Sanford Permanent Seat

City of Sanford was declared the "permanent county seat" of Seminole County by Circuit Judge Roger Dyer today to bring to a conclusion a 10-month battle in the courts to secure construction of a new courthouse for Seminole County.

In a 16-minute court session this morning Judge Dyer read his five-page written decision in the case which was filed by three South Seminole residents last December.

The judge also denied and dismissed complaint of the petitioners in the suit holding the request for injunctive relief "prematurely made." The dismissal came as a "surprise" to Harlan Tuck, attorney for the complainants, who told 'The Herald' he had "no doubt" what action he would take next.

Judge Dyer held that Sanford as the permanent county seat "is subject to change or removal only through the procedure authorized in Chapter 128, Florida Statutes." This section requires a special election to be held to determine a county seat after petitioners requesting the election are submitted containing signatures of 20 per cent.

Seminole 'Cheap' Richards Quits; Just 'Disgusted'

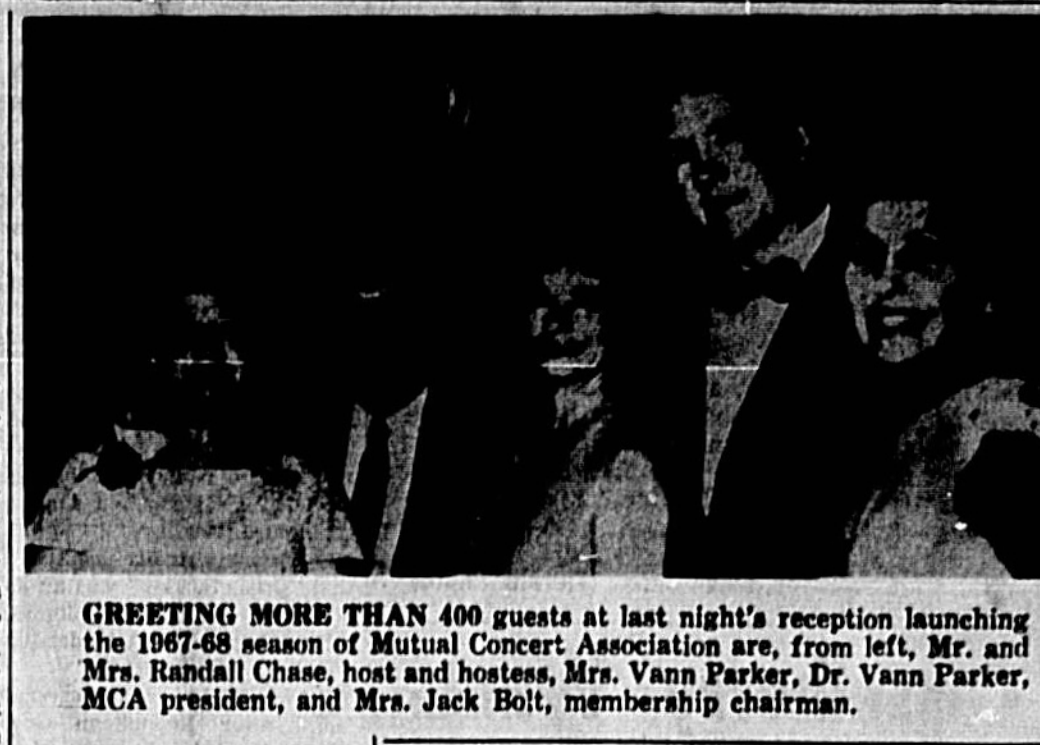
Administrative policies of the Seminole County School Board were lambasted Tuesday night by Bear Lake Elementary Principal Floyd Richards in a prepared statement of resignation before the school's Parent-Teachers Association.

Citing the board's decision to hold back expenditures as basic cause for his resignation, effective at end of the current school year, Richards stressed that "shortage of space, personnel and equipment cannot be condoned or met with calmness over a period of years."

"In the 10 year period during which I have been in Seminole County, the county has not equaled only by one county in the state for cheapness, and I have long been a firm believer that you get exactly what you pay for. Last year, Seminole County had fewer teachers per thousand students than any other county in the state except Okaloosa and that means our children get cheated out of overcrowding, or phasing out of curricula which would be the best thing for them."

Our school buildings have been built through the process of cutting this out and cutting that out to bring the costs down, rather than by stating what our needs are and then building to fulfill those needs.

