

Spotlight On Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Despite a budding career on the screen and TV, Fraser Heston has retired. What's more, he's going to spend as much time as possible in the woods of Michigan, away from the bright lights of Hollywood and New York.

No sense in kidding you—Fraser is 9 months old. He's the first-born of Lydia and Charlton Heston, and he has a resolute father.

"No more acting for my son" is the Heston edict. But, being a proud papa, he couldn't refrain from giving the lad's credits:

Portrayal of the Infant Moses in the bullrush scene for "The 10 Commandments," playing himself, on the Ed Murrow Person to Person show.

"But that's all there will be for now," assured the elder Heston. "I certainly don't want him to be a child actor. If he wants to be an actor when he grows up, that's up to him."

Heston added that he wants his son to spend much of his childhood in the woods of Michigan. The Hestons have a thousand-acre place near St. Helen, Mich., 200 miles north of Detroit. That's where Charlton grew up.

"I think it's much less healthy for a boy to grow up in a city atmosphere," he observed. "You have to instruct him in so many things. Like 'Don't accept rides from strangers' and 'Play only in front of our house.' In the woods, you don't have to develop such inhibitions. Kids grow up much freer. Boys especially: I don't think there is so much difference with girls."

"Also, it's a much healthier life in the woods. The air is clean and fresh, and a boy is outside active most of the time. We have no TV and no radio."

**State Dept. Chief
Henry Suydam, 64,
Dies From Attack**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 (AP)—Henry Suydam, 64, the State Department's chief press officer, died of a heart attack Sunday—less than two weeks after his wife died.

Suydam, Secretary of State Dulles Sunday praised Suydam for "great ability, coupled with a kindly personality and high sense of public duty."

As spokesman for the department, Suydam had accompanied to several international conferences, including the recent Big Four foreign ministers meeting at Geneva. He had directed the State Department's press section since Oct. 1, 1953, and was on leave of absence from his post as chief editorial writer of the Newark (N.J.) Evening News.

Mr. Suydam, the former Anne Hamilton Gordon of Baltimore, died Oct. 13.

The struck newspapers have continued collecting local news through a jointly operated hotel newsroom; they provide it to radio and television stations without cost.

Swamped by a windfall of local advertising, the stations have canceled some of their national programs for local shows punctuated with commercials.

