Cooperative Group Will Have Meeting

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—(Special)—Recent developments in the cooperative purchasing of farm supplies by co-operators organized primarily to market farm products will be described at conferences on cooperative purchasing at the 17th session of the American Institute of Cooperation, January 12-16, in Atlanta, Georgia.

Sponsored by the University of Georgia and Georgia Cooperative Council, the January meeting of the institute will be its first southern session since 1933, when it met in North Carolina. This year the institute devotes from its usual policy of meeting on a college campus, as for the first time its session is being held during the school year. All meetings will be in downtown Atlanta hotels, the Wesley Memorial Church, and the Atlanta Chamber of Commerce Building. Although no discussion of cooperative purchasing under a wartime economy has been officially scheduled, it is expected that many of the speakers addressing the purchasing conferences will broaden their talks to include an examination of cooperative problems and policies in wartime.

James C. Morton of Waverly, Florida, superintendent of the Waverly Growers Cooperative, will discuss cooperative purchasing by fruit and vegetable marketing co-ops at the conference on Wednesday, January 13.

A.F.L. Makes Peace Offering To C.I.O.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 18.—(AP)—The American Federation of Labor offered Tuesday to make peace with the C.I.O. asserting in a declaration of war labor policy that there was no place in the present emergency for rival labor disputes.

The declaration was adopted at a meeting of A.F.L. officers. It said: "We regret sincerely and are deeply concerned with the destructive rivalry and organization that has beset the American labor field for the past few years. We hold all such rivalries and jurisdictional conflicts have no place in an emergency such as faces America and the world today. We therefore, renew our offer for unity in the labor movement and for the common defense of our nation against mortal danger. We hope our call to this end may act as a balm."

The declaration also went on record in favor of a no-strike policy for the duration of the war.

Senate, House Fail To Agree On Age Limits

Controversy Occurs On Starting At 19 Or 21 Years

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—(AP)—The Senate-House committee conference, working on selective service legislation, broke up in complete disagreement today on the minimum age for active service.

The Senate passed the measure of 79 to 2. California's two Senators, Downey, Democrat, and Johnson, Republican, recorded the only "no" votes.

The action sent the bill to conference with the House, which only Wednesday passed its own version limiting military duty to men in the 21-44 bracket.

The Senate measure would clear the way for a potential army of 2,000,000 men, an increase of 600,000 in the present force.

A force of 7,000,000 men would be established if the two chambers compromise on 20 years as the lowest age limit for service.

The final vote followed rejection of three amendments to modify provisions affecting 19 and 20 year olds.

The sub-contracting, scattered from New England to Wisconsin, covers 40 companies for machinery, 41 for supply of productive material, 122 for miscellaneous supplies such as wire, paper, tools, jigs and fixtures.—Wall Street Journal.

Be Fair to Foreign Born

In Seminole County, as in most American communities, there is a sizeable sprinkling of foreign-born people. Here they hail mostly from Germany, Bulgaria, Hungary and Rumania, nations with which we are now at war. But most of them are as good American citizens as if they came from England.

During the last war many injustices were committed against German-Americans, as prejudices against their mother country grew until even the singing of German folk songs became an anathema to many people. Anyone who spoke with a broken accent, whether he was from Germany or Italy, a country with which we were then allied, was apt to be spied upon, lied about, fired from his job, or if he was in business, boycotted.

We hope that in this war all of us can keep a better sense of balance, though the destruction of Japanese cherry trees in Washington is not particularly encouraging. We should try to remember that we are not fighting the Japanese horticulturists who developed the Japonica, or the German scientists, scholars, and musicians who have given the world some of its finest achievements, but rather the Nazis, the Fascists and the war lords, who are a curse to their own people as well as to us.

Most German-Americans left their native land because they could not stand the tyranny which the Prussian military caste imposed upon them. They came to America like the rest of us because they wanted to be free to think and worship as they pleased and because they saw here a country of equal opportunity for all where a man was not denied the privileges of other men because of his race, creed or religion.