"Don't misunderstand me, school buildings are well-built structurally but not educationally. I am tired of not being allowed to run the school the way I know it should be run. I have been a member of the (Continued on Page 2 Col. 7)

\$8 Million Jet Demolished Sanford Navy Pilot Safe

A Navy pilot from Sanford Naval Air Station ejected safely from his disabled aircraft yesterday afternoon near Oak Hill, on the east coast, but his \$8 million RASC "Vigilante" jet was demolished.

Lt. Cdr. Richard Scroggs, attached to RVAN-2, was unharmed.

Commander Scroggs said that while on a routine training flight his aircraft began to lose control at 10,000 feet. After several attempts to regain control, he ejected at 5,000 feet.

The ejection was successful and Scroggs was rescued from the water by Constable Rene Vender, of Daytona Beach. The jet crashed in the Indian River, about seven miles south of New Smyrna Beach.

A helicopter from the Navy base returned Scroggs to the station.

An investigation is being conducted into the cause of the accident.

Commander Scroggs and his wife, Marilyn Lee, and their two children reside at 2823 Lion Heart Road, Winter Park.

For the 1966-67 year there were 770 permits issued for a valuation of \$1,735,574 as compared to permits issued for \$2,087,446 during the 1965-66 year.

The biggest permit issued was for the Holiday Inn at \$600,000.

Earlier in the week, the Herald reported, a building permits valuation in the county totaled \$8 million plus.

Bond Issue A Must Teague Tells Board

A \$10 to \$15 million bond issue within the next six to eight months will be a "must" to adequately house school children here, was predicted by Finance Director Walter Teague at a special school board meeting Tuesday.

"We need 46 additional classrooms over the next few years," Teague told the board and urged them to ask the voters on Nov. 7 to retain the same district millage as last year—6.

"You don't want to ask for a millage hike in November and come back in the spring with a \$15 million bond issue," Teague emphasized.

There was some discussion among board members to push for a higher district millage request. Vice Chairman John Evans called on teachers to make the millage request a higher one.

Seminole Education President William Layer said his group would discuss it at the next board meeting on Oct. 12.

The board also agreed to ask the voters whether they wish an appointed or elected school superintendent on the Nov. 7 ballot.

Union Vs. Management; Teachers Lose Round 1

It was union vs. management in an 83 minute verbal slugfest last night at the school board with collective bargaining for teachers doomed to failure.

The County School Board held representatives of the Professional Negotiating Committee that it would wait 30 days before making a "yes" or "no" decision on a professional relations agreement which would guarantee that teachers have the right to talk to the school board.

"I thought you always had that," Board member James Birkmeyer told spokesman Richard Silvers. Silvers cited the need for good communication between teachers and the board and said in the past teachers had not been aware of policies made by the board until they were put into effect.

Silvers went over a three page agreement that would literally give teachers the right to bargain on salaries and other mutual problems.

School Board members took turns picking holes into the proposal with Vice Chairman John Evans the severest critic.

During the membership meeting, some twenty directors will be elected.

