New Community Told

\$22 Million Project Plans Are Revealed

CASSELBERRY — Plans for a \$22 million housing and commercial development on a 100-acre tract of land bordering State Road 436, Red Bug Road and Lake Howell were revealed by the Greater Construction Company today. Lester Mandell, president of Greater, said the development, to be known as "Sau Salito," will include the first "cluster homes" in Central Florida. He said this type home is planned to focus around a "public space" within the development to have a "park-type atmosphere and setting."

Mandell continued that normally not more than 40 families will share the same land area and a civic center association comprised of the home owners will be responsible for all public areas.

The developer said of the 100 acres purchased, 68 will be used for residential development, 20 for commercial planning, with the remaining acreage to become part of the "green belt" areas.

Sau Salito is to feature numerous green areas, recreational facilities, boating and, Mandell said, "an opportunity for today's families to enjoy living as they would like to."

Homes will begin at \$26,000. The developer said the \$26,000 to \$30,000 price range in housing in Central Florida has been non-existent.

Next step on the long road to construction will be preparation and approval by the planning board of a preliminary plan.

In another action, the zoning board postponed taking action at a public hearing considering rezoning three lots on west side of Monica Avenue between West 25th Street and West 24th Place from single family to multiple family to allow construction of nine one-story residential units.

John Williams, real estate broker, said the houses would be in the \$10,000 price range. This brought on objections from several area property owners, including Henry Schlein, who opined that other homes in the area are more expensive.

Williams, viewing the mounting opposition, apologized for not bringing a plan to show the homeowners and asked the public hearing be adjourned until Nov. 18 to allow him time to show each opponent the development plan.

Bank Would Buy City Parking Lot

Sanford Atlantic National Bank is interested in purchasing the city-owned parking lot at First Street and Park Avenue.

Purpose of the proposed acquisition would be to extend the present bank facilities by establishing from five to nine drive-in cubicles to facilitate mobile banking. Other expansions would follow in a period of time to ultimately include a five-story bank-office building.

This was disclosed at Thursday's special City Commission meeting by Mayor Lee P. Moore, who read a letter from Howard Hodges, bank president, which outlined the bank's plans to the commission.

City Manager W. E. Knowles estimated the city invested \$2,000 when it purchased the property in 1964 and razed the structure that occupied the busy downtown corner.

Commissioner J. H. Crapps, also a member of the bank's directors board, explained the bank is embarked on a 10-year building program and envisioned a \$1 million bank facility on the lot at the conclusion of the program.

Mayor Moore said the matter would be placed on Monday night's 8 p.m. meeting agenda for further consideration. All commissioners indicated the property would be available for sale to the bank for an agreeable price.

Hodges, in discussion about the proposed land sale and building expansion plans with The Herald, said the proposal contained a lot of "ifs" and everything is still in the planning stage.

Cruisers, Supplies Lacking FHP Faults Revealed

Disclosures of faulty auto equipment and lack of proper supplies were made last night by two troopers of the Florida Highway Patrol to the Orange-Seminole legislative delegation.

The situation came to light as a result of a presentation by George Crossley, district chairman of the law enforcement program for the Florida Jaycees. Crossley told the delegation he is requesting legislation be introduced in Tallahassee to provide better salaries for the patrolmen as well as hospital and insurance benefits.

Crossley said the starting pay of a trooper in Florida is \$31 monthly, that this barely covers the cost of living in some areas, necessitating "moonlighting."

Crossley stated the duties of the troopers extend beyond traffic control. He mentioned the case of Trooper John Green, who was hospitalized as a result of a high speed chase in which the individual swerved in front of the trooper.

Sen. Jack Ducker remarked the problem in the area of better benefits for the men has been money but contended "now that the Governor has money, we have no worries at all."

Rep. William Gibson said a matter of priority exists and cited the fact that many individuals at Sunland Training Center also are underpaid. Further, he said, the patrol has not been blessed with "good management in the past" . . . "even their credit cards were refused."

Gibson said plans are being initiated to lower the retirement age of the patrol to \$5 and to remove the prohibition against being hired by other agencies.

At this point one of the troopers present said that vehicles are being used having 70,000 miles, and that maintenance is lacking. He said a 1971 Dodge

Two Hospital Districts Aired By Lawmakers

For Sanford Drainage \$4 Million Bonds On Ballot

A referendum authorizing a \$4 million bond issue to finance a city-wide drainage project will be placed before Sanford voters at the Dec. 7 election. City Commission Thursday noon approved a resolution authorizing the referendum by advertising for a 90-day period prior to the election.

