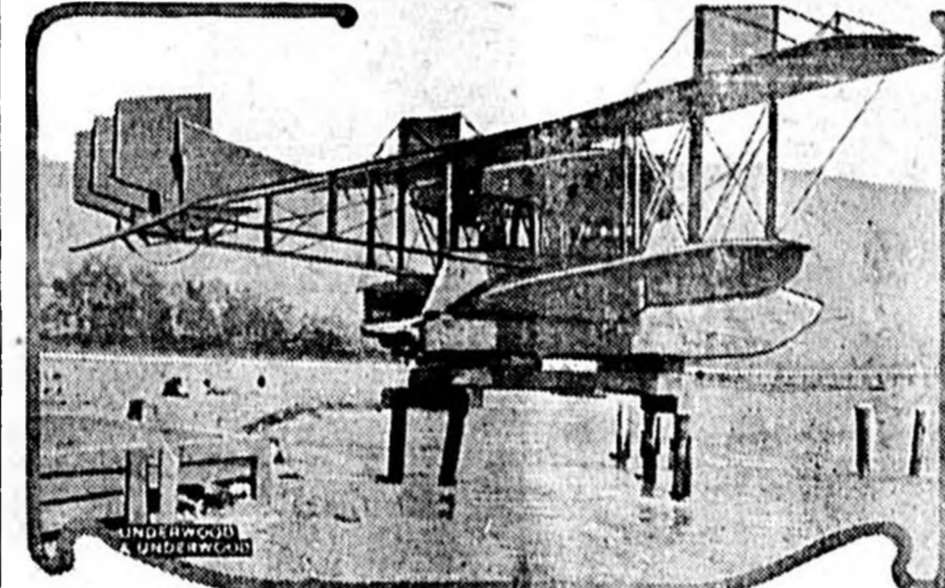

U-Ren said that Mrs. Hubbard told him, the bailiff who had charge of the jury and a number of reporters, that two men approached her husband, T. W. Hubbard, with a view to having him use his influence to have her change her vote.

Mrs. Hubbard let it be known that she had been voting for a verdict of guilty on the manslaughter charge whereof the motion picture comedian was accused.

To Arouse Congress to the Needs of Canals and Streams

IN EASTERN U. S.

MEETING AT SAVANNAH MAKES OFFICIALS THINK TIME IS RIPE TO DO SOMETHING

A campaign of vigor and far-reaching importance has been decided upon by the Atlantic Deeper Waterways Association to arouse congress and the country to a realization of the need of improving the canals and streams of the eastern part of the United States.

The Association held its fourteenth annual meeting in Savannah, Ga., last month. The convention was so successful that the officers decided that the time is ripe to urge action upon the program of insuring the plan of a continuous inside water route from Maine to Florida.

The Association heartily endorsed the action of the International Conference at Washington in declaring for the establishment of a naval holiday. A statement issued yesterday by the association defined its position in the following terms:

"It has been estimated that two out of every three dollars appropriated by the federal government during the entire period of its existence have been for the purpose of war or the results of war.

"We believe that the adoption of the concrete suggestions as proposed by the Secretary of State of the United States will greatly relieve the restlessness of a turbulent world and reduce materially the unbearable burdens of taxation. Thus will it be possible to give more serious consideration to the solution of domestic problems, foremost among which are internal improvements, including the adequate development of a national inland waterway system.

"Chief among these is the intracoastal waterway from Maine to Florida and thence to the Gulf of Mexico. The utilization of the sections already improved, which are as yet limited by the incompleteness of the whole system, has given substantial proof of the wisdom and the economic necessity for the project.

"We therefore urge the Congress to make the needed appropriations for the speedy completion of the Chesapeake and Delaware section and to adopt, without further delay, the Raritan Bay to the Delaware River and Beaufort, N. C., to St. Johns river, Florida, section.

"We urge the consummation of the purchase of the Cape Cod Canal and its maintenance and operation, free of tolls.

"The continued agitation for the canalization of the St. Lawrence river prompts us to reiterate our earnest belief in the principle declared at our convention in 1920, that all appropriations made by the congress of the United States for the improvement of waterways should be expended solely upon such improvements as lie wholly within American boundaries, jurisdiction and control."

