Request For License Negative Stirs Feud

A 25-year-old Sanford woman's request for the negative of her dead husband's picture on his driver's license has generated a feud in Tallahassee—even an anticipated legal opinion by Atty. Gen. Robert Shelin.

It all began when Mrs. Sue Ann Tyson of 203 West 17th Street asked the Florida Division of Drivers Licenses for the negative because, "It's the best and most recent one that I have."

After a two months' wait, Mrs. Tyson was informed by state officials the negative could not be released to her. So, she appealed to State Senator Lori Wilson, who after a check with state officials, was told the same thing—the negative couldn't be released.

Calling the state's refusal "rather inhuman and certainly ridiculous," Wilson then appealed to Shelin on the basis the photograph is open to inspection per the public records law. Shelin's ruling is expected soon, officials say.

Mrs. Tyson's husband, Roger, died Aug. 11. Shortly after his death, she said she realized she didn't have a recent photograph of Roger for herself—or for his mother, Mrs. Sally Tyson.

"I have candid pictures, but they're not of his face," she said. And she was told any effort to reproduce the original on the drivers' license would ruin her one and only good picture.

Her opinion was that the negative "would be of no further interest to them" and sent a copy of her husband's death certificate to back up her contention.

"I have taken it to several photo labs and have been told the driver's license itself cannot produce a satisfactory reproduction," Mrs. Tyson said in her letter to the senator.

Wilson says release of the negative would be a



"simple act of human kindness," but Executive Director Ralph Davis says it "drives license division is 'not in the business of selling pictures.'"

Davis said only law enforcement officers or a person who loses his license may apply and receive a negative of the pictures which adorn licenses.

And even though Davis says he will obey an opinion by Shelin, he also fears it would "open the gate. We handle six million licenses and that would put us in the photography business."

Wilson, however, contends Davis could have avoided a lot of problems by pulling the negative. "There's no way for our office to wrestle the negative away from him," the Cocoa Beach Independent said.

"I am so impatient when bureaucracy defeats the purpose of good government with futile things—such as getting the attorney general involved in what should have been an act of human kindness," Wilson said.

Meanwhile Mrs. Tyson, who is a technician at Seminole Memorial Hospital, awaits an opinion from Shelin, an opinion which Wilson says could have been avoided if "without fanfare" Davis had "pulled the negative."

"In an indirect way she certainly paid for it—many times," Wilson said.

"It's a family request, just family. We'd love it," Mrs. Tyson added.

Zoners Override Foes To Cardinal Request

In the face of opposition from a group of Sanford residents, the city's Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) last night voted in favor of a rezoning request to allow Cardinal Industries to locate an apartment complex next to the Sanora housing development.

The P&Z board, which voted unanimously on the request,

now will recommend to City Commission the property be rezoned from commercial to multiple-family residential.

The property in question is located on the east side of Airport Boulevard and north of Sanora Boulevard.

Cardinal Industries, a Columbus, Ohio based modular apartment manufacturing firm, plans to locate 48 apartment units at the site on Sanford Avenue.

Cardinal is a new industry, which has bought the vacant Hunt Plant on South Sanford Avenue, plans to begin plant operations in June. The modular units are constructed in the plant and later transported to the site.

Bob Baker, a resident in the Sanora development, summed up the 10 residents' objections to the complex by saying it "was ill conceived and a poorly thought out place to put it (an apartment complex)."

Baker told the board he opposed the apartment complex because it was "another endeavor to lower the quality of development" and that South Sanford Avenue is not equipped to handle the traffic to the apartments.

Baker also was concerned

that since the apartments were frame construction that the city fire department would not be able to adequately protect the complex.

"It is a haphazard, irrational spot for zoning," he said. "More apartments are not even needed here now. There are already enough apartments in the same price range."

Austin Guiringer, president of Cardinal Industries, told the board and citizens that a single

bedroom would probably rent for \$145 or \$155 per month.

Guiringer and company vice-president Paul Jarvis showed complimentary pictures of the projects in Ohio.

"If you are concerned about property values dropping," Guiringer told the residents, "I would be willing to buy a home in Sanora myself."

Concerning the proposal to permit parking of interest on the site plans:

"We will have to be careful on the site plans."

In other action:

— approval was given on a conditional use for a site plan for construction of a church at 10th Street and Hickory avenue.

