to get that fight out of his system. He's contemplating to enact his "tax equalization plan."

To carry out the proposal, he says he has pledged his active support to place a slate of independent candidates for state office in the field "if it is necessary."

He wouldn't say whether he'd be a candidate himself, but pointed out "I never have promised or pledged I will not again be a candidate."

"Brother Charlie", as he was dubbed when he teamed with the distinguished William Jennings Bryan in the latter's political tactics, is so enthusiastic about his plan he has announced he is giving up operation of his three large farms to devote more time to "special legislation in which I am interested."

Program of the man who was three times governor includes extending of home owners from taxation and enactment of provisions in favor of cars and singing Eire's calling for a state income tax di-

rected at persons investing their money in stocks and bonds; a tax on present tax-exempt securities; a sales tax on luxuries; a tax on the salaries of governmental employes; a reduction in state government costs which he claims are 30 to 40 per cent too high.

The homestead tax exemption proposal will be placed on the ballot as a constitutional amendment if sufficient petitions are obtained.

The ice floe prison of the four scientists drifted within eight miles of the uninhabited shores yesterday in the teeth of an Arctic gale which hampered rescue efforts by ship and sea plane. Radio reports received at Moscow from an unannounced station in the region of the Polar campers said the sea was calmer after the gale blew off.

Vinson Plans To Hike Size Of Naval Bill

Fleet Big Enough To Protect Both U. S. Coasts Advocated By Representative

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Chairman Vinson, Georgia Democrat, told the House Naval Committee he would try to amend the pending \$300,000,000 naval expansion bill so as to authorize a fleet big enough to protect both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts at the same time.

Admiral William D. Leahy, chief of naval operations, told the committee the fleet now is inadequate. Major General Johnson Harross, retired army officer, told the committee the country's national defense and security "is being made a football of politics" because Congress had neglected its duties to make rules and regulations for the land and naval forces.

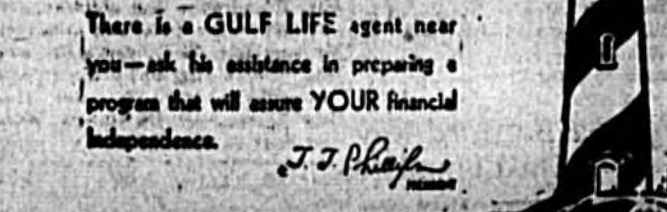

Cream butter, add sugar gradually and cream together until light and fluffy. Add unbeaten egg, beating well. Sift flour and measure. Add baking powder and mix together. Add flour to butter mixture alternately with milk. Add flavoring. Bake in one large 10" x 15" or two small 8" greased, paper-lined cake pans in moderate oven (350° F.) 30 minutes. WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—The holding company made possible such top-heavy financial empires as the small utility group, which crashed in 1929 with losses to thousands of investors, many of whom did not even understand what kind of securities they had bought.

Under Test New

Abuses have led to some congressional interference with the holding company device. The present law provides that utilities must form their holding companies only in "incorporated areas, that is, in adjoining cities. They can't scatter themselves all over the map. That law is being tested in the supreme court.

Although the utility holding company is more familiar to the newspaper reader than other types of holding operations, the device is in common use throughout industry and banking.

United States Steel uses it to assure smooth, powerful management in its subsidiaries, as well as to keep its financial structure trim. American Telephone and Telegraph is a holding company that harmonizes the management of its state and regional companies, at the same time giving local companies a wide measure of control in local matters. But even A. T. & T. has run into complaints from the Federal Communications commission.

Device Is Defended

An officer of one of the nation's most efficient corporation holding groups tells me he thinks the device can be efficient, legitimate and convenient. However, he believes it has been abused widely by people who are after quick profits rather than sound business progress.

This executive says the test of a holding company is its ability to finance subsidiaries and to increase their efficiency in producing a cheaper and better product for the consumer.

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Saint Augustine's Restoration Plans Carried Forward

ST. AUGUSTINE, Feb. 11.—Archaeologists working on the restoration of historic St. Augustine have recovered more than 100,000 objects here.

The object of the project is to reconstruct many of the scenes connected with the history of this city, the oldest town in the United States.

The project is under the direction of the Carnegie Institution of Washington, D. C., and the city of St. Augustine.

Excavations have uncovered broken and whole pottery, bones, shells, pipes, arrowheads, bone hairpins, oil, wine, and water jugs, hinges, chimes, coils, iron buttons, candle snuffers, glasses, pewee spoons, leg irons, brass buttons, bullets, per's of guns of various types, baskets, pots and many other objects.

