Section 2. The transportation or importation into any state, territory, or possession of the Culted States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited,

Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the conventions of the several statue, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the thte of aubminsion hereof to the states by the Congress,"

Pistol Permits

Without attempting to minimize the degree of censure which should be heaped upon Zangara for his fiendish attack upon President-elect Roosevelt in which five persons year seriously wounded, we would remind our readers that some blame at least should accrue in another direction. What about the man who sold this moron, certainly on the verge of insanity, the gun with which he did the shooting? Of course, there is no law in the State of Florida specifically restricting such sales. The pawn broker, whoever he was, undoubtedly had a perfettly legal right to sell Zangara a gue, or to sell anybody else contemplating a similarly serious crime, the weapon with which to execute it. But that does not relieve him of certain moral responsibility for his part in this affair.

Nor does it relievs the lawmakers of this state in sears gone by of a certain positive dereliction in their line of duty for not previding this state with adequate laws against the promiscuous sale of firearms. The suggestion has been made time and time again, both in the press and from the public forum, that laws should be enacted which should restrict, if not prohibit altogether, the sale of pistols and revolvers indiscriminately, but so far nothing has been done about it.

These pocket guns serve only one purpose in this world: they are devised essentially for the purpose of killing people. You do not hunt quall with revolvers, nor do you shoot ducks with them. A person who buys a pistol buys it with the possibility, at least, in mind, of shooting

This purpose may be perfectly justifiable, especially in these days when law and order fail so frequently to function, as one of self-defense or the protection of his home. But such a purpose can easily be established before the proper authorities.

If every person were compelled to show a legal permit before he could buy a revolver, in any state in the union, gangsters, racketeers, highwaymen, and morons like Zaugara would find it far more difficult to get hold of the wespons with which they carry on their illegal warfare. A degenerate contemplating murder could not then walk into the nearest paymanop and emerge a moment later fully equipped to take the life of the first man he meets.

The tragedy which occurred in Miami the other night should be a lesson to the people of this state, and of other states, and should make it impossible for the Legislature to delay any longer the enactment of such laws as may be necessary to make more difficult the recurrence of similar wilfull and destructive outbursts in the future.

Counterfeit Bills

It is reported that since the depression began in 1929, there has been an inordinate amount of counterfeiting going on in the United States, with the result that the Federal Secret Service is being hard pressed to combat the illegal enterprise.

The biggest difficulty in fighting the fake money lies in the case with which it may be passed off to the public. It is true that same of the counterfeits are the last word in the craftsman art and can be detected only with difficulty by the expert, but it is equally true that many of the counterfeit bills are crudely made and should be detected by the casual handler of money.

Therefore the Secret Service has turned to other sources for their attack on counterfeiters. The baual manner of procedure is a check-up on supplies and materials which are used in the angraving of bills. The inks needed for making spurious money are of a very fine grade and any deflection of shipments to other than accredited places is investigated. Also a close tab is kept on sales of certain types of presses which are needed by counterfeiters. The engravers rogue gallery in which specimens of the work of expert engravers, who have made imitations of American currency is maintained and is a big help to investigators. The purchase of paper of a grade similar to that used in making bills is usually subject to investigation.