TULANE-ALABAMA GAME BREAKS UP IN A BIG FIGHT

(By The Associated Press) NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 5.—The University of Alabama defeated Tulane by a score of 14 to 7 in a post season game here Saturday. The contest ended in an attack on Referee Finley, by spectators and students of Tulane when he ruled that a 50 yard forward pass from Legendre to Maloney, who ran ten yards for the touchdown to tie the score, was illegal as he had blown the whistle for time on the period.

All newspaper men at the game agreed that the ball was in play when the whistle blew, but referee Finley ruled otherwise and had to be escorted from the field by twelve policemen.

# WHAT IS CO-OPERATION?

Webster says it is: "The act of working or operating together to one end; joint operation; concurrent effort or labor; as the co-operation of the combined powers, the co-operation of the understanding and the will."

Elbert Hubbard, in his Roycroft dictionary, says co-operation means: "Doing what I tell you to do, and doing it quick."

The latter definition seems to be the one now generally accepted. There are a number of organized efforts now working for the welfare and the upbuilding of Melbourne, morally and physically. The individuals composing the various organizations and civic bodies are all honest in their endeavor to do what is best for the city, but there are those who believe that their particular organization should have the right of way in furthering certain movements. They have little use for the other fellow's hobby.

There are men who will tell you that they would take an interest in church work if all the churches in town would join together in one organization, but until such time as such a result can be accomplished they will do nothing. "Do what I tell you to do—or nothing doing for me."

Many devote their time, talent and money towards increasing the activities of the Chamber of Commerce, believing that through this organization most of the problems effecting the city's welfare can be solved. They are ready to co-operate in every way with any movement that has for its object the advancement of the city's interest. Others hesitate to join in a concurrent effort to carry out a new suggestion until they are first satisfied that it will reflect favorably on their own business affairs. They lack the imagination to see that the suc-

cessful advancement of the community as a whole will indirectly benefit all. But the man who does not desire to co-operate with any movement of this character can always find plenty of excuses, and hobbies of his own, as a reason for his absence from the meetings or taking an active part in the work of the organization.

The mayor and city council and the new park commission will need the hearty co-operation of every individual and every organization in the city during the coming year. The officers elected and appointed are expected to carry out a big program of public improvements and beautification. They are expected to do this work without pay, and some of our people will probably consider that their own responsibility ends when they have voted to put men in office, who are supposed to carry out their will; and criticism rather than co-operation is the order of the day.

Then there is the single driver who can not work with any one else. Give him a one man job and he will get the thing done in no time, but he must have his own way about it. You can best co-operate with this individual by letting him do the work you want him to do in his own way.

Welcome the day, when we can all see clearly the one end to be attained, and then work together in one concurrent effort to reach that end. Individual with individual, organization with organization, society with society—all jointly operating together to make Melbourne the city we want it to be.

What is co-operation? It is doing the thing you find necessary to be done, and doing it so willingly and joyfully that others will want to help you do it.

