

Dangerfield Just Won't Fade Away

NEW YORK (AP) — You might think that old comedians never die; they just fade away. But that's not true of Rodney Dangerfield.

A lot of people have come up the hard way in show business. But Rodney has done it twice: first as Jack Roy, a reasonably successful comic on small club circuits, and then, after a lapse of 12 years, in his present name as one of the most popular comedians on television.

Rodney was born in Babylon, N.Y., the son of a vaudeville performer named Phil Roy. At age 15, Jack Roy started writing jokes and doing imitations of W. C. Fields and Charles Laughton in amateur hour shows, where he won prizes of \$1.50 and \$5.

Now he gets \$8,500 plus expenses for a single appearance. Between the quarters and the thousands was a period when Jack Roy quit the standup comic routines to "live a normal life" as a businessman (in paint) and collect a wife and two children.

He has appeared on the Johnny Carson show 40 times and on the Dean Martin weekly show as the comedian-owner of a night club, Dangerfield's, which he opened in September 1969.

Rodney says he has turned down offers of as much as \$30,000 to appear in Las Vegas. "I do quite well in my own club or I'd go to Vegas," he said.

"People have a good time at my place and I like to see people walk out happy. There aren't many places left where you see people laugh. My place is probably the only one left that has a comedian working steady."

"It isn't good for a comic to hit too soon. He can't handle it. It takes comic 20 years of alking the boards to feel at home. My night club routine involves making 150 to 200 jokes in 45 minutes."

Some Stations Delay Increases County Gasoline Prices Start To Soar

Gas price hikes of up to 10 cents a gallon across the nation were predicted Wednesday, and already many Seminole County stations have upped their prices, including one by as much as 7.3 cents a gallon to 56.7 cents on high test and 51.2 on regular.

In recently announced hikes the American Oil Co. went up 5.8 cents; Fina Oil 5.5; Standard Oil and Sun Oil, 2; and Shell Oil 1 cent.

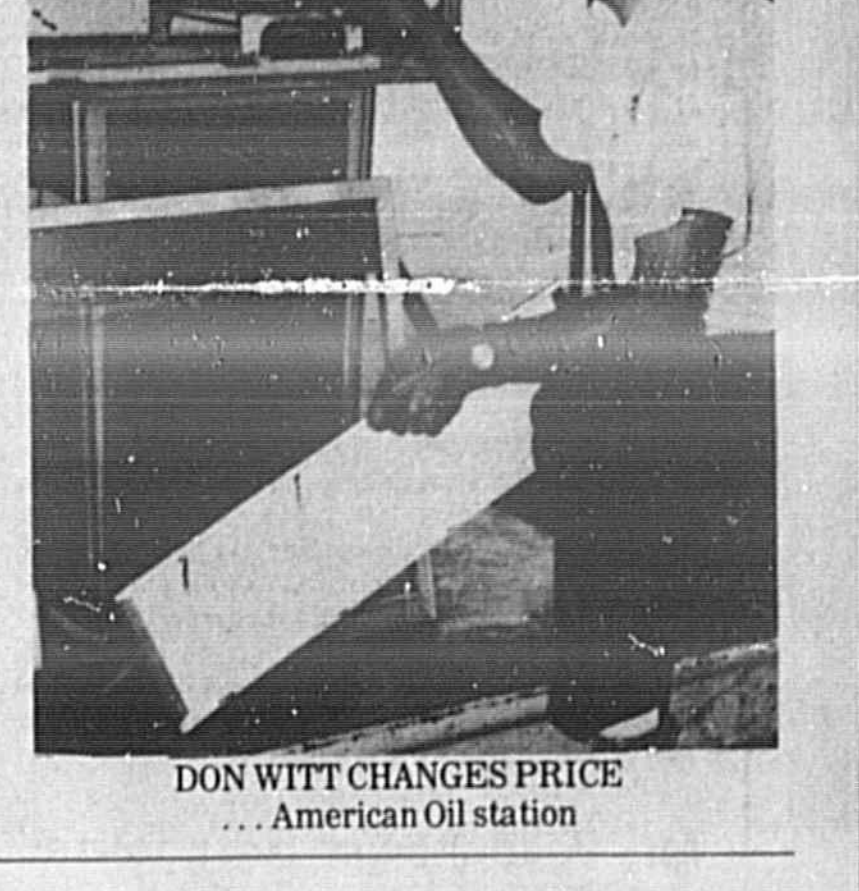
In Sanford, Wagner's Amoco manager Price Penick upped his gas price 7.3 cents a gallon; Witts American is up 6.8 cents to 55.9 cents for high test and 50.9 for regular; Williams Amoco prices have increased 5.8 cents, also to 55.9 on high

