Recognition Well Earned

The untold actions of a modest man, reported only through conversation with a friend or neighbor, often reveal a story deserving of special recognition.
Such was the case this week when the Herald learned that Longwood Police and Fire Chief Claude Layo recently was credited with saving the life of nine-year-old Ann McElreath, daughter of T Sgt. and Mrs. Dewey McElreath.
Ann, an asthmatic since the age of three months, suffered an unusually serious attack some three weeks ago at which time the family doctor was found to be unavailable.
Ann's mother, in desperation, called Layo who arrived in a matter of minutes with the resuscitator and administered to the child until an ambulance could arrive.
Mrs. McElreath said today that she credits the fact that her little girl is still living to the fast action of Chief Layo. She wishes to publicly thank him and to tell the people of Longwood how lucky she considers them to have such a dedicated man serving the town.
The McElreaths live on the Old Dixie Hwy., outside the city limits of Longwood, and, in many instances, would have been ineligible for any emergency aid from city police or fire departments.

'Selfish' Interests Rapped By Bryant

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant said today selfish special interests in the Legislature were endangering his plans for higher education expansion by fighting all proposals for new revenue except a sales tax on groceries.

At the same time, Bryant told his weekly news conference the special interest groups were pressing for large appropriations that would be impossible to finance.

"This is a difficult maneuver to fight," said Bryant, who added he would take any steps he thought proper to fight off the threat to the need for increased revenues for higher education.

He said representatives of the heavy machinery, cigarette, gambling, trucking and alcohol industries were fighting to prevent the lawmakers from spreading the three per cent sales tax to them. To do this, he said, they were fighting all taxes except an expansion of the sales tax on groceries and medicines.

Asked if the special interests have been successful in their fight, Bryant said, "at this point we haven't raised any more money."

He said gambling taxes, cigarette taxes for state purposes and a lien and recovery proposal to get back welfare payments from the estates of deceased recipients have been turned down by the lawmakers.

Bryant said he was trying by personal contacts to "bring home to the legislators the overall picture of what is happening."

Bryant refused to say whether or not he would veto an appropriations bill exceeding the financial ability of the state to push the higher education program, either by general revenue or a bond program.

Bryant said he did not think special interests opposed the bond proposal but he admitted there was considerable opposition among lawmakers in the senate.

The governor said he was convinced the Legislature would find areas to cut its record \$1 billion in proposed spending and would eventually return to the cabinet budget commission's proposal of about \$882 million. "I am convinced that the budget

commission proposals were for the most part sound, realistic and in most instances adequate," he said.

Bryant said flatly he would veto any proposal for a Florida sweepstakes similar to the plan put into law last week in Vermont.

He also indicated he would veto any legislation of bingo in Florida.

Haiti Warned On Aggression

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (UPI) — President Juan Bosch, threatening to invade Haiti if it commits any new aggression against the Dominican Republic today sought collective inter-American action against Haitian President Francois Duvalier.

Bosch called Duvalier "a mentally sick man" Thursday night and cited a statement Wednesday by the Haitian president that only God could remove him from power.

A fact-finding team of the Organization of American States (OAS) flew to Santo Domingo from the Haitian capital of Port Au Prince Thursday, leaving behind a country gripped by fear that Duvalier would resume a violent campaign against his enemies.

Bosch told foreign correspondents in his presidential residence Thursday night that the Dominican Republic would not wait for OAS action in the event of renewed Haitian aggression.

"The next time Haiti commits aggression against us, we will tell the OAS what our course of action has been, not from the Dominican capital but from the capital of a neighboring nation," he said.

Full Support Expected For St. Johns Canal

Unanimous support of the proposed St. Johns - Indian River Canal by four county delegations was anticipated this afternoon at a joint session at the Mayfair Inn.

John Krider, chairman of the St. Johns-Indian River Navigating Committee, said at noon it was expected commission members of four counties would voice full support of the waterway.

Harold Scott, Jacksonville engineer, was to read a report of a preliminary study of the proposed canal, extending from Lake Hartney to Maytown and connecting the St. Johns and Indian Rivers.

Attending the session were members of Krider's navigating committee, Randolph Hodges, chairman of the State Board of Conservation; William McCree, chairman of the State Canal Authority; Secretary of State Tom Adams, Chairman J. C. Hutchison and members of the Seminole County Commission; Chairman Harris Saxon and members of the Volusia County Commission; Chairman Joe Wickham and members of the Brevard County Commission, and Chairman Don Evans and members of the Orange County Commission.

State senators of the four counties also were to attend but Sen. Mack Cleveland Jr. telephoned The Herald from Tallahassee this morning that because of the important appropriation bill being discussed today the president of the Senate refused to approve the absence of any members.

With approval by the county commissions today, Sen. Bernard Parrish, of Brevard County, is scheduled to introduce in the Senate next week a bill seeking to establish the St. Johns-Indian River Canal Authority.

