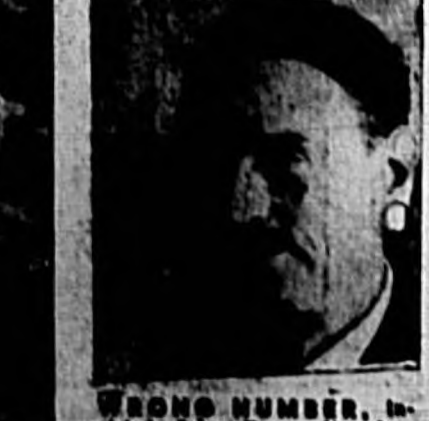

SHANGHAI, Sept. 7.—(AP)—The Japanese army today seized the Hugs American Seventh Day Adventist mission property in the Yangtze-poo district north of Shanghai for military purposes. The property was confiscated despite the protests of its owners and the fact that the mission flew many United States flags to identify it as American property.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Roaring flames across all northwestern Shanghai lit the path tonight of a fierce Japanese effort to batter down Chinese resistance that has brought their Shanghai offensive to a standstill. Naval and heavy artillery guns roared in the Yangtze-poo, Chapel, Kiangwan and North Station districts laying down blankets of shell fire in advance of tremendous Japanese sunset attacks on the Chinese front lines. Fires spread across the whole area.

## Al Wallace Has Narrow Escape In Fatal Wreck

## Giles Broward And Sidney Wood Of Orlando Are Killed

AL Wallace, Sanford youth, and Bob Michaels of Orlando narrowly missed death early Monday morning in an auto crash on Daytona Beach which proved fatal to two of their comrades, Giles Broward, 18, of Orlando and Sidney Wood, 20, also of Orlando.

Young Wallace stated today that he and his pals were driving along Daytona Beach south of the pier, at about 45 to 50 miles per hour, their V-8 phaeton hit a washout which caused it to skid. Wallace and Michael were thrown clear of the careening car as they were sitting on the right hand side. However, their ill-fated comrades who were on the left were thrown in the path of the overturning car which killed them instantly.

Wallace stated that he did not remember any of the details of the accident only that he felt the car in which he was riding started to skid and that somehow he was thrown through space clear of uncontrolled car.

The quartet of close friends had just left the Riviera Hotel in Rio Vista, four miles north of Daytona Beach, where the Omega Xi Club of Orlando was host at a script dance attended almost wholly by the younger set of Orange County.

## Ollie H. Gore Dies In Hospital

MIAMI, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Ollie H. Gore, 53, former director of the Miami Jockey Club, whose sensational charges against former Governor Dave Sholtz almost resulted in a legislative investigation, died in a hospital here today. He had been ill for five days. Gore charged that Hialeah Park obtained preferred operating dates from the State Racing Commission by improper methods. Sholtz denied the charges.

## PUBLISHER DIES

FAIRHOPE, Ala., Sept. 7.—(AP)—Funeral services are to be held here today for L. O. Bishop, for years a publisher of daily newspapers in Clinton, Ind., who died yesterday. Bishop, 78, had lived here the past 17 years and conducted a column for the local weekly newspaper. A heart attack was responsible for his death.

## Gas Tax Row Given Courts By Counties

### Lawyers Contend Lee Has No Right To Withhold \$1,750,000 Gas Funds Per Year

TALLAHASSEE, Sept. 7.—(AP)—A dozen lawyers laid the gas-rolling tax wrangle before the Supreme Court today for a decision on whether special legislative acts may direct the payment of money to counties for their own purposes.

The money directly involved is about \$1,750,000 a year. Twelve counties are claiming it under terms of so-called "local" legislative acts. The law, years old, virtually every county is concerned in the outcome.

Comptroller Lee, who said he was faced with special laws contrary to the general gasoline tax distribution law, refused to make July payments to 22 counties. Seven of the counties went into court to require continued payments.

## England And France Plan Piracy Moves

### Decide To Go Ahead With Conference To Stop Attacks On Ships Despite Italy, Russia Rebuffed

## Russia Rebuffed By Mussolini

## Soviets Accused Italians Of Sinking Two Russian Ships

LONDON, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Great Britain and France decided today that their navies were strong enough to stop "Mediterranean piracy" without any help and determined to go ahead with the conference on the matter with or without Italy's participation.