The bonds will be repayable by additional levy on property of an estimated 4% to five mills, depending on the amount of bonds actually sold, and the time millage, if approved, by the resolution, as written by the attorney said.

Casselberry would allow up to 40 years to repay the issue but it might be done in 30 years, depending on advice of fiscal agent Lenas Leedy at the time of the bond sale.

Leedy earlier had given a "horse-lack" four-five additional millage figures as interest rate for the bond issue.

To pass, the referendum must be approved by a majority of those city electors voting. The referendum will not be limited to freholders (property owners), who must pay the additional millage, if approved, by further property assessments, the resolution said.

The commissioner added, "It does not make good sense to me that an individual owning city property but living just outside the city has no vote on the taxing of his property." Commissioner J. H. Crapps commented he wanted the exact millage amount listed on the ballot, so people will know for what they are committing themselves.

City Manager W. E. Knowles said his staff could prepare a table to determine interest requirements for a 30-year bond issue, figured on the basis of the value of today's assessments. Information is expected to be ready at Monday night's Commission session.

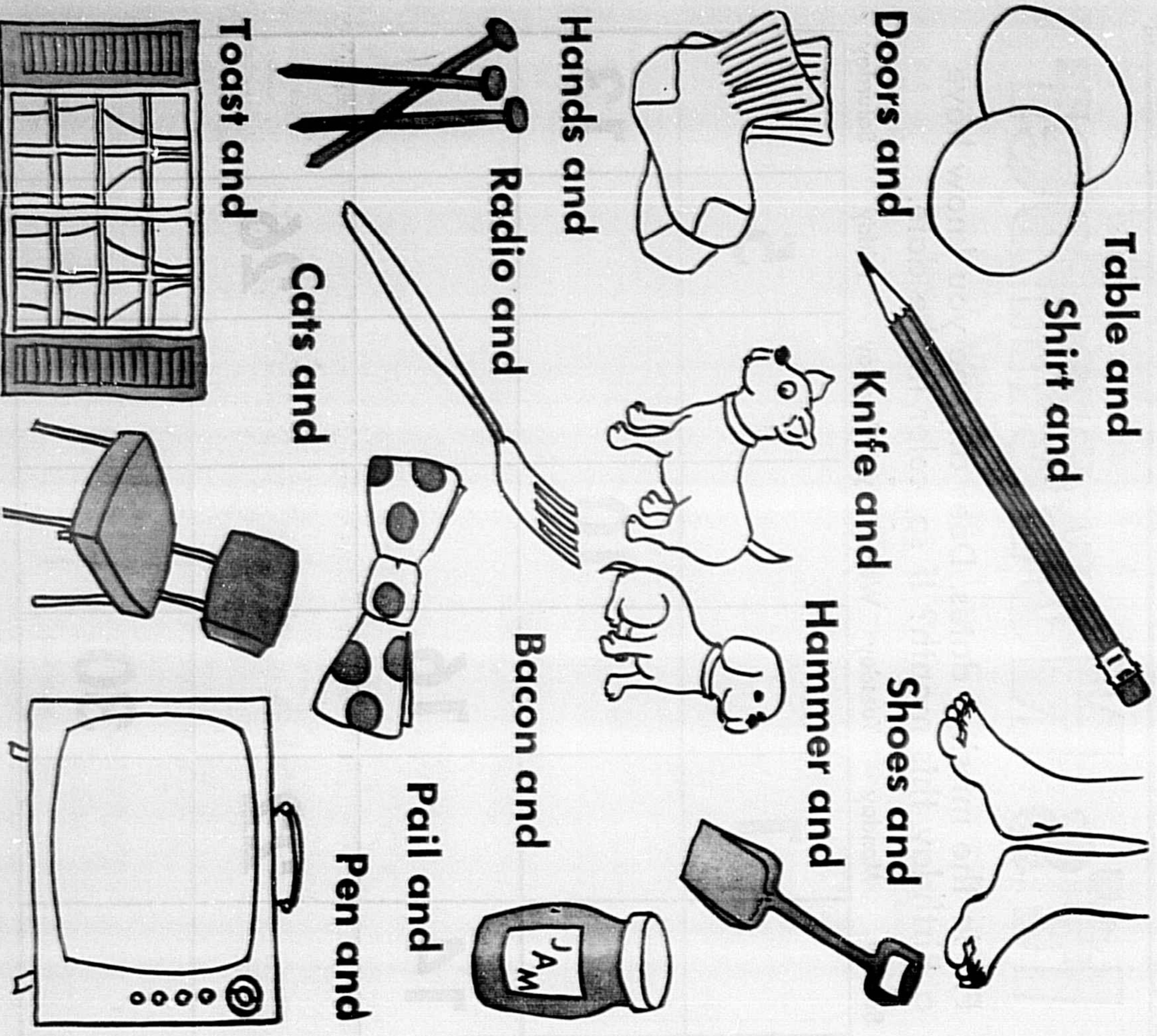

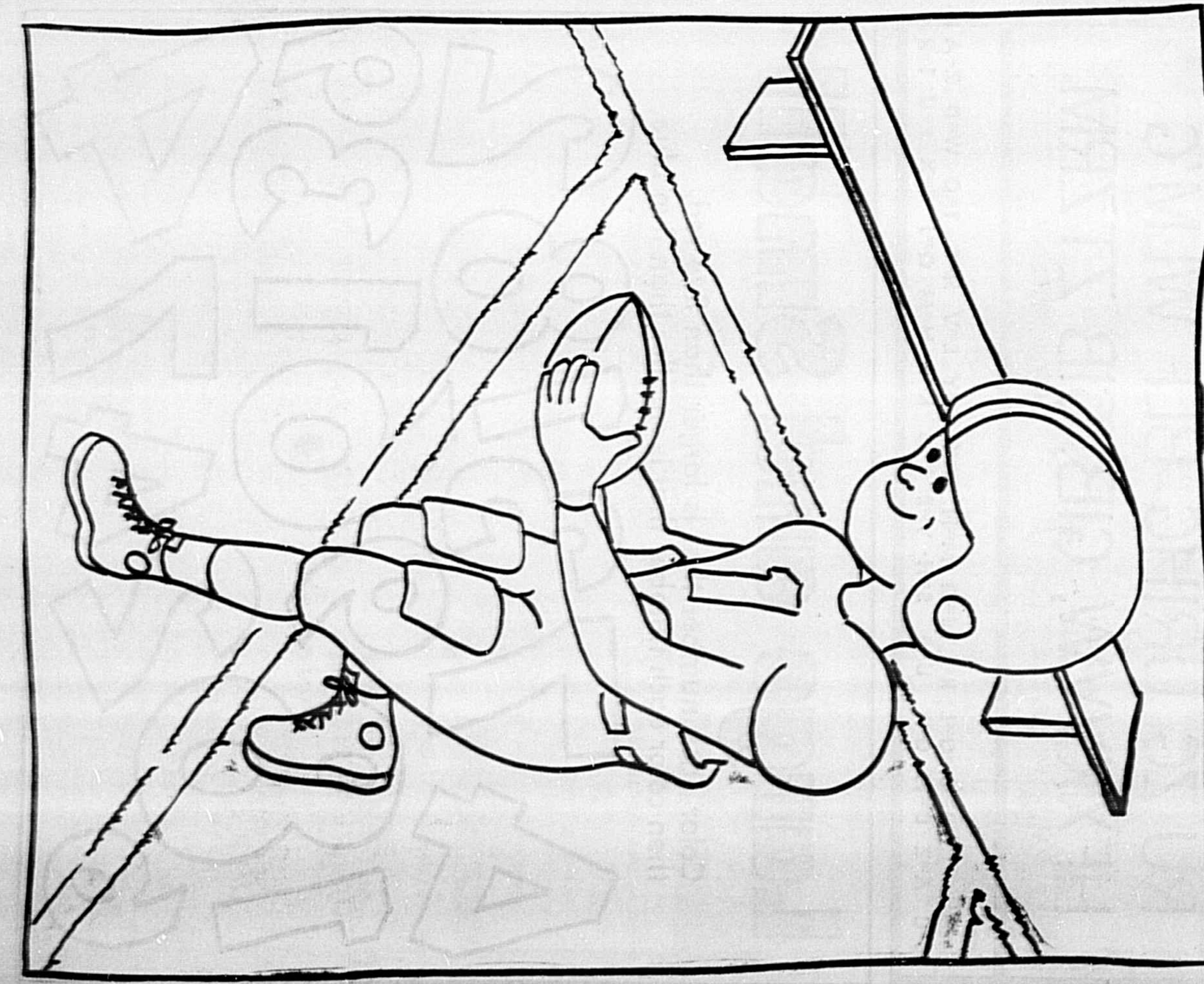

Judiciary Change Seen In Seminole

Law enforcement and the courts figured prominently in a hearing by the Orange-Seminole legislative delegation. Creation of a separate office of juvenile judge received the unanimous approval of the delegation. Roger Berry, president-elect of the Seminole County Bar Association, told the delegation the creation of the separate office was recommended because the present judge wears "many hats."

