## Pepper Calls Col. Lindbergh 5th Columnist

Florida Senator Says Inventor Of Mechanical Heart Can Know No Real Hurt

## Flyer Is Leader Of Appeasement

## 'Lone Eagle's' Speech Makes Him Target Of Solon's Blast

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Senator Pepper, of Florida, yesterday denounced Col. Charles A. Lindbergh as chief of the nation's fifth columnists and suggested that "maybe the colonel would like to see American life regimented the Hitler way."

Interrupting Senate debate on a bill vesting President Roosevelt with authority to call out the National Guard, Pepper shouted: "In a few months, hours, or days, the people will have to decide between the chief of the nation's fifth columnists, the nation's ancient hero—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, or Gen. John J. Pershing for counsel."

Lindbergh addressed a peacemaking audience in Chicago Sunday and charged domestic and foreign "interests" were trying to draw this nation into war. A few hours later Pershing told a nationwide radio audience that unless the United States made at least 50 destroyers available to Great Britain, "we shall be falling in our duty to America."

"The colonel has been a friend of Germany a long time," Pepper declared. "He might not be terrified if Germany were to report in the United States because he would know that he would not come to any harm at the hands of Hitler."

Pepper assailed the flyer for accepting a medal from the German government several years ago and said that "the man who built a mechanical heart is more than a human heart."

Lindbergh for several years has been experimenting with a mechanical heart, and he has been reported to have been successful in making a mechanical heart that would last for a long time.

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Pepper said that Lindbergh's work on a mechanical heart was a waste of time and money. He said that Lindbergh should be concentrating on his flying and not on his mechanical heart.

## Citrus Heads Vote Against City Change

### Decide 9-2 To Maintain Quarters At Lakeland In New Buildings

## Most Of Funds Go Toward Radio

### Commission Discusses Contemplated Action For Year

LAKELAND, Aug. 7.—(AP)—The Florida Citrus Commission yesterday voted down, 9 to 2, a proposal that the headquarters be transferred to Winter Haven and accepted with a dissenting vote an offer from Lakeland for new quarters in a building nearby.

Orlando and Haines City also submitted offers, but only those from Lakeland and Winter Haven were voted on.

Chairman Luther L. Chandler reported that Arthur Kudner, Inc., the commission's advertising agency, will have its seasonal campaign in shape shortly and that the commission probably will hold a special meeting within two weeks to give final consideration to the setup.

The commission already has adopted the campaign in principle, including a proposal that the major part of funds be spent for radio promotion.

Secretary Charles P. Chastain reported information was being received on a national pro-citrus plan for citrus which is contemplated in a congressional bill, and said this information will be distributed to commission members when available.

The commission also said by its action that the industry generally will be able to vote satisfactorily under the new-hour law as it is now being considered in Washington.

Ball, reporting on recent hearings in Washington and on subsequent developments, said citrus operators now have a total exemption of 28 weeks, or seven months, from provisions of the act and that this period appears adequate. An additional 14 weeks seasonal exemption was recently granted by Administrator Fleming.

Ball said industry representatives were not satisfied with the area of production definition, but he advised against any further litigation.

## Board of Commissioners Approves Project Enlarging Sanford Airport

A bigger airport for Sanford seemed nearer realization today with approval by the Board of County Commissioners at their meeting yesterday of a resolution endorsing enlargement of the field and installation of runways.

Edward Higgins, secretary of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, appeared before the board and urged it to endorse a project to increase the size of the airport to meet regular army requirements.

J. N. Gillon and M. G. McNair were also at the meeting to support the proposal. McNair is president of the National Youth Administration, and Gillon is a member of the board.

Enlargement of the field would require either abandonment of the Atlantic Coast Line branch of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad, which now crosses the airport, or lowering the track to avoid interfering with the proposed runway.

In their resolution, the board asked the cooperation of the Atlantic Coast Line on the project, and recommended to the Interstate Commerce Commission that the railroad abandon the track and use the other route to Ovidio. The other track is only slightly longer.

The board voted down a motion made by W. G. Kilbee that the county send 15 convicts to participate in the construction of the airport. The motion was defeated by a vote of 10 to 5.

## 200 Fishermen Ask Aid From Senate Group

### Holland States He Is Willing To Help If Group Will Map Out Feasible Plans

TITUSVILLE, Aug. 7.—(AP)—More than 200 East and West Coast commercial fishermen and dealers left this city yesterday afternoon with the definite assurance of additional recognition of their industry by the next session of the Florida Legislature, provided they would first iron out their problems and present a constructive and helpful program for forthcoming years.

The Democratic nominee for Governor, Spessard L. Holland, spoke to the commercial salt water fishermen, assembled here in the first state-wide conference of this type and assured them they and their problems will get the amount of consideration due, only when they display the desire to organize and map a progressive, constructive and workable program for one of the State's most important industries.

Two results of the conference were announced at the morning session by Leroy M. Carpenter, member of the City Council and manager of the Sea-board Fish Company, were adopted.

## Increase Urged In Lending To Latin America

### Minority Group Files Protest Terming Measure 'Futile'

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—(AP)—A majority of the Senate Banking Committee yesterday voted to increase the amount of loans in the capital of the Export-Import Bank as an essential measure of economic progress for ourselves and our Latin American neighbors against the uncertain future of a world at war.

The committee made this report to the Senate at about the same time that a minority of the committee members filed a protest concerning the proposed Latin American lending as "unsound, futile and a waste of the people's money."

The measure provides that the bank's capital shall be increased from \$200,000,000 to \$400,000,000, with authority to make loans to governments or central banks in the Western Hemisphere. Earlier Secretary of State Hull sent a letter to the House Banking Committee saying the bill was essential to "economic defense" of the Western Hemisphere.