The decision to go ahead with the Mediterranean "anti piracy" conference in Switzerland Friday was disclosed authoritatively after Soviet Russia had protested to Italy—and been angrily rebuffed—on charges that Italian "private" submarines were responsible for the sinking of two Soviet freighters in the sea lanes off Spain.

Informed British sources made it plain that the Italian-Soviet trouble "does not change the situation at all." This view apparently was communicated quickly to Italy.

The feeling here was that Italy, despite hints she could not now attend the Mediterranean conference, would play into Russia's hands if she stayed away from the talks. These were designed to find a way to stop the mysterious attacks, some of them by unidentified submarines on the shipping of many nations.

ROME, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Russia last night formally accused fascist Italy of sinking two Soviet ships in the Mediterranean during the recent terrorism of submarine "piracy" and received from Italy a curt reply that threatened an immediate diplomatic break.

The Russian note, delivered to Premier Mussolini's foreign minister, did not identify the torpedoed vessel but demanded indemnity and punishment of those responsible for the war-like attack.

Cairo, after hurried consultation with Mussolini, informed Moscow that the allegation was rejected and that Italy refused to give further consideration to the charge.

The defiant Italian answer, flatly refusing the Russian claims for satisfaction, was such an open diplomatic rebuff as to carry the threat of an international explosion in the crowded Mediterranean.

Diplomats said the consequences of the exchange of notes, accomplished within the space of a few hours, might (Continued on Page Three)

Wall Street Stocks Crack On War Scare

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—(AP)—As large blocks of stock were dumped on the New York Stock Exchange today, share prices broke down by more than 16 points. The stock market for this morning opened at a level of 100.30 and fell to 93.75 by 11:30 a. m. and then around three minutes and trading was at an active clip as the session went into its third hour.

Widespread tension was evident in financial quarters over the possibility of a European war although many traders held the view that suspicion over the course of Wall Street was a major factor behind the break.

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Killing The Deer

At last Florida sportsmen are beginning to do something about the plan of the State Livestock Board to annihilate all the deer in South Florida...

According to members of the State Livestock Board, this is the only way the cattle tick can be handled. They contend it doesn't do any good to dip the cattle...

We have been wondering for some time why the sportsmen of Florida didn't band together in an effort to combat this wholesale destruction...

For years stricter and stricter game laws have been enacted to protect our wildlife. Most of the native hunters, as well as those who come here from other states...

According to the State Veterinarian, after the cattle tick has been eradicated, the woods will be restocked with deer, and the damage will not be felt.

We believe there must be some other way of meeting the cattle tick situation. The easiest way, of course, is to go out and kill all the deer.

For those who have been unable to take a vacation during the summer, the Baltimore Sun suggests that it is not yet too late to have all the thrills of a summer resort right at home...

Move into the smallest bedroom in your house; if possible one immediately over the kitchen. If your bed is soft and downy, put a couple of bricks in it.

Dig a hole in the garden, get into it and cover yourself up to the neck. When you get tired of this diversion, wash yourself off with the garden hose.

WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—Probably one of the things President Roosevelt didn't think about when he appointed Hugo Black to the Supreme Court was that Tom Heflin would try to succeed Black in the senate.

The people outside Alabama who don't know former Senator Heflin could be counted in millions. But in his home state Heflin's peculiar figure, reddish hair and smooth-fitting, buff-colored shoes are recognized at every crossroads.

Likely he has told a rip-roaring story at each crossing, accompanied by a booming laugh that rattled the audience off the fence rails. A man who spent 16 years in the house and 10 years in the senate should be able to think of something funny at almost any moment.

Heflin was elected to the senate and soon thereafter won himself a kettler of fame by attacking the Pope as a menace to peace in America. The Pope, said Heflin, was trying to get the United States to punish Mexico for roughing up the Catholic clergy down there.

He rode this hobby-horse in and out of the senate. Although few besides Heflin ever took it very seriously, he carried it so far as to bolt the Al Smith ticket in 1928.

In 1930 a Bankhead father-son cycle was completed after a 10 year interruption by Heflin. The great foe of the Pope had been elected to the senate in 1920 to succeed John H. Bankhead, father of the present congressional hunchback, the speaker of the house and the senator. Speaker William Bankhead had been in congress several years before his elbow brother polished off Heflin in the 1930 primary and he put another John H. Bankhead in the senate.

