

BEARING BLAME HOUSE LABORS UPON DAM BILL

Heeds President's Re- commendation And Takes Up Measure Of Swing-Johnson

Filibuster Scare Met By Leaders

Legislation Has Long
Been Delayed By So-
Called 'Power Trust'

WASHINGTON, May 22.—(INS)—Heeding the recommendation of President Coolidge and fearful of a new flood disaster being laid to its door, the House today took up the Swing-Johnson Bill for the building of Boulder Canyon Dam on the Colorado River.

With the threat of filibustering tactics met by the firm decision of leaders to bring the bill to a vote, all indications pointed to its passage within three days. Originating in the plan of residents of the Imperial Valley of California for protection from a flood which is declared to be inevitable, the legislation has long been delayed by fight of the so-called "power trust" to prevent the generation of electricity at the dam.

In an effort to relieve the federal government of the cost of flood protection, sponsors of the bill evolved the scheme of building a 50-foot dam on the river between Nevada and Arizona, generating electricity, and selling water both for irrigation purposes and for domestic use in Southern California. This scheme would make possible the repayment of the \$125,000,000 cost of the project to the federal government within 20 years, factors of the measure claimed.

In addition to the interest of President Coolidge who recently chaired Congress for failure to consider the bill, the endorsement of Secretary of Commerce Herbert Hoover and Secretary of the Interior Hubert Work. The only stumbling blocks in the path of the measure appeared to be the opposition of power interests to a government dam on the Colorado, where power sites are already being eagerly sought, and the refusal of Arizona to join with six other states in a compact for the project.

Dam Still Holds Despite Erosions

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, May 22.—(INS)—The Pleasant Valley dam above Castlegate, which threatened to break yesterday flooding vast areas was still holding today, according to reports here, confidence was expressed that disaster will be averted. A force of five hundred men worked throughout the night plugging the leaks and bolstering the dam with sand bags, cement and earth with the result that the eroding effect of the accumulated material was checked. Today workers were trying to lower the reservoir level to the safety point by cutting away the top of the dam and permitting the surplus water to flow out gradually.

FAMOUS ACTOR IS GIVEN DIVORCE IN NEW YORK COURT

Mrs. Atwill did not defend the suit, and now is believed to be in Europe. The couple was married in Chicago on February 7, 1920 and when not on the road lived at Douglas Manor, N. Y. Mr. and Mrs. Atwill played in "Deep in the Woods" in 1925. Max Monteleale, a protégé of Atwill's who was named correspondent, also played in the show.

SENATE PUTS NEW TAX BILL IN CONFERENCE

Administration Leaders Revive Hopes Of Adjourning Next Saturday Night When Trek Will Begin For Conventions

Boulder Dam Bill Faces Filibuster

Tax Reduction Measures As Yet Passed Two Houses Carry No Aid For Normal Income

WASHINGTON, May 22. (INS)—The new tax reduction bill, which the Senate held within the Treasury limit of \$204,000,000 after the House authorized a \$289,000,000 slash, was sent to conference today while administration leaders revived hopes of adjourning Congress next Saturday night.

The Boulder Dam Bill, likely to pass the House in a day or two, but facing a desperate filibuster in the Senate, and a final settlement of the tax differences between the two branches, along with the adjournment at the end of the week. Failing to get Congress humored today by May 26, administration leaders will set May 29 as the date for ending the present session.

The new tax reduction bill, as it passed both House and Senate, carried reduction in the normal income taxes but granted heavy relief to corporations. The general public was benefited by increased exemptions on amusement taxes, lightening of the automobile tax and repeal of the attachable tax. An effort to amend the bill to raise the normal income tax to 25 percent was rejected by the Senate. Proposals to increase the tariff on farm products, to establish a \$300,000,000 farm department fund for allowing farmers to import articles free of duty, and to refund transportation costs on exported farm products all were defeated.

