SANFORD — Pan American Airways will substantially cut service in and out of Orlando Sanford International Airport beginning next week.

The cuts, which begin Sept. 14, are in response to declining demand throughout the airline industry, a Pan Am official said.

"You can't pick up a newspaper without reading about the troubles in the industry," said Dan Fortnam, vice president of marketAirline will reduce flights and eliminate destinations, including Newark

"Airlines are in very hard times right now," Fortnam added. "We need to be able to respond quickly, and we're cutting frequency pretty seriously."


Discussion concerning a new fire station has circulated within city government for several years. In 2000, \$189,000 was allocated in the city's fiscal year budget to begin design studies for the new facility.

We obviously need a new fire station," Lake Mary Mayor Thom Greene said. "The old fire station is totally insufficient for the growing needs of our fire department. The structure is not up to current code. It is a metal building that has outlived its usefulness, and it is not capable of handling what our department

Preliminary design proposals include a 20,000 square-foot facility that will house administra-tion, building and safety staff and emergency response equip-ment crews. Plans include demolishing the department's current facility on Rinehart Road and constructing a new building on the site. Temporary facilities will house emergency crews while the new station is under construction.

Nearly two dozen alleged drug dealers were arrested Thursday during a pre-dawn operation that resulted in federal and state drug charges.

Thursday's arrests were the result of a four-month investigation by the Seminole County Sheriff's Office and the Drug

Enforcement Agency.

Members of the DEA Mobile Enforcement Team (MET) along with detectives and officers of the Seminole County Sheriff's office began working undercover in late May, making purchases of "crack" cocaine, concentrating their efforts in Altamonte Springs, Casselberry, Oviedo, Midway and Sanford.

During the operation, several loosely knit crack cocaine trafficking organizations were identified and investigated. On Thursday, local and federal agents fanned out throughout Seminole County in the predawn hours to arrest dozens of defendants wanted on both state and federal drug charges

"This partnership with DEA, the U.S. Attorney's office and State Attorney's office will have a major impact on those who choose to pedal crack cocaine in our community," Eslinger said. "These dealers are looking at several years in either state or federal prisons thanks to this team

All of those arrested Thursday on federal charges face up to 20 years in federal prison, and several are facing a minimum of five


State, local officials gather to unveil Ronald Reagan Boulevard street sign

Motorists driving along County Road 427 may have noticed new signs honoring the 40th president of the United States.

Local and state officials gathered Wednesday at the intersection of CR 427 and Country Club Road to unveil one of the signs, which proclaims the road "Ronald Reagan Boulevard." The change includes a 9.8-mile segment of road that runs from State Road 436 in Altamonte Springs to Lake

Mary Boulevard in Sanford.
"This is in honor of a great president," U.S. Rep. John Mica said

during the dedication ceremony. "Today is a special day. It honors an individual who gave so much to this nation."

When Reagan became president, this country was in despair, " state Sen. Lee Constantine said. "This man gave us eight years of prosperity and growth.

"He gave us hope, and this country is so much better because he was president," Constantine said. "It is appropriate that today we remember him."

Seminole The County Commission in July unanimously approved the name change. The Altamonte Springs, Casselberry, Lake Mary, Longwood and Sanford city commissions also approved renaming the road, and many of the cities' officials were in attendance Wednesday to witness

the unveiling.
Before County Commission approved the measure in July, 300 property owners in the effected CR 427 area were notified of the

Given the city's recent history with contract awards, I'm not betting on it until it actually happens. Under the city's purchasing policy, all bidders have until 5 p.m. Monday to fill a protest regarding why Wharton-Smith should not receive the contract. Not protests ... yet.

A little help from friends: Speaking of the Riverwalk, Mayor Brady Lessard said he has identified about \$1.4 million in savings for construction of Riverwalk. That's significant because Wharton-Smith's base

bid is about \$1.7 million more than the city has banked in state and federal money to fund the project. Add in the extras like a trailhead building and major renovations at Memorial Park and the deficit nears \$3 million.

Lessard will unveil those cost cutting measures Monday.

Whether the savings are viable without harming the integrity of the project remains to be seen. What's significant about Lessard's proposal is the assistance he's received.

Dave Gierach, who heads the operations at CPH Engineering, faxed a list of value-engineering ideas to Lessard. CPH, you'll recall, was one of the bidders for Riverwalk. In fact, they were the most expensive of the four with a bid of \$15 million.

"Dave had some ideas about reducing costs and said we could use whatever we wanted," Lessard said.