Let the rest of us remember this in our dealings with our friends and neighbors, regardless of whence they came. If you are convinced that a man is a spy, or a traitor, don't tell your neighbors, or your customers. Tell the police. They will know what to do.

What To Do About Worry

"One of the wisest men I ever knew had a private Trouble Tree in his front yard," relates Robert R. Updegraff in Your Life Magazine. "When he walked up the path on his return home at night, he mentally hung all the troubles and worries and fears of his day on a sturdy copper beech tree so that they would not intrude on his evening with his wife and children.

"In the morning when he left the house he would pick up his troubles — if they had not blown away in the night, which he declared they often had. But even if they were still there, to his rested spirit they seemed so much lighter that he shouldered them almost jauntily.

"In these war-darkened days when the world is full of worry and confusion, each of us might well adopt a Trouble Tree on which to hang our worries and fears every evening before entering our homes.

"After-hours worry is never intelligent. The problems which are our own responsibility will be better solved if we hang them on our Trouble Tree over night and come at them fresh in the morning. The things beyond our influence will not be cured by all the worrying we can hope to do.

"We must, of course, distinguish between idle worries and practical concerns. The concern of higher taxes, for example, is a potential worry that we will not be able to hang on any Trouble Tree and forget when the taxes fall due. But we can avoid making it a next year's worry by doing our self-sacrificing this year, setting aside each month the approximate proportion of current incomes that we expect to have to pay in income taxes.

"In any event, if we resolutely take charge of our worries, instead of letting them take charge of us, we may face the future with calm courage, and with the knowledge that we are not going through anything that the world has not survived before."

Don't Want Work

(From the Key West Citizen)

Closing of the electric welding school which offers free training for defense workers would be an irreparable loss to Key West.

But it will close unless the young men start enrolling immediately and in droves.

In other cities, the free vocational training schools are filled to overflowing. Here in Key West, the instructors are made to feel like private tutors, so meagre is the attendance at the classes.

Robert D. Dolley, state director of Vocational Training for Defense Workers, has threatened to remove the welding machinery to some other city where there is a demand for it.

And he will, unless Key West justifies the confidence he placed in it when he requisitioned the machinery for this city in preference to larger, and more influential cities.

There is no reason — no good, logical reason — why the men and young men of Key West should be so lax.