Sen. John Ducker questioned the new constitutional amendment to be voted on next November, in which the new juvenile judge also would become a circuit judge.

However, Rep. William Gorman contended the matter "probably will go to the House judiciary committee and even if the issue passes would take one to three years to implement."

Juvenile Judge Wallace Hall told the delegation there has been a substantial increase in the case load of this office; that in 1968 there was an average of 50 cases per month, whereas there has been 150 cases per month in the past six months. Judge Hall said there were 1,500 juvenile court case referrals during the past year, and there was not enough individual attention accorded to these due to the "physical lack of time."

Berry also made a presentation relative to removing the county prosecutor from the fee system and placing the office on a budget system and salary. Berry said the office is becoming a full time job.

Also presented at the next hearing is a bill for creation of magistrate judges drafted by Mack Cleveland Jr. The bill will increase the trial jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace over the present limit which is a misdemeanor carrying a maximum fine of \$100.

'Mr. Florida' Funeral Today

BARTOW (AP) — Dignitaries arrived in this quiet Central Florida community today for the funeral of its most famous native son — retired Sen. Spessard Lindsey Holland who died Saturday at the age of 79.

Holland's body lay in state from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the First Methodist Church his father helped found. Among those expected at the 4 p.m. funeral service were Gov. Reubin Askew, who postponed a trip to a Southern Governor's Conference in Atlanta, and Sen. Lawton Chiles, the youthful Democratic friend and protégé who replaced Holland in Washington.

Hundreds more were expected at Wildwood Cemetery where Holland is to be buried, near his mother and father under spreading oaks in the town where he began his political climb 50 years ago.

"Mr. Florida" to many, Holland died of a heart attack at his home a few blocks from the spot where he started his public career as a Polk County prosecuting attorney in 1919.

He won a county judgeship the following year, served two decades as a state senator in the 1930s and 40s, won a term as governor from 1941-45 and was elected to the U.S. Senate in 1946 — a job that was his personal field until failing health prompted him to step down last January.

In the Senate, Holland usually sat slumped over in his seat and appeared to have dozed off. But he startled more than one Senate-floor speaker by suddenly sitting up.

Swofford Advocates: Ax County Government

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Lawrence Swofford has won reelection without opposition to his sixth consecutive term as mayor of this city.

Incumbent Councilmen Keith Nixon and Mrs. Helen Keyser also are unopposed as the qualifying period ended Sunday evening, according to City Clerk Jane Richards.

The Dec. 7 municipal election will be only a formality to confirm the win.

Swofford, active in politics in Seminole County for the past 23 years, has contested in a total of 24 elections for county and municipal governments. This is his 20th victory, but the first time he has been an unopposed candidate.

The mayor entered politics first in 1948, when he ran unsuccessfully for a council seat in the city. In the summer of 1951 during a special election he won a council seat for a split term and was successful in December of that year winning a full term.

Swofford became mayor in December of 1953 and served in the position for six years before suffering defeat in 1959. He returned to the mayor's office in 1961 and has served continuously since that time. In addition, he won terms on the Board of County Commissioners in 1956 and in 1964.

Nixon will be beginning his sixth consecutive term in office also in January. Winning an election unopposed is not a new thing for Nixon, however. This is the fourth time he has been elected without contest in the city.

Mrs. Keyser first entered politics in 1970 and was elected unopposed that year. Councilmen Dan Dorfman and Thomas Radloff won their seats unopposed last year.

He said citizens are disenchanted with county government and unable to receive services. He pointed to the large number of annexations being requested of the six cities in the county as an indication of this dissatisfaction.

Speaking of CALNO (Council of Local Governments), Swofford said he is strongly opposed to the inclusion of the county government in the organization.

Swofford credited his victory to citizen satisfaction with the job being done by the city government.

Preexisting things to come in Seminole County politics Swofford said petitions will be circulated by citizens, within the next few weeks, to require the County Commission to place on the ballot in 1972 the question of abolition of county government in favor of city government throughout Seminole.

Trucker Held For Perjury

Gary Allen Schappold, 34, of 236 South Dixie Highway, Casselberry was jailed Saturday on a perjury charge involving a narcotics trial held last week in Circuit Court. Bond for Schappold is set at \$1,000 and the unemployed truck driver still remains in jail.
