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### FPL-Union Talk Bogs, Continued

MIAMI (AP) — A meeting between federal mediators, union officials and Florida Power & Light Company representatives stalled Wednesday, and the two-hour session broke up the same way it started — with both sides deadlocked.

(Service was proceeding in the Sanford area today, FPL Manager Scott Burns reported, despite the strike by union employees. No untoward incidents were reported.)

A strike by 2,000 electrical workers went into its second day today as pickets marched in front of FPL installations while supervisory personnel manned equipment inside.

Federal mediators requested both parties be available for further meetings, but none was scheduled.

The International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers walked off their jobs at midnight Tuesday in a dispute over wages and pension benefits.

Earlier the workers turned down a proposed one-cent-per-hour wage margin. Union workers now earn \$4.24 an hour and are asking in the area of \$6 an hour.

### Marine Company Newest Addition

Continental Marine Engineering Company, Inc., Orlando, has leased a temporary building at Sanford Airport subject to approval of the Sanford Industrial Commission, in which to manufacture sample concrete drylocks.

Jack W. Behrman, president of the new firm, says "The airport operation will precede the construction of a 10,000 square foot facility on 3.5 acres at the site of the new Port of Sanford, now under construction. Plant construction must be approved by the Port Authority.

Behrman said, "This is the first Ferro-Cement products in the country."

The firm will employ approximately 50 persons at its permanent facility and will start with four employees building sample products at the airport. It is hoped that the port operation can begin in 60 days.

In addition to drylock construction, the company will eventually build concrete houseboat hulls.

Other officers in the firm include Robert Carrigan Jr., secretary-treasurer, and W. W. Arnold, vice president, both of Orlando.

This is the first of its kind same type plants to be constructed throughout the country.

The president said he had just obtained a patent for this type cement construction.

### Local Chicanery On Road Recited

A bit of nostalgia was injected into the county road situation, which has become something of an anatomy, as Attorney Douglas Stenstrom recalled his participation on the road program.

Stenstrom reminisced that during the declining months of the administration of Governor Charley Johns in 1954, the state chief executive indicated to James A. Wright, president of Ox Fiber Brush Company and chairman of the Seminole County Commissioners, willingness to six lane French Avenue.

Wright, Judge Volie Williams Jr., Stack Cleveland Jr. and Stenstrom, then state senator from the old 37th district, journeyed to Tallahassee numerous times to consult with Governor Johns. During the last week of the Governor's tenure, Christmas 1954, the quartet of Sanforites was invited to luncheon at governor's mansion.

Like "The Man Who Came To Dinner," they stayed for lunch, dinner, spent the night, and re-delegation played its trump card. They had the Sanford police and fire chiefs and health department officials declare French Avenue a traffic, fire and health hazard.

# Herndon's Future Appears 'Dark' Sanford Airport Boost Seen

The expected recommendation of the Orange-Orlando-Seminole Joint Planning Commission to close Orlando's Herndon Airport could mean that Sanford has the only air facility in Central Florida in the event of ever increasing air operations.

Sanford Industrial Commission director Don Rathel said today, "If Herndon is closed, it will mean Sanford Airport is the logical choice to have many corporation jets now housed at the Orlando terminal. "After all, we are just 25 driving minutes from Orlando and even in the larger cities it takes that long or longer to drive from airports to the downtown areas," Rathel said.

He cited the situations at Atlanta and New York as an illustration of the location of airports out of heavily populated areas.

Questioned about the possibility of Orlando's construction of an additional airport to handle that city's air traffic, Rathel cited the time element involved in constructing such facilities and the possible lack of funds in Orange County for construction purposes.

The possibility of Sanford re-opening some of the industries now operating at Herndon is not too bright, Rathel said, but the handle of proper facilities for new industries to locate in Orange County would mean that Sanford Airport would be in a good position to entice them here, he continued.

James Howes, chief of the Airports Branch of the FAA Miami office, said several studies had been made in an effort to determine the future of Herndon. "A big, major decision must be made," Howes said.

Area planning groups reportedly have been pushing for closing of the airport.

Herndon's future is complicated by the north-south traffic patterns of McCoy Air Force Field, an airport at the old Sanford Naval Air Station and Disney World, Howes said.

"It is like to see a decision made," Howes said, "but I don't want a quick one."