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Solons Go Into Closed Session On \$ \$ Woes

The free-wheeling Senate, undoing everything it did in a five-hour session Thursday, went back today and restored huge pay raises for state cabinet officials in a multi-million dollar salary bill.

The surprise action followed a 45-minute executive session which corridor speculation said concerned the state's financial mess.

The Senate went into executive session today in an effort to discuss the financial dilemma including \$50 million in teacher pay raises and the \$43 million on state school funds.

The senators considered only salary hikes Thursday. They are but a small part of the 20 spending bills proposed by the appropriations committee.

The total spending proposed is \$300 million more than present taxes will provide.

The upper chamber was expected to hit \$30 million in teacher pay raises and the \$43 million "freeze" on state public school funds today.

The raise money would provide \$100 across-the-board hikes for the state's public school teachers, and the "freeze" bill stipulates that the state pay 75 per cent of the cost of running public schools during the coming biennium.

Biggest part of the spending program will be considered in bills for operations and buildings for state agencies and institutions during the coming biennium.

Thursday, Sen. Wilson Caraway stepped from the rostrum in an unprecedented move to push a \$200 million

cut of spending recommended by his own committee.

He didn't get much done in the first day's action, however, and even joined in with the spenders to defeat a motion by Sen. Clayton Maples to slice the proposed salary of Board of Control executive director J. Broward Culpepper from \$29,000 to \$18,500.

While the Senate fought, House subcommittees continued to struggle with a \$1,022,000,000 bill to be introduced in the lower chamber next week. The appropriations subcommittees have orders to cut the figure to \$915 million in line with Gov. Farris Bryant's warning that he may veto anything over \$970 million.

Thus far, the subcommittees have added \$4 million to the spending bill via the arguing process.

The Senate Finance and Taxation Committee buried the so-called Liberty Amendment under an avalanche of "no" votes.

Judge Orders FEC To Halt Work Rules

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A federal judge has ordered the strike-bound Florida East Coast Railway to withdraw recently proposed work rules because the rules threatened efforts by a presidential board to settle a nationwide railroad dispute.

The four operating unions that struck April 6 in protest of the anti-featherbedding rules immediately responded to Judge Luther W. Youngdahl's order by withdrawing their strike notices against the carrier.

But the strike withdrawal, by the engineers, trainmen, conductors, brakemen, firemen and engine men will have little effect on the FEC, which was struck Jan. 23 by 1,200 workers of 11 non-operating unions over a wage dispute.

"One has to be naive not to believe that if you put these rules into effect the negotiations by President's emergency board will be practically moot," Youngdahl said.

The injunction, which is expected to be issued formally Monday, was requested by the Justice Department.

The judge said if the FEC's work rules stayed in effect, there was a possibility representatives of the 200 unions involved in the national dispute would break off negotiations.

FEC attorney William Deveney wouldn't say whether the carrier would appeal the order, and FEC Board Chairman Ed Ball declined to comment on the injunction.

The visitors will be guests of Mackle Bros. at the Mayfair Inn for the weekend, along with a dinner-dance Saturday evening at the hotel.

Kozlov Suffers Heart Attack
MOSCOW (UPI) — Deputy Communist party leader Frol Kozlov, the man Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev has dubbed his successor, was reported today to have suffered his second heart attack.

The report came from usually well-informed Eastern European sources. They said he is in "serious condition."

This would explain Kozlov's mysterious absence from the huge May Day parade two days ago at which Cuban Premier Fidel Castro stood by Khrushchev's side.

Kozlov, 55, has not appeared in public here since early April. If he is ill, as reported, presumably he is in a local clinic or resting at home.

The men are Donald G. Franklin, 34; Joseph Rooto, 39, and John F. Vlahovich, 31.

The Supreme Court rejected their petition for review of the case on March 25 of this year.

Education Headed Here

Thus, in this instance, the headline can be confusing to the reader for presently there are four schools in the offing for this area and the reader cannot tell from the headline to which school does the article refer but must read into the story to learn that fact.

1. Seminole College, a branch of Orlando Junior College, to be erected at North Orlando.

2. A four-year university for undergraduates (high school graduates) in the "Cape Canaveral-Orlando - Daytona Beach" area. It is this school in which so much effort is being made by local leaders to have it placed in Seminole County.

3. A branch of the University of Florida engineering college for students in engineering and science for the "East Central Florida" area. Local leaders also are endeavoring to have this school placed in Seminole County.

4. A "space institute" for graduate engineers and scientists in the "Cape Canaveral - Orlando" area. This school will offer advanced courses aimed primarily for the space age. Local leaders are not too much concerned about this school but would, of course, be happy to have it placed in Seminole County.

Bite Now!

Political Notebook

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—Tennessee Valley Authority will be 30 years old May 18.

Celebrations and oratory are being planned. Literature or the TVA "experiment" is appearing, pro and con.

Whether you approve of it or not, TVA is admittedly one of the seven wonders of America and an eighth wonder of the world. When the King of Morocco came to the United States he stopped to see TVA before coming to Washington.