I don't know about you, but that's a strong move by the folks at CPH. The cynics out there will claim this Gierach is playing some kind of angle. I disagree. I'm a pretty big cynic (as regular readers of this column can attest), but I honestly believe this is a prime example of civic pride. Gierach had nothing to gain but respect, and he allowed him that in spaces. A lot of businesses taken bout being "good neighbors." CPH acts like one

Sanford's blessed with several great corporate citizens - Wayne Densch, Bill Heard Chevrolet, and Central Florida Regional Hospital just to name three that quickly come to mind — and a bushel full of small businesses that exhibit the same pride in community as Gierach. Hats off to all of you. And thanks for that list, Dave.

The money pit: There's a debate going on whether the city should fund downtown organizations to promote and help revitalize downtown.

Some, like Downtown Community Redevelopment Agency Chairman John Mercer, advocate financially supporting Sanford Main Street Inc. Others, like Sara Jacobson, are pushing for the Downtown Business Association to take a lead role.


Add a third name to the mix. Word Around The Clock is that Angelia Gordon and the Sanford Chamber of Commerce will make a bid Monday night to take over activities such as Octoberfest and the monthly car cruises, as well as business recruitment duties. The price? \$25,000 annually, which is much less than either Main Street or DBA hope to receive.

Having the chamber take over downtown promotion may be a good idea. Gordon has certainly made a difference at the chamber after a rocky start.

The real question is should the city continue to fund organizations that could and should be supported by private dollars? Personally I think government can play a role in revitalization efforts, but to date, Sanford has received little bang for its buck. At some point, downtown has to help itself. That's not happening because each clique wants its piece of the pie, usually at the expense of some other clique.

Sharply curtail or eliminate taxpayer money and those organizations that are worthy will find a way to succeed.



Don't forget to vote on Tuesday

The word is out. For the second consecutive weekend, the Seminole Herald is publishing the ballot for Tuesday's Democratic and Republican primary elections. As you flip through the pages of the paper looking for news items that interest you, please don't just pass them by. Take the time to read the ballot.

These are the names of people who are seeking election to our government positions which will affect us all. Some of the names may be very familiar while there are probably many you have never heard of. Yet, who knows, this person whose name doesn't ring a bell, may be better qualified.

Every person on the ballot deserves your thoughts and consid-

For whom will you be voting: a friend, a neighbor, the incumbent, the newcomer, someone your friends suggest, or perhaps someone who has done you a favor?

Perhaps you will be voting AGAINST someone — regardless of who might be in opposition. Could it be someone who you believe has done you wrong, an incumbent who voted against a measure you wanted to be passed, a newcomer who doesn't have the qualifications to serve in that office, perhaps someone who has run negative ads or doesn't seem to live up to the principles or ethics you want in an elected official?

If a person does not have opposition from another party, this Tuesday's election could be decisive. If there is opposition, your candidate will be facing the general election in November.

In past years, I have personally questioned people about why they voted for a particular candidate. After a while, I wasn't surprised at some of the answers: "Oh, he (or she) is better looking," "I didn't like the person so I voted against him or her, just to keep him out of office," "The candidate had more signs out, and I recognized the name on the ballot," or, "It's time women took control so I'm voting for all females, regardless of their qualifications."


These are NOT the reasons to cast votes. There are those working in Seminole County who live elsewhere. It is also highly important that they review their ballots before going into that voting booth. Sometimes we have a tendency to think of where we work as where we live, and pay more attention to those candidates, rather than our own.

Seminole County Elections Supervisor Sandra Goard has predicted the turnout of eligible voters in Seminole County Tuesday will be light. "I'm predicting 14 percent of the voters will turn out," she said, "but I certainly hope I'm way below in my estimate." If only 14 percent turn out to vote, we are allowing just a few people to determine the leadership of all of us.

The primaries come just one day before we observe the first anniversary of the disasters at the World Trade Center, Pentagon, and that field in Pennsylvania. Remember that time? All of us suddenly became extremely patriotic. In fact, President Bush has declared September 11 as "Patriots' Day."

Continued from Page 1A marketing and operating the

flights, particularly in Newark, are high.
"We analyzed each of our desti-

nations and made a decision based on what was in the best business interests," Fortnam said. "We plan to revisit those decisions in November.

The company has already laid off or cut hours for employees, though Fortnam was tight-lipped about specific numbers.

"We're pretty stingy with those

types of numbers," Fortnam said. "I wouldn't classify it as substantial cuts, but there have been across-the-board reductions in our work force.

Pan Am was founded in 1927 by Juan Terry Trippe and set a number of "firsts" in the airline industry. It was the first U.S. airline to offer scheduled international flights (Key West to Havana, Cuba), recorded the first transpacific and transatlantic passenger flights and was the first to use jet airplanes for passenger service.