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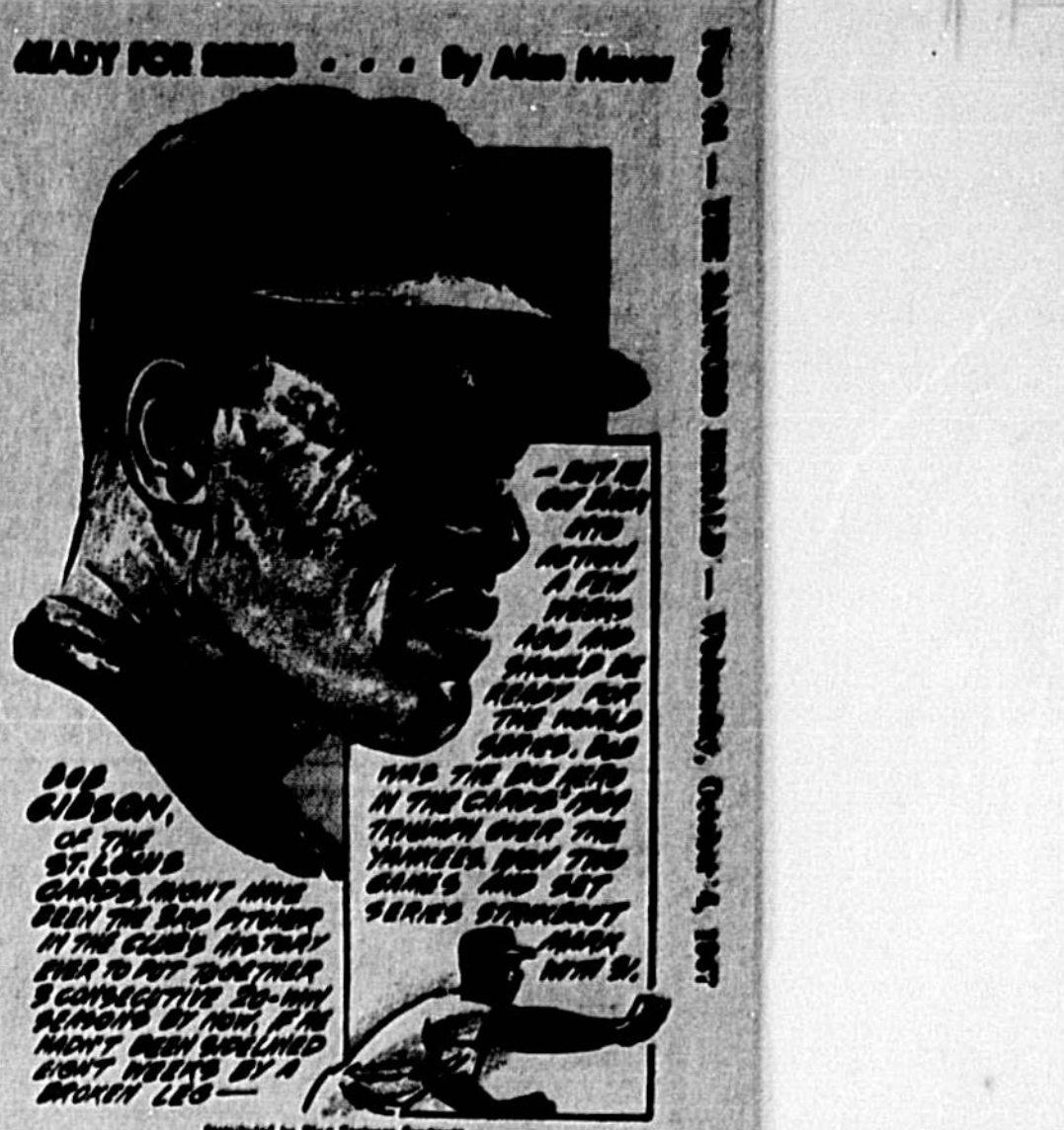
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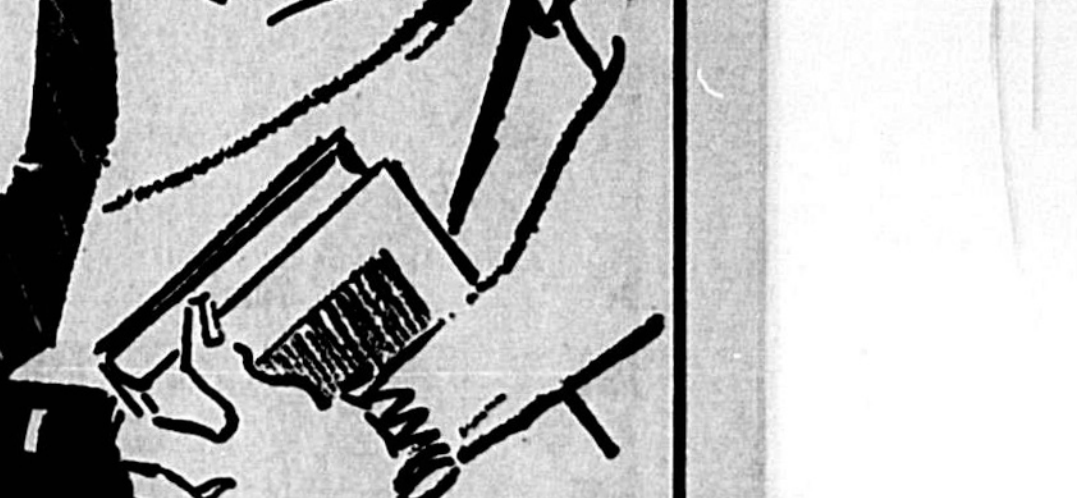
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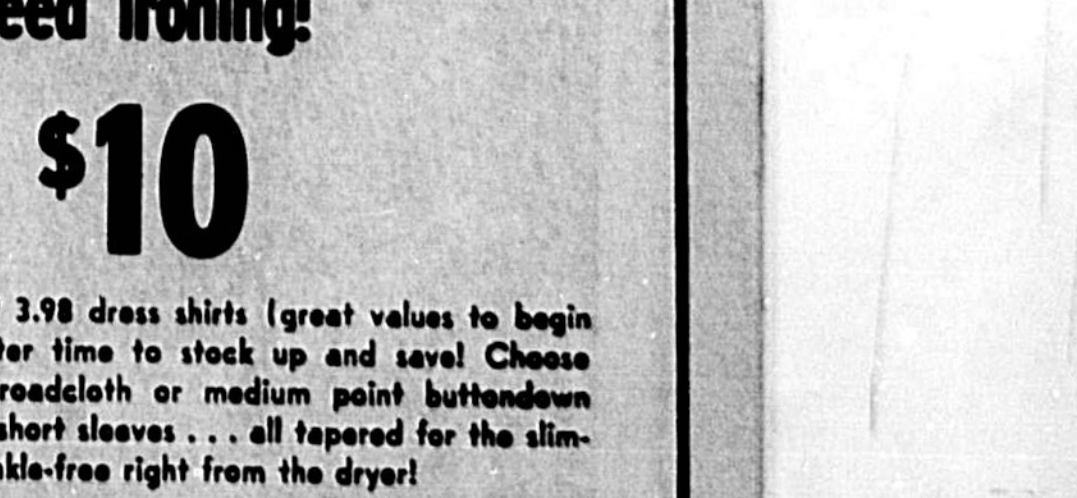