St. Augustine was founded in 1565 and was the first permanent white settlement on the Atlantic seaboard of North America. The historical restoration, however, is

Schuschnigg And Hitler Confer On Rome-Berlin Axis

Meeting Is Held To Pave Way For Union Of Austria And Italy And Germany

Secrecy Surrounds Important Session

Tension Eases In German Army Because New High Command

VIENNA, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Chancellor Kurt von Schuschnigg of Austria met Reichsfuhrer Adolf Hitler of Germany for a three-day conference today, at the urgent suggestion of Benito Mussolini of Italy.

The Austrian cabinet met in continuous session as Schuschnigg conferred with Hitler at the German Fuhrer's private retreat at Berchtesgaden.

The meeting was arranged with the greatest secrecy. Only sketchy reports of the meeting reached Vienna, but one message, purporting to come directly from the Austrian chancellor, said the outlook for improved relations between Austria and Germany was extremely good.

Hitler was held to have urged Schuschnigg to bring Austria more closely into line with the Rome-Berlin axis that links Germany and Italy, Austria's two powerful neighbors.

Austria, troublesome center of European war has been a sore spot in the international relations between Germany and Italy. A majority of Austrian are German-speaking and a union has been one of main desires of the Nazi party and Hitler himself, a native of Austria.

The German army's feeling of trust in its new high command seems to be growing despite the uneasiness caused by Reichsfuhrer Hitler's centralization of control over the armed forces.

The general attitude of the army, as it recovered from the first shock of the purge of high-ranking officers, apparently was one of watchful waiting rather than any immediate worry over further shakeups.

At the same time, however, army circles have not overlooked the fact that radicals in the Nazi party have been seeking to improve Hitler with the need for continued weeding out of reactionary commanders, particularly in the old guard stronghold of Prussia and East Prussia.

Almost as though sensing this attitude, the propaganda ministry issued a statement that no charges were contemplated, apparently to allay whatever unrest may exist in the army.

Reichsfuhrer Hitler shared at the collapse of Romania's Fascist-led government, and the unfriendly reception given his governmental dispatches, and apparently has decided to make a series of gestures of conciliation.

For the present there are in the direction of Austria, the Catholic Church and the Protestant Church and more may follow.

These moves were given dramatic direction today when Hitler met Chancellor Kurt von Schuschnigg.

Japan Refuses To Show Cards In Naval Race

Intention Is Denied Of Possessing Armament Menacing To Any Other Country

TOKYO, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Japan refused formally tonight to divulge details of her naval construction program to the United States, France and Great Britain. Japan declared heretofore, however, to discuss naval limitations on a general rather than individual ship basis.

The formal note contended that Japan failed to see any logical reason for assuming she was planning to build warships beyond the limitations of the 1936 London Naval Treaty. The government insisted, moreover, that Japan has "no intention whatever of possessing an armament which would menace other countries."

"More communication of information concerning construction of vessels will, in the absence of quantitative limitation, not contribute to any fair and equitable measure of disarmament," Japan's communication said.

It added that the "Japanese Government will be ready at any moment to enter into any discussion of the matter of disarmament which gives primary importance to a fair, quantitative limitation."

Senate Plans Vote On Farm Measure Monday Afternoon

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—(AP)—The Senate voted tonight to schedule a vote on the farm bill for Monday afternoon.

The Senate will vote on the bill after the House has passed its version. The bill is expected to pass the House today.

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Midway Point Is Reached In Citrus Sales

14,000,000 Boxes Of Oranges, Grapefruit Tangerines Have Already Been Sold

When a good football team finds itself at the end of the first half and the game going against it, plans are made to score during the last half. Many a gridders' score has come back from behind in this fashion, piled up the score over the goal. Just at this season of the year the citrus industry may be compared with a football game. The growers and shippers are the players; the Florida Citrus Commission, the coaching staff. How much time is left to play?

Well, between Feb. 1 and Feb. 15 approximately half of the state's citrus has been shipped to market. This is the way citrus statisticians figure. It is interesting to note that during the first several days of this month (February) Florida had shipped to market just 14,000,000 boxes of fresh fruit—oranges, grapefruit and tangerines.

This would indicate that for the entire season shipment will reach approximately 28,000,000 boxes.

Now, how about the score? The following table of figures shows the average price on regular Florida fruit, delivered at auction, for approximately half of the 1937-38 shipping period. A study of the figures shows clearly that the price has been going steadily up since "kickoff" away back last autumn. But there is still a lot of time left—a lot of fruit to ship.