In recent years, however, Pan Am has faced financial troubles. The Pan Am name is in its third incarnation after company officials filed for bankruptcy in 1991 and 1997. Guilford Transportation Industries - lead by David Fink and Timothy Mellon, heir to the Mellon family banking fortune bought Pan Am's assets for \$28.5 million in 1998. The company's strategy has focused on providing service to small regional airports, Orlando Sanford International, that are not served

by the major carriers.

Pan Am's current troubles are not a reflection on the company's business plan, Fortnam said, but are part of a trend in the airline industry.

"The market is extremely different from a year ago, and certainly different than when we began,' Fortnam said. "We're going to stay in the markets we're serving, but there's no point in burning fuel if we don't have the passengers. If we don't need to run twice a day, we're going to cut back."

Fortnam said the cuts in service are not an early indicator the company plans to file for bankruptcy, a point echoed by Sanford Airport Authority President Larry Dale.

"Mr. Fink assures me that Pan Am is not getting out of the business," Dale said. "Pan Am is still going to have a presence in

Dale said he is unsure of what effects Pan Am's cuts will have on the Sanford airport.

"They're still formulating their plans and have not shared with me

all of the particulars," Dale said. "I don't know what impact it might have for us, but we're always recruiting other airlines to Sanford. Any negative effects, I believe, will

only be temporary. Fortnam, too, believes the cuts in service will be temporary. Reservations for November and December are picking up, though he doesn't expect demand will warrant the return of service at Pan

Am's current capacity. "This is a way for us to regroup until demand returns," Fortnam said.

Greyhounds suffer frustrating setback

ORLANDO — It was one of those maddeningly frustrating nights for the Lyman High School football teams where a handful of plays were all that kept the Greyhounds from inspired season-opening victory.

Instead, the Greyhounds left Boone High School on the short end of a 14-6 score.

"We just made too many mistakes," said Lyman coach Bill Caughell. "Every time we got something going, we'd shoot ourselves in the foot.

'To our credit, we didn't give up. We were down 14-0 in the first quarter and we kept battling back. We were in it until the final play. We just made too many mistakes. We're going to have to work on our execution."

Basically, five plays were what separated Lyman from a victory over the defending 5A-District 3 champion Boone Braves.

In the first quarter, Boone running back

Jonathan Hurt pinballed his way through the Greyhound defense for a 65-yard touchdown run. A fumble on fourth-and-goal from the Boone 1yard line killed a Lyman drive in the second quar-

On the series following Jett Mulligan's 20-yard return of a fumble recovery that put the Greyhounds on the board, Lyman had a chance to pin Boone deep in its own territory. But the Braves used a 23-yard pass play to convert on a third-and-12 situation from their own 19.

Early in the fourth quarter, Lyman quarterback Victor Johnson suffered a foot injury that sidelined him for the rest of the game. Later in the period, a fumble (which the Greyhounds managed to recover) and a slip in the backfield on successive plays inside the Boone 40-yard line

derailed Lyman's last bid to tie the score. An examination of the statistics shows that after Hurt's touchdown on the second play from scrimmage, the two offenses were almost dead even. Lyman accumulated 151 yards while Boone amassed 170 yards.

"You have to give Boone credit," said Caughell, whose team was outnumbered by an almost 2-to-1 margin by the Braves but still was matching their hosts hit for hit until the final whistle. "We made mistakes and they capitalized on them."

J.J. Bass highlighted the Lyman rushing attack with 92 yards on 22 carries while Johnson contributed 34 yards on nine carries before being sidelines. Travo Woods had four carries for 21 yards. Kyle Harris chipped in with four yards on six carries filling in for Johnson at quarterback.

Hurt led the Braves with a game-high 112 yards and two touchdowns on 12 carries.

The Greyhounds open the home portion of their season next Friday when the Lake Brantley Patriots come calling at the Carlton D. Henley Sports Complex starting at 7:30 p.m.


Logan finds humor in almost all aspects of life

Garage sale tale inspires first book

Dee Logan never wanted to be a writer. That's why she's still surprised when people refer to her as Fern Park's very own Erma Bombeck.

"When people compare me to Erma Bombeck, it gives me the most wonderful feeling," Logan said. "It's the greatest thing I can imagine - being compared to her."
Like Bomback, who
became one of the world's most beloved humor columnists before her death in 1996, Logan writes about life's amusing side. Where people find the mundane, the self-proclaimed "bud-



during one of her regular outings. She had no use for the item, but she paid \$20 to take it home with her. "I didn't know why I bought it," Logan said. "When I got home, I remembered something I learned in a literature class – If you want to find out why you did something, write about it. So, I wrote about it."