At the end of World War II a party of European journalists came to Washington direct from TVA at the end of a transcontinental junket.

They were different political parties, and they had seen through partisan eyes the great Tennessee River with its dams and power lines, electrified farms, navigation channels and flood control works.

To the liberals, TVA showed what a democratic government and society could do when they went to work for the people. To the socialists, TVA was pure Marxism. To the Communists, it was fulfillment of the Leninist-Stalinist dream; only Russia could do it better. To the conservatives, this was big business that could be created only in a free enterprise, capitalistic economy.

They all got into such a heated argument about it that when they reached Washington they weren't speaking to each other.

This illustrates as well as anything the point that TVA is controversial. And in its 30th anniversary observance this month there probably will be some sour notes that it is so anti-American it should be broken up and sold to private power companies.

The best justification of TVA is that it works. But as a matter of speculation, if a completely unbiased jury could be given the case, it might be found that the competitive private enterprise system owes a great debt to Tennessee Valley Authority.

TVA woke up the private

power industry to its potential. It showed what could be done with rural electrification. It showed that lower power rates with increase consumption and increase the sale of electric appliances many times over. It promoted growth.

When TVA legislation was before Congress in 1933, E. A. Yates of Dixon-Yates fame testified in opposition to TVA because there was already a 65 percent over production capacity of private power in the area and he could see no market for more.

But within seven years, TVA had doubled the private consumption level. By 1933 it had increased 17 times. Today TVA's total steam and hydroelectric power capacity is over 50 times what it was in 1933.

In 1934 TVA began heating homes with electricity in the town of Norris, with rate schedules designed for R. Private utilities at first regarded this as crazy, but today they vigorously promote it.

TVA's purchase of low-bid foreign electric generating equipment caused American manufacturers to sharpen their pencils and become competitive.

Of far more value than its pioneering in the electrical industry, TVA has set a national and international pattern for multiple purpose water control, flood prevention, forestation and the shift of

agriculture from row crops like corn and cotton to cover crops that conserve water.

The million tons of cargo carried on the Tennessee River system in 1933 has grown to 12 million tons and will double by 1975.

In 1937, with 25 inches of rainfall in 21 days, TVA met its most severe flood control test by management of stream flow from its 31 dams, six of which are privately owned but TVA operated.

Along the 10,000 miles of shoreline on these artificial lakes and reservoirs, recreation facilities have been provided for 42-million persons of fun a year at 250 resorts and camp areas.

Good News From Europe

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI)—Adlai Stevenson brought back encouraging news from Europe for the United Nations; he found a renewed interest in France in the world organization and a disposition among some of its members to pay up their financial arrearsages.

The U.N. money problem was widely reported to have been one of the purposes of the U.S. ambassador's trip to Belgium, Britain, France, Spain, West Germany and Morocco.

While Stevenson was on his trip, Eugene R. Black was

on a quiet tour of the Middle East, talking money to financial authorities of delinquent countries there. Black returned Monday. His report to Secretary General Thant was not as well publicized as Stevenson's findings.

Stevenson said three of the countries he visited would "remedy their delinquencies" at least by the end of the year. Since France has refused to pay for the Congo, West Germany is not a UN member, and Britain is paid up, it was obvious that he referred to Belgium, Spain and Morocco.

Actually, Morocco paid its

share for the UN Middle East operation (UNEF) almost as soon as Stevenson finished his talks in Rabat. It still owes \$117,822 to the Congo.

Spain's overall debt to the United Nations for UNEF and the Congo is \$1.6 million and Belgium's is \$3.8 million.

Since Belgium wants to accept a major role in the re-training of the Congo army—a development favorable to Belgian economy through redemption of the country's prestige among the Congolese—a payment from Brussels was expected soon. Belgium probably will bargain on the basis of damages suffered by its nationals and installations in the Congo.

There appeared little chance that France would pay anything on the \$16.1 million it owes for the Congo—it is up to the minute on all its other UN payments.

Although Stevenson did not get to see DeGaulle, who refers to the world organization as the "Disunited Nations," he had this harbinger of impending policy change: "I think that even in France with the disappearance of the Algerian problem as a major preoccupation of the government, that there is now a renewed interest in the United Nations and support and appreciation for its work and its potential for keeping peace."

Citrus Tree Loss Estimated At 14 Million By Mutual

LAKELAND (UPI) — The December freeze killed an estimated 14 million citrus trees, Florida Mutual said today, and as a result citrus utilization next season will be even lower than experienced this season.

Robert W. Rutledge, executive vice president of Mutual, said Thursday that it will take six years under optimum conditions to replace the trees.

He said that the only possible exception to the citrus utilization drop next season will be with fresh oranges.

Rutledge said that Mutual estimates about nine million boxes of oranges will be used in fresh channels next season, up about a half a million from this season.

But this amount would be down nearly eight million boxes from the fresh shipments of last season.

He said fresh orange shipments this season were the smallest in more than 30 years and that next season should run about the same.