Enlivened by the presence of a multitude of mosquitoes, who picked their trade fast and furiously much to the discomfort of everyone, the seventh of a series of county political meetings was held last night in the Fosgate pucking house at Forest City. As one speaker described it, "the candidates chewed the rag and the mosquitoes chewed the skin."

The only tripping on an otherwise calm sea occurred when Frank Evans, member of the board of county commissioners and a candidate to succeed himself, took occasion to brand as false statements, which he declared had been made with "malice toward me."

The county commissioner with some feeling expressed an erroneous conception of the distribution of public improvements" by the county board.

The speaker declared it had been charged that he built a road through Lake Mary to suit his own wishes, and in reply asserted that he had in his possession a petition bearing more than a hundred names, requesting that the road be constructed. Mr. Evans said allegations had been spread to the effect that he had built other roads without regard to the wishes of his constituents, and in answer to the charge that no road could be built without the sanction of the whole board and that no county commissioner is permitted to spend more than \$500 without first obtaining approval of the other members.

Nationalist Party In Germany Begins War On Socialists

BERLIN, May 22.—(INS)—Embittered by their route in the general election, leaders of the Nationalists today began making preparations to wage war against the socialists when the new cabinet and the new Reichstag comes into power next month.

Count Westarp and his fellow leaders of the radical faction of the Nationalists predicted that the next cabinet will not last long and that the People's party will encounter continued obstacles.

Mail Pilot Dies In Crash Of Airplane

RICHMOND, May 22. (INS)—Pit Morrissey, air mail pilot operating between here and New York, was killed early today when his plane went into a nose dive and crashed near the city airport. He had just taken off for New York and was believed to have lost his bearings in a fog. He was buried under the wreckage. The body was mangled. Morrissey was a World War flyer and later instructor at Kelly Field, Texas. He was about 33 years of age and lived at Aurora, Ill. He is survived by his wife and three children at Aurora.

CHINESE GENERAL SEEKS DEAL WITH JAP GOVERNMENT

Northern War Lord Proposes To Withdraw Troops From Mukden If Japanese Will Hold Nationalists In Check

LONDON, May 22.—(INS)—Chang Tso-Lin, the northern Chinese war lord, has unofficially approached the Japanese Government intimating he would withdraw his men with a proposal in which he offers to withdraw his troops from Mukden, the capital of Manchuria, if the Japanese would hold back his Nationalist foes in the drive toward Peking, an exchange telegraph dispatch from Tokio stated today.

The Japanese Government refused to accept Chang's proposal, the dispatch added. The Japanese, it is reported, fear that a disorganized retreat of the northern armies in Manchuria might result in a repetition of the Tsinan incident.

There are many Japanese in Manchuria and Japan is determined to see that none of its citizens are endangered. It is reported that all available Japanese troops in Manchuria are being concentrated at Mukden.

Mrs. Dorothy Knapp Succumbs To Heavy Strain Of Her Trial

ALBANY, N. Y., May 22.—(INS)—Collapsing from the strain which she has been under for the last month, Florence E. S. Knapp, former secretary of state, today was ordered to bed by physicians and a recess was taken in her second trial until tomorrow. Mrs. Knapp is on trial before Supreme Court Justice Callaghan on a charge of stealing census money.

Announcement that Mrs. Knapp was too ill to come to court was made by her attorney P. C. Dugan as soon as court was convened today. "I understand Mrs. Knapp's illness is only temporary and she may be able to come to court tomorrow," Justice Callaghan said. Paula A. Smith, of Bedford, Mass., sister of Mrs. Knapp, announced however, that the former secretary of state had collapsed.

Maria Jeritza Will Never Sing Again In Vienna State Opera

VIENNA, May 22.—(INS)—Mrs. Maria Jeritza, Austrian opera singer and beauty, has quit the Vienna state opera and will never sing here again, she announced today. The trouble arose over a French decoration.