test and 50.9 on regular. "It's killing us," said Steve Williams, manager of Williams' Amoco. "People just aren't buying. I've been cussed out twice this morning because of the increase, and it's not my fault."

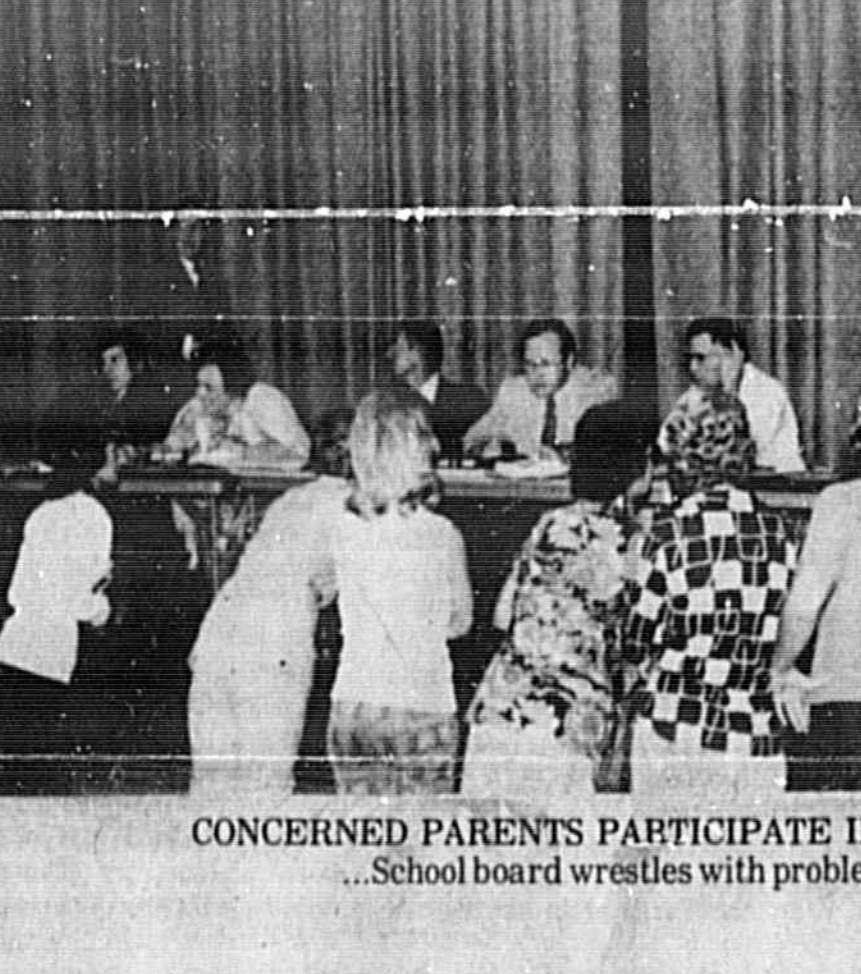

7 Killed In Phnom Penh Attack; Coastal Supply Highway Is Blocked

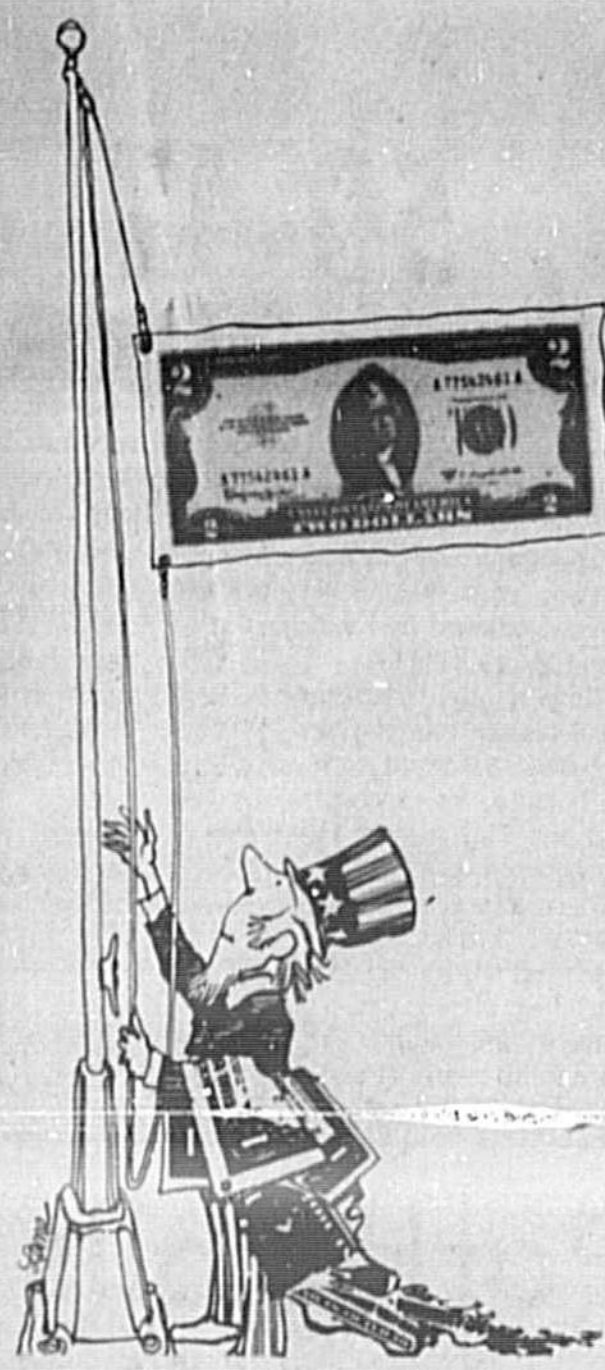
PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) — Khmer Rouge rockets hit Phnom Penh late Wednesday night and again this afternoon, and officials said seven persons were killed and at least 23 wounded.

Cambodian Army Headquarters said six 122mm rockets were fired into the city Wednesday night but only one caused casualties.

What Hath Inflation Wrought: Is There Really A \$2 Bill In Our Future?

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Years ago the nation lamented the passing of the value of the penny coin. Then it was the nickel and in time the two-bit piece. Now it seems the cry is "You can't buy anything for a dollar anymore."

James Conlon, director of Treasury's bureau of engraving and printing, says the number of bills printed and put into circulation is expected to rise by about \$4 million a year.

One: The dollar doesn't go so far anymore. What can one buy for one? Two gallons of gas, if it's available at all.

Two: The American Revolutionary Bicentennial Commission wants commemorative space on the back of the new bill and the public use was that of Alexander Hamilton.

Not only money, however, is scarce. Money apparently did not exist in the Confederacy of the Civil War. It's the phony as a \$2 bill, became, for an erroneous few, it's a phony as a \$2 bill.

But the two was never phony. Questioned about this by a newspaper reporter in 1936, a Treasury official joked: "I assure you the \$2 bill is worth \$2. If anyone doubts this they may send me personally all their \$2 bills and I will prove their worth."

Behind The Shortage: Who Has The Facts?

AP Special Correspondent. How much crude oil is pumped from the ground each day in the United States? How much is refined? What are the nation's oil inventories and untapped reserves? What about reserves and production abroad?

The U.S. government has to have this information for policy decisions on the energy crisis. And this places the administration in a strange position: It is dependent on the private oil companies for almost all its statistics about petroleum.

The top dozen oil companies — mostly huge international firms — control each step of oil development, from drilling to mining to marketing. So the statistics they furnish are difficult to check as oil makes its way from the ground to the consumer.