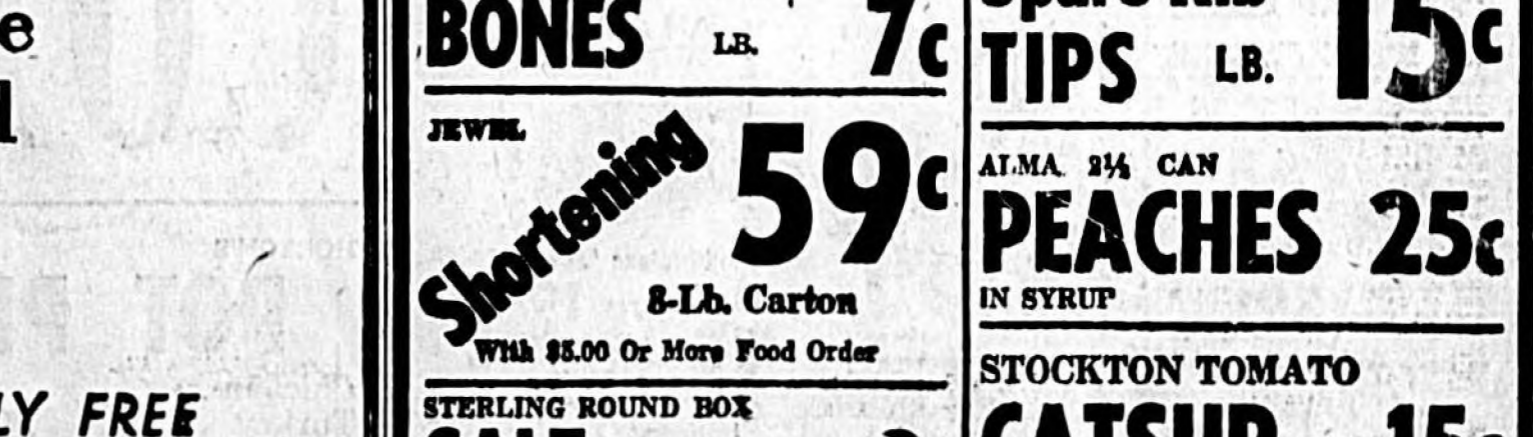
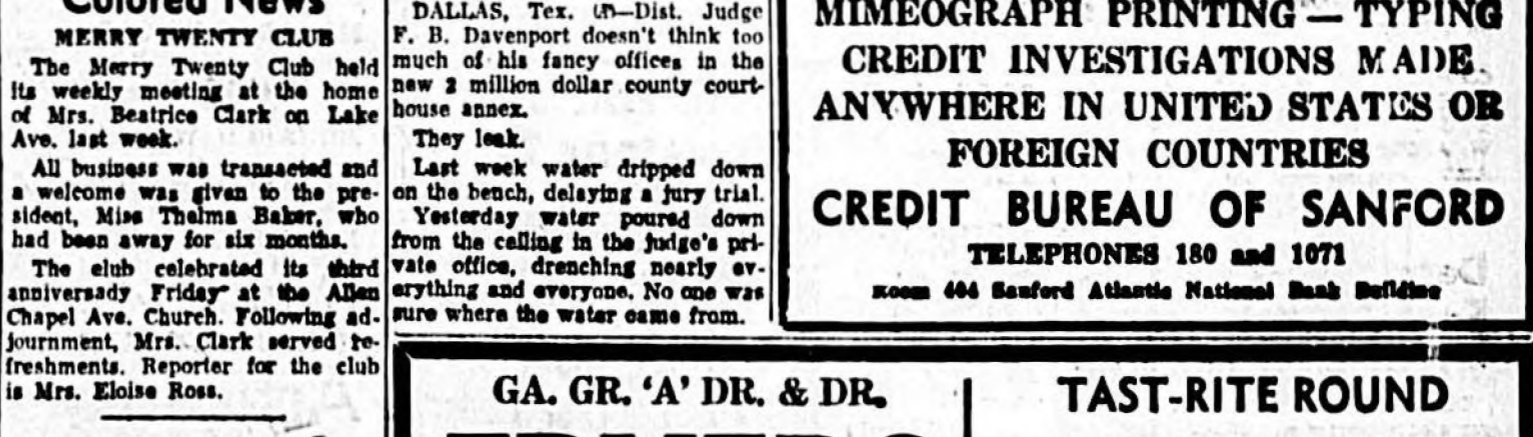