### Chilean Rebellion Stymied

## 'Garbage Truck' Army Wins

**SANTIAGO, Chile (AP)** — President Eduardo Frei may get down in history as the man who faced a rebellious army regiment with a battalion of garbage trucks and won.

The tall, soft-spoken Chilean president ended the defiance in 24 hours of quiet, orderly negotiations, then announced his victory in an eight-minute speech to the nation.

The words must have rung home to the military govern-

ments in Panama, Brazil, Bolivia, Argentina and Peru as Frei declared: "In Chile, the armed forces do not accept insubordination and the people do not tolerate coups d'etat."

Leaders of the short-lived rebellion insisted they were not trying to overthrow Frei. Instead they demanded salary increases and better equipment for their trucks.

Frei, their action was "seditions" in army units from outlying provinces and appealed to the students, unions and political parties, Congress and the people for support.

First to arrive on the scene was a convoy of garbage trucks which ringtoned the presidential Moneda Palace and blocked all streets leading to it.

"One lady brought back 30 bottles of cyclamate drink and asked when I was going to do with it," commented a Milwaukee store manager. "I said I'm going to put it back on my shelf and sell it. When you stop and think about it, if you've been drinking it for the last 20 years or so, what's another two bottles or six bottles going to hurt?"

But one Milwaukee waitress expressed a different viewpoint.

## Customers Returning Banned Cyclamate

**NEW YORK (AP)** — "He said he was going to die someday anyhow, but he was going to lose weight first," related an Ohio supermarket salesman after a dieting customer stocked up with \$13 of soda containing cyclamate.

The incident in a Cincinnati suburb, however, was not typical across the country. Supermarket cash registers have been getting a workout ringing up refunds for consumers returning foods and soda containing the artificial sweetener.

The Department of Health Education and Welfare announced last weekend a ban on public sales of drinks containing cyclamate after Jan. 1 and of food and other products containing it after Feb. 1 under a 1968 law prohibiting the sale of foods that have been found to cause cancer in the animals. Abbott Laboratories, the major producer of the artificial sweetener, first alerted the government to research findings that massive doses of cyclamate had caused cancer in rats.

"I don't care if they haven't proved that it causes cancer in human beings," she said. "If it's not good enough for rats, it's not good enough for human beings."

In a Grand Pointe, Mich. market, manager Bob Eschrich said, "My diet-pop sales have stopped cold. Who's going to pay me for all those?"

A spokesman for Albany Public Market, operator of six stores in Albany, N.Y., said of foods with cyclamate: "They're still buying it in small lots. You'd have to say that sales are pretty much off and situation is pretty much up in the air. The customers are still confused."

A spokesman for the Este Diabetic Candy Co. in New Jersey said that right after the announcement there was a drop in sales, but now a booming trend appears to be developing. The spokesman attributed the move to speculation that requiring prescriptions to buy the candy would push up the price. Some customers also feel that they may not like the substitute product and want to stock up on the cyclamate candy, he said.

Persons requiring non-sugar diets for medical reasons, such as diabetes or obesity, still could, with a prescription, get products containing cyclamate. Some store operators attributed any runs on cyclamate foods to these persons stocking up now, but all are doing this however.

Mrs. Dee Carrey, at Oak Ridge, Tenn. woman whose husband is a diabetic, said she has stopped using cyclamate foods and has turned to saccharin, another noncaloric, artificial sweetener.

### Unusual Hearing Set Before High Court

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The Nixon administration, arguing today what could be one of the most important Supreme Court cases in recent years, says "it is simply unreal to talk about instantaneous desegregation" of southern public schools.

Today's hearing produced the unusual pairing of the federal government and Mississippi on one side and the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund on the other.

Asst. Atty. Gen. Jerris Leonard, the administration's chief civil rights lawyer, presented the government's arguments. Leonard had said Wednesday that apprehension of "hostile community reaction" aside, it takes some time to accomplish desegregation.

Workable plans have to be perfected by local and federal education officials, he said in an advance memorandum, and 49 school systems in nine southern states are still without desegregation plans.

Leonard defended an August order of the U.S. Court of Appeals in New Orleans delaying integration in 33 Mississippi school districts. The administration had counseled delay, producing the first fissures in what had been a solid partnership with the civil rights movement.

Allied with the NAACP Fund in the case is "The Lawyers Committee for Civil Rights Under Law," a group of private lawyers that includes John Doar, Leonard's predecessor. The lawyers have volunteered to help implement any sweeping desegregation ruling.

