FLORIDA GATORS MAKING DEBUT AGAINST TIGERS

Real Test Of Power Expected To Come From Sewanee Team

UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA, GAINESVILLE, Oct. 8.—Charlie Bahaman's 1932 edition of the University of Florida football Gators makes its season's debut against the Sewanee Tigers in Fairfield stadium at Jacksonville today.

Spoken of as the first eleven to begin a new cycle of Florida grid prosperity after two lean years, the Gators meet a team that bears the scars of two Southern conference defeats by relatively low scores, but who should give the Gators a real test in ability. Sewanee lost to South Carolina, 7-3, and to Kentucky, 18-0.

The tremendous amount of reserve material gives the Florida Gators a distinct edge over the little eleven from the foothills of Tennessee, and should more than balance the advantage gained by the Tigers in starting their season two weeks before the Gators.

The Gators worked out leisurely yesterday afternoon, perfecting what faults were left in the offensive and defensive styles of the individual and group play. They topped off the short session with kicking and passing. Al Rogers, the dependable left half back, will bear the brunt of the punting and passing. McAnly and Jack Henderson may relieve him late in the game.

With a line averaging slightly over 190 pounds, the Gators outweigh their opponents some seven pounds to the man in the forward wall. Because of the absence of Hank Dorsett, 190-pound quarter-back, and John Fountain, 176-

pound halfback, the Florida backfield will just about strike a par with the starting quartet of Tiger ball carriers.

Johnny Culler and Bobby Frankgold, veteran lettermen, will start the game at the positions vacated by the injured Dorsett and Fountain. Sam Davis and Ernie Priest are the quarter-back substitutes and Steve Moya and Wally Brown the relief at right half.

The comparative work of Jimmy Hughes and Charlie Stolz at fullback for the Gators will be watched with interest in the opening game. Stolz has created a storm of enthusiasm over his fine crashing while subbing for Hughes. Hughes is scheduled to start the game, but his understudy is a probable participant.

As in the case of Stolz, thus it is with all the first year men on the squad. It is a test to see if they can stand up under the steady fire of a varsity game and whether the potentialities that they have demonstrated in practice are realities in true competition. Twenty-two members of the squad of 45 are getting the first taste of what a college football game is, and the eyes of all Florida supporters will be on them, as well as the scouts of opposing teams.

CARNERA KNOCKS OUT OPPONENT IN FOURTH IN TAMPA

Italian Heavyweight Proves Too Big For German, Sandwina

TAMPA, Oct. 8.—Primero Carnera, giant Italian heavyweight, knocked out Ted Sandwina, huge German, in the fourth round of their 19-round "battle of the post-noments" at Benjamin Field here last night.

Carnera, largest prize fighter in the world, won every round. He battered Sandwina from rope to rope in the fourth, then knocked out his lighter opponent with a terrific right hand smash flush to the chin in the German's corner.

The crowd was estimated at 2500, about 500 less than attended Wednesday night's postponed show. Carnera weighed 265 pounds and Sandwina, 212.

Officials in the box office said that ticket money had been refunded to about 200 fans before the fight started, but the tickets had been sold to approximately the same number of new customers.

Money was refunded to about 200 fans Wednesday night after an enraged crowd had besieged the box office. A scattering of tickets numbering not more than 50 or 100, were redeemed by the officials Thursday and yesterday.

In other words, the promoter, Patsy Suarez, and his backers appeared little better off last night from a financial view than they did on Wednesday night. The customers just about offset the refunds, but it was estimated that approximately 500 who bought tickets Wednesday, passed up last night's show.

The bleachers, priced at \$1 were about two-thirds filled. The reserve seats, priced at \$2, also were comparatively filled, but there were wide open spaces in the ringside section priced at \$3, and the box seats priced at \$5, were practically empty. It appeared that the promoters had