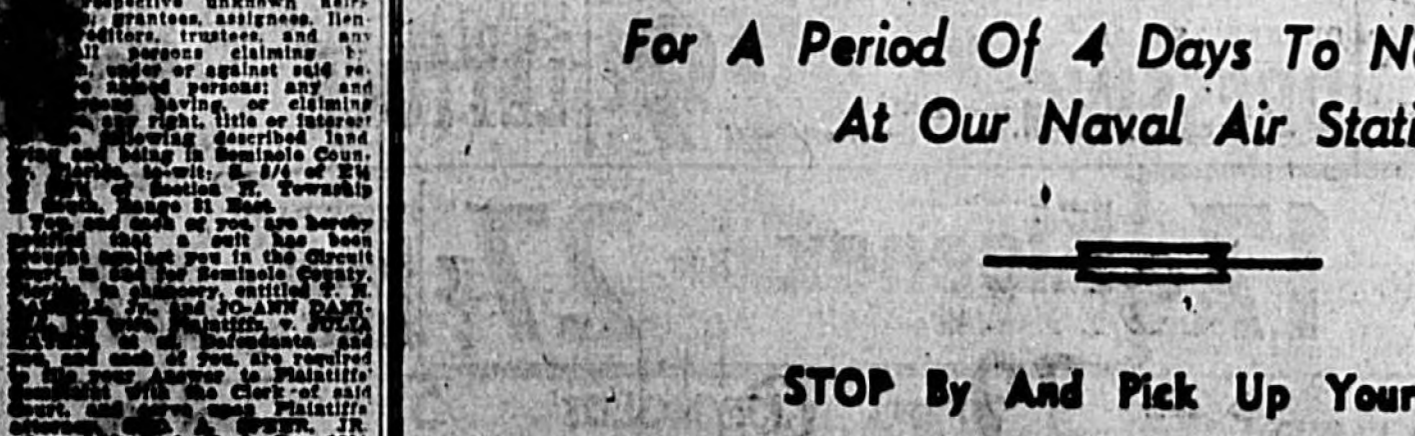
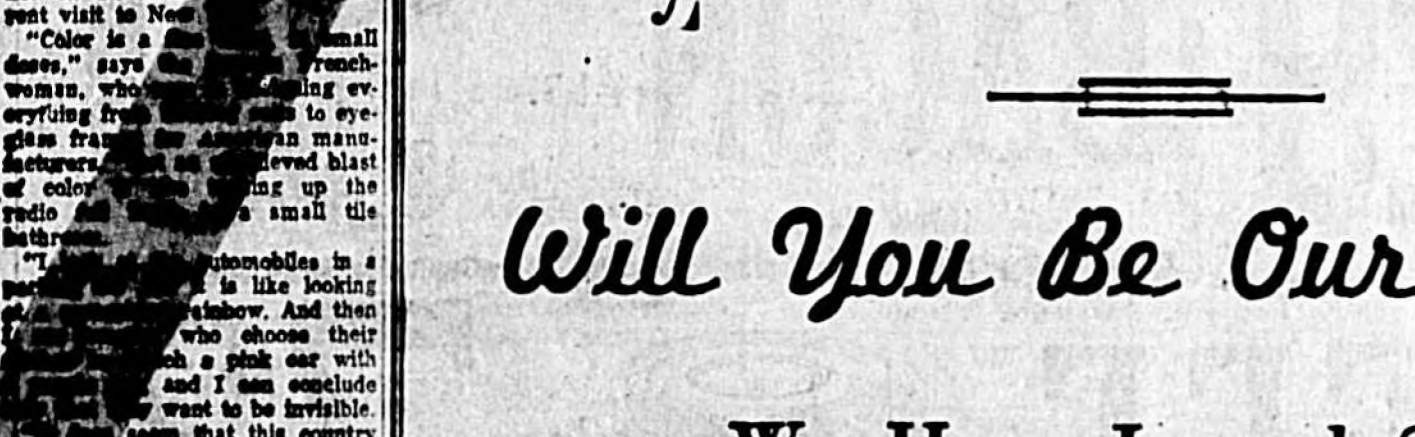