# HHH Linked With Loan Fraud Charge

WASHINGTON (AP) — Herbert H. Humphrey intervened repeatedly with high U.S. and Indian officials from 1961 through 1964 to help a Minnesota firm in a \$2.3 million deal for which the company is now being sued for fraud.

In records saved by the Justice Department after Rep. H. R. Gross, R-Iowa, accused Humphrey of "highly improper conduct" for his role in this shoddy affair, Humphrey was a U.S. senator at the time. The case involved Napco Industries, Inc. of Minneapolis, which set up a company in India that, in turn, applied for a \$2.3 million loan from the Agency for International Development.

Humphrey was able to hoodwink the Agency for International Development into paying a tremendously inflated price for its virtually obsolete, worn-out gear manufacturing plant, which was then dumped on a group of unsuspecting investors in India. The government claimed the machinery actually had a fair market value of only \$508,000. The suit demanded that Napco repay the loan along with double damages to the government. Gross has criticized Humphrey for his activities on behalf of Napco on numerous occasions. He raised the issue on the House floor again on the basis of Humphrey's letters and telegrams, introduced an exhibit in the pending government suit.

# Agnew Attacks Sen. Muskie

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Spiro T. Agnew, keeping up his strongly worded attacks on administration criticism, has accused Democratic Sen. Edmund S. Muskie of irresponsibly advocating a "Russian roulette" disarmament plan.

Agnew's statement was the latest in a series of strong attacks on those disagreeing with him. "Does he clear these things with the White House?" asked Republican Sen. Edward W. Brooke of Massachusetts, who then admitted he didn't know the answer. Muskie Tuesday proposed a unilateral U.S. cessation of the testing of multiple, warhead missiles as a step to stimulate arms control efforts. Brooke is the chief sponsor of a resolution backed by 43 senators urging a U.S. Soviet moratorium on ICBM testing.

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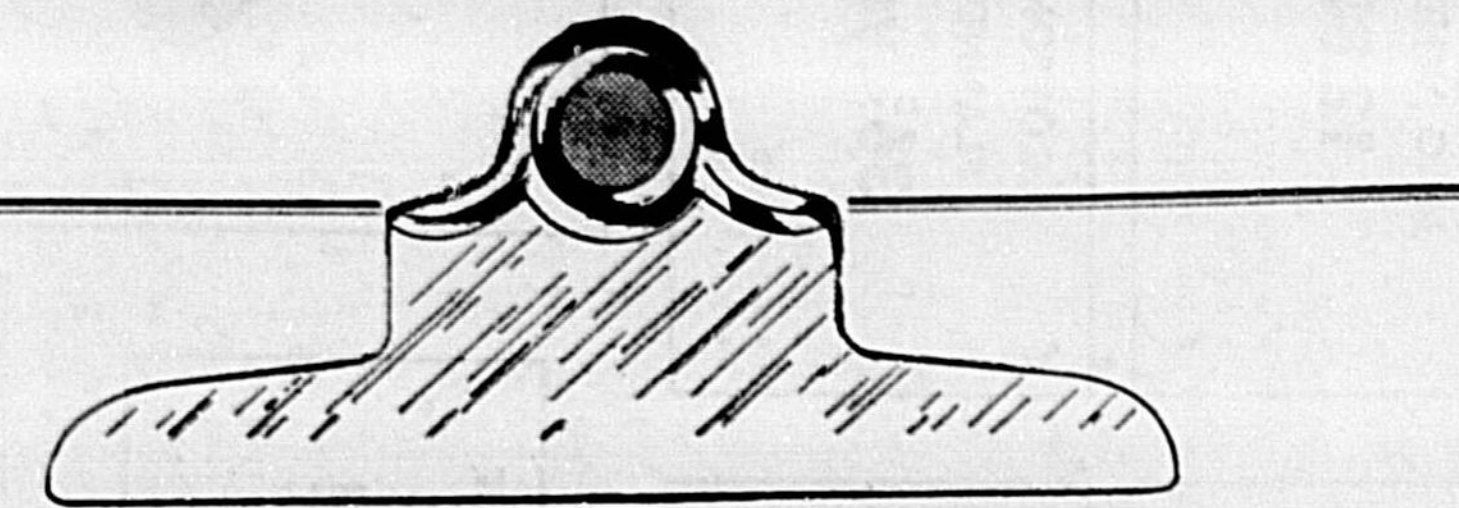