After Logan finished the short essay, she showed it to her husband, Kit. He was so amused by the story, he told his wife to write about other subjects. She received the same suggestion from her sister.
"I asked them what I should write about," Logan

said. "And then I realized the world is my oyster. ! started to write about everything."

One story became a stack of stories. Logan began sharing her work with more people, including a friend in the publishing business.

"He thought it was worth a book," Logan said. "I couldn't believe it. I never meant to write a book. I

wondered why anyone would want to read my stuff."
Logan approached Maitland's Legacy Publishing,
who agreed to publish the humor columns. A cover was created, and an artist was hired to draw pictures to go along with the stories.

Last year, the first edition of "Hey, Wait a Minute" down the east coast for book signings. She has also held book discussions for various groups in several

major cities, including Atlanta.

As a result of the book's popularity, Logan's publisher has asked her to write two more. Once finished, the collection of columns will appropriately be titled "Hey, Wait Another Minute," and "Hey, Just One

Although her first attempt at being an author has received rave reviews from literary critics and peers, Logan said she receives the greatest satisfaction from a person's simple reaction to her stories.

"When I hear people laughing while they are reading my book - that's the greatest compliment," she said. " Because, you know life would be a horse with Because, you know, life would be a bore without laughter."

ee Logan believes telemarketers don't really want to sell anything. Those annoying dinnertime telephone calls aren't strategically timed sales pitches. No, tele-marketers are people who just want to be loved. At least, the "love conquers all" theory was what Logan believed until she tried it on an

unsuspecting telephone salesman. He called during dinner, she showed the love, and then she heard the dial tone.

Logan's telemarketer theory is just one of numerous subjects addressed in her comical book, "Hey, Wait a Minute." Written by "a budding senior citizen," the 175-page book reflects on what it means to experience an array of "Senior Moments."

People of all ages, however, can relate to many of Logan's tales. Prom "fatal groot" messages on the computer screen to leftover garage sale signs, the author finds humor in even the most exasperating of experiences. And, she often gives her two solutions and sugown solutions and sug-gestions to deal

For example, if Logan had her way, people who have more than 10 items in a grocery store's "10 items or less" express lane would face strict penalties. "They could charge you for every item over the 10 'maximum limit' and you wouldn't get to take those items home ...," she writes. The more items over 10 — the bigger the fine."

The author also offers a unique perspective on marriage, often at the expense of her husband, Kit. She explains why train shows are for men and flower shows are for women - men know how many bolts and rivets it took to build a Conrail SD40-2 train engine, while women know how many flowers it takes to create the perfect Hogarth curve for a floral design — and why wrestling isn't necessarily for everyone.

On a more personal note, she discusses why the couple's 1983 yellow Volvo — a spontaneous purchase by Kit — is named Vomit. "When I saw

purchase by Kit — is named Vomit. "When I saw it sitting in the front driveway, it was a rather putrid shade of 'carnival gold,' like strained squash that had been in a baby too long."

As the book's cover indicates, Logan also reflects on growing older. She wonders why so many "old people" were invited to her 40th class reunion and gives reasons why she can no longer stay up past 9:30 p.m.

Logan said she decided to write the book after hunters walker at a grange sale. She doesn't use

Students in all 50 states take the ACT Assessment. Virtually all colleges and universities in the nation accept ACT scores, including lvy League Schools. The test fee is \$25 (\$28 in Florida). A student's ACT scores are considered by colleges for admissions and course placement along with several other important factors including

high school GPA, college prep courses taking in high school, extracurricular activities, personal background and other information.

The ACT Assessment is an achievement test that measures a student's academic skills in four subject areas: English, reading, mathematics and science. It is not an aptitude test. The website has helpful information including


sample test questions and the opportunity to order test prep materials.



QUESTION: If you were a counselor who was helping someone manage a crisis situation, your recommendations to exercise tough love could potentially kill the marriage. Doesn't that make you nervous? Have you ever regretted taking a family in this direction?

DR. DOBSON: To answer that question you need to understand how I see my situation. My role is similar to that of a surgeon who tells a patient that he needs a coronary artery bypass operation. The

man sits in his doctor's office, hearing the probabilities of success and failure. 'If you undergo this opera-tion," the doctor says, "research shows you'll have a 3 percent chance of not surviving the surgery." Wow! Three out of every 100 people who submit to the knife will die on the table! Why would anyone run that risk voluntarily? Because the chances of death are far greater without the surgery.

