## TWO DIE WHEN CAR RUNS OFF MONROE SPAN

Jacksonville Men, Returning From Sanford On Business Take Fatal Plunge

E. B. Juhns and Eugene P. Rutledge, of Jacksonville, were drowned last night about 7:30 o'clock when their car, a new Ford sport roadster, crashed over the side of the Monroe bridge into the St. Johns River.

The two men are said to have been traveling at a moderate rate of speed, when their car skidded and crashed over the bridge into 2 feet of water. The car overturned and pinned the driver and his companion beneath it under the water. Several persons arriving on the scene of the accident shortly after it happened, dove into the water in an attempt to rescue the men according to Sheriff J. F. McChlann, who said that Leon County Sheriff D. C. Bassing was notified of the accident last night and rushed to the bridge in time to see the two dead men caught upon the shore, where efforts of resuscitation were徒劳无功.

## SINO-RUSSIAN SQUABBLE HAS BEEN SETTLED

Treaty Is Signed Between Two Nations Ending Railway Row Accented By Shots

MOSCOW, Dec. 23.—(INS)—The two nations of Russia and China signed a treaty of peace this morning, ending the long-standing dispute between the two countries over the Manchurian railway.

The signing of the treaty, which had been suspended since October 25, was preceded by a formal exchange of shots between Chinese and Russian troops.

A statement of the Russian Foreign Ministry said the two countries will now work together to settle the dispute over the Manchurian railway.

Germany's vote is anticipated in the coming session of the Reichstag, and disappointed German officials are continuing negotiations with the Italian delegation, thought to be strong supporters of the German proposal.

At the same time, the German delegation, which has been here since Oct. 25, is engaged in negotiations with Washington, D. C., officials, disappointed with the Senate's failure to ratify the U. S. plan.

## SOUTH IS HELD IN ICY GRIP OF COLD WEATHER

Snows, Sleet And Sub-freezing Temperatures Extend Over Entire Dixie Areas

ATLANTA, Dec. 23.—(INS)—Snow, sleet and sub-freezing temperatures gripped the South today from the Carolinas to Texas and from Virginia to the southern tip of Georgia and the ordinarily warm Gulf Coast states.

Some small towns were left in complete darkness. Inter-tel was reported in telephone and telegraph communication. Numerous automobile accidents were reported over the weekend as a result of ice-coated highways.

The death from exposure was reported in Union, S. C., and another at New Orleans. Ten persons were killed in an automobile wreck in Atlanta. A number of animals were marooned in their hay bales.

The heavy snowfall in the mountains reported in the vicinity of Colorado, Ark., where 17 inches fell near the Gulf Coast regions of Mississippi and Louisiana, continued throughout the day.

Continued cold was the forecast for the day, many sections facing the prospect of a white Christmas.

CHICAGO, Dec. 23.—(INS)—Several inches of falling snow, the remains of a predicted return of last week's paralyzing cold, today gave this region a taste of a white Christmas. ## Benny Bass Defeats Ted Morgan To Win 130-Pound Boxing Title By Knockout

**NEW YORK,** Dec. 21.—A Russian immigrant boy whose real name probably can't be pronounced without a consernation is the 130-pound champion of the world today.

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—An ex-champion of the world, a baseball club owner, a multi-million dollar corporation, the proprietor of a Broadway night club and a couple of bright young men associated with him were playing cut-throat today over the only prize that boxing possibly can sponsor.

The prize in question was the Jack Sharkey-Max Schmeling fight this summer for the world's heavyweight championship, an event that can mean either an event or a financial hole in one.

So today we find Jack Dempsey over in a corner whispering with Charles A. Stompan about the Polo Grounds; the Madison Square Garden, generally to a fault, has decided to give its faithful followers a Christmas present. True, the gift will come a little late—nine days to be exact—Jan. 3, to be more exact—and the boys and girls will have to pay for it, but, after all, it's the spirit of the thing.

On that night Jackie Field, welterweight champion of the world, will defend his title against the underlings of young Jack Thompson, the Franciscan negro boxer, in a 15-round bout. Tom McArdle, garden bookholder, has announced. The deal was closed yesterday when Big Rooney, manager of the champion, wired his acceptance of the terms. Contracts for the signature of Rooney and McArdle are now on their way to Chicago and will be filed with the state commission as soon as they are returned here.


a loan is not contingent upon any purpose and this amount is increasing annually. It is a private Masonic or Templar relationship.