Hard times then came upon Heflin. Few politicians, especially the senatorial kind, amass real fortunes from politics; and Heflin was not one of those. He was in and out of Washington much of the time, and by 1935 had forgotten his anti-Pope fervor and was glad of a few months work under the New Deal. He became speaker extraordinary and

State Game Preserves May Get Federal Aid

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Florida will be entitled to federal help in establishing game preserves under terms of a bill now awaiting President Roosevelt's signature.

The measure sets aside revenue from taxes on firearms, shells and cartridges for participation in state programs to establish protected areas for wildlife. The bureau of biological survey estimated the fund at \$3,500,000 annually.

The federal law permits government in establishing any preserve submitted by the state game department and approved by the secretary of agriculture. The federal share of the cost may go as high as 75 per cent.

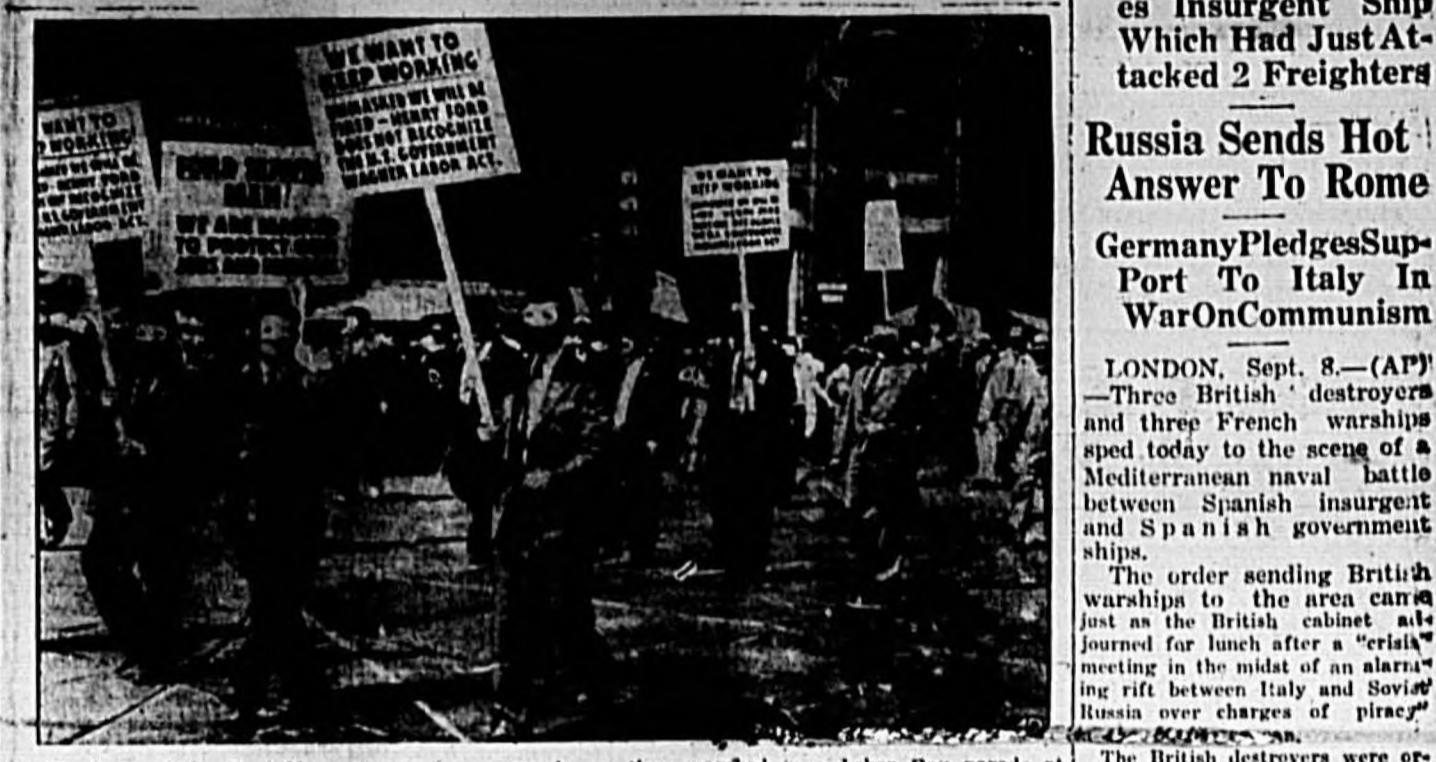