Rutledge said the orange and grapefruit crops next season should run about one third lower than this season's actual harvest, when much of the fruit harvested after the freeze went into processing channels.

Frozen orange concentrate will take one of the largest drops next season, Mutual predicted, with declines also expected in chilled and canned orange juice.

Mutual said next season's estimated concentrate pack will be about 47 million gallons. This would be three million gallons less than this season's anticipated pack and off a whopping 69 million gallons from the record amount packed last season.

FEC Sets Move To Start Expansion Plan

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — Bondholders in the strike-bound Florida East Coast Railway voted today to amend bond regulations to permit the company to raise money for expansion purposes.

The FEC, which has track between Jacksonville and Miami, plans to extend its lines into Cape Canaveral, the nation's spaceport, and to the new Miami docks on Dodge Island.

Cost of the projects will run several million dollars, FEC officials said, and the company plans to raise the money by selling off or leasing certain property and using other property as collateral for loans.

Although the outcome of the ballot was never in doubt because FEC officials control more than \$17 million of the \$23 million outstanding bonds, several voices were raised in objection of the amendments.

Henry W. Allers of Ft. Lauderdale said he could not see the point of expanding into Canaveral "which is only 6 miles from Soviet control and where you can dig one foot in the ground and hit water."

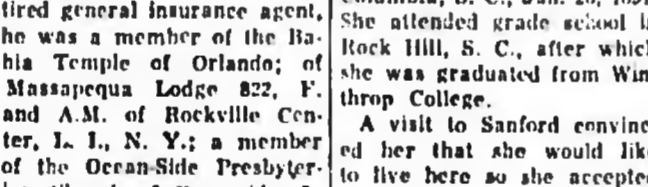
A visit to Sanford convinced her that she would like to live here so she accepted a position as a school teacher. She continued teaching for seventeen years during which time she made a great number of friends.

of ruffing and then South decided he should lead trumps from his own hand. He ruffed dummy's jack of hearts with his seven. East won with the king and led a low club which South ruffed also.

At this point the trap was set and South fell right into it. He was down to two trumps and he led another trump to dummy's nine. Now East produced the jack of trumps and continued with the ace.

West discarded his last diamond and East put him in with the king of clubs so that West made the last three tricks with hearts.

East had helped South work out a play for down four.

If it is to stay young and alert, the mind has to be used. And it is a woman's mind — not her face — that really tells the world whether she is young and alert and eager, or a has-been who is just marking time.

United Press International — Old man Musial ain't what he used to be but he's not yet ready to throw aside his bat in favor of a rocking chair in the sun.

Stan the Man, now 42, got off to a slow start with the St. Louis Cardinals this season after no less an authority than Branch Rickey had suggested he might be excess baggage for the team to carry.

Manager Johnny Keane, however, closed his ears to the advice and waited for Musial to supply his own answer.

That the Man did Thursday night with a three-run, seventh-inning double that lifted the Cardinals to a 4-3 victory over the Chicago Cubs and increased their National League lead to two games.

The double enabled Musial to tie Babe Ruth's major league record of 1,336 extra base hits and also raised his career RBI total to 1,901.

Whitey Ford's Arm? Well, It's A-OK!

United Press International — It won't require any kind of medical knowledge to establish that all is well with Whitey Ford's left arm.

It's also just as basic to baseball fans that they'll have to find another excuse if they expect the New York Yankees to lose the pennant.

Ford, a clever lefthander with a pitiful sense of humor, was bothered by arm trouble part of last season and he still wasn't feeling right when the current campaign started as he lost his first two games. Yankee batters were quick to point out that a broken-down Ford would cause the world champions to run out of gas.

The Yankees were rolling on a full tank Thursday when Ford threw a four-hit shutout at the Los Angeles Angels in a 7-0 victory. Ford, who after the game said his arm felt stronger than at any time since the 1961 World Series, now has a string of 16 scoreless innings during which he has yielded just six hits.

The Kansas City Athletics fell from first place in the American League after taking a 15-6 shellacking from the Washington Senators outslugging the Detroit Tigers, 9-4; the Baltimore Orioles beat the Chicago White Sox, 8-7, in a night game, and a scheduled day contest at Minnesota between the Twins and Boston Red Sox was postponed by rain.

Ford's victory was an important one for the Yankees, who had lost two straight in Los Angeles and were threatened with a drop to the second division. After five scoreless innings, New York broke the game wide open in the sixth on a bases-loaded walk and a grand-slam homer by Joe Pepitone. Two more runs followed in the seventh, one of which came in on a Pepitone single.

Pepitone's homer was his fifth of the season, a club high, and the young first baseman also tops the Yankees in runs-batted-in with 11.

Woody Held cracked a grand slam homer to pace the Indian assault and rookie Vic Davalillo contributed a homer and a double. Cleveland bombarded four Kansas City pitchers for 18 hits, including four by Tito Francona, to overcome an early coma, to overcome an early coma, to overcome an early coma.

