

GOP To Elect Delegates In 4 States

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Republicans select a sizeable bloc of convention delegates this week in balloting across the nation. Oregon's free-for-all primary on Friday.

Henry Cabot Lodge, U. S. ambassador to Viet Nam, is favored in the Oregon contest which has been all but passed up by Sen. Barry Goldwater, the GOP front runner in delegate strength.

Goldwater has concentrated instead on Tuesday's primary in Nebraska where he is considered certain to improve his lead in delegate support for the GOP presidential nomination.

The Arizona senator has been assembling convention votes while other Republicans have been winning polls and popularity contests. Goldwater's backers claim he is only about 100 votes short of a first ballot nomination at the San Francisco convention opening July 13.

A United Press International tabulation shows Goldwater has 274 delegates pledged or publicly committed to him. His strategists say he also has enough promised or expected support to push him within

reach of the 655 votes needed for the nomination. Here is the major political

activity scheduled this week: Nebraska: GOP voters choose 16 convention dele-

gates Tuesday. Goldwater, who is on the ballot, is a heavy favorite in the popular-

ity contest despite write-in campaigns for Lodge, Richard M. Nixon and Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York.

West Virginia: Rockefeller is unopposed in Tuesday's presidential preference balloting. As in Nebraska, the outcome of the voting is not binding on convention delegates, who are chosen separately.

Rhode Island: State GOP convention is being held Tuesday. Goldwater men predict

their candidate will get four national delegates, with four each going to Rockefeller and Lodge and two to Nixon.

Oregon: Lodge is apparent winner in Friday's primary where voters will find Goldwater, Rockefeller, Nixon, Gov. William W. Scranton of Pennsylvania and Sen. Margaret Chase Smith of Maine also on the ballot. The outcome binds the state's 18 convention delegates.

Paper Bombed In Mississippi

LAUREL, Miss. (UPI) — Editor-publisher J. W. West of the Laurel Leader-Call, damaged by an explosion Sunday, said today's edition would be published on schedule.

The blast shattered the press room, broke all windows on the building's first floor and caused moderate damage to the press.

"Someone was apparently trying to put us out of business," said West, who estimated the damage at \$2,000.

West said a cross was burned in front of the building several weeks ago, "but I don't know whether you can connect this or not."

He said the newspaper had taken no editorial stands that were particularly controversial.

The FBI joined local officers in the investigation but it was not determined Sunday what type of explosive was used.

"The explosives appeared to have been planted," said West.

Officers indicated that a large chunk of concrete found near a window in the press room may have preceded the explosive through a window.

Debris was scattered over the press room, and the 65 windows in the first story were all out. The press room clock stopped at 1:38 a. m.

Police officers said they arrived on the scene a few minutes after the blast, which rocked the city. No one was in the building at the time of the explosion. They said there was smoke billowing from the building but no fire.

The newspaper plant, a two story brick structure, is located on a busy street near the heart of the city.

A number of crosses have been burned in recent weeks across south and central Mississippi, where the Ku Klux Klan has been reported organizing.

"We haven't had any labor trouble or anyone fired recently," said the editor, "I can't imagine why anyone would want to do this."

Slayer Suspect Drowned During Fight With Cops

BOISE, Idaho (UPI) — A suspect in the slaying of five persons apparently drowned Sunday night during a gunfight with police which climaxed one of the most grisly crimes in Idaho history.

The victims included the suspect's three children, his stepdaughter and his former wife. Two were garrotted with lengths of wire two were shot and one was bludgeoned to death with the butt of a Luger pistol.

Police identified the suspected slayer as Raymond Reasons age unknown.

The victims included his daughters, Pamela, 18 and Patty, 13; his son, Eddie Ray, 14; his stepdaughter, Sarah G. Gozman, 20, and his former wife, Estelle, 47.

Dawson, secretary-treasurer of the American Nudist Camp Association, said he has read every account so far written about the wedding and said the family was made unhappy by coverage of the affair.

Grandson Of Former Sanford Mayor Visits NAS For Army

The grandson of one of this city's early day mayors spent last week in Sanford on a special assignment for the U. S. Army at the Naval Air Station.

Lt. Col. Everard Barnes is the grandson of E. Franklin Barnes who was mayor of Sanford from February 1897 until February 1899. Before that, the mayor served Sanford as an alderman. In addition to his service to the city, the elder Barnes was the local agent for the railroad.

The former city chief executive's photo, a copy of which was presented to the younger Barnes, was recently placed on display in the collection of Police Chief Itoy G. Williams at the Sanford Police station. Chief Williams has photos of just about every former Sanford mayor.

Early in the 20th century former Mayor Barnes was transferred by the railroad to Jacksonville. Later he died at Savannah, Ga.

The mayor's son, a native of Sanford, was Edison Anderson Barnes. He is now a retired U. S. Army colonel and resides in El Paso, Texas.