The love must be tough — confrontations and ultimatums are like that. They may result in the sudden demise of a relationship. But, without the crisis, there is a much higher probability of a lin-gering death. Instead of bringing the matter to a head while there is a chance for healing, the alterna-tive is to stand by while the marriage dies with a whimper. I'd

rather take my chances today, before further damage is done. A blowout is better than a slow leak.

QUESTION: My family lives together under one roof and we share the same last name, but we don't "feel" like a family. How can I begin to put a sense of togetherness into this harried household? How do you put meaningful activities into your family?

DR.DOBSON: One way to accomplish that is by creating traditions in your home. By traditions I'm referring to those recurring events and behaviors that are anticipated, especially by children, as times of closeness and fellowship between loved ones.

In our family, the centerpiece of our holiday traditions is food. Each year during Thanksgiving and Christmas, the women prepare marvelous turkey dinners with all the trimmings. 

Chinese tallow now considered invasive pest plant

The Chinese tallow tree or popcorn tree has been introduced repeatedly to the United States as an ornamental and potential oil crop species.

In Florida, the
Carolinas, and other
states in the Gulf
Coast, it is considered
an invasive pest plant
in low-lying areas,
becoming dominant
and spreading along
roadside ditches and
into areas where the

soil stays wet. It also thrives in upland, well-drained areas near human habitation and in undisturbed areas such as closed canopy forests, in bottomland hardwood forests, and shores of bodies of water. It survives well in both poorly drained freshwater and saline soils as well.

The Chinese tallow tree has been found naturalized in 57 percent of Florida's counties and is most abundant and naturalized in the northwest and central part of Florida, in

marshes, lakes and pond shallows, stream and river banks, ditches and well-drained uplands. It is listed as invasive exotic plant specie by the Florida Exotic Pest Plant Council.

Ferrer

The Plant

The tree is deciduous, growing about 30 to 35 feet tall at maturity. Like many of the plants in the Euphorbia family, it contains a milky sap that is considered poisonous.

The leaves are simple, alternate, oval or heart shaped with broadly rounded bases and tapering to a slender point. The flowers are small, yellow, borne on spikes about 8 inches long, with no petals and two to three sepa-

Is, two to three stamens in male flowers or three styles in female flowers. The fruit is a three-lobed capsule, about half inch wide, that turns brown and splits open at maturity to reveal three dull white, waxy seeds that look like pop corn. These seeds remain attached to the tree for a long time.

The tree can start flowering and fruiting from the time the tree is just above 3 feet tall. Flowering begins in the spring with fruits ripening from August to November. The seeds are primarily dispersed by birds, water, and men.

Culture

This tree grows well in full sun and tolerates different types of soil under acidic or alkaline conditions. It will also grow in well-drained soils or soils with extended flooding conditions. It has a

moderate tolerance to drought and relatively pest free.

Pruning is usually required to develop a strong structure. They are hard to transplant to other locations once they become established. Propagation is mainly by seeds or cuttings.

Use

The tree has been used as an ornamental shade tree that allows enough light to penetrate for grass to growth beneath. It is one of the few trees that show a good fall color in the central Florida zone. In the fall, the leaves turn to shades of red, yellow, orange and purple.

The waxy coating on the seeds is used for making candles and soap in China and other Far East countries.

Problems

This tree has escaped culti-

vation and is invading native woodlands and the edge of wetlands, therefore, the use of this ornamental tree in the landscape is not recommended.

The wood is brittle and small to medium-sized branches are subject to breakage in windy locations. The twigs and foliage can cause significant litter on the yards where trees are located.

Roots tend to grow quite large near the soil surface and can lift sidewalks or interfere with mowing practices. It can introduce a weed problem in the yard as seeds are produced abundantly and germinate readily, becoming a nuisance in the lawn.

Tasty recipes highlight Latin 'flavor'

By hand or machine, cream the margarine and sugar together until they lighten in color. Add the whisked eggs, one spoonful at a time, adding a little of the flour if necessary to pre-

vent curdling.
Mix the rest of the flour with the spices, then add to the batter mixture one spoonful at a time, alternating with the milk. Stir in the apples, raisins and walnuts if using. Spoon into the prepared pan and smooth level.

Bake for 11/4 hours, until well risen and firm to the touch. Remove from the oven and leave the pan on a wire rack to cool for 20 minutes, before carefully easing the cake out.

> In a large pot over medium-high heat, melt the butter and cook the onion for four minutes, or until soft. Add the wine and cook for three minutes longer.

Add the broth, potato, celery root and thyme. Bring to a boil over high heat.

Reduce the heat to medium-low, cover and simmer one hour or until the vegetables are very soft.

Working in batches if necessary, place the mixture in a food processor

Process until smooth. Add the cream and pulse just until blended. stir in the apple and season with salt and pepper to taste.