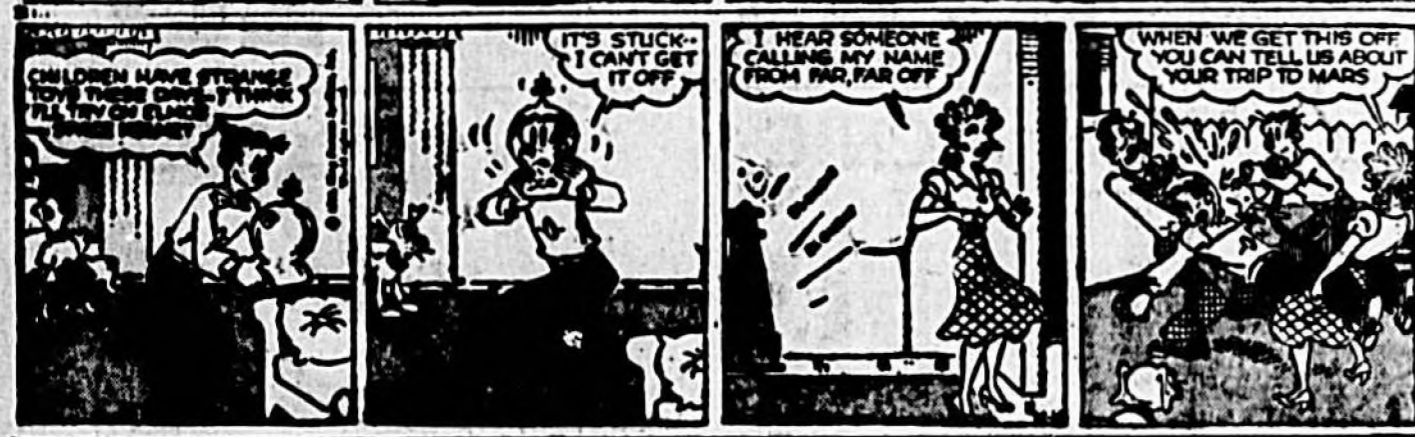
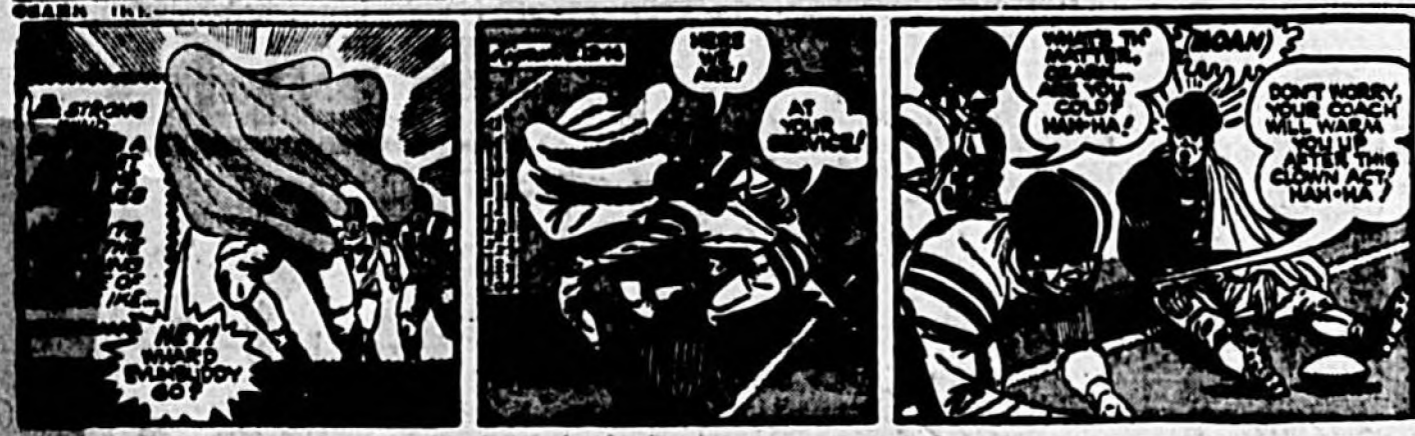