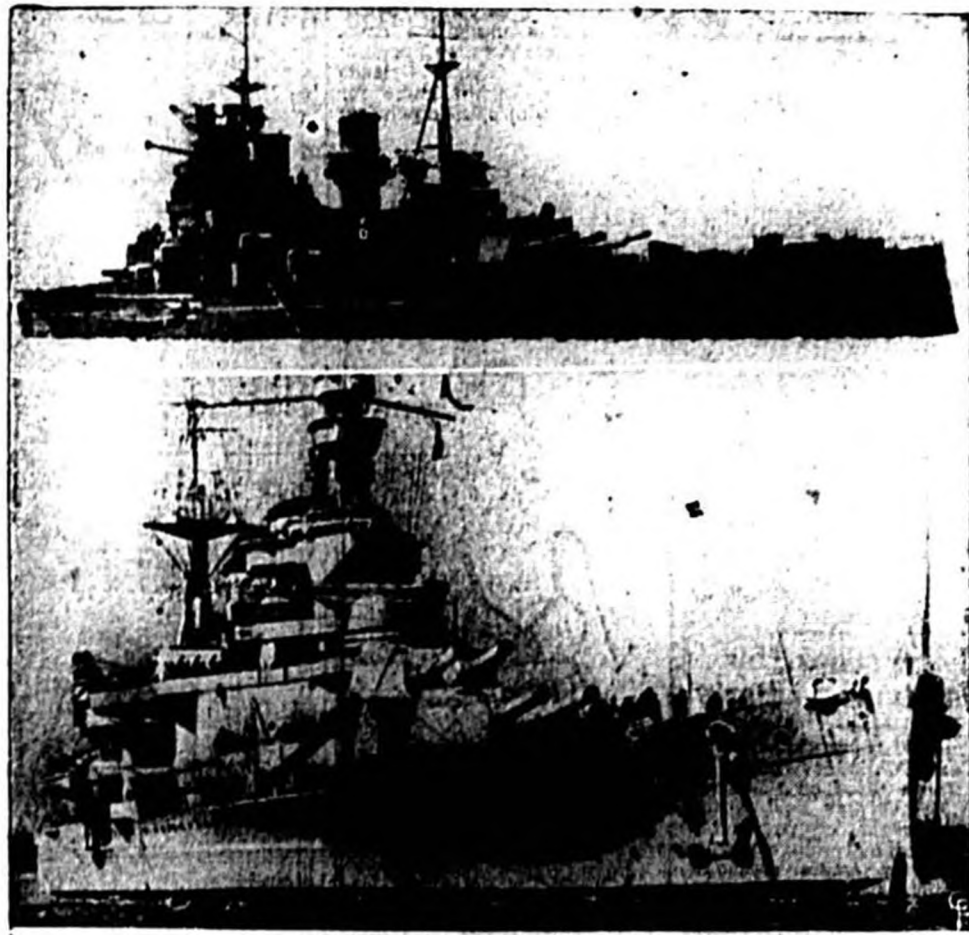

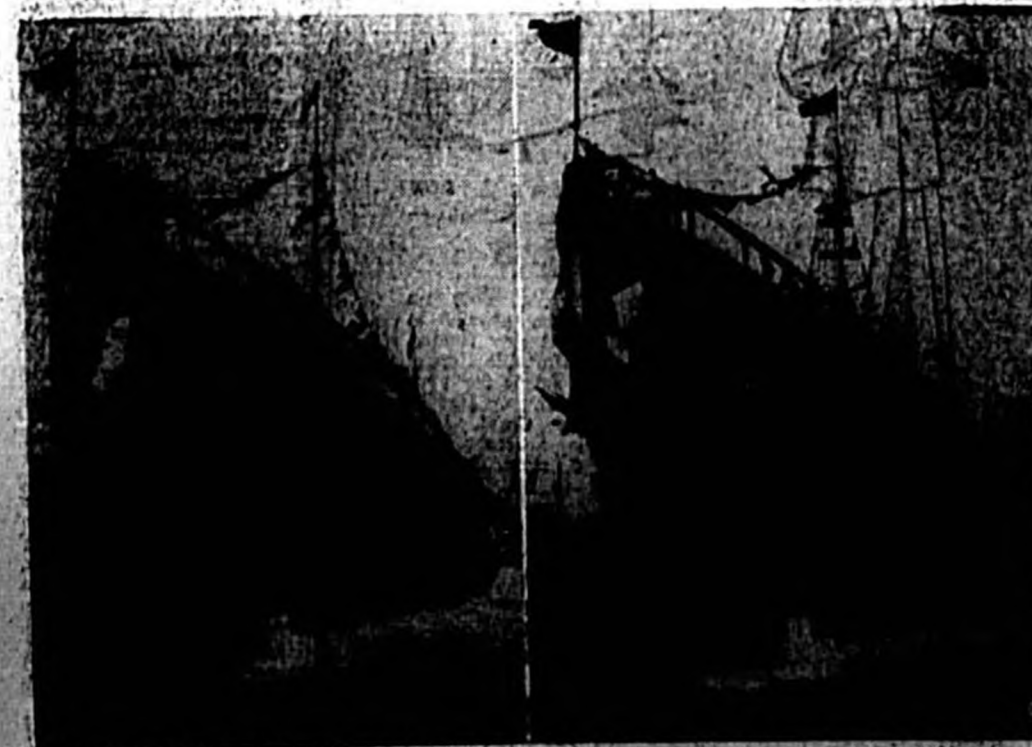

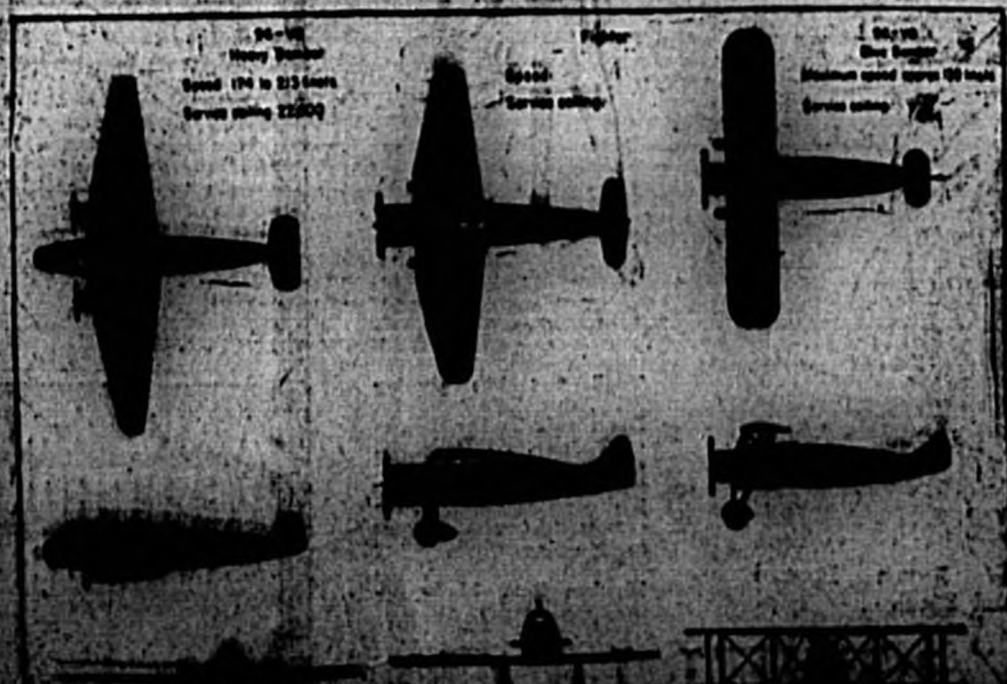

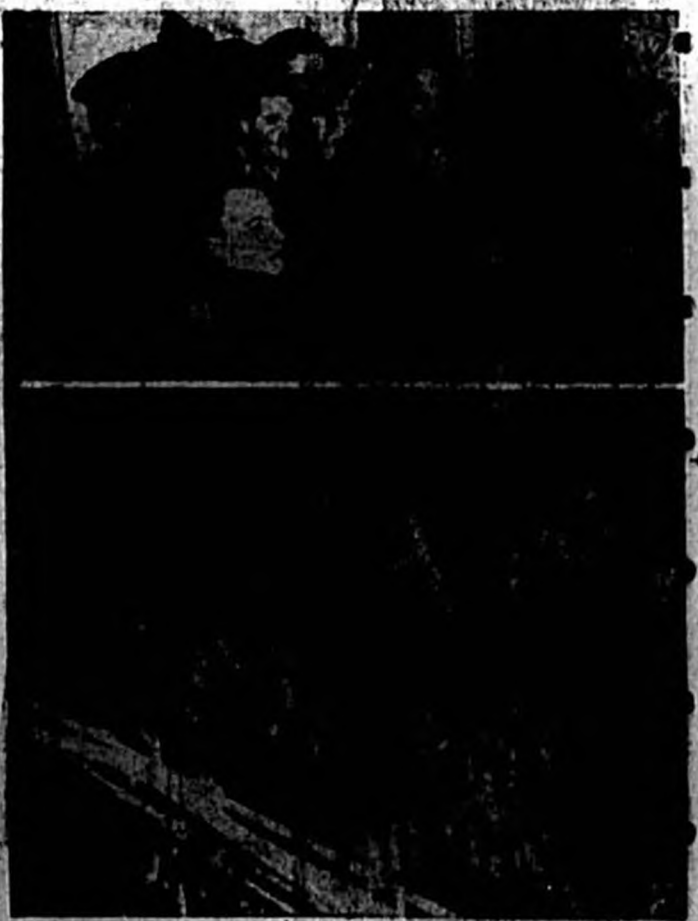

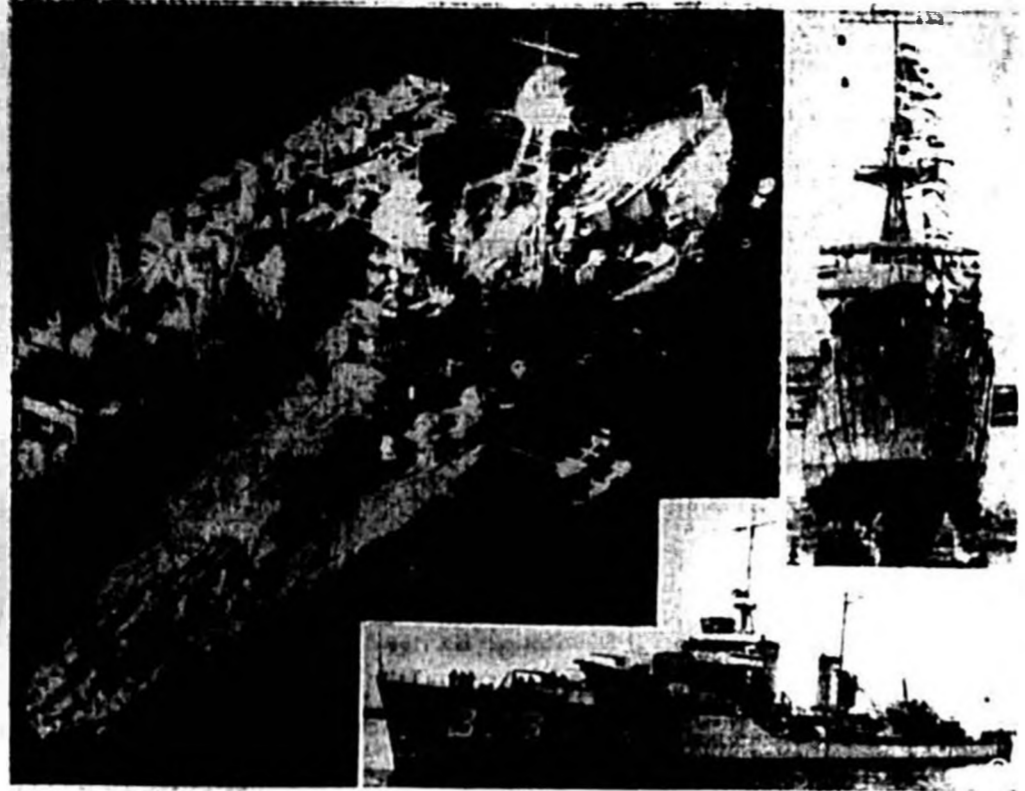

Legislation Is Passed To Increase Army

Registration Set By Congress At 18-64; Military Service Is Liable From 20-44

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Congress cleared today a way yesterday for a 4,000,000-man army by approving and sending to President Roosevelt legislation requiring the registration of all men from 18 to 64 years old, including and making those from 20 to 44 inclusive, subject to military service.

Officials at selective service headquarters said the registration probably would not begin before "several weeks." Although the new draft bill makes possible an Army of at least 4,000,000, there is no way of telling whether that many men will ever be called to the colors. Secretary of War Stimson has said increases in the Army would be ordered "in the light of the strategic situation as it develops."

Both Houses agreed speedily on compromise amendments to the Selective Service Act which War Department officials said would make a total of 2,218,000 men available in the next few months in addition to the 1,800,000 now in uniform. By compromising on a minimum age of 20 for active service — a year younger than the House desired and a year older than the Senate had voted — Congress cut off an additional supply of 600,000 potential soldiers.

But with 100,000 youths turning 20 every month, Congressional leaders said there was every reason to believe that the Army would get all of the men it could equip and train as fast as it could handle them. Under the new law, 100,000 more young men will be added to the Army each month.