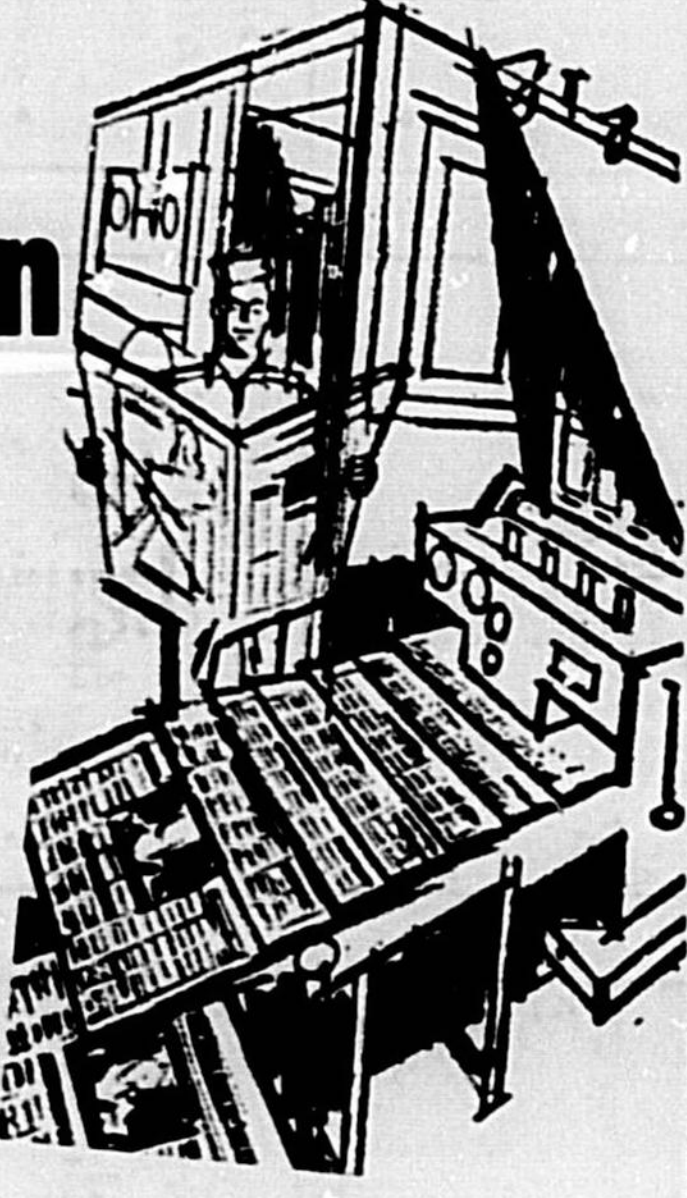

(Grand in a football) As pleasuring as it was in an earlier era, I would reluctantly drop Ed More, my first team fullback choice of 1931, and still say that his brother, George, still deserves the all-time second team fullback slot. My first team utility back would be the brilliant Buck Metts of the 1953 squad and this new choice casts no reflection on the tall and tanned Hendrix Lyles whose powerful play was dramatically attired in the mid-1952 season when he was carried from the field with a hip broken in two places.

I am tempted to say that the greatest coach SHS has ever had was the affable but determined Jim Pigott whose overall 63-10-7 in eight years through 1961 will probably never be equaled locally. Jim moves up to my second all-time team coach because, when you consider the material he took over and off the field as another of those who obviously "came to play."

My final change would be the naming of the late Billy Fleming as the second team utility back. Billy could and did everything, whenever called upon, and he did it with a grace and finesse and charm that is priceless in athletes.

Looking back on 55 years of SHS football who would have ever thought that in a starting backfield in 1924 would be two under-fed players who went on to become nationally known in the broadcasting and entertainment field?

I refer to Bud Barber and Sam Hylt, the former to become the first ever to announce a televised baseball game and to retire recently as one of the greatest sports announcers of all time; the latter to set a world record of consecutive appearances in a New York stage production, "Tobacco Road."

# Adams Gets Help From Many Friends

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Friends known and unknown are coming to the rescue of Secretary of State Tom Adams, who has found himself unable to pay off a \$100,000 election debt from 1966.

Letters containing words of praise for the retiring politician and checks, mostly for \$5 or \$10, have poured into Adams' Capitol office since his financial plight hit the news last week.