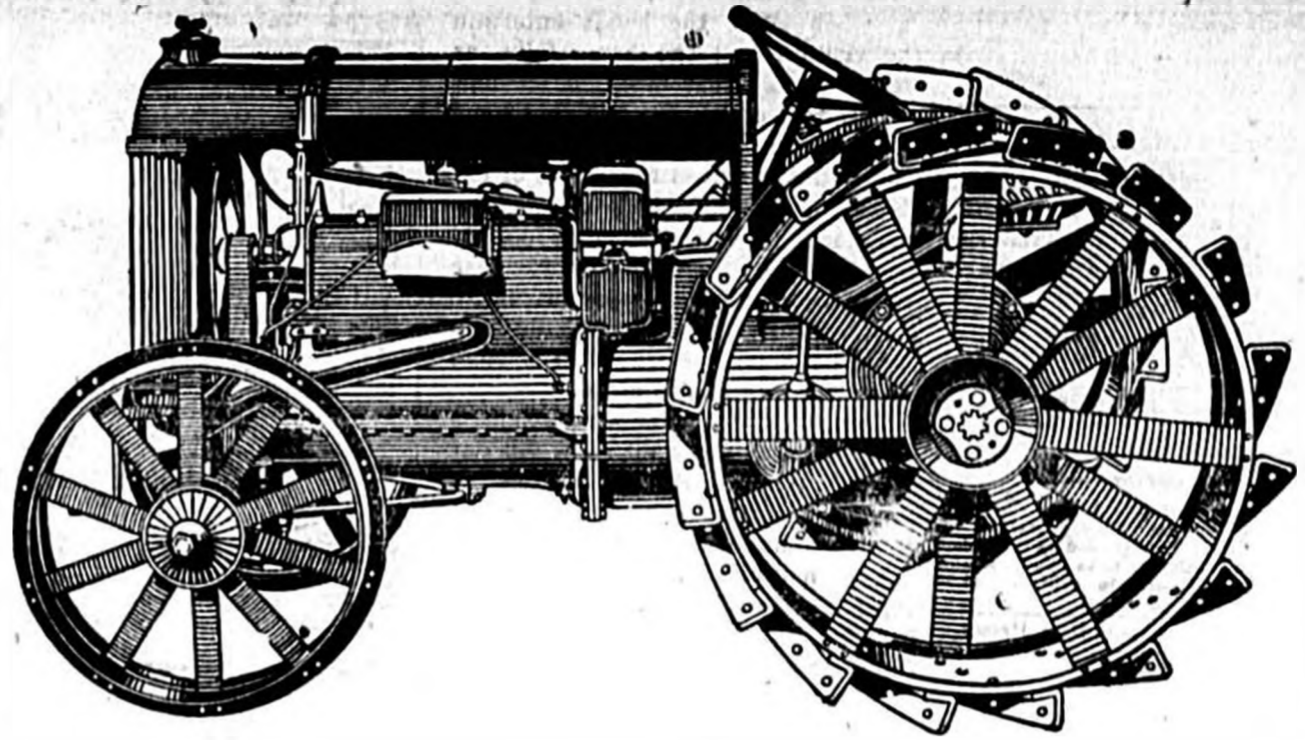
### BIRDS ARE AMONG OUR BEST FRIENDS

Often does the farmer think and look upon the birds around his farm as his enemies. No doubt he is often annoyed by depredations of birds. But hardly has he ever stopped to realize that the birds are among his best friends.

The bureau of Biology, United States Department of Agriculture, has made a survey of the work of birds and its findings are interesting and instructive. For instance: "On one Utah farm infested by the alfalfa weevil, English sparrows alone in one season fed to their young, it is estimated, 500,000 of the pests, making them about a third of the diet of the growing birds. Sixty-six kinds of birds feed on the cotton-boll weevil, the greatest feathered enemy of this pest being the orchard oriole. A single stomach of this kind of bird contained, upon examination, 41 boll weevils."

It is stated that hardly an agricultural pest exist that has not numerous effective bird enemies. "Twenty-five kinds of birds are known to feed upon the clover weevil and a like number on the potato beetle, 36 on the codling moth, 49 on horseflies, 67 on bull-bugs, 85 on clover root borers, 98 on cut-worms, 120 on leaf hoppers and 168 on wire worms," according to the findings of specialists of the Department of Agriculture.

In our groves and fields there are myriads of insects which cause us to make great expenditures in time and money for their eradication. At the same time we kill and permit others to kill the birds in our fields and forests, many of which are not game birds. We neglect to recognize these birds as our friends. Rather, we ordinarily consider them as unnecessary neighbors, or we actually regard them as positive enemies. In nearly every case these bird-neighbors are our friends, constantly aiding us by keeping down destructive insects.

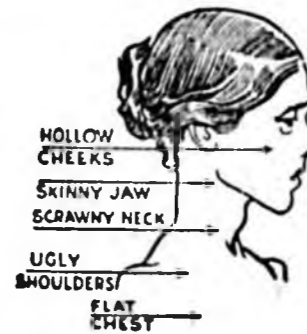