— approved a site development plan for a bakery at 253 S. Laurel Ave.

— approved a conditional use plan for a garage at 1121 S. Sanford Avenue.

Southern Bell Set To Tell Sanford 'No' To Franchise

Sanford City Commissioners Telephone Company.

Tom Hunt, local manager of Southern Bell, will meet with their telephone franchise commission (P&Z) last night at 7 p.m., in City Hall with the reply from

telephone officials in Southern Bell's headquarters in Atlanta, Ga.

Hunt this morning would not comment on the decision made by top telephone officials, but both he and Sanford City Manager Warren 'Pete' Knowles have predicted that the offer made by the city would be rejected.

Commission two weeks ago offered Southern Bell a 30-year franchise agreement, which following the first two years could cause customer telephone rates to increase.

The offer allowed Southern Bell the right of way in the city to conduct their business and pay the city one per cent of the company's gross annual revenues for the first two years.

The use of the public's right-of-way means the telephone company has the authority to use public streets in their work.

An example is tearing up the street to lay a telephone line and then repairing the street.

Following the two year period, the city would hold the option to raise the franchise fee to 2 per cent, a move which Hunt said would cause an increase in telephone rates.

Hunt also told commissioners at that time that the company officials, "under no circumstances" would accept a franchise which might allow a 2 per cent fee.

County Utility System 'Nearer'

County Commissioners Monday will take another step towards a county-owned, regional utility system by wrapping up the details in a contract for the purchase of Eagle Utilities.

The purchase of the system, which serves 100 water and sewer customers in Sterling Park, will bring the number of county-owned systems to three once bond validations for Consumer and Indian Hills utilities are completed.

Capacity for the Eagle water plant is 300,000 gallons a day, and 100,000 a day for sewer processing, according to Utility Control Director Bill Dale.

Pastor's Corner

Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her, that he might sanctify her, by the washing of water with the word, that he might present the church to himself in splendor, without spot or blemish or any such thing, that might be anything and without blemish." (Eph. 5:25-27)

Not everyone who says he loves Christ loves the church. Many have made the statement, "The church doesn't matter; it's all about Christ." In this age of anti-institutionalism, such a statement may seem elementary.

However, if the Bible is to be believed, the church does matter. Why? For one reason, Christ died for the church (Eph. 5:25). If He thought the church was dying for her, how dare He say the church doesn't matter? For another reason, Christ will someday present the church to himself in perfect condition (Eph. 5:27). If it is the church which is to be presented to Christ, then those who desire salvation must also desire to be a part of the church. The church is the bride of Christ (2 Cor. 11:2); and the church is the body of Christ (Col. 1:24). If one wishes to be united with Christ, he must thus be united with the church.

Some say, "But you see, I'm part of Christ's invisible church, therefore it doesn't matter whether I become part of any visible congregation." This statement is difficult to understand and impossible to realize. Christ established the church so that his people might have fellowship with each other and work together in this life. Such a purpose could be impossible if we were all invisible.

Some may say, "I'm a member of the church universal but not of a specific local congregation." This is impossible. Our only approach to the church universal is through the local congregation. If we are unwilling to claim our brethren in specific local situations, there is no way we can be identified with the brethren in general.

The Bible says that "the who does not love his brother whom he has seen, cannot love God whom he has not seen" (1 John 4:20). It might be added that the statement, "The church doesn't matter; it's all about Christ," is a statement which is unbelief. The church is the bride of Christ (2 Cor. 11:2); and the church is the body of Christ (Col. 1:24). If one wishes to be united with Christ, he must thus be united with the church.

Ordaining Homosexuals Opposed

LAKELAND — A statement opposing efforts to make homosexuals eligible for ordination as clergymen has been issued by resident Bishop Joel D. McDavid of the United Methodist Church's Florida Conference and his cabinet of 12 district superintendents.

"We do not think that practicing homosexuals persons should be generally acceptable as pastors or associate pastors to children, youth and adults in our local churches, nor do we believe they should be," the statement said.

An effort to gain ordination rights for acknowledged homosexuals is expected to be a major issue at the next United Methodist General Conference, the church's top legislative and policy-making body, when it meets in 1976 in Portland, Ore.

Noting the pressures of groups which advocate the ordination of homosexuals, Bishop McDavid and his cabinet said, "We view with concern some of the current suggestions that our church's laws should be changed," and pointed out that moral principles and scriptural teachings should be involved in considering the church's position.