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WW I Debts Owed Uncle Sam Growing



WASHINGTON (AP) — World War I debt owed the United States by 17 nations continues to grow.

A new compilation prepared by the Treasury Department shows that the debt jumped \$324 million because of accumulated interest during the fiscal year which ended June 30.

This brought total debt still owed Uncle Sam from World War I to \$21,958,854,700.70 including unpaid interest.

The original debt was just over \$12 billion.

Finland, as she has in the past, continued to make payments on her debt—\$28,968,000 during the last fiscal year—and is the only nation not behind in payments. She still owes \$1,000,000.

There also were developments with Greece this past year which resulted in settlement of \$100 U. S. loan of \$10 million included as part of World War I debt. It was used to resettle Greek refugees from Asia Minor.

The settlement agreement provides for full repayment of the loan plus partial repayment of interest.

Proceeds will be used for cultural and educational exchanges between the two countries.

But there appears little hope at the moment for repayment or settlement of the debt owed by other countries.

Two countries—Cuba and Liberia—repaid their World War I debts while that of Nicaragua was canceled by a 1958 agreement.

After The New Wave Comes The Deluge

PARIS (AP) — "They always say the cinema is in a crisis," French Culture Minister Andre Malraux observed a couple of years ago. "Only, like the sun, it reappears the next morning."

But, by all indications, the French film industry is still waiting for the sun to rise.

It's faced with stiff competition from television, rising costs and a shrinking audience.

Since 1957 annual movie attendance in France has fallen from 41 million to 22 million. At the same time, production costs have more than doubled.