OHIO CAMPAIGN PLACED UNDER SENATE PROBE

Late George Willis Manager Testifies \$40,000 Was Spent Upon His Candidate

Pomerene States He Used But \$100

Carmi Thompson Says \$14,000 Was Put Up Before Willis' Death

WASHINGTON, May 22.—(INS)—Ohio's presidential campaign came under the Senate's presidential fund committee's spotlight today. Carmi Thompson, manager of the late Senator Willis' campaign against Secretary of Commerce Hoover, testified \$41,216 was expended on behalf of Willis.

Ex-Senator Atlee Pomerene, Ohio's favorite son candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, declared he spent but \$100 which was used in Cleveland where a contest developed over one of his delegates.

Thompson said only \$14,117.63 was spent before Willis' death and that his organization stopped the fight after that. The expenditures made later, he explained, were for bills made before Willis died and for traveling expenses.

"Outside of traveling expenses, I can say that no contract was made to spend money after Senator Willis' death," said Thompson. "Some contracts, entered into and carried out before his death, were paid for afterwards."

Thompson said the Willis organization received \$15,300 before Willis' death while \$26,110 was received after his death. Thompson said he had a list of contributors, Beman G. Davis, brother of the Vice President, gave \$7,500 while Thompson gave \$6,800. J. W. Hopkins and T. W. Robinson, of Chicago, each gave \$5,000. So did Michael Gallagher, of Cleveland. L. M. Willis, a brother of the Senator, gave \$1,000.

Thompson revealed he made some personal contributions to county committees. He said he gave about \$10,000. Thompson explained that he accepted these "large contributions" only because "contributions fell off after Senator Willis' death."

"We have called you because you are known as a candidate for the presidency," said Senator Stelwer (R) of Oregon. "You complained me," said Pomerene, who denied he was an active candidate for president.

Florida Leads

According to a recent report from the Bureau of Railway Economics, covering rail movements of fresh fruits and vegetables for the years of 1924, 1925 and 1926 Florida stands at the head of the list in shipments of grapefruit, stringbeans, celery, cucumbers, eggplants, peppers and tomatoes.

In fruit shipments, Florida ranked second, California leading with 180,741 cars annually. Florida shipped 54,234 cars; Washington state, 40,574; New York state, 35,633; Georgia, 32,617; and Virginia, 14,580. In shipments of all kinds of vegetables, California again leads, followed closely by New York state, Maine, Virginia, Minnesota, Florida, Texas, Colorado, Wisconsin, Michigan, Idaho, and New Jersey, in the order named.

Such figures as these tend to disprove the old theory that Florida is primarily a tourist state and can be nothing else. Entertaining visitors is without question a great business with us, and we hope that it will always be our pleasure to have many northern tourists with us, but we will never cease to believe that Florida's great future lies in its possibilities as an agricultural state.

Constitution Nullifiers

Last Thursday from the floor of the Senate chamber, "Tom Tom" Heflin, who Time says "mortally fears and hates the Roman Pope" delivered another of his asinine philippics against Alfred Emanuel Smith. Concluding his diatribe, this Sidney J. Catts of national politics declared: "I'd rather suffer defeat than have at the head of the Democratic Party this appointed of the Pope, this constitutional nullifier, wringing wet, this believer in social equality between the races, Alfred Smith."

While we hold no brief for the Tammany governor of New York state, we cannot resist the temptation of coming to his defense when attacked by a demagogue whose inconsistencies are as obvious as the paunch which always precedes him. In the same breath with which the Senate fat boy derides Smith as being a Constitutional nullifier, he attacks him for believing in certain amendments which it appears are distasteful to Heflin himself. Perhaps the Alabamian does not know that one of the basic principals of the Constitution is religious freedom. Perhaps he has forgotten that the Fourteenth Amendment assures equality between the races.

Surely if one's belief in the Constitution is to be his recommendation for the nomination, Al Smith would have it all over a candidate of Heflin's choice. For while Smith is accused of disbelief in the Eighteenth Amendment only, Senator Heflin shows his inclination to nullify both the First and Fourteenth Amendments.

