

LONGWOOD - The Longwood City Commission hired John Drago Wednesday as the new city administrator, starting Jan. 4, 1999.

The commission met with Drago in a special session cities and Seminole County



Drago said redevelopment, infrastructure improvements, attracting new business, and retaining businesses are among the city's urgent concerns. He said that at some point the city's borders with neighboring would need to be expanded.

"I think some infrastructure improvements need to be made," Drago said. "A certain amount of redevelopment needs to take place. Longwood may not have the growth potential of some cities, but we can see an improvement. In time, the city may need to expand its boundaries."

Drago's starting salary is \$74,250. Although the city will pay for 100 percent of Drago's health insurance, he will pay 50 percent of the health insurance costs of his dependents. He will receive the same sick days as other city employees.

The annual review process caused contention between Drago and the commission.

Drago objected to a proposed review that would have given the commissioners a choice between a) below expectations, b) meets expectations, or c) exceeds expectations.

Such a review, without goals and measurements, would allow for subjective judgments based Pience see Drage, Page 24.

Local veteran shares views on Iraq bombing

WINTER SPRINGS - As the United States conducted strategic air strikes against Iraq on Wednesday in the shadow of impeachment hearings, a Winter Springs Vietnam Veteran remembers a lesson painfully learned.

"I don't think this should be turned into a political football," retired Lt. Jerry Hefketh, 54, said. "That's what people are trying to do, but this was done with the 100 percent backing of his cabinet, including the Secretary of Defense and Joint Chiefs of Staff. This is not done for politics, it's more important. I hope they don't fal-

ter.'

The horror of a biological or chemical weapon is that as a soldier, you have no idea that it has been released until it's too late. You have no warning."

Wednesday's attack was limited to air strikes against military targets in Iraq. Hethketh said he wants to see the military goal clearly stated and executed.

"We're knocking out antiaircraft launchers and other sites," Hethketh said. -We should be aggressive. We know Iraq is capable of creating weapons of mass destruction."

What worries Hethketh is that as of late Wednesday night. Britain was the only European country to support the air strikes. Russia had not voiced support or opposition to the

strike.

The Seminole County Sherill's Office has issued an alert warning citizens in the south end of Seminole County to be aware of distraction burglars.

Four white males, possibly Hispanics, posed as Florida Power and Light employees trimming trees in the District 5 area (Casselberry/Winter Park) on Dec. 15 between 4 and 5 p.m. and stole several thousand dollars worth of jewelry, coins (silver dollars) and cash.

Hefketh served in the Navy for 21 years, including an 18month tour in Vietnam. He said the destruction of Iraq's capacity to create nuclear, chemical and biological weapons is in the national interest.

We can't allow him to spread these weapons of mass destruction to countries around him," Hefketh said of Iraqi President Saddam Hussein.

Russia and France have supported the easing of sanctions imposed on Iraq following the Persian Gulf War. Both nationa depend on cheap oil from the region, and lifting sanctions would possibly lower the price of oil.

Airline adds plane to fleet in Sanford

SANFORD - A charter airline is expanding its fleet and building a new terminal facility in the Orlando Sanford Airport. Sunjet Aviation Inc. added a Lear Jet 31 and Citation V to its charter fleet at the airport on Wednesday. Sunjet, now operating nine jets at the airport, is constructing a new 23,000 square foot terminal facility that will open May 1, 1999.

We're increasing our fleet because demand has increased significantly," James Watkins, vice president and general manager of Sunjet Aviation, Inc. said. "The airport and the surrounding area is rapidly expanding. The planes we have now are as busy as they can

Sunjet's business jets seat 6-8 people. The airline grossed \$6 million in sales this year, Watkins said. He said that with the expansion, he expects the airline to gross \$9 million next year.