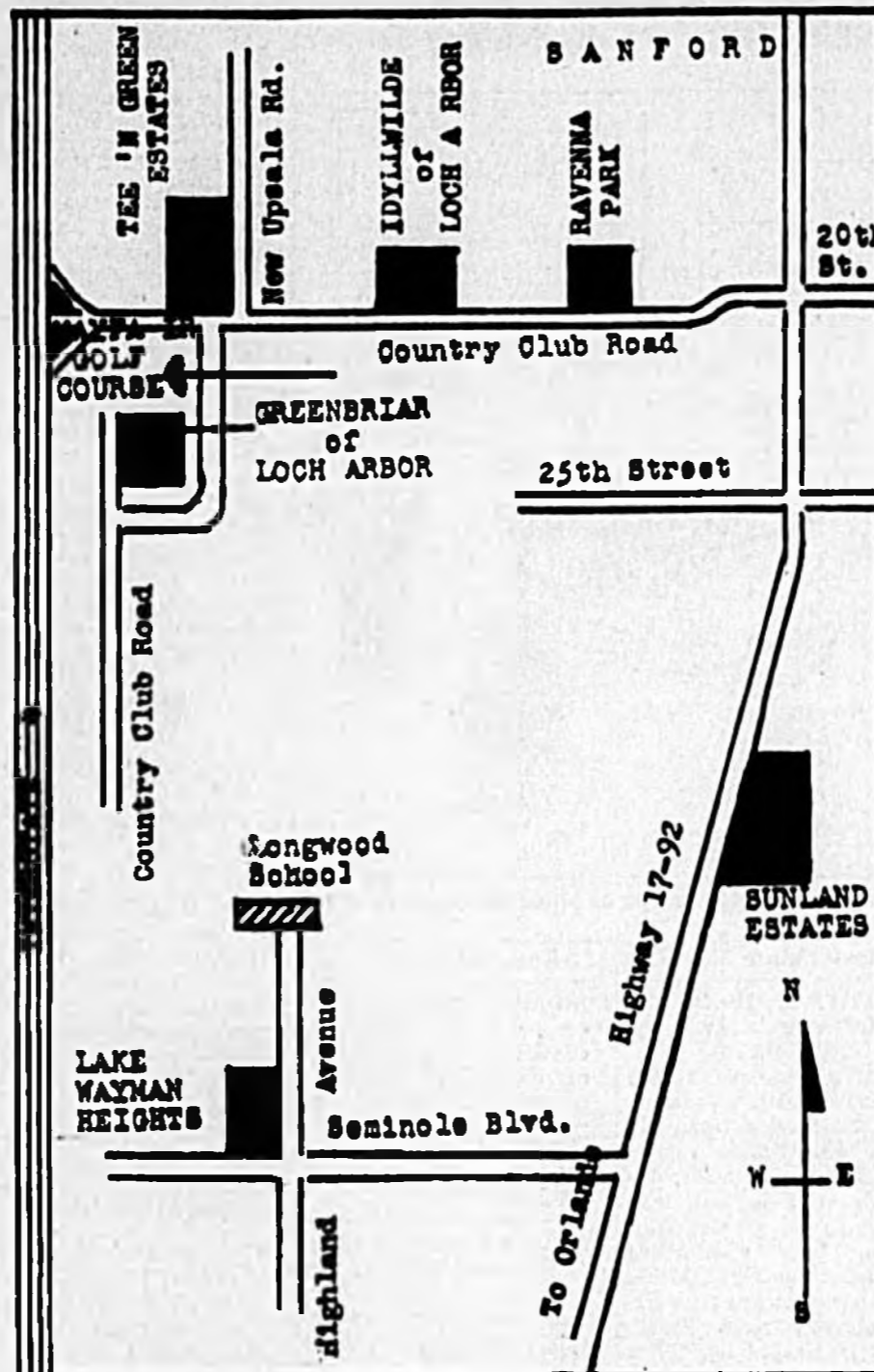

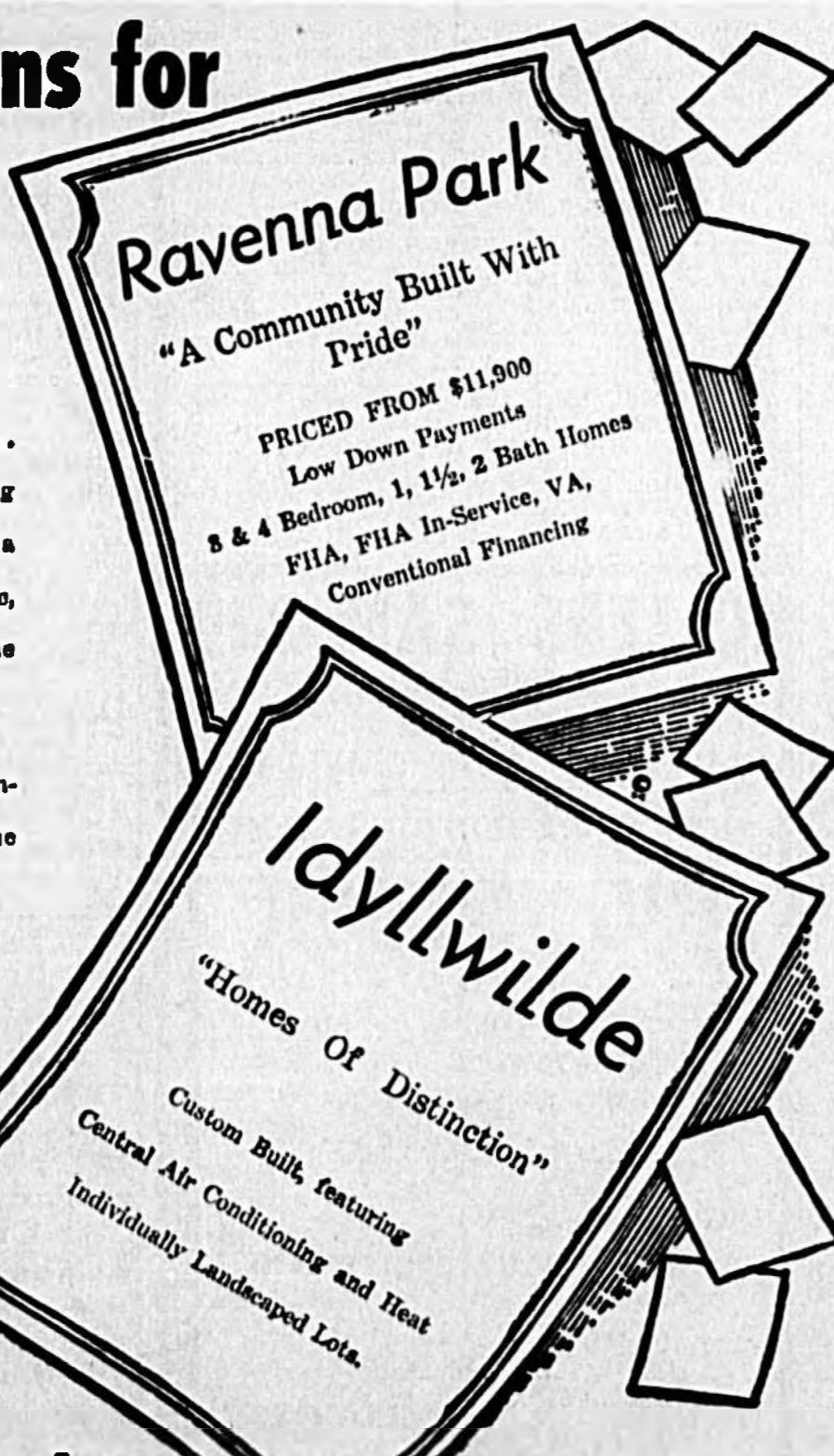

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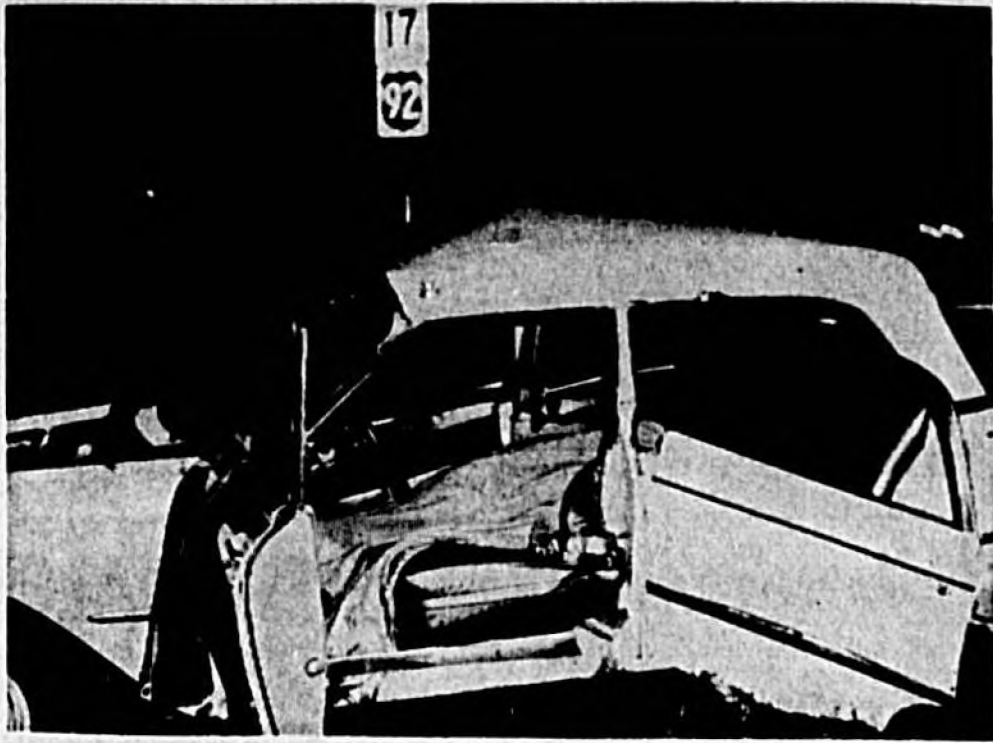

State Mishaps Take 18 Lives

Traffic accidents claimed 18 lives in Seminole County over the weekend, bringing the total in the county to six for the last eight days and to 11 for the year. At least 18 persons died in accidents in the state over the weekend.