"There's a little help for those political expenses," said a letter from an old friend, Harry W. Massey, a Palm Beach insurance agent, Massey sent \$25.

Wallace G. Felton, a Republican from Fort Lauderdale, sent \$10.

"I hope I may be in thinking

that this little bit can be of any help," Kelson said. "I hope I may be in accepting the situation at its face value and have it may be in looking for honest politicians, I have just had the satisfaction of placing some faith in another human being thereby renewing to some degree my faith in myself."

Arthur Thurn, a 79-year-old Miami living on social security, sent \$5.

"This is not a contribution, but a loan!" Thurn wrote. "This is a very small part of a debt which every decent citizen of this state owes to the long-time secretary of state for his honesty unique in U.S. history!"

Many of the contributors urged Adams to reconsider his decision to drop out of politics and

resume his ended quest for the gubernatorial nomination.

"It is my hope and prayer that we may convince you to come forward and assist," he said. "I certainly renounce obligations to the special interests that finance campaigns."

Although Adams said he is grateful for the encouragement to stay in politics, he said nothing will change his mind to get out when his current term expires in January of 1971.

Adams indicated in June that he had lost faith in the political process when he announced he would give up his dream of being governor and get out of politics. He said he could not raise enough money to run for the office because he refused to be paid for his services. He said the office has refused to pay him for his services.

# Aerojet Suing State's Action

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Aerojet General Corp., manufacturer of solid rocket fuels, has moved with jet speed in suing the Cabinet over a decision to void a contract to sell the firm 25,312 acres of Dade County land at \$30 an acre.

The Cabinet voted 41-23 Tuesday to void the contract, and within a couple of hours Attorney George H. Wright Jr. had filed suit in U.S. District Court. Court officials formally notified Cabinet officers of the suit Wednesday.

Aerojet charged the Cabinet with a 1965 agreement to sell the sprawling marsh tract near Homestead. If the firm decided to pick up an option to buy within 18 months, it would pay 26 per cent down on the total price of \$1,265,436.

But Secretary of State Tom Adams, Agriculture Commissioner Doyle Cooney, Treasurer Broward Williams and Attorney Gen. Earl Furetsch voted Tuesday to void the contract with Gov. Claude Kirk voting in opposition.

The 1961 contract, Company President R. J. McKemie, in a letter from the firm's El Monte, Calif., headquarters, informed the Cabinet last month Aerojet was ready to exercise its option to pay 26 per cent down on the total price of \$1,265,436.

But Secretary of State Tom Adams, Agriculture Commissioner Doyle Cooney, Treasurer Broward Williams and Attorney Gen. Earl Furetsch voted Tuesday to void the contract with Gov. Claude Kirk voting in opposition.

# Battle Casualties Continue Low

By GEORGE ESPER Associated Press Writer

SAIGON (AP)—The total of U.S. battlefield deaths in Vietnam last week remained near the lowest figure for the past three years, with 28 Americans killed in action, the U.S. Command announced today.

It was the fourth consecutive week that fewer than 100 Americans were killed in action. Meanwhile, the total of South Vietnamese combat dead exceeded the American total for the 23rd straight week, with 301 government troops killed.