The younger Barnes talked by phone with his father a few weeks ago and advised him he would be sent from

Washington to Sanford for a week of special duty. Col. Barnes mentioned to his son that Sanford was the city of the colonel's birth. So while here, Lt. Col. Barnes was especially interested in seeing Sanford as it is today and undoubtedly will have an interesting report to make to his father in El Paso.

Lt. Col. Barnes, although on duty in Washington calls Royal Palm Beach, a suburb of West Palm Beach, his home. He has been in the service for the past 22 years.

Opportunity Is Theme For Senior Citizens Month

The theme of Senior Citizens Month 1964 is "Opportunity for Older Americans," and one Southern gentleman really took advantage of his opportunity.

At the age of 65, Col. Harlan Sanders of Shelbyville, Ky. was forced out of the restaurant business when a super-highway bypassed his place that specialized in his own recipe for fried chicken. The colonel paid off his debts, packed up his recipe and his pots and pans, and set off on a tour of the United States—on exactly \$105, the amount of his first Social Security check, and all the money he had in the world.

During that tour, Sanders didn't just sightsee; he stopped at countless restaurants and demonstrated his secret preparation for fried chicken. And he gave away franchises for this preparation, telling each restaurant proprietor, "Pay me out of the profits when you get the money."

In this way he distributed the franchises throughout the country, and at the end of seven years the colonel's fried chicken had made him a millionaire and the proprietor of the largest food franchise business in the United States.

Sanders appeared recently on the TV program, "I've Got a Secret," and revealed that he had sold this business for \$2 million—quite an increase over the \$105 he started out with.

Now, at the age of 74, he's going back on Social Security. And even that has increased as a result of his self-employment income over the past nine years. The colonel's monthly benefit checks will amount to \$127, the maximum payable to a retired worker under Social Security.

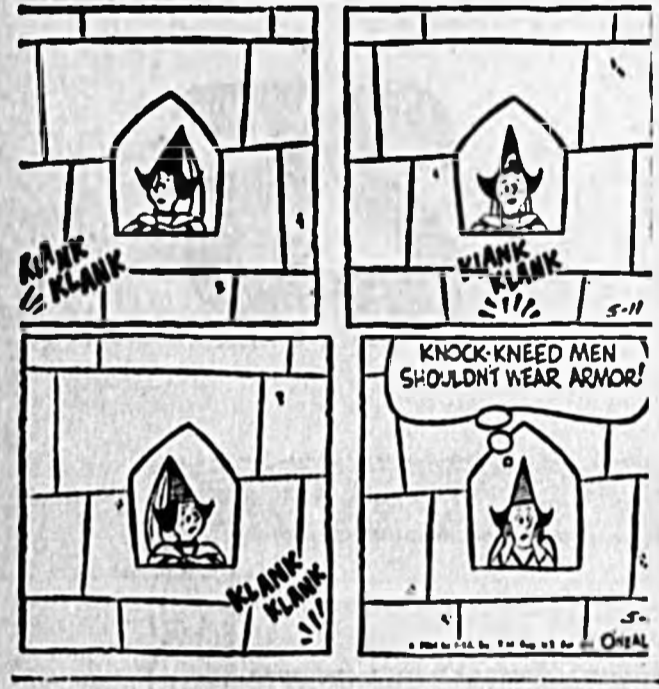

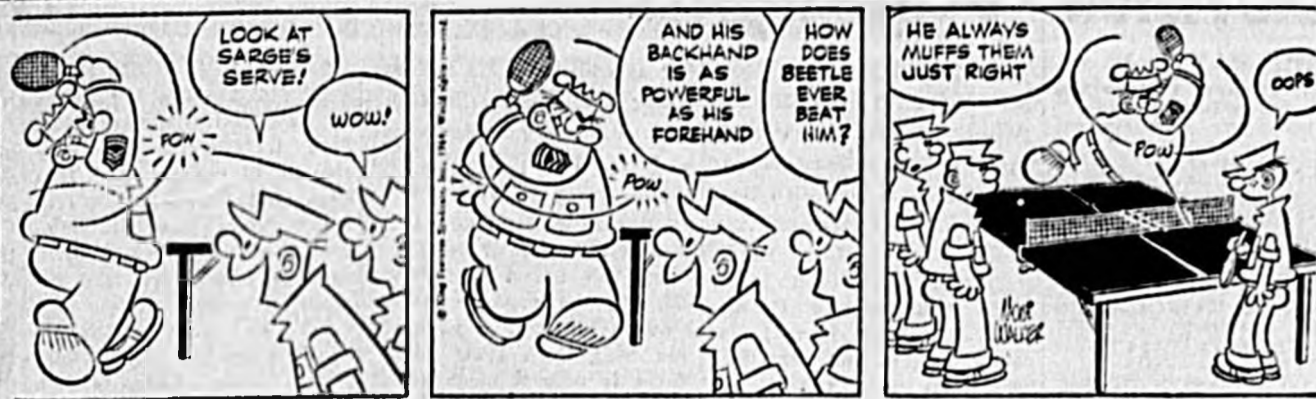