Sunjet's expansion follows the recent loss of Britannia Airlines to the Orlando Airport, accounting for 20 percent of the airport's passengers. Britannia Please see Airport, Page 3A

The way we were: Who's who

I recently received a copy of a special edition of the Sanford Herald dated April 29, 1933 which is entitled "Who's Who in Sanford 1933". In it are pictures and biographies of a large number of "those most prominently associated with the city's business life". A more complete list was promised in a second edition as space was limited. There are 112 biographies, only six of which are of women.

I knew several of these people and knew of many more 1 was not yet born in 1933, so is interesting to see young pictures of these people who I remember as much older. Most were about the age of my parents or older. so my contact with them would have been limited, such as at church, merchants, Kiwanis friends of my dad and the like.

I will give you a short blography of several of these today and in future columns. If I know more about a person. I'll add that. I'm sure that many of you will also remember these people and can perhaps give me further information.

Karl Lehman

Karl Lehman came to Sanford in October 1931 to assume the position of Seminole **County Chamber of Commerce** secretary. He was considered to be one of the leading Chamber secretaries in Florida.

Mr. Lehman was born Oct. 5, 1887 in Oconomowoc, Wisconsin and received his education there and in New Mexico. After coming to Florida, he received an honorary LLD degree from Rollins College.

He had been national secretary of the Christian Endeavor. vice president of the Montverde School, and was secretary of the Orange **County Chamber of Commerce** for a number of years. It was stated that he was largely responsible for the development and progress of the latter.

His civic organization memberships included the Masonic Lodge and honorary Kiwanian. Rotarian and Lion.

Mr. Lehman and his wife. the former Helen Shafer, resided at 108 West Sixth Street and attended the First Presbyterian Church.



H.H. Coleman

H.H. Coleman had come to Sanford the previous December as local manager of the Florida Power and Light Company. He was married to the former frene Thayer and they made their home at 461 Mellonwville Avenue

Mr. Coleman was born in Lykens, Pa. where he had received his schooling and he also attended an electrical school in Washington. DC. He belonged to the Masonic

Order, Elks, Rotary, Chamber of Commerce and Holy Cross Episcopal Church.

J.G. Michael

A resident of Sanford since 1919, J.G. Michael was considered to be one of the best informed and most experienced man in the wholesale. produce business. He had recently taken over the management of the only open air curb market in Sanford which was located at Second Street and Palmetto Avenue. It was known as the Manhattan Market.

Mr. Michael was a native of Fort Pierce and attended Columbia College in Lake City, II believe this later became University of Florida.)

The former Gall Stewart was his wife and they had two children. James Calvin and Mary Gray. The family attended First Presbyterian Church. Mr. Gray's hobbies included reading, golf and collecting old coins.

If did not know Mr. Michael, but I knew his daughter. Mary Gray. She was solo clarinetist in the Seminole High Band the year I was in the eighth grade. Once a week, our bandmaster, Bernard Black, would take a few of us from the junior high band to practice with the SHS band. Occasionally I would share a stand with Mary Gray and feel very intimidated as

she was such an excellent player. I enjoyed playing with the second or third clarinets much more! Mary Gray was always kind and helpful, though, to us young players.) Leonard McLucas

Leonard McLucas was the young and capable athletic director at Seminole High School where he had had remarkable success in molding the lives and characters of hovs since 1930.

A native of Lakeland, McLucas came to Sanford in 1905. While a student at Seminole High 1918-23, he was the only local student to win five major sports letters in one year. (Does this record still stand?) During his last three years, he won 15 letters.

During his four years at the University of Florida, he won sty letters in football, baseball, basketball and swimming. He was considered one of Coach Bachman's most apt football players

Coach McLucas was a Mason and a member of Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity. He attended First Presbyterian Church. He resided at 2628 Sanford Avenue with his stepfather and mother, Mr. and Mrs. C.F. Reese.

(McLucas graduated from Seminole High in 1923 with my mother. Marie Stemper. and they would have been on the SHS faculty together in 1933. Rodman Lehman, also of the class of 1923, was on the faculty then, too. McLucas remained at SHS until 1943.