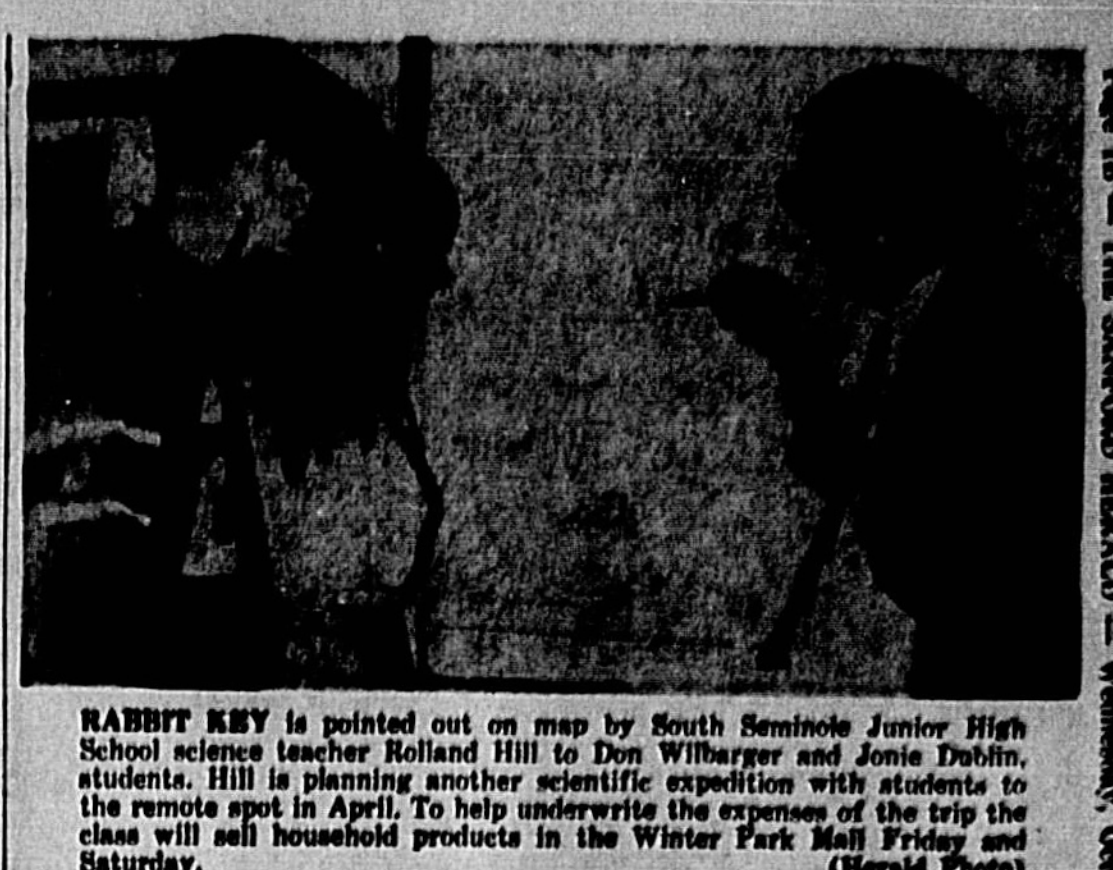

The privilege would enable them to park free at designated spaces for as long as they want in areas where other parking is a parking meter charge and are limited to one or two hours. But the special parking privilege will cost \$5 a year.

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Latin-Type Tossed Salad

Treat For Girl Friend

Next time your current flame invites you over for dinner, offer to make the salad. You can put on quite a show, even if you feel you're all thumbs when it comes to cooking. Treat her to a Latin-type tossed salad. Buy a head of lettuce, a bunch of celery, two tomatoes, two carrots (skinny ones), a small bottle of olive oil, a bottle of wine vinegar (nothing else will do), a few green onions (some people call them scallions) and a small jar of garlic powder. The girl friend won't mind supplying the salt and pepper.

Ask her whether she has a salad bowl. If she doesn't use this opportunity to get one. It's an attractive and useful gift and should guarantee you another invitation. She may not be wild about you, but she'll adore your salad.

Ready? Here we go.

Take off any blemished outer leaves from the head of lettuce and throw them away. Now, leaf by leaf, put more than enough lettuce in the bowl for two healthy portions. You can tear, pull, or cut the lettuce—but make the pieces large enough to spear with a fork. (The go-to-the-dickens tearing method is the most impressive.)

Cut the tomatoes into fourths, then cut each piece in half; toss the tomatoes into the salad bowl as you make the final cut. Peel the two skinny carrots with a vegetable peeler, keeping your 18 thumbs out of the way. Cut the carrots into half-inch pieces and toss into the bowl.

Put one of your thumbs over the open end of the bottle of wine vinegar and spritz a little over the salad. Mix and taste again. Be careful with the vinegar because it has a strong flavor and can dominate a salad. You can always add more. When the dressing is right, the salad's ready for the two of you.

