## BUSINESS OVER SOUTH SHOWS STABLE TREND

### Bank Survey Reveals Slight Fluctuation In Financial And Industrial Conditions

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 31.—(INS)—Stable business conditions in the South resulting from normal industrial activities and an improved agricultural situation were reflected in the report today of the eighth district federal reserve bank for the month of November.

The survey revealed only the slightest fluctuations in financial, industrial and business conditions. Wholesale and retail trade showed a seasonal decline compared with the preceding month, and also a slight drop from the volume of the corresponding period of last year. In retail stores, the volume of merchandise increased somewhat over the same period a month earlier, but was smaller than a year ago. Cumulative sales for the past 11 months showed small increases and decreases in reporting cities, with a two percent decline for the district when compared with the first 11 months of 1928.

The final estimate by the United States Department of Agriculture placed the cotton crop produced in the six states of the district at 25 per cent larger than the crop of last season. Although current prices are slightly smaller, the income of the farmer from this crop was greater.

Most of the other crops, according to the report, were larger in the district. While potatoes and fruits were the exception.

Building activities sagged but the survey revealed an increase in construction work, however, as reported in Aniston, Mont.gomery, Miami and Miami Beach, Orlando, Jacksonville, Tallahassee, and Lakeland.

Tennessee showed an increase in output of coal during November but Alabama fell back in comparison with the same weeks of last year. Alabama also showed a decrease in pig iron production.

The continual growth of the district's seaports as export points was reflected by figures which showed increased receipts at all wharves, municipally owned and private. A large increase in the export of wheat was shown at New Orleans, while naval stores receipts at Savannah, Jacksonville and Pensacola, surveyed figures for both the preceding month and the corresponding month of last year.

Savings deposits held by 75 reporting banks dropped less than the percent compared with October, but which always declines in October and November.

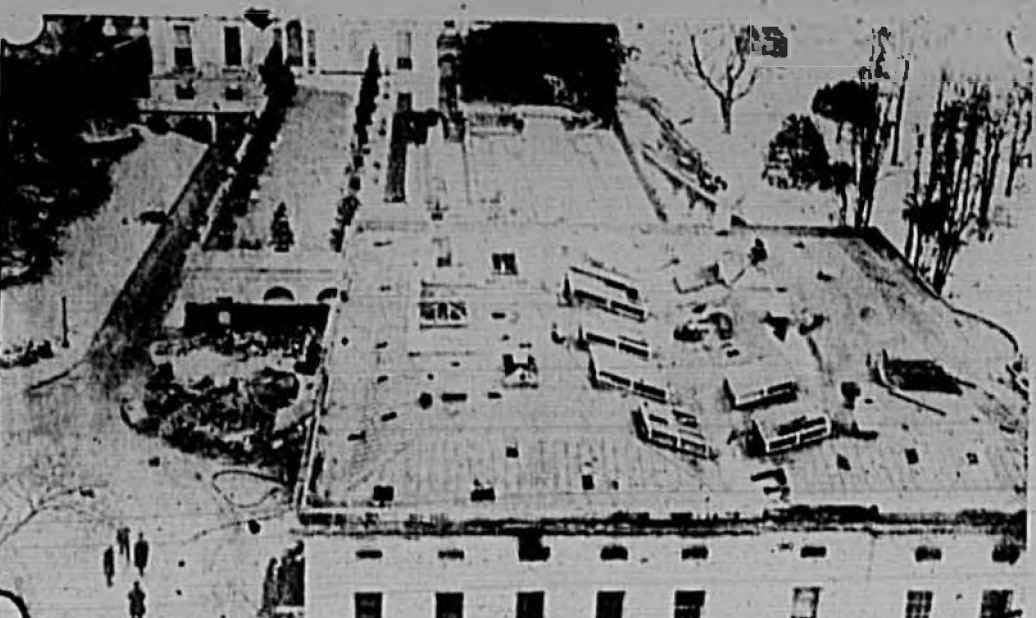

## Unconscious Heaps Of Young People Found By Rescuers Jammed In Doors, Windows

PAISLEY, Scotland, Dec. 31.—(INS)—Horrible tragedy visited this peaceful mill city this afternoon when at least 60 children, ranging in ages from a few years to nearly teens, lost their lives in a fire which destroyed the Glen Motion Picture Theatre during a children's matinee.

The fire broke out from an undetermined cause while the theater was jammed with hundreds of children attending a special New Year's Eve performance staged for their benefit.

Most of the deaths were caused by the panic-stricken rush for exits and windows, short while after the first few whiffs of smoke curled down among the youthful audience. Rescuers found unconscious heaps of children, many of them dead and others suffering terrible injuries, jammed against the doors and windows.

While an adequate check-up of the dead was impossible immediately after the fire, autopsy reports placed the death toll at 60. Fears were expressed others would succumb from the effects of exhaustion and terrible burns.

More than 100 children were treated at hospitals for their injuries. Traffic through the main streets of Paisley, a city of 25,000 population, was completely suspended as the night of woe was given to ambulances, fire apparatus and rescue cars pending to aid from the rubble of the holocaust.

Scores of heroic rescuers were reported by police, firemen and assembly who pooled their efforts to extricate the children from the blazing theater.

Many children were rescued by being pulled through windows and doors by police and firemen while suffocating smoke belched from the movie house.

Heart-rending scenes were enacted in front of the theater as word of the tragedy spread through Paisley. Mothers who had been before and sent their children to the theater to enjoy the performance, stormed the movie house in panic, seeking their little ones from out of the tragic heaps of dead whose bodies were taken from the charnel house.

It was the worst tragedy which had ever struck Paisley, a rich milling community whose chief product, the colorful shawl bearing its name, is known all over the world.

The entire city was in holiday mood as New Year's is the principal festival throughout the British Isles. While Christmas Day is celebrated throughout most of the world as the principal festival of the year, Scotland reserves its enthusiasm for New Year's, and the performance at the Glen Theatre had been arranged to provide the children with an special holiday treat.

All available fire apparatus in Paisley and from nearby towns was called out to stem the blaze, while hundreds of police, firemen and residents of the town co-operated in the rescue work.