It is recalled to our minds that Sidney J. Catts before his appearance on the scene of Florida politics, once ran against the Papist enemy and was defeated in an Alabama Congressional election. It is a debatable question who was the loser in that election. As a result of it Florida got Sidney J. Catts and the American people got Tom Heflin, both of whom are the rankest demagogues who ever brought disgrace upon their respective states.

Cigarette Dope

The director of public welfare for the city of Miami has uncovered an insidious practice which might easily have developed into something of more degenerating influence than whiskey selling or dope peddling. Cigarettes, containing a drug similar in effect to cocaine, it was found, were being sold by smugglers from Mexico to high school boys and girls.

Young students, buying these "smokes" and thinking them perhaps similar to any other kind of cigarette, undoubtedly were ignorant of the depths to which they might readily sink, should the practice be continued and a resistance habit be formed. Most of these youngsters undoubtedly wished to emulate their elders by smoking cigarettes exactly as they had seen their fathers and some of their mothers smoke them, but we do not believe they wanted to fall so low as the vicious dope of treacherous peddlers would have made them.

The Miami director of public welfare discovered that the cigarettes were made from the leaves and stems of a plant known as Cannabis Indica and Cannabis Sativa and resulted in the partial intoxication of the user. Federal agents said that addicts were not responsible for their actions, and he told of the recent arrest of a man found wandering senselessly about the city streets, apparently drunk, and unable to tell police where he wanted to go.

As the drug is something new, it is not covered by the Harrison narcotic act, and officials were unable to do anything about it. However, an ordinance has been presented to the city commissioners providing a heavy penalty for the possession or sale of this particular kind of cigarette. In the meantime boys and girls, who think they must smoke, are being urged to buy them from reputable dealers, and not take chances with peddlers who are likely to give them more than they expect.

WELCOME, MR. WAYBRIGHT

Tampa today is honored by the presence of Edgar A. Waybright, distinguished criminal lawyer of Jacksonville.

This is the third occasion in the last five years Mr. Waybright has selected for an official visit to Tampa.

The first was in 1924, when Mr. Waybright successfully defended Edith Conway who confessed to complicity in a West Tampa bank robbery, but who was acquitted nevertheless—thanks to Mr. Waybright. That justice was defeated in this instance was obvious, still it was something of a compliment to Mr. Waybright; after a fashion.

Mr. Waybright's second visit to Tampa occurred in 1925, when he represented the bootleggers and gamblers of the "Panama" in an attempt to prevent the annexation of that territory to Tampa proper. Mr. Waybright was completely exposed by the local press upon this occasion and left the city in something of a high dungeon. Still he carried his clients' money along with him, as was proved by publication of a photo of a check paid him for his services. That must have been comforting—not to the underworld, but to Mr. Waybright.

Today, Mr. Waybright is in Tampa in the interest of a third client, Fons A. Hathaway, who wants ever so badly to be Governor, but who can not fail to realize the fact that his cause is entirely hopeless and that the people of

MUD-SLINGING TAMPA TIMES

Doyle E. Carlton, in his recent address here, took at least one position with which every right-thinking man and woman, every friend of clean government must agree. This had to do with the discussion of the official acts of men who hold public office.

As Mr. Carlton pointed out, there are those who, in their eagerness to protect their friends in public life from attacks, cry "mud-slinging" whenever criticism is leveled at an official. These people would take advantage of the fact that vilification has come to be frowned upon and protect their friends from attacks of any sort. Whether sincere or not, they would make it appear that there is no difference between an honest discussion of a man's official record and an unwarranted attack on him personally.

Nothing, however, could be further from the truth. It must be patent to all that every office-holder's record is and should be open to public scrutiny. So far as his acts are committed to paper, the law in every state requires that they shall be available to public inspection at all times. This is intended as a deterrent against wrong-doing. It is also unquestionably intended to furnish the public with information on which to base an intelligent determination whether to return an office-holder to office.