Living Room Tells Many Tales

BRIONI, Yugoslavia (AP)— You can find out a lot about a man if you poke around his living room for a while—even a dictator.

For instance, Marshal Josef Broz Tito, President of independently Communist Yugoslavia, likes boats—be they models or real speedboats. His taste in antique statuary is excellent and his taste in painting embarrassing.

You reach the Tito mansion by walking up a winding drive, past fountains lighted with changing colors at night and wooded groves where white-tailed deer hide.

Just short of the house, you see the sleek convertible Tito loves to drive. Too, you pass carriages drawn by magnificent grey horses. And then you are looked over by security guards and into the house you go.

The living room is the reverse of cosy. The big room is floored in black marble. At the far end is a piano, prettily painted gold and ivory. Five model ships are spotted

around the room: an old galleon, a big model of the coastal vessel Vladimir Nazor in drydock, and three sailboats.

Inside a glass case are dozens of beautiful Roman statuettes magnificently preserved and executed with a grace which hints they were the work of Greek slaves. Tito proudly reported all were excavated on Brioni.

Oddly out of place in the room is a Spanish cavalier in delicately painted porcelain—but not nearly as out of place as a large statue of a nude girl with her hand covering her face. This stands outside on the veranda.

The frame stretches the length of the house. From it you can look down through the oak trees to a snug artificial harbor in which Tito keeps his speedboats, which he pilots himself. A winding cement staircase littered with acorns lead up to the house.

Often Tito climbs into a speedboat with his handsome brunette wife and roars out to Vang, a smaller island. There he likes to exercise a hobby shared with President Eisenhower—cooking. Tito is an ardent amateur chef.

The home of the boss of Yugoslavia is that of a man of action, except for the oddly out of place piano and Spanish cavalier. But most out of place of all is the one big oil painting which stands in his living room.

The frame is battered, the painting torn in several places. It shows plump women holding about a cow, while choruses wail about, and as a work of art it is very inferior.

The dynamic Tito spent most of his life as a revolutionary, often in hiding. I felt that he must have picked up a conviction somewhere along the line that a living room should have a big painting and he didn't care very much what his looked like.

There wasn't a book or magazine in the room.

Yes, it's mighty interesting to spend an hour in a man's living room. You can learn a lot about him, including a man who rules a nation.

Your City Charter

YOUR CITY CHARTER
 Section 61. FISCAL YEAR. The fiscal year of the City shall begin on the first day of October and end on the thirtieth day of September of each year.
 Section 62. BUDGET OF EXPENSES AND LEVY OF TAXES. Prior to the first day of July of each year the City Manager shall make up an estimate or budget of the revenues and expenditures of the City for the ensuing year; such estimate or budget of revenues and expenditures shall be made with particular application to the various departments of the Government. A separate levy of taxes shall be made annually for the operating expenses of the City including public utility for the current year, but said taxes shall be allocated on the records of the City according to the several items of the estimate or budget, as aforesaid, and no monies shall be diverted from the levy for operating expenses to the levy for the funded indebtedness. The levy of taxes for operating expenses, including public utility, of the City authorized by this section shall be subject to the subject to the limitation prescribed by Section 64 of this Act and Section 68 of this Act shall not be repealed by the amendment of this section.
 Section 63. WARRANTS OR OBLIGATIONS NOT TO BE IN EXCESS OF APPROPRIATIONS. No warrants or obligations against the City shall be drawn in excess of the appropriations made in accordance with and under the next preceding section.
 Section 64. POWER TO LEVY TAXES: MAXIMUM FOR ORDINARY PURPOSES. The City of Sanford shall have the power to levy taxes each year for the ordinary purposes of the Municipality; provided that such levy shall not exceed one and one-half per cent of the assessed valuation of taxable property within its limits.
 Section 65. TAXATION, LEVY FOR INDEBTEDNESS. In addition to the levy provided in the next preceding section, the said Municipality may levy and collect annually such special taxes as may be required to meet any outstanding indebtedness with interest, including any judgments which may be rendered against the City.
 Section 66. FULL CASH VALUE, PROPERTY TO BE ASSESSED AT. The taxation herein authorized shall in each case be upon the valuation of taxable property in said city, as set forth in the assessment roll; provided that all property shall be assessed at its full cash value.
 Section 67. TO WHOM PROPERTY ASSESSED; ADJOINING PROPERTY MAY BE ASSESSED TOGETHER; ASSESSOR TO MAKE DILIGENT INQUIRY AS TO OWNERSHIP OF PERSONAL PROPERTY. All taxable personal property within the City shall be assessed and listed for the purpose of taxation on the City Tax Assessment Roll in the name of the owner, when the name of the owner is known to the assessing officer, and as "Unknown" when the name of the owner is known to the assessing officer, it shall be lawful to assess together several lots or tracts of land adjoining each other when such several lots or tracts of land are owned by one party, or jointly by more than one party, unless the owner shall request in writing that they be assessed separately. The Assessor shall make diligent inquiry as to ownership of personal property subject to taxation, and shall assess all such property in the name of the owners.