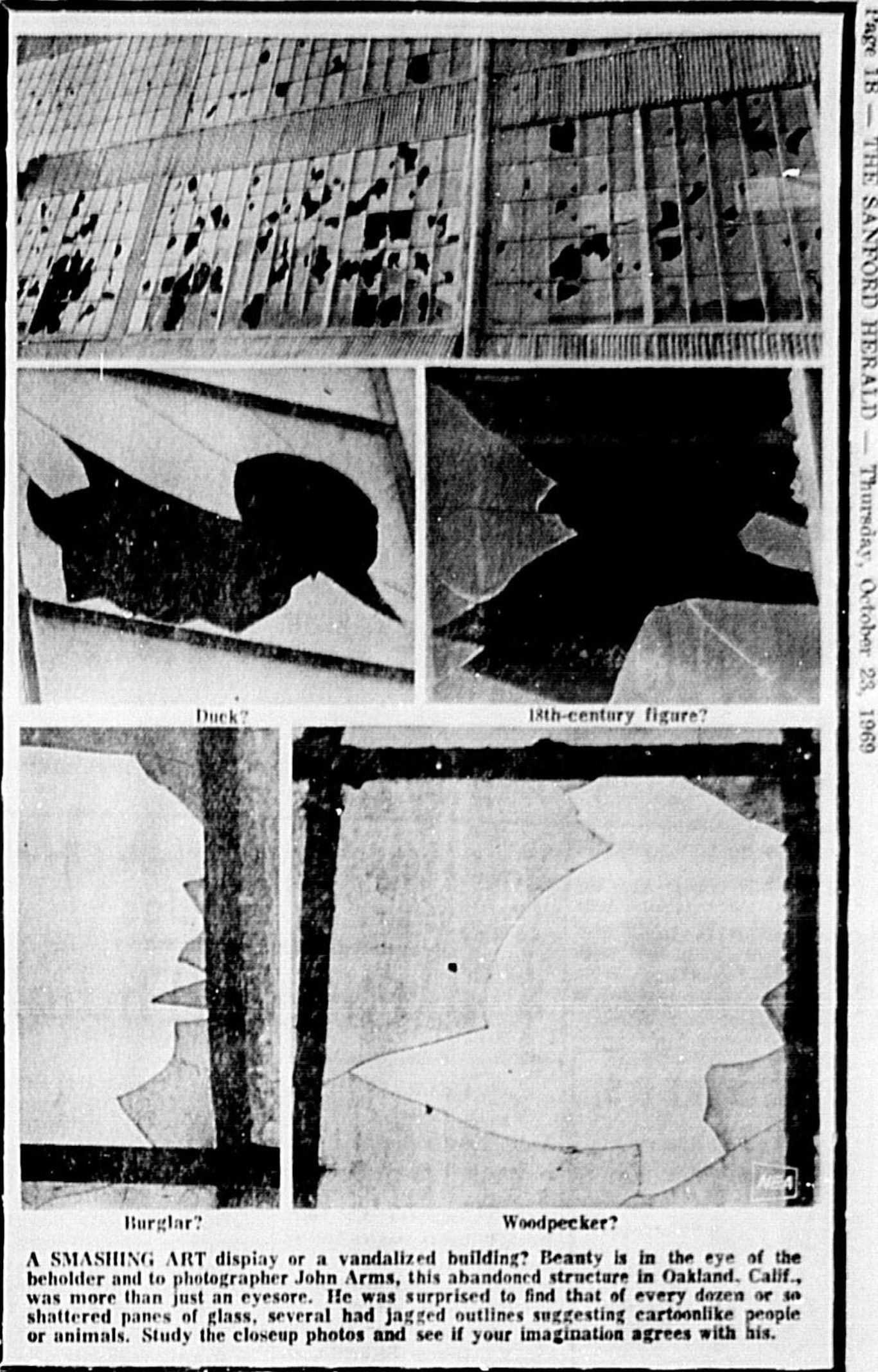
The allied commands reported 1,624 North Vietnamese and

Viet Cong killed last week, the lowest enemy toll reported in 1,000 the week before.

The larger Vietnamese casualties in comparison with those of the Americans is attributed to the assumption by the Vietnamese of a larger share of the fighting and to the American program of troop withdrawal.

The weekly casualty report brought the number of Americans reported killed in action in Vietnam since Jan. 1, 1961 to 39,847, and the number of enemy reported killed in that period to 362,532.