If, then a public official's record shall, under the law, be kept open to public inspection at all times, where is the imprudence in discussing it in public? If, as in the case of Dr. Hathaway, Governor Martin and many others who are seeking office "on their records," these records are not

his client, Mr. Hathaway, no fair-minded citizen can regard his challenges to Mr. Carlton as anything more than a play to the galleries in the hope of drawing a crowd before whom he can strut and swashbuckle in his customary style as the employed counsel for a desperate and hopeless defendant.

a fit subject for public discussion, can someone suggest what might be? There is no safer way to judge what a man will be, if entrusted with responsibility, than to consider how he has already acted under similar conditions. Is it not potentially absurd, then, to hold that such consideration is outside the voters' proper sphere?

Malfaisance in office has grown commoner at an alarming rate in the last few years. Scarcely a week rolls by now without the discovery that some official has betrayed the trust placed in him. Courts in almost every state are busy meting out punishment to office-holders who have sold their honor and their constituents. Unfortunately, Florida has her share of such cases. Yet there are those who would hold that discussion of a man's official record is unwarranted; who are ready to cry "mud-slinging" whenever charges are made against a candidate for public office.

Nothing could be more absurd; nothing more foreign to the spirit of our government; nothing more detrimental to the best interests of the people as a whole.

An office-holder's official acts—and not a few hold, ever his private life—are public property. To examine them painstakingly is not only the right, but the duty of every voter. By discussing them fairly, any candidate does the public a real service.

Only eighteen more days before election and then you will know who the next governor is going to be.