All Methodist clergymen are subject to annual appointments, the statement noted, and some of the suggested changes, if adopted,

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Seven Cardinal Virtues: The Brightest Of Virtues Is Hope

"To believe in God is to know that all the rules will be fair and that there will be wonderful surprises." (Ugo Betti)

One of the strange and exciting patterns to be found in the Bible is the unexpected. When human events are at an impasse, when despair reigns and the flag of defeat is flying—a herald of divine energy appears.

In the case of the prophet Jeremiah we have this word: "Thus says the Lord of hosts, the God of Israel: Take these deeds, both this sealed deed of purchase and this open deed, and put them in an earthenware vessel, that they may last a long time." Jeremiah was supposedly stuck with his cousin's opinion: to redeem the land, he had possession of a farm right smack in the middle of a war. The prophet preferred to be a refugee camp not a real estate office! But he heeds the divine nudge, puts the deed in a vessel, for a "long time, for houses and fields and vineyards shall again be bought in this land." (Jeremiah 32)

The Hebrew prophets were not unlike in much, but in seeing bright things coming they were all agreed. No matter how dark and dismal the picture which they painted of the world in which they lived, they never laid down their brush until they had tinged the horizon with golden fire. No man has a right to call attention to the terrible and tragic features of his time unless he has at the same time pointed to the deepening splendor of a great glory awaiting the East. Sometime, somewhere, the prophets said, the city of the Lord shall be established and its glory shall go forth into all the earth."

