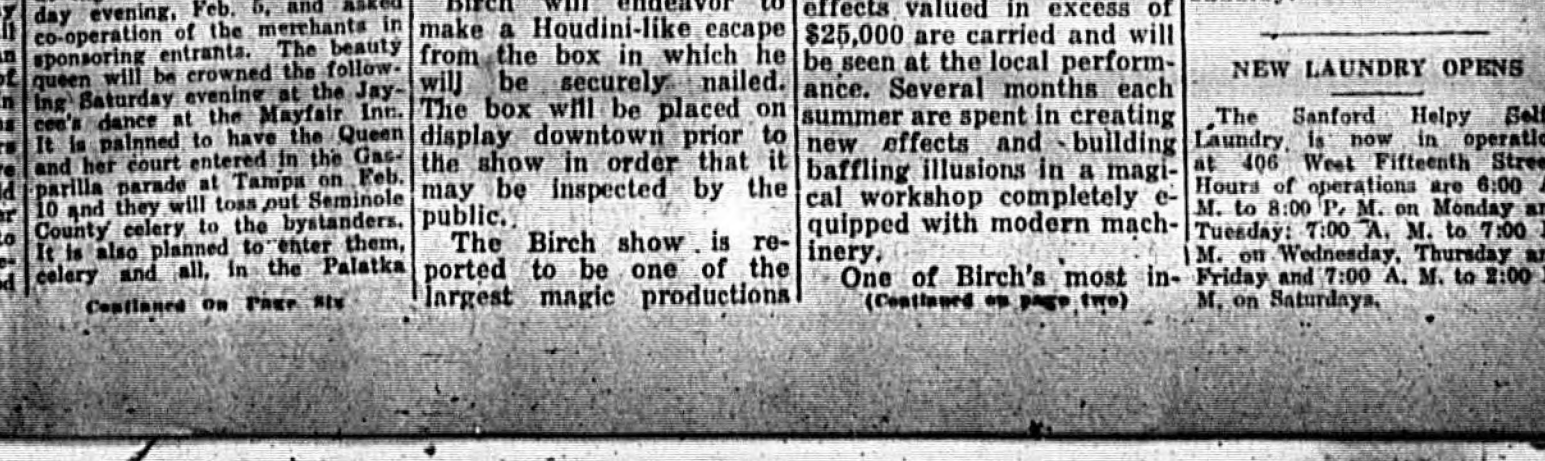
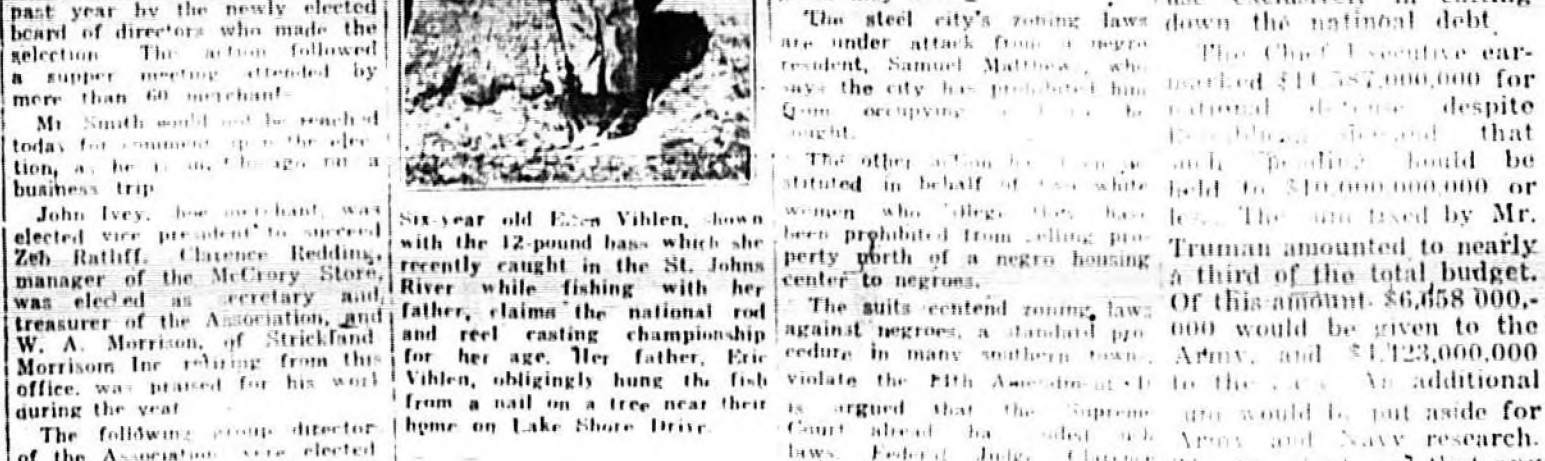

Congratulations to Mayor Jim Gut upon his re-election, or should we say condolences? Sanford needs more civic-minded, self-sacrificing plutons for punishment like him. Some day we may get around to paying our mayors for their services. Meanwhile, it is a thankless job.

