The fact that a wave of prosperity seems to be ahead of us is no reason why the consuming public should calmly submit to being gouged in the matter of its foodstuffs.

After the slabs are made and seasoned they are loaded on trucks and hauled down to the end of the bulkhead where they are placed into position by by draulic suction. The slabs are made to dovetail into position and will form a solid wall that will not only withstand the assaults of wind and water but will form a most handsome appearance from the lake side. The tops at present show the steel rods but these will be hidden by a beautiful stone coping that will cap the entire bulkhead.

As soon as the wall is formed the dredge will be started with the new equipment and the filling will be made in record time. The work is progressing in fine shape and is something that can be pointed to with pride by our citizens this winter even though it is only in course of construction for it demonstrates that Sanford is alive to the many opportunities offered and our city will eventually be the most beautiful spot in the state, provided by pature with the most advantageous position on the great artery of trade and travel.