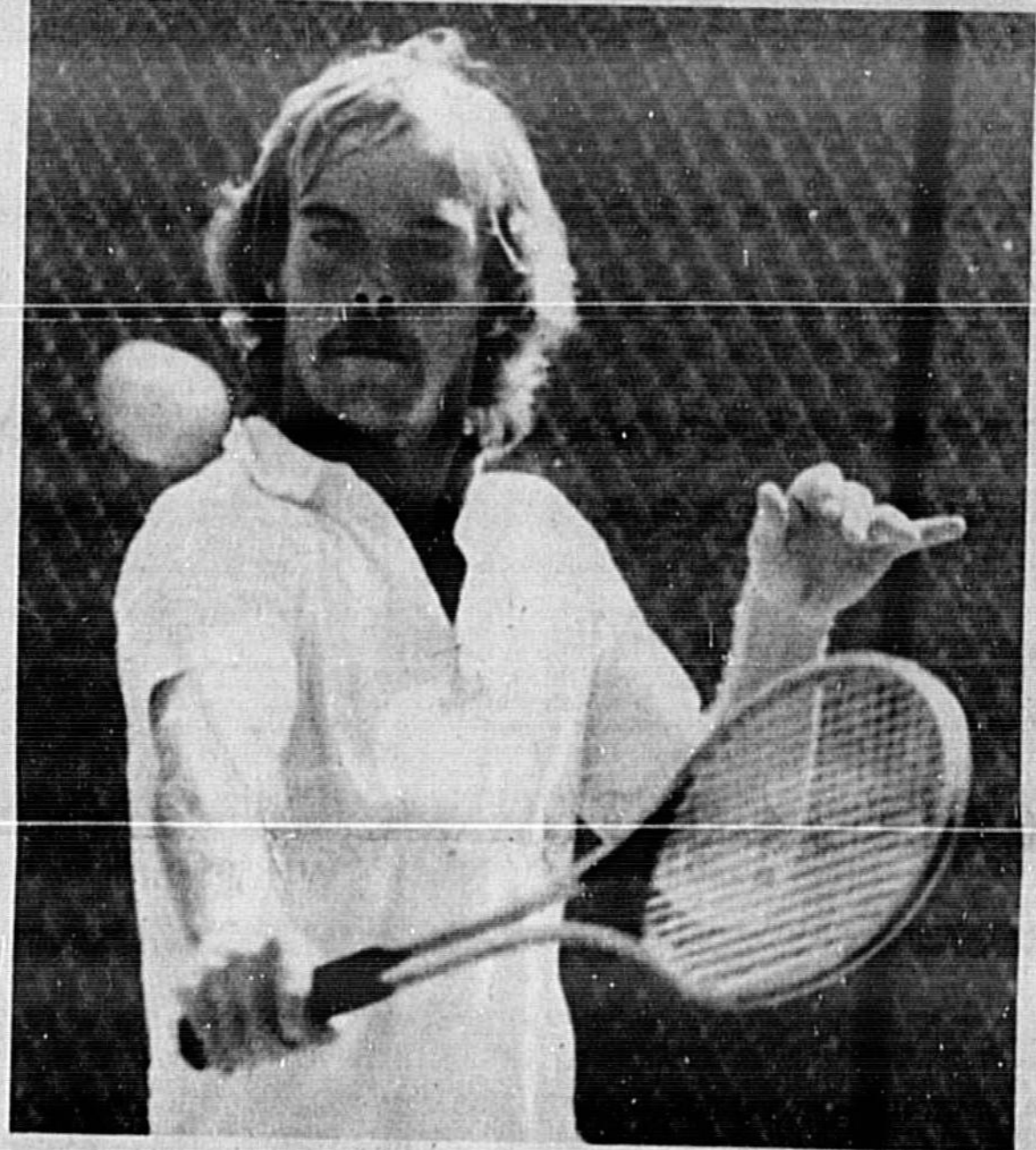
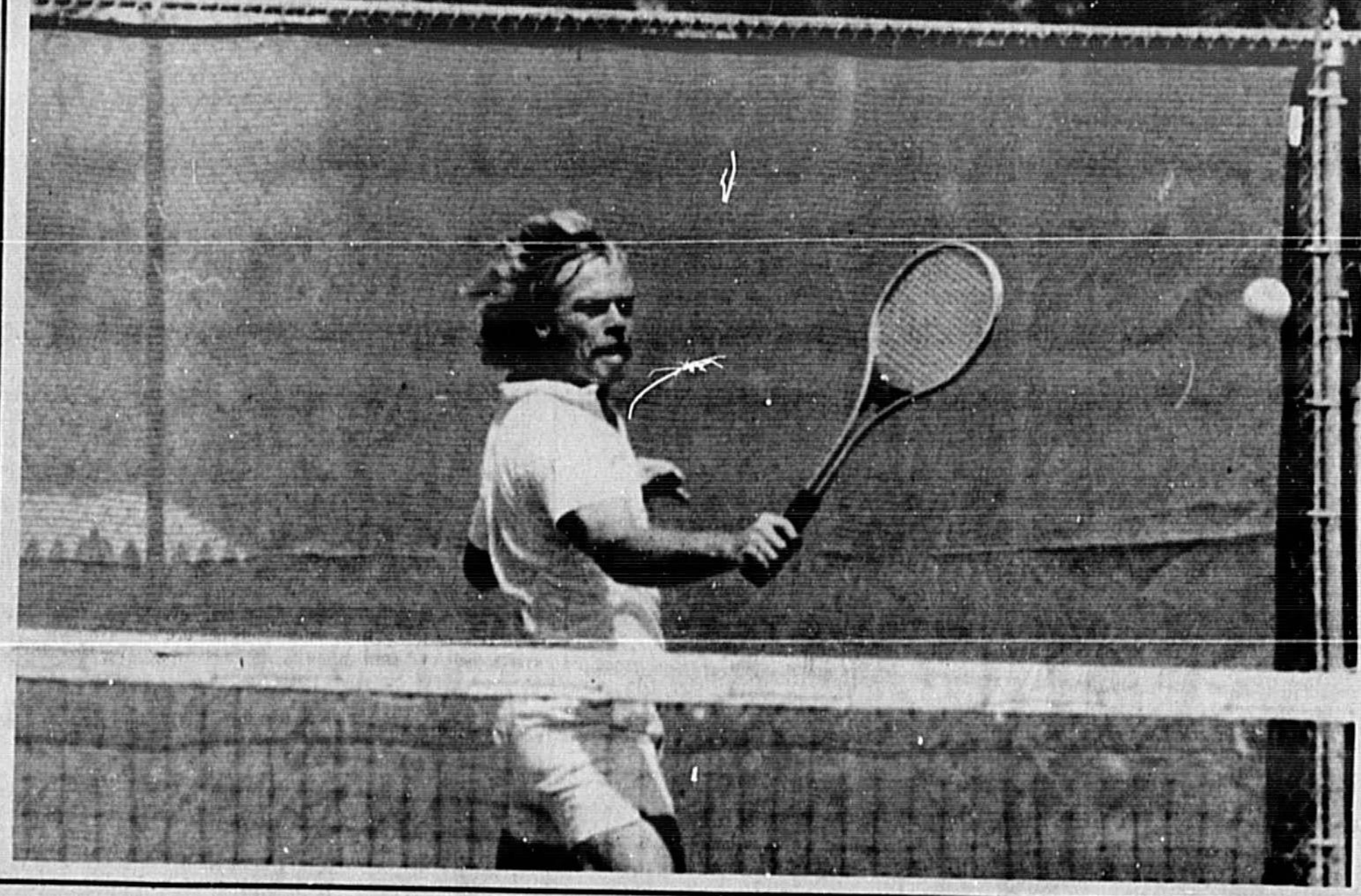
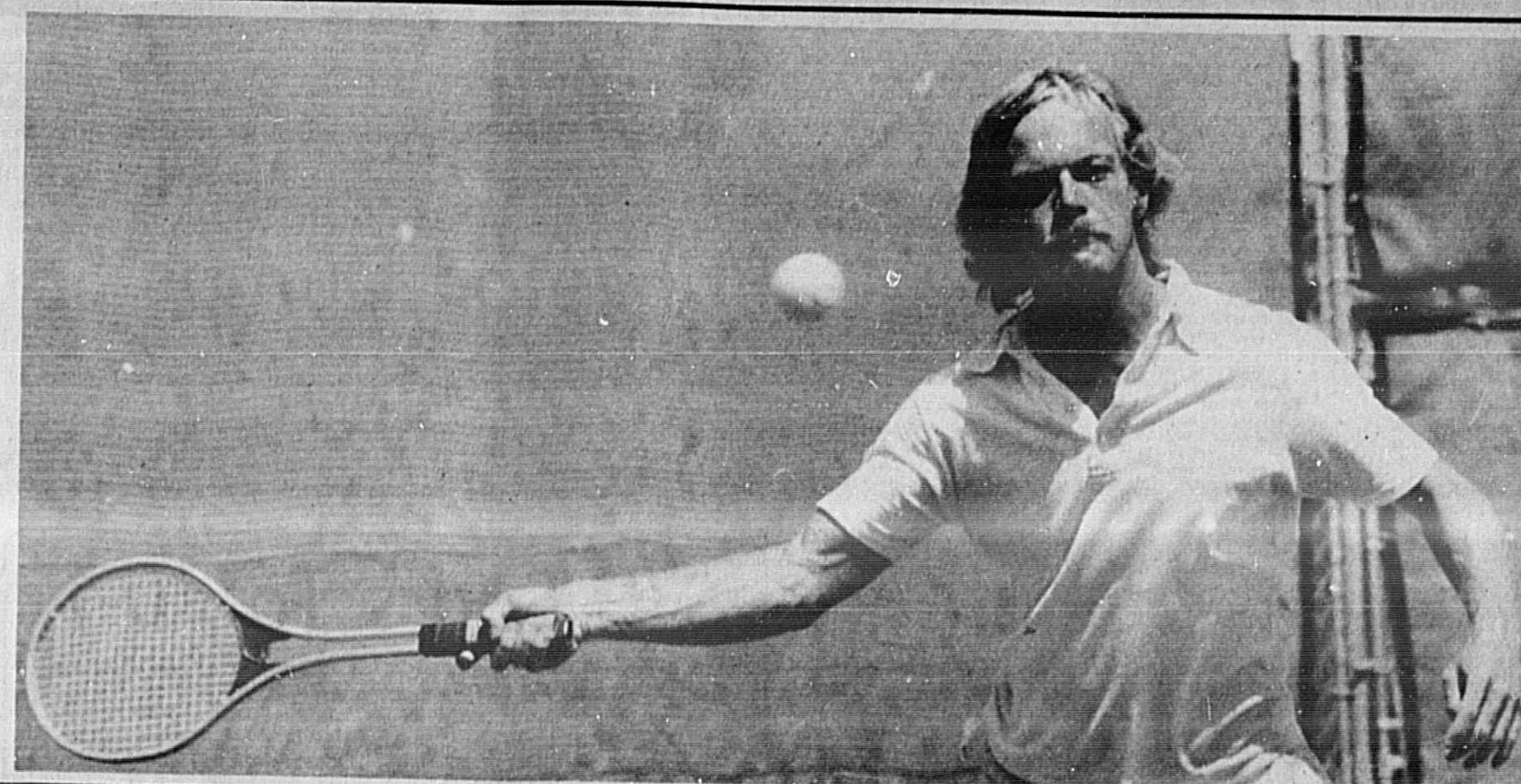