The quote by his picture in the 1923 Salmagundi reads "He is one of the best athletes SHS has ever had. However, when Leonard chooses his vocation, he should make sure that he treats it like he has athletics not as he has school work.'

His high school activities included Literary Society, Class Vice President, swimming, basketball, football, baseball and track teams. He was captain of each team at least one year, usually more. Information by his football picture gives his weight as 125 and height as five feet eight inches. It stated that he was one of the most skillful quarterbacks in the state, that he had a cool head and was a sure and hard tackler.)

Airport Boulevard/Hidden Lake, Dec. 15. 3:14 p.m. A 25-year-old man and a 20-year-old man were arrested for possession of cocaine with the intent to distribute and with possession of 17 grams of crack cocaine by Seminole County sheriff's officers. Deputies said undercover agents, working through an informant, arranged to buy \$800 worth of crack from the men. They met at the arranged place and made the agreed-upon exchange. The men left the sale location, but were arrested a short distance away by deputies.

Drivers can have a say in future

TAMPA - The holidays are a time for family get-togethers, a time when young and old family members join together to celebrate life and hope for the future.

Unfortunately, each year many young family members are dying in motor vehicle crashes - the leading cause of death for people ages 6 to 27.

"We call them crashes, not accidents, because they are preventable, which makes the number of deaths all the more tragic," said Yoli Buss, director of traffic safety for AAA Auto Club South.

In 1997, 16,189 people died in alcohol-related craahes, accounting for nearly 40 percent of the total traffic fatalities for the year. "This means a member of someone's family died in an alcohol-related crash every 32 minutes. Another was injured in an alcohol-related crash every two minutes," Buss said.

Not only are families endangered by intoxicated drivers but the future is also at risk.

Almost 30 percent of the 15 to 20-year-old drivers killed in motor vehicle crashes in 1997 had been drinking. That same year, 21 percent of the children under age 15 were killed in alcohol-related crashes. Of these children killed, 93 weren't even in vehicles. They were pedestrians or pedalcyclists struck by drunk drivers.

"Who knows how many of them were future doctors, lawyers, congressmen, parents?" asked Buss. "The safety of these children - our future - is in our hands, from the driving instructor, to the parent, to the convenience store clerk who

"Another way you can take a stand is by being a responsible host when you entertain guests at a holiday party. Serve only non-alcoholic beverages or make sure that guests have a designated driver selected before serving them alcoholic beverages. As a driver during the holiday driving season, choose not to drink and drive," said Buss.

"What can we do to safeguard the future?" Buse continued. "As adults, encourage the young people you know not to mix drinking and driving. Since young driver fatalities often result because of the deadly mix of driver inexperience and alcohol consumption, get involved with your young driver's training. Help them hone their skills by carefully steering them through behind-the-wheel training. Contact your local AAA office for information on obtaining the two novice driver learning tools, The Cool Way to Learn and Teaching Your Teen to Drive and help teach your young driver how to stay safe during the holiday season."

As Russia's economy faiters, the minority communist party is blaming Western nations including the United States for the country's troubles, while calling for strong relations with nations in the Middle East. President Boris Yeltsin has urged Iraq to comply with sanctions, but has not commented yet on Wednesday's strike.

"I'm more worried about Russla than about Iraq," Hethketh said. "No one said anything against what we did as of 7 p.m. I think the nations are waiting to see what happens. I don't think they want to commit right now, one way or the other."

Eight Muslim nations recently urged Iraq to comply unconditionally with the sanctions. However, Hesketh is concerned strike, as of 7 p.m. that night. The Muslim holy month of Ramadan will begin this weekend, making this week the last time the U.S. could strike for another month without upsetting the Muslim world.

"That's why I feel the decision to do this was made now," Hethketh said. "Ramadan is bigger to them than the birth of Christ is to us."

Hethketh said he is confident in Clinton's abilities as commander-in-chief.