To Impress Special Girl ... Cook For Her

 Give her diamonds, buy her fur, but to really impress that special female — cook for her!
 It doesn't have to be a seven-course meal or something that entails much money, time or equipment. But it MUST be something your girl friend would never think of cooking — something a bit exotic. It can be a cup of soup, a salad or a simple main dish.
 So for the second time around, let's make something simple but different: Garlic soup.
 If you've ever bitten into a raw piece of garlic and said, "Light — you were right. But though garlic is pungent, if used properly it can be surprisingly pleasant and can enhance many a dish.
 To get ready, pick up two cans of clear chicken broth, a head of garlic, a small can or bottle of pure olive oil (no substitution here), a small package of macaroni (shells or elbow) and a can of garbanzo (sometimes called chick-peas).
 If your girl friend is in the kitchen, cheer her out. Start an argument so she'll go sulk in another room. Before the evening is over, she'll be putting anyway.
 Now get everything ready. Open the broth and the garbanzo and uncap the olive oil. Take off about four or five cloves of garlic and peel them with a small paring knife.
 Find a pot — something smaller than a tall yet large enough to hold the quantity of the three cans you've opened. Don't bother hunting for a cover to fit — you won't need one.
 Slice the garlic thin or chop it into small pieces. Now you're ready to cook.
 Pour enough olive oil into the pot to amply cover the bottom. Turn the heat to medium; if you don't have an indicator on your stove that means halfway between off and high. When the oil is hot, drop the garlic in and please stand there and watch it. It should be browned, not burned. If the girl friend happens to be peaking, take the pot and swirl it once or twice during the browning process. It looks professional and it turns the garlic.
 When the garlic is brown, pour in both cans of broth. Turn the heat up a bit and bring the broth to a boil; now drop in six ounces of the macaroni and stir a couple of times after it goes in. When the macaroni is done (reading the cooking instructions on the package for the time it should take — about 10 minutes — and check by tasting); pour in the garbanzo — liquid and all. When the soup comes to a boil again, turn off the heat.
 That's it. Now you're ready to dish out your masterpiece.
 Information to demonstrate your culinary knowledge: Garlic is an European bulbous herb and a member of the lily family.

Wilded Lettuce Salad or Wilded Greens actually use the drippings from bacon as part of the dressing. To make this, fry four strips of bacon, cut up, until crisp. Add to this one-fourth cup of vinegar and two tablespoons water. Pour over a quart of washed lettuce or shredded greens tossed with two or three chopped green onions and seasoned with salt and pepper. Garnish with chopped, hard-cooked egg and additional crisp-cooked bacon, if desired.

Bacon can be wrapped around lamb burgers that are about to be broiled as well as two beef burgers patties which enclose a slice of onion, crumbled blue cheese or chopped, stuffed green olives.

Use bacon for wrapping fruits, too, like apple wedges on a skewer, bananas for a meat garnish or peach halves for an entrée.

Here's bacon in an unusual muffin made with applesauce, spiced with cinnamon.

Bacon-Apple Muffins
 8 slices bacon
 2 cups sifted flour
 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
 2 teaspoons baking powder
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 1 egg, beaten
 1-1/2 cup milk
 1/2 cup applesauce

Cook bacon until lightly browned and crisp. Drain, reserving drippings. Break bacon into pieces. Sift together flour, soda, baking powder, salt and cinnamon. Mix together egg, milk, applesauce, 1-3/4 cup bacon drippings and pieces of bacon. Add liquid to dry ingredients and stir only until dry ingredients are moistened. Fill greased 24-inch muffin pans 2/3 full. Bake in a hot oven (400 deg. F) 18 to 20 minutes. Yield: 12 muffins.

Helicopter

ROSWELL, N.M. (AP) — A Roswell electronics firm is coming up with a black box to foil black-clad Viet Cong bringing down U.S. helicopters in Vietnam.

Bill Underhill, president of Electronics Industries, said the device would be placed in the helicopter cockpit to pick up sounds of enemy bullets fired within 50 yards of the helicopter.

The detector would indicate the sounds of fire on the helicopter's control panel and cause a warning noise in the pilot's headset. He said now that noise level in the helicopters is so high that sometimes the aircraft is hit without the pilot knowing his craft is being fired upon.