Jap Government Admits Soldiers Were Disorderly

Note Says Necessity Arose Because Of Lack Of Supplies

TOKYO, Feb. 12.—(AP)—The Japanese government, answering the United States protest of Jan. 17, today admitted that Japanese soldiers committed disorders in Nanking and illegally entered American property at Hangchow. The Japanese note, however, said the Nanking incidents were the result of an "unavoidable insufficiency of the force detailed to the duty of protecting rights and interests of third powers."

Regarding the Hangchow incidents, the note asserted that supply lines were cut and it was necessary to requisition provisions within that city. The note enumerated measures taken by Japan to prevent any recurrence of such incidents.

Republicans Will Make Lincoln Day Speeches Tonight

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Abraham Lincoln Birthday speeches will start the Republican party tonight on the 1938 political campaign aimed primarily at increasing the party's strength in Congress.

Republican leaders, representatives and party leaders have been deployed to more than fifty cities, to speak at dinners honoring the memory of the Great Emancipator—and incidentally supplying for party policy. Senator Vandenberg of Michigan, discussed by party members as a possible presidential nominee in 1940, will speak in Boston.

Party officials said efforts in the 1938 campaign will be concentrated in about a hundred congressional districts in hope of picking up between 50 and 60 House seats.

Advertising Plan Is Postponed For Current Season

Three To Five Year Program Planned To Begin Next Year

Shippers representing a control in the celery tonnage shipped from Seminole County unanimously recommended that the proposed advertising program for the current celery season be dropped and that the matter be held over until early May when a committee of shippers will begin a campaign to get shippers for an extensive program to continue from three to five years.

At the meeting all agreed in favor of an extensive advertising program but it was also agreed that it was not practical to set the program in motion before the next season. Mr. Cullum said.

It was brought out at the meeting that by the time the proposed program was set in motion the season would be too far advanced to derive benefits that would warrant the expenditure of the \$60,000 suggested in the tentative setup.

A committee of shippers will probably contact the growers with the view of soliciting signups for the program near May 10 to 15. Mr. Cullum said, with the thought in mind of inaugurating the advertising program next October or November.

Sarasota-Manatee growers and shippers, who left the decision in the hands of those connected with the industry in Seminole County, expressed themselves as well pleased with the recommendations and pledged co-operation when the advertising program was revived.

Heavy Celery Prorate Set By Committee

One-Quarter Of Shipments To Be Withheld During Week Beginning Feb. 14

Government Asked To Buy Surplus

Commodities Corporation Requested To Pay \$1.25 Per Crate

The Florida Celery Industry Control Committee voted to recommend to the Secretary of Agriculture a program of prorate of shipment during the coming season beginning Feb. 14 and an adjournment requesting the Surplus Commodities Corporation to purchase all surplus of U. S. No. 2 grades or better at \$1.25 per crate during the coming week.

A report offered at the meeting by Secretary J. C. Lottice showed that the average price for 6 dozen sizes on the New York market for the current week had dropped from \$1.75 per crate to \$1.15 per crate and in view of the large increase in the supply available for shipment during the coming week.

CIO Demands That Senate Committee Hear Bridges' Plea

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—(AP)—The committee for industrial organization demanded last night that the senate commerce committee grant to its west coast director, Australian-born Harry Bridges, opportunity to appear and defend himself against charges for which his deportation has been asked.

In a sharply worded letter to Senator Copeland, democratic New York, chairman, and other members of the committee, John Brophy, executive CIO director, declared that "the refusal to permit a man to be heard in defense of serious charges that are made against him in itself constitutes an issue of such importance that we do not see how any senator in a democratic representative government can ignore its challenge."

Copeland has refused Bridges' repeated requests for an opportunity to appear, asserting his committee's "which" is investigating conditions in the maritime industry. "I am interested in what an alien has to say."

"The matter is one of such simple justice and fundamental right that we are compelled to believe that the senate joint commerce and labor committee will not allow Senator Copeland's decision to stand and will immediately offer Harry Bridges the right to be heard before the committee," Brophy said.

"Notwithstanding the fact that an investigation of the files of the labor department failed to support his charges, Senator Copeland continues to denounce Bridges in the most violent terms as an alien illegally in this country and unfit to be a union leader."

The department of labor indicated Thursday that it will soon hold a hearing on the charges against Bridges and that the labor leader probably would be called to testify.

The CIO demand came a few hours after Senator Guffey, democratic Pennsylvania, proposed in the committee a measure designed to stabilize maritime labor conditions through arbitration and mediation of disputes. The bill closely parallels one proposed by Chairman Kennedy of the maritime commission but differs sharply from the view of Labor Secretary Perkins who opposes arbitration.