Shoppers Who Are Shippers Should Follow These Rules

Many Christmas shopping lists include gifts to be sent to distant friends and relatives. If shoppers who are also shippers follow some simple hints they can be sure that their packages reach their destinations safely, on time, and in perfect condition.

1. The first thing to do, of course, is to shop early enough. Equally important, Railway Express Agency points out, is the need to pack and tape or tie gift shipments carefully and address them correctly. Studies in past years have shown that when damages and delays occur, usually they can be blamed on inadequate packing and improper marking. Shipping gifts early enough to avoid the last minute rush presents no problem to the sender if gummed paper is used until Christmas.
2. Use old newspapers for cushioning material. Do not ball or roll the paper, instead tear vertically into 2-inch strips and then fluff and crinkle them.
3. Insert a 2-inch bottom layer of stuffed newspaper, then your gift. Stuff 2 inches of the material on the sides and top of the gift—but not too tight.
4. It is a good idea to double pack very fragile gifts. First pack them, with cushioning, in a proper sized carton. Then, with more cushioning, pack the first box in a second container in the same way.

When taping or tying:
The container must be securely closed or held together. Taping or tying, or both, can be used. Gummed tape, however, is preferable for shipments going by express. Sealed express packages do not involve extra charges or require opening for inspection.

When tape is used—at least 2 inches in width—moistening with a damp sponge, cloth, or paper napkin is recommended. Avoid soaking because it will impair adhesive quality. If a little vinegar is mixed with the water, the tape will stick more securely.

Tied gift packages also can be shipped very safely if strong twine and proper tying methods are used. The twine should be securely looped all around the length and girth of the package twice so that there will be a double strand. The twine should be knotted securely where the strands cross on top and bottom.

How to mark it:
Care in marking holiday gift shipments is equally important for safe, on time deliveries. "From" and "to" addresses should be hand-printed on the top of the package and repeated on one side. Black crayon or heavy pencil are best to use. Ordinary ink may smudge or run and become illegible. Gummed labels, preferably typewritten, are also suggested. Shippers should write or print clearly and be careful of abbreviations in addresses. States should be identified fully. For example—there are 28 communities named Madison in as many states.

brand name of "Sanford" the annual payroll would also double and eventually, in a period of approximately two years, rise to a possible \$400,000 to \$500,000.

The entire operation of the firm is expected to be shifted to Sanford, was the report from committee members who had talked with the local manager of the manufacturing plant.

Property for the location of the industry has already been secured but clearing and preparation of the property for building had not been accomplished because of the uncertainty of the project.

Through banking firms, 50 per cent of the financing would be secured with Sanford merchants raising 25 percent and the manufacturing firm furnishing the additional fourth of the money needed for the building.

Banks would handle the loan through a cumbersome manner but because of the public service such a loan would be feasible because of keeping the manufacturing plant in this area.

Two Florida communities and one from Georgia has already approached the Sanford firm relative to moving to their communities and in one instance the financing of the entire move would be handled by the city acquiring the firm.

One of the Florida towns said, "We don't want to take an industry away from Sanford, but if they're moving we want them here."

Sanford businessman Herman Jacobson told the merchants meeting this morning that the plant was originally set up as a school which was later converted into a