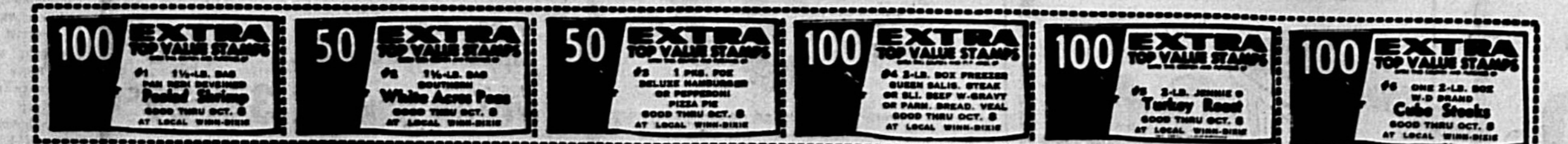

Pork Tenderloin Makes A Treat When Broiled

Sometimes good things come in small packages. You may have heard. This is certainly true of pork tenderloin which weighs a pound or less. This most tender and boneless section of the pork loin has often been roasted whole. It's been cut in patties and broiled on a hot grill or in the range. It's delicious when treated to a broil-on sauce during the cooking for the pork takes easily to special nectars, ginger, soy sauce and lime juice, says Reba Stagg, home economist. This cut, the loin section, is cooked at an internal temperature of 170° F. whether it's just the tenderloin or whole roast. That's well-done for pork loin or tenderloin. Pork Tenderloin, Orientale 2 to 3 pounds pork tenderloin 1 tablespoon ground ginger 1/4 cup brown sugar 1/2 cup soy sauce 1 can (12 ounces) apricot nectar 1/3 cup soy sauce 1 tablespoon lime juice, if desired. Mix ground ginger and sugar. Add apricot nectar, soy sauce and lime juice and mix well. Place tenderloin on grill and cook slowly. Broil on one side about 5 minutes, turn, brush with mixture. Broil second side 5 minutes, turn and brush with mixture. Continue broiling, turning occasionally and brushing with mixture until done, allowing 25 to 30 minutes total cooking time. 6 to 8 servings.

Oviedo Borrows On Water Plan

Temporary loan of \$3,013 from the Citizens Bank of Oviedo to provide interim financing on the new water system for the City of Oviedo was unanimously authorized at the meeting of the City Council. Resolution was also adopted granting contracts for low bids on the system to Meredith Corporation for stage A as \$174,978.11; to Central Florida Well Driller for stage B at \$8,013 and to Cambion Construction Company for \$24,729 for stage C. The bids received prior approval of HUD in Atlanta.

In addition, unsigned leaflets had been distributed. With the clothing short, campus security officers marched the couple, both non-students, to a nearby wagon. They were taken first to Tareval police station and then to the Hall of Justice. The girl, Patricia Gayle Vawter, 18, finally stepped back into her smock at the hall, but her companion remained nude while being booked on charges of indecent exposure and resisting arrest. He gave his name as Adam Feldman, but refused to give his age. He said he was a native of New York City and had lived recently in the Haight-Ashbury hippie district. Miss Vawter also was booked. Asked why he stripped, Feldman quoted a letter he had written to the college paper: "We were all born free . . . why has man imprisoned himself? Why can't everyone just be, and love one another?"

The brick will be unloaded on the old bandshell "island" — after appropriate ceremonies Friday — and then removed to a storage place on West First Street, across from the Florida Power and Light Company's sub-station, on land leased for 18 months from Chase & Company.

Merry Bros. will continue this arrangement until the Port of Sanford is completed on the St. Johns River, across from the FP&L power plant, when it will lease storage space there, shipping its product out by rail and truck.

Kirk Slapped By Jurists Here

The five circuit judges of the 18th Judicial circuit Wednesday threw out the appointment by Gov. Claude Kirk of Norman Robbin as official court reporter terming the appointment "invalid, null and void and of no effect."

In an order filed in the circuit court of both Sanford and Seminole Counties, the judges declared "attempts by Governor Kirk... to appoint someone (as official court reporter) other than recommended by the judges is an attempt to usurp powers inherently vested within the judiciary."

The judges further declared "unconstitutional" Section 28.01 of the Florida Statutes which states, "Such reporter when appointed shall hold office during the pleasure of the governor."

The section is "unconstitutional as in derogation of the Constitutional guarantee of the separation of powers between the branches of government," the judges said.

The jurists (Judge Vassar Carlton, Vice Williams Jr., William Akridge, Tom Waddell Jr. and Roger Dykes) filed orders on Monday at 4:02 p.m. to Sanford and at 4:04 p.m. in Seminole, the circuit judges filed the order striking out the governor's appointment.

The order says, "On Friday, Oct. 6, 1967, Gerald Hager, representing himself to be speaking for the Governor's office, telephoned the court and requested that time be set for a hearing on the proposed order.