"He has proven his leadership," Hefketh said. "He's the commander-in chief. Unless he tells us to do something that goes against all the rules, it's our duty in the military to follow. That's the way a lot of the older people in the military look at this." "I can juggle one ball, two balls, or even three balls at a time," Drago said. "At some point, anyone comes to a limit. Of all the projects that are ongoing, I would like the commission to prioritize the ones you want done first. I want to be evaluated based on desired outcomes, and attained goals as







PART II OF 2 PARTS

Last week we discussed how restrictions on the use of property are usually established, who may enforce them, and we mentioned the three requirements to enforcement: 1) notice; 2) reasonable demand for compliance: and 3) compliance with any applicable procedural due process considerations. These requirements are explained below.

The first requirement to enforcement of a restrictive covenant is that the alleged violator must receive notice of the existence of the restriction prior to enforcement of the restriction. There are three types of notice, express actual, implied actual, and constructive, and they are described as follows.

Express actual notice exists when the owner of the property has been informed that a particular restriction exists. An example of express actual notice would be receipt of a copy of the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions, or similar document, by the buyer, when purchasing the property. The other type of actual notice, implied actual



How property restrictions are established

notice, also known as inquiry notice, exists when there are facts that would have made a reasonable person aware of particular restrictions from inspection of the subdivision. For example, if a subdivision consists of single family homes, an owner is likely to be on notice that he or she may not use the property for commercial purposes.

The third type of notice, constructive notice, also known as record notice, is different from actual notice in that it is a legal inference that imputes knowledge to the owner by virtue of the restriction appearing on the owner's chain of title. In other words, if a restrictive covenant was recorded on a prior deed of the same propcharged with notice. This notice would be valid even if the owner's current deed did not include the restriction.

In addition to receiving notice, the homeowners' association or grantee must provide a reasonable demand for compliance with the restriction after the breach has occurred. But what is a reasonable demand for compliance? There is no clear cut rule as to what is a reasonable demand for compliance; reasonable demand for compliance is case specific and depends on the circumstances surrounding the breach. For example, absent a defense, demand for removal of a basketball hoop within 10 days is likely to be reasonable, whereas demand for repainting of a house, painted in a color not permitted by covenant, within 10 days is probably not reasonable.

In addition to receiving notice and a reasonable demand for compliance with the restriction after breach, the property owner must be afforded compliance with any applicable procedural due process considerations which require no-

erty, the owner would be tice of the commencement of the litigation and an opportunity to be heard in court. In other words, an injunction or . award of damages may not be entered against a property owner regardless of how blatant the breach may be, unless and until the property owner has an opportunity to present his or her side of the story in court.

The law allows for the placement of restrictions on what an owner can do with his or her property. However, before a restrictive covenant may be enforced against a property owner, the property owner must be alforded notice, a reasonable demand for compliance, and compliance with any applicable procedural due process considerations. In the coming weeks we will discuse the defenses available against enforcement of restrictive covenants as well as other aspecta of property law

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am a 23-year old woman who has experienced epileptic seizures for 15 years. Although I'm on Tegretol, the seizures are getting out of control. Is there any surgery that will control my epilepsy?

DEAR READER: I don't know. That is a decision best left to the judgment of your neurologist and a neurosurgeon. Some forms of epilepsy are surgically curable, but most are not. A more useful approach would be to have your neurologist prescribe other anti-convulsant drugs, of which there are many.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My healthy, 65year-old husband has suffered two brief episodes of short-term memory loss in the last four months. What could be the cause?

DEAR READER: Transient shortterm memory loss, without any other neurological deficits, can be challenging to diagnose in a healthy person. It can be caused by many problems. including nerve diseases, small blood clots, arterial spasm, heartbeat abnormalities and brain disorders, such as Alzheimer's disease. Your husband needs a meticulous neurological examination, blood tests and a CT (or MHI) scan to determine why he has had difficulty. In many cases, once the cause is identified, treatment can prevent long-term memory loss and other serious manifestations of brain dysfunction