A spokesman for the U.S. Command noted that action has

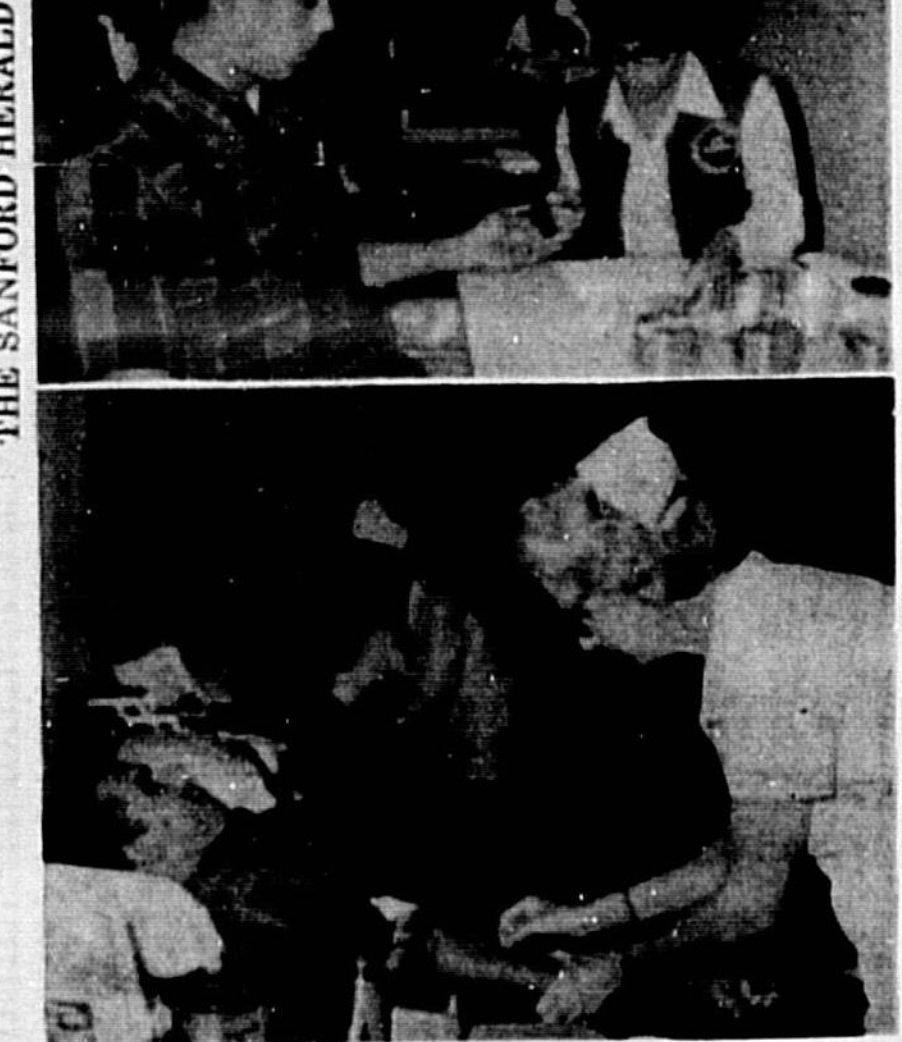


# Students Stage Blood-For-Peace

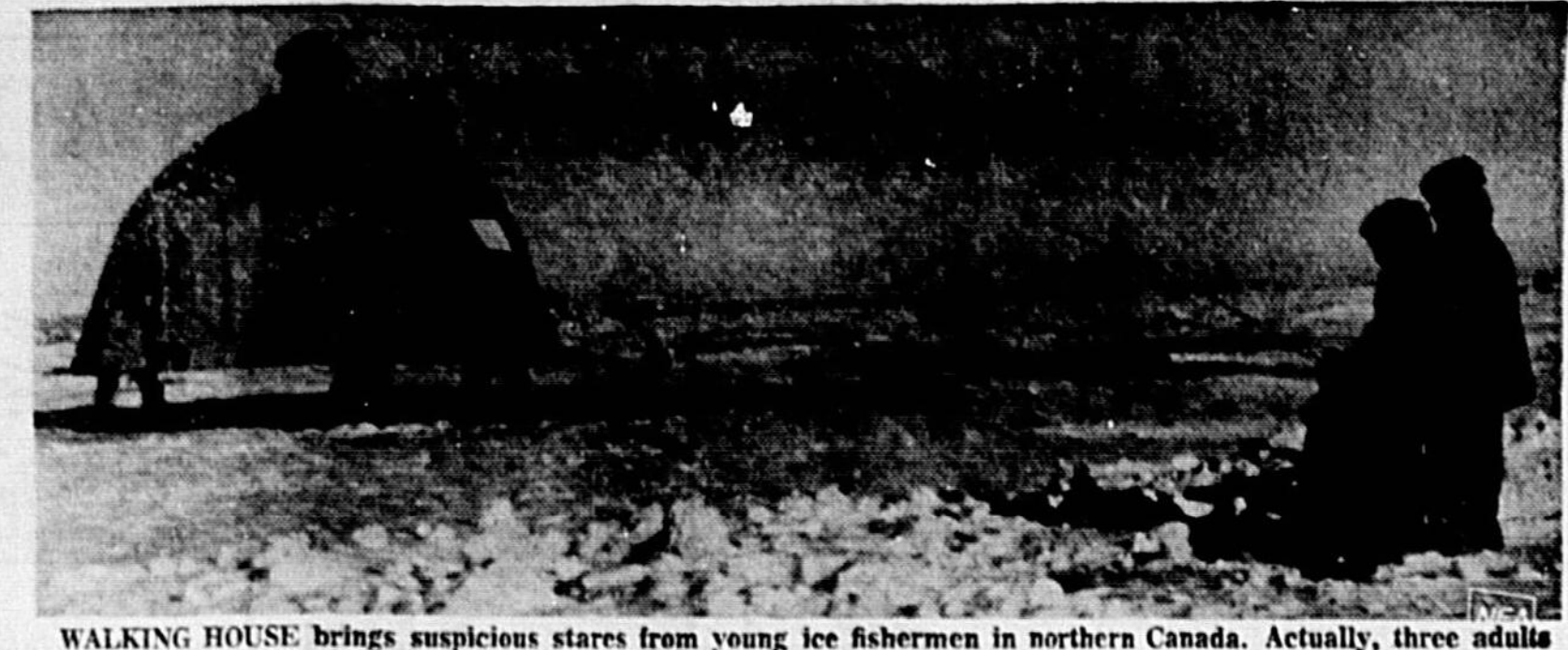

## Farmers Mart Needs \$500,000 Building

Expansion of agri-business in Seminole County and Central Florida was revealed by Leo Butner, manager of the Sanford State Farmers Market, before 50 persons attending a public hearing for improvement of State Road 46 between the Wokiva River and Interstate 4. Butner was speaking in favor of the road improvement to lure northern produce trucks to the Sanford market. He said that now most northern trucks reach here.

Butner has recommended the construction of the second building at the Sanford State Farmers Market to his superior, W. O. Whittle, chief of all State Farmers Markets in Florida. Whittle, of Winter Haven, was interviewed by the Herald. He said that Butner's recommendation will be considered with the 1970-71 budget, which becomes effective next July 1. He said he had been approached by Butner that Harold H. Kaster, of Sanford, and a Jacksonville firm have agreed to each lease half of the new building. Butner said that if the Jacksonville firm cannot find space here it will open in Orlando.

## Lyman Stadium Promised

Lyman High School will have a football stadium by the 1970 football season. This was the promise made to Lyman High School Boosters during last night's meeting of the county board of education in the new facility's auditorium by John Evans, school board chairman.

Evans and the board had just heard Garth Myers, a member of the school's Boosters Club, challenge the board to match dollar-for-dollar the amount that boosters would raise by next football season.

Evans and other board members did not accept Myers' challenge but Evans indicated the board is "on the same team with the boosters" and wanted a suitable football facility as Lyman would not have to play all 10 season games "on the road."

Evans reminded Myers that \$38,500 for lighting system already had been approved by the board for a Lyman field. Myers replied, "This is appreciated, but seats and other facilities also are needed."