The major companies also produce natural gas and the statistics about natural gas. Oil and natural gas provide two-thirds of the energy consumed by Americans.

(Cont. from page 1) across the nation as about 20 per cent of service stations checked by the agency recently were selling above the legal ceiling price.

The IRS survey shows gasoline stations are violating price regulations at a higher rate than any other industry under government price guidelines.

A spokesman said the IRS plans to have 300 agents assigned solely to checking price violations by gasoline stations.

Most of the violations probably do not involve flagrant price gouging in which motorists are charged \$1 or more for a gallon of gas, the spokesman said. But the number of such serious violations is increasing.

major petroleum exporting countries publish oil statistics. But these, too, come from the oil companies. Frequently, they're American firms. Texaco, Mobil, Exxon, Standard Oil of California and Gulf, for example, are major owners of Aramco, the big producing company in Saudi Arabia.

Oil industry critics such as Ralph Nader have charged that the giants of the oil industry have intensified the energy crisis by understating their reserves and withholding oil from the market.

The purpose? To push prices up, drive out independent competition and force a retreat from environmental laws, the critics charge.

The oil industry helps shape the nation's oil policy in another way. The National Petroleum Council is made up of 119 oil-industry executives appointed by the secretary of the Interior.

The council's \$800,000-a-year operating budget is paid for by industry, and it oversees studies carried out by oil company employees. These studies are presented to the government.

Moves have been made again inside the industry. The Federal Trade Commission has launched a massive antitrust action charging that only eight oil companies control 51 per cent of the retail market and 94 per cent of all U.S. reserves.

Congress is exploring ways to close the industry. Sen. Adlai Stevenson, D-Ill., and others

WORRY CLINIC

By George W. Crane, Ph.D., M.D. Note my momentary shock to find that one of my funny stories fell flat! But a few seconds later, the audience laughed uproariously. Why this? Read the account below of America's most unique college. I was Research Psychologist for 3 years.

CASE Z-516: Gallaudet College for the Deaf is the most unique institution of higher learning in the U.S. "Dr. Crane," I was asked, "could you address our college convention?" The questioner was the President of Gallaudet and I was then doing research with the deaf under a 3-year grant from the National Research Council, plus the Carnegie Institution of Washington, D.C.

"Dr. Crane," the President continued, "the faculty will be able to hear what you say as the words leave your lips." "But most of the college students will lag a few seconds in interpreting standing slightly behind you," I said.

"I'm opening remarks, I told what I thought was a funny story relevant to the interests of college students. But only 15 or 20 people laughed."

"Then it dawned on me that my interpreter lagged about 10 seconds behind and his second wave of widespread laughter came from the deaf college students."

It was a little disconcerting, to find only 15 or 20 in the audience, with their eyes glued on me, while the rest focussed on the professor who was meanwhile repeating my remarks in the sign language. The sign language permits visual conversation, but is not exact enough for use in delivering mathematical or chemistry lectures in class.

That's why the finger spelling (manual alphabet) must be employed for precise dates or math, etc. Another defect of the sign language is its lack of synonyms.

For example, it offers a basic sign to indicate a "group," but lacks the wide variety of similar terms, such as "bevy," "flock," "herd," etc.

"Dr. Crane," my interpreter laughingly informed me later, "I doubly enjoyed your address today, for you didn't keep repeating the same idea just in slightly different words."

"By contrast we had a distinguished U.S. Senator here a few years ago."

"He also addressed our faculty and student assembly for 20 minutes."

"But he delivered his essential thought in the very first 5 minutes, then merely repeated it in different words during the final 15 minutes."

"Unfortunately we don't have the synonyms in sign language which enrich spoken vocabulary, so I was on the spot."

"I couldn't repeat my identical first 5 minutes of sign language, so I improvised an extra 15 minute talk of my own and the deaf students thought I was still translating for the Senator."

"The hearing faculty members in the audience knew that my final 15 minutes of signs were unrelated to the Senator's spoken words, but our students didn't know the difference, since they couldn't hear."

Some Indian chiefs visited Gallaudet College back in President Taft's administration and conversed readily via signs.