By ASSOCIATED PRESS Portland, Ore., second-ranked UCLA squeaked past unheralded Montana 67-64 and No. 7 Arizona State topped 16th-ranked Nevada-Las Vegas 87-84. All the winners will meet Saturday for the regional titles, then the winners will advance to the national semifinals at San Diego March 29. The championship will be at San Diego March 31. Indiana's victory over Oregon State was its 34th in a row over two years and 31st this season. The Big Ten Conference champions got 34 points from Steve Green, who connected on 14 of 19 field goal attempts, and 23 points from Kent Benson. Kentucky, 24-4, led upstart Central Michigan by only two points with eight minutes left, before pulling away with three straight baskets. Kevin Grevey paced Kentucky with 17 points. Syracuse's victory over North Carolina was the biggest upset so far in the far-ranging NCAA tourney. The Orangemen, 42-7, won it on Jim Lee's field goal with three seconds remaining. Lee finished with 24 points. Chuck Williams' 32 points, 24 in the second half, led Kansas State, 20-4, past Boston College. The Eagles rallied to within 65-63, but couldn't overcome the Wildcats, who shot a sparkling 83 per cent from the field, hitting 34 of 44 attempts. Louisville, 26-2, used first-half streaks of 15-0 and 10-0 in building a 42-25 lead and beating Cincinnati, ending the Bearcats' 16-game winning streak. Maryland, 24-4, rallied from a 15-5 deficit against Notre Dame and finally forged ahead to stay 50-48 early in the second half on a field goal by John Lucas, its high scorer with 24 points.