Melbert Gene Bay, 28, a volunteer policeman of 802 Triplet Drive, Casselberry, was crushed to death early Sunday when a tractor-trailer overturned on his car at Highway 17-92 and Seminole Boulevard.

Trooper J. L. Sikes said Bay apparently turned in front of a produce-laden tractor-trailer driven by George D. Skipper, 27, of Savannah, Ga. Skipper reported to Sikes that his truck struck and knocked the car ahead, then the trailer overturned on the automobile.

Wrecking crews required four hours to clean up the debris and unload the produce truck. Sikes estimated damage to the tractor-trailer at \$25,000 and \$800 to Bay's car.

Three persons died as a result of a two-car crash early Saturday at Highway 17-92 and State Road 410. They were:

William Hamm Vann, 44, of 2200 Magnolia Avenue, Sanford.

Daisy (Perdue) Vann, 44, his wife.

Charles A. Hall, 31, of 210 Nannette Drive, Orlando.

Mrs. Vann and Hall were killed instantly at 1:20 a. m. Saturday, Vann died at 11 a. m. Saturday at Orange Memorial Hospital, Orlando.

Hall was riding with Perry W. Nichols, 24, McCoy AFD, who was charged with driving without a valid license.

Deputy William Chandler, who witnessed the crash, reported to Sikes that the Vann car crossed in front of Nichols.

Mr. and Mrs. Vann came to Sanford 3 1/2 years ago from Salem, N. C. Their bodies were sent to Salem by the Brisson Funeral Home.

Vann is survived by his mother, Mrs. Betty Wilson, Salem, and four brothers and sisters, including James W. Vann, of Pahokee.

Mrs. Vann is survived by seven children, Mrs. Martha Tackett, John H. Tommy, a Sanford Herald carrier, and Paul Caudle, of Sanford, and Mrs. Eugene Marshall, Mrs. Betty Walker and Mrs. Naomi Carroll, of Greenboro, N. C.; her mother, Mrs. Annie Walker, Greenboro, and eight brothers and sisters.

Hall is survived by his wife, Mrs. Rose L. Hall; a son, Mark; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Hall, Louisville, Ky.; and a brother, Joseph Hall, Louisville.

St. Johns Canal District Bill Okay Seen This Week

The bill creating the St. Johns-Indian River Canal District will be introduced in the Legislature this week and pushed through to early passage by the delegations from Brevard, Orange, Seminole and Volusia Counties.

As outlined at a joint session of the commissions of the four counties Friday noon at the Mayfair Inn, the legislation is designed only for the district officers to obtain the necessary right-of-way for the proposed canal connecting the two rivers from Lake Harney to Maytown.

State officers emphasized to the county commissioners they will not be asked for funds or will ad valorem taxes be requested.

John Krider, chairman of the St. Johns-Indian River Navigating Committee, stated he had been informed by Sen. Bernard Parrish, Brevard County, who has been appointed chairman of the canal, that he (Parrish) holds commitments from three property owners contributing gratis the necessary right-of-way for all except about 200 yards at the east-end of the canal.

Tom Adams, secretary of state; Randolph Hodges, chairman of the State Board of Conservation, and William McCree, chairman of the State Canal Authority, emphasized to the county commissioners that the only function of the canal district will be to obtain the necessary right-of-way.

Thereafter, the project will pass to the control of the State Canal Authority.

Harold Scott, Jacksonville engineer, informed the meeting that he recommends the Harney-Maytown route and that a feasibility study would cost an estimated \$24,000.

McCree stated it would be the function of his Canal Authority to finance this study.

The state officers indicated actual financing of canal construction would be done with matching funds by the state and federal governments.

All four county commissioners approved the canal project.

Scott emphasized . . . and he was supported by the state officers . . . that the canal construction will bypass the shad spawning and fishing grounds of the St. Johns River. Only opposition expressed to the canal was from commercial fishermen and fishing camp operators who expressed fear the construction would damage or kill shad fishing.

The engineer explained preliminary planning calls for a canal 100 feet wide and eight feet deep, with locks at either end to maintain a mean water level 15 feet above sea level and to prevent infiltration of salt water into the fresh water areas and vice versa.

The locks would be 250 x 36 feet, allowing for two barges and a tug to pass through at one time. Pleasure craft would bypass the locks.

Gov. Farris Bryant will name the five commissioners of the canal district, two from Seminole County and one each from the other three counties.