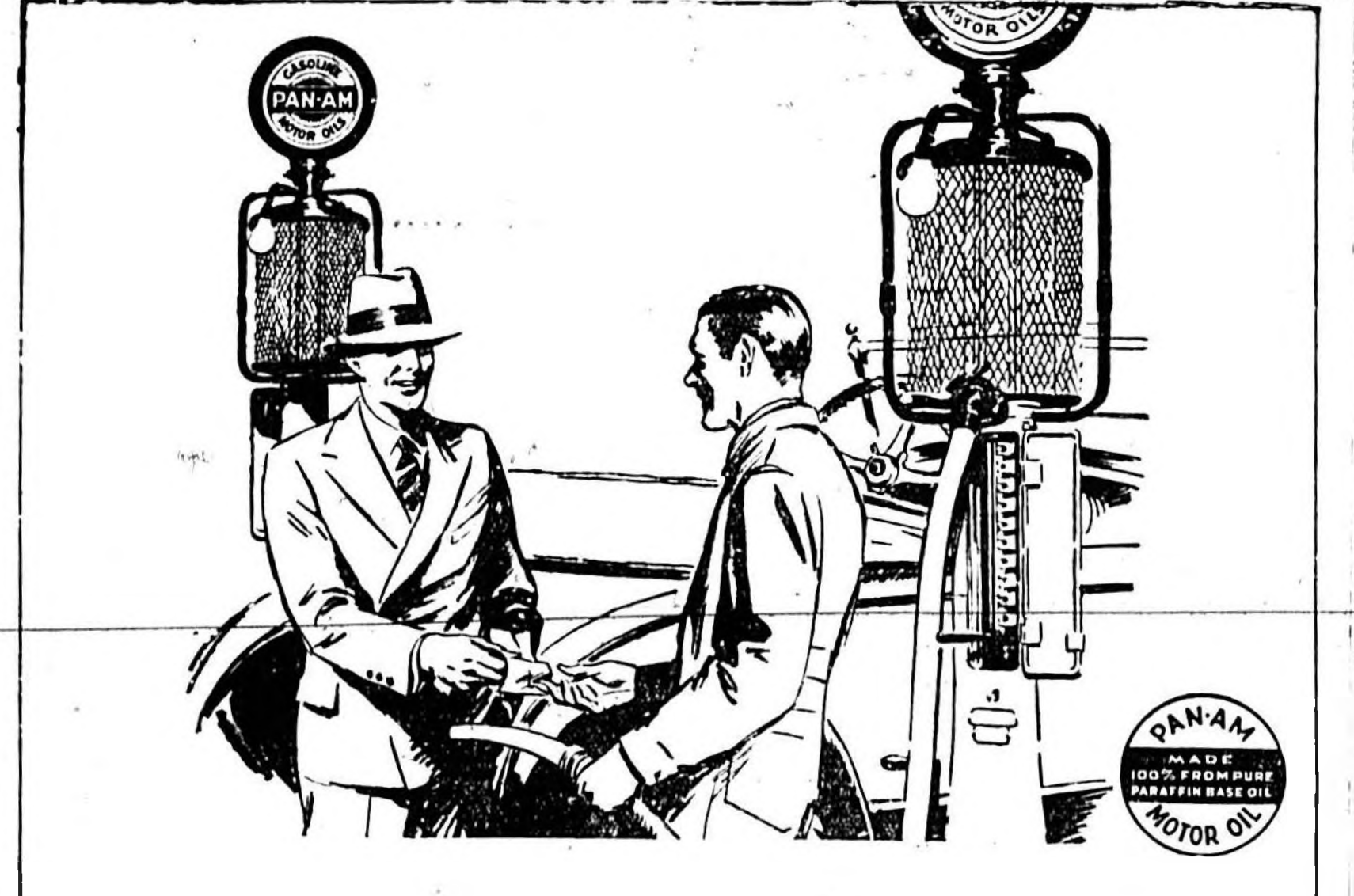

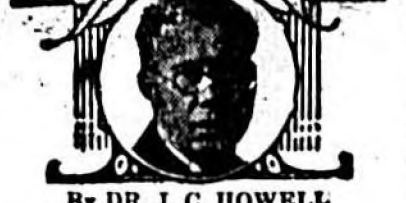

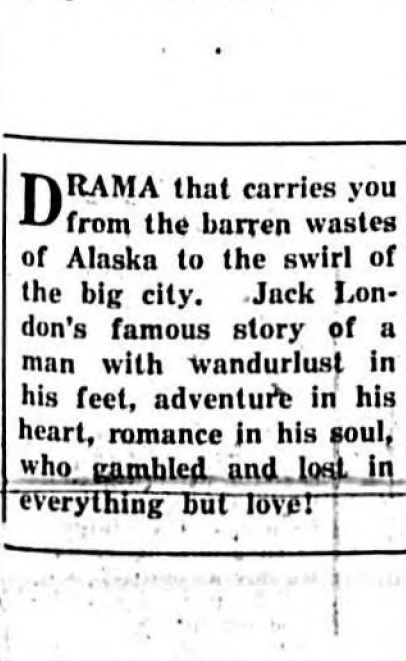

term in the House he had been assigned to important committees and that he served on the same groups throughout his legislative career, being selected on the same committees when he was elevated to the Senate. Mr. Kilbee said he had planned to "elude dance" for the benefit of the audience but upon second thought had changed his mind. Mr. Chittenden said he had not had any experience that particularly qualified him for office but declared that he had the ability and would give "faithful, conscientious service" to the job. He stressed his promise to elect Mr. Vaughan and he was neither creator nor orange grower but is a tax assessor. On his record, he said, he again seeks the office.

D. L. Thrasher, R. R. Deas and Vance Douglass were speakers for the office of clerk of the circuit court. Candidates for sheriff followed. C. M. Hand, incumbent, promised a continuance of a "business man." E. E. Walker told his full performance of duty. Mr. McClelland said he was running on his record "as a citizen and business man." E. E. Bad Weather Delays Polar Hop Of Nobile

OSLO, Norway, May 22.—(INS)—Balked by bad weather in his attempt to sail last night for the North Pole, Gen. Umberto Nobile, Italian Arctic explorer, hopes to get away within 24 hours in the dirigible balloon Italia, said a radiogram from Kings Bay, Spitzbergen, today.