Rent controls have been removed from hotels and motor courts—which may be all right, but they should be left on houses until the present shortage of housing is at least partly overcome. A drastic increase in rents right now could create considerable economic confusion throughout the country.

Walter Lippman wisely suggested that any decision regarding atomic bombs or any other form of disarmament should await a signing of the peace treaties in which the United States is so vitally interested. Of course, Russia would like to have the United States scrap its armaments (as we sank our war ships after the last war) before the treaties with Germany and Japan are drawn up.

The life of one of America's foremost newspapermen came to an end when Ogden Reid, editor of the New York Herald Tribune, died in New York Sunday. A son of Whitelaw Reid, once publisher of the same paper and a former U. S. Ambassador to England, Ogden Reid was born to the position he so ably filled throughout most his adult life, and he made the Herald Tribune one of the world's greatest newspapers.

Another illustration of the futility of picking up hitchhikers, if you want to live comes from Centerville, Tenn. A 36-year old former Army lieutenant on his way to Florida picked up two teen-age boys thumbing a ride. A few minutes later, after they had gone about ten miles, one of them pulled out a .22 caliber pistol and shot the Good Samaritan through the head, killing him. We hope the next good looking young fellow who hails us on the highway will understand when we pass him by.

Three Fears

It is no secret, among observant people, that the world is changing. There are always changes going on, but they seem now to move more rapidly than usual. And there are many who fear any change. Dr. Frederick May Eliot of Boston analyzes the situation roughly as follows, viewing it from three angles:

First, he points out, the present-day world has produced an enormous and one-sided advance in science and technology, which takes time to digest. New instruments of power have been put into the hands of the people of many nations. They feel oppressed, and strive to break their bonds. And in this straining, there develops a sort of pagan spirit, of which men once thought they had rid themselves. Dr. Eliot fears the appearance of a generation corrupt and frivolous sweeping over the world.

But Dr. Eliot finds hope even in the gloom. "The more evidence piles up that the world is going to the dogs," he says, "the more it is necessary for the spirit to realize that God moves on the face of the waters and broods over chaos."

"We should look for fidelity in the midst of chaos. And we should all have recourse to the ancient part of religion—prayer. In prayer man lays siege to his own inner doubt, selfishness and disquiet. Religion is a matter of faith rather than proof. By means of religion we discover that there is a central calm existing at the heart of endless agitation."

Unknown Explorer

The Soviet whaling expedition to the Antarctic, just announced, is not the first Russian venture into the South Polar seas. A century and a quarter ago Baron Thaddeus Bellingshausen made one of the most important and one of the least known voyages of Antarctic discovery. His record after this long interval has finally been translated into English by a British geographical society.

From 1819 to 1822 Bellingshausen cruised in the South Seas about the Antarctic below South America, covering even more Polar longitude than the famous Captain James Cook, the first great explorer of the South Polar ocean. He was the first man to see the Antarctic continent, but unfortunately so veiled was this mist that he recorded it merely as "appearances of land," never being quite certain that he had actually seen anything more than icebergs.

With such a promising start the Russians might have been expected to continue, but from that day to this Antarctic discovery has been carried on exclusively by other nations. Ivan Voronin, the leader of the present expedition, will go down in history if he does even half as well as Bellingshausen.

Pneumonia Preventive

Two "men in white," Dr. Colin M. McLeod of New York University, and Dr. Michael Heidelberger of Columbia University, who have been engaged in research on the subject since 1941, have perfected a vaccine which is said to immunize against lobar pneumonia for six months or more.

This vaccine will be especially valuable in preventing epidemics of this deadly form of pneumonia in large groups of people who work together or who live in institutions. Further research is to be made in the hope of developing the substance so as to make it effective against other forms of pneumonia, also.

While the world was at war, selfless research went on which may save thousands of valuable lives.