Extended Session For Legislature?

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Florida lawmakers returned from the weekend today to a roof-high stack of unpassed legislation amid rumors of a move to either extend the session or convene the Legislature annually.

Five weeks of the nine-week session have gone, yet little major legislation has been passed into law, including what promises to be a record general spending bill.

A need for a change in the length or frequency of the legislative session became apparent when lawmakers failed to get the general appropriations bill out of the way by the first month as hoped.

House leaders said this weekend that the Constitutional Amendments Committee is prepared to introduce a resolution directing the Legislative Council to make a two-year study and recommend session changes to the 1965 Legislature.

Rocky, Bride On Honeymoon

CARACAS, Venezuela (UPI) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller and his bride began a two-week honeymoon at a sprawling family cattle ranch today, remote from the political controversy stirred by their marriage back home.

Rockefeller and the former Mrs. Margaretta Fittler (Happy) Murphy settled down in relative isolation on the 14,000-acre ranch and potato farm 125 miles west of Caracas.

4th Man Surrenders In 'Repair' Probe

(Special to The Herald) GAINESVILLE — Glynn Calvin Jones Jr., 32, the last of four home repair men sought for the "theft of a mortgage," surrendered Friday night to authorities here.

He posted a \$3,000 bond an hour after his surrender.

He reportedly had been living in Ormond Beach and working in a home repair business in that area.

Jones was an officer of the now defunct Nova Builders of Sanford. He's accused along with two other officers and a salesman of "stealing" the mortgage to property owned by Mrs. Romie Reed West of Gainesville.

The firm agreed to no improvements on Mrs. Reed's shell house. Sheriff Joe Cravasse said the work never was completed.

A mortgage for the job was taken and sold.

The four men charged will go to trial June 4 in Circuit Court here.

They are, besides Jones, Horace Richard Bernard, William Cletus Braden and William A. DeBross. Their arrests came as a result of an extensive investigation of home repair racketeering begun by Sheriff Joe Cravasse.

FEC Walkout Nearing End?

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — A leader of the operating unions' strike against the Florida East Coast Railway said the walkout probably will be called off today.

Labor leader T. C. Bolin said a Federal District Court order probably would be filed in Washington today directing the FEC to rescind its anti-feather-bodding work laws which sparked the strike April 5.

"As soon as the order is entered and served on our executives, we will be informed and the strike notice will be withdrawn," Bolin said.

District Judge Luther W. Youngdahl said he would issue an order today. He listened to arguments from both sides on Thursday.

The end of the operating on train unions' strikes against the FEC will not have much practical effect on the railway. It has been crippled by a strike by 11 non-operating unions since Jan. 23.

The "non-ops" strike, now in its 104th day, will not be affected by the court order. Labor and management meet here Friday to discuss a settlement to the non-ops wage dispute.

Dominicans Set 'Attack' Plans

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (UPI) — President Juan Bosch convoked his cabinet today for a report from military chiefs, strengthening belief the hour for a Dominican strike against Haiti may be imminent.

An Army spokesman said Dominican infantry now were in attack positions the length of the border separating the two countries on the Caribbean island of Hispaniola.

Bosch made no secret of his plans to invade Haiti if necessary to topple the dictatorial regime of President Francois Duvalier.

The Organization of American States (OAS) stepped up its efforts to head off a war between the two nations which share the Caribbean island of Hispaniola, only 55 miles from Cuba.

President Duvalier vowed in Port Au Prince he never would step down under pressure, he told his people: "I am a revolutionary in every sense—not a sentimental type but one of the firm kind . . . I have for my companion my rifle."

In Washington, the OAS scheduled an emergency meeting to hear a report from three members of the fact-finding mission it sent to Haiti and the Dominican Republic. The mission members expressed doubt that Bosch would move against Haiti while the OAS was trying to solve the crisis.

Negroes Plan More Protests

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI) — Negro leaders, encouraged by the first march on city jail in a 31-day campaign that did not result in mass arrests, planned more protests for today while federal officials sought to ease the explosive racial situation here.

More than 2,000 singing, chanting Negroes Sunday marched six blocks from a Negro church to a park across from the city jail. They were permitted by police to hold a 15-minute demonstration aimed at bolstering the spirits of more than 1,200 Negroes who remain in jail for previous demonstrations.

Burke Marshall, head of the Justice Department's civil rights division and considered the chief racial trouble-shooter of the Kennedy administration, met with local officials during the weekend in efforts to ease racial pressures.

Yanks Ask Red Asylum

BERLIN (UPI) — The East German news agency ADN said today two American soldiers—a captain and a sergeant—had entered East Germany and asked for asylum.

ADN identified them as Capt. Alfred Svenson, deputy commander of the 2nd Tank Battalion of the 1st Cavalry Division, and Sgt. Benjamin G. Galt, 3rd Armored Division, in West Germany, and Sgt. Benjamin Cain of West Berlin's 6th Infantry Regiment.

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