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Reader Has Weight Loss

DEAR DR. LAMB — I had some tests for nausea and the tests show I do not have enough acid in my system. The doctor seems to be at a loss to know how to treat my condition. He has tried several medicines but to no avail.

I have tried Metamucil which seems to give some relief. The X ray tests show only the diverticulosis.

I'm on a soft diet and a supplementary diet, but I'm losing weight. I have lost 20 pounds and only weigh 93 pounds now. I'm very miserable with this condition.

DEAR READER — It is fairly common for people to have decreased amounts of acid in the stomach after age 50. Often it is not associated with any symptoms at all. It can affect your ability to absorb vitamin B-12 and in that case pernicious anemia may develop, requiring B-12 shots. Taking the usual amount of B-12 by mouth will not solve the problem. I presume that you don't have anemia, but it can be associated with nausea.

Your problem may be from your colon, and the story of getting some relief from Metamucil is suggestive of this. The Metamucil provides bulk which you should be getting from a proper diet.

Diverticulosis, or pockets on the colon, usually mean the person has had long-standing problems with bowel function, whether or not they have recognized it. Spastic colon is a common accompaniment of diverticulosis.

Many people first learn they have diverticulosis from an X ray because the condition may cause no symptoms that have

really bothered the patient. So it is a bit difficult to say this is your problem. Gall bladder disease and other conditions also cause nausea. A more detailed history of your symptoms would help.

Meanwhile I would question the use of a soft diet for anyone with uncomplicated diverticulosis or spastic colon. So often in our culture these conditions are the result of a diet devoid of bulk, particularly cereal fiber. It is a big change from the old management of diverticulosis, but in many cases it is the change that produces the results.

A large number of people have some excess gas when they start using a bulk diet with cereal. This will last about

three weeks when the digestive system is adjusting to a more normal diet, instead of the refined flour, sugar and bulkless food so many people have become accustomed to eating. A good source of bulk is the whole cereal group made from wheat. The bran and shredded wheat are good examples. You might start your program with real whole wheat bread and avoiding sugar and products made with white flour. I don't mean brown bread sometimes sold as whole wheat but the real thing made from 100 per cent whole wheat flour and not half whole wheat and half white flour.

Faced with the loss of Law Enforcement Assistance Act (LEAA) money for the \$750,000 operation of the Sanford Crime Lab, local officials say their only alternative is to ask the state to take over the lab "lock, stock, and barrel."