Myers then flung his challenge at the board asking it to match \$30,000 that boosters would raise for the balance of the needed stadium.

Evans invited the challenge collectors will surpass this amount in 1969, at \$32.5 million. (Continued on Page 1B, Col. 3)

# County Tax Roll \$5 Million

The fact that Seminole County is growing like a "green bay tree" is particularly evident if reviewing facts and figures of the county tax roll from Tax Collector G. Troy Ray. The tax roll for 1969 is \$5.25 million, as opposed to \$4.53 million in 1968.

The tax bills, which will be mailed to county residents on Oct. 31, are now being data processed. The old bills were processed by an address-ograph machine. The comparable efficiency of IBM over the old system was approved by the board that it took 8.10 weeks previously, whereas now the bills are prepared in a matter of hours. The new system processes 600 lines per minute.

The new bills also contain considerably more information to the taxpayer, such as section, township, range, subdivision, block, lot, assessment number, amount of mortgage, map number, and tax district. There is room on the bill for every type of exemption. Another innovation is the exact amount of discount allowed each month from November through April is shown.

Ray feels that data processing is particularly necessary since the county will be collecting municipal taxes next year. The collector added that this is only the first phase of the system, and additional costs are justified, the system will be applied to other departments, such as tags, licenses, etc.

It has taken four years to put the new system into operation, which, since it is a data processing service, necessitated no purchase of equipment.

School bond millage is 12.57, school general tax, 2.34, and county millage, 6.33. Exception to the figures is noted for those included in a fire control district.

Ray further states that 44,873 bills have been processed upon real estate parcels. Seminole County residents are prompt in payment, according to Ray, in