A descent will be attempted upon the Polar ice cap. Two scientists will be landed, if possible, to make exhaustive studies of the ice and meteorological conditions. The course to be taken depends upon the weather.

Gen Nobile has already made an official report to the Italian Geographical Society upon his exploration flight to Nicholas II Land, which began on May 16. This flight was primarily for two purposes: intensive exploration of Nicholas II Land and a search for new land. No new territory was found.

Sensational Hoax Of English Woman Is Recalled Today

LONDON, May 22.—(INS)—One of the most sensational hoaxes in recent years was recalled today when Dr. Dorothy Logan, otherwise known as Mona McLellan, appeared before the general medical board for a discussion of her confession that she falsely claimed to have swam the English channel. The case created a tremendous sensation last year.

Dr. Logan, who was as well known as a swimmer as she was as a physician, announced her intention of swimming the channel from Cape Gris Nez, on the French coast to England. She apparently set out from the French coast and some hours later appeared on the English coast, claiming to have made the swim. Her claim was supported by several persons who said they accompanied her by boat.

For a few days Dr. Logan was lionized then doubts began to arise. Her claim was questioned and Dr. Logan confessed. She was summoned to court and fined \$500, her defense being that she did not commit the hoax to gain a reward, but to draw attention to the necessity of rigid control over attempts to establish new athletic records.

Famed Jap Doctor Dies In Fight For Combatting Plague

LONDON, May 22.—(INS)—Dr. Hideo Noguchi, world famous Japanese physician and discoverer of the South American yellow fever germ, who died at Accra, West Africa, was universally lauded today as a martyr to science. He died of the disease he had spent his life fighting. The yellow plague. His death occurred while he was conducting experiments to obtain new methods of fighting the scourge. He became inoculated from his own experiments.

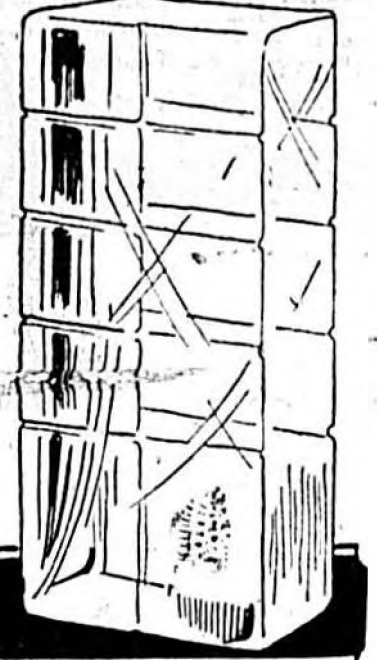
Dr. Noguchi went to West Africa last year for the Rockefeller Institute for medical research.

After contracting the disease in January he watched his own case and made valuable scientific notes for the guidance of future doctors. He calmly watched the approach of death, giving it no thought so intense was his interest in his studies. The Japanese physician was recently called "one of the greatest living Japanese."

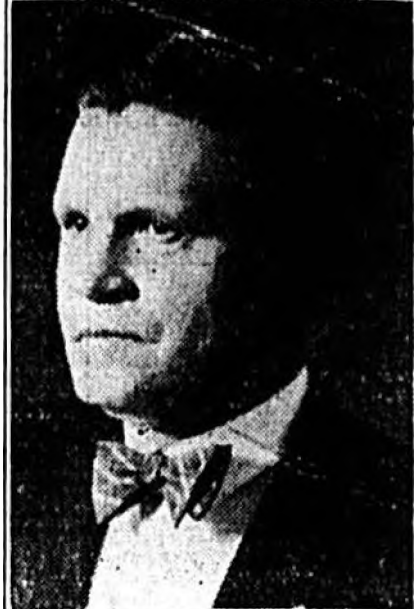
