### Late Returns Show State Amendments Favored By Voters

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Nov. 6.—(AP)—  
Revised returns from Tuesday's general election in Florida continue to give the three proposed constitutional amendments a margin of victory.  
With complete returns from 13 counties and partial returns from seven others, the figures stood today:  
Amendment one, to provide for the empowering of the Legislature to appropriate funds for common schools out of the general revenue money: For 10,857; against 7,808.  
Amendment two, to provide for a change in the method of selecting the chief justice of the Supreme Court: For 8,553; against 6,195.  
Amendment three, to empower the Legislature to enact a law restricting ownership of land to those whose "ancestry can be traced to those whose ancestors were naturalized": For 8,120; against 5,319.  
Six counties, from which no figures are yet available, have reported that all three amendments carried by substantial majorities. Five other counties, also without giving figures, reported them defeated.

### Borah Attacks State Heads for Barring of Soviet Woman Envoy

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—(AP)—  
Refusal of the State Department to permit Madame Alexandra Kollantay, Soviet Russia's only woman diplomat, to visit the United States on her way to her new post as minister to Mexico, was attacked yesterday by Senator Borah, Idaho, as "intolerable and unjustifiable."  
Meanwhile the State Department indicated that it would not be swayed from its decision to bar the Russian diplomat for the same reasons that had resulted in barring the Count and Countess Karolyi of Hungary, and Shapurji Saklatvala, Communist member of the British Parliament—that they were advocates of anarchy, revolution and agitation.  
"I am utterly opposed to the whole theory and policy upon which such proceedings seem to be based," Senator Borah said, who is chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. "It is contrary to the most cherished traditions of the American people."

### IL DUCE NOW IN POSSESSION OF 7 CABINET JOBS

Mussolini Assumes Exclusive Personal Control of New Order for the Protection of Fascist Rule in Italy

### Nation Is Virtually Under Military Rule

Premier Asks Cohorts for Support in Carrying Out His Two Favorite Maxims

ROME, Nov. 6.—(AP)—  
Benito Mussolini today held seven of the cabinet's 13 portfolios and was exercising personal control of the newly created formidable machinery for the protection of the Fascist regime against all attacks, on principles and results of its policies.  
So far as offenses against the government or its leader are concerned, the country was virtually under martial law today.  
Mussolini possesses the power of a commander-in-chief of the army in time of war. New courts for trial of crimes against the regime and special judicial police forces extended to which he has here and abroad are both controlled by the Fascist militia. Mussolini is doubly in command, as Minister of the Interior and commander of the militia.  
Having added the ministry of the interior to his already enormous responsibilities, the Premier, more deeply entrenched in power than ever before, called upon his cohorts to support him in carrying out two of his favorite maxims, two eyes for one eye and one tooth for an entire set of teeth, and "the best way to defend his to attack."  
The wheat among the cohorts is to be separated from the chaff, however, the grand council of the Fascist party—the supreme instrument of the regime—decided today to authorize Secretary General Turati to carry out a systematic purging of the ranks of all members not giving proof of their faithfulness to the original Fascist spirit.  
Moreover, the Fascist ranks will not be permitted to take matters into their own hands. The council has ordered an immediate cessation of the movement started at Padoa and Parma to institute special secret political police and complete lists of enemies for the regime for special surveillance by local black shirts.  
In addition to being commander in chief of the militia, Mussolini is now Premier, Foreign Minister, Minister of Interior, Minister of War, Minister of Marine, Minister of Aviation and Minister of Labor. The national council has approved all the drastic measures which the cabinet, sitting under the presidency of Mussolini, requested. They will now go to the Chamber of Deputies, specially convoked next Tuesday.  
They include death for attempts to injure or molest the Premier or members of the royal family by word or deed, or to conspire against the regime; heavy penalties for direct or indirect opposition; the creation of political police to watch the activities of anti-Fascist newspapers and periodicals.  
Only the establishment of a retroactive death penalty for those responsible for previous attempts against the life of Mussolini fitted of enactment by the grand council. It is understood that Minister of Justice Rocco insisted that approval would be at variance with all he legal traditions of Italy.

### Taxpayers May Get Relief Through Rebate Ranging From 10 To 12 Per Cent

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—(AP)—  
Studies during the past few days have convinced President Coolidge that some relief for individual and corporation taxpayers, in the form of rebates or refunds, 10 to 12 per cent on the tax payments, may be feasible.  
Although he believes that it will not be possible for the December session of Congress to revise the present revenue laws, he let it be known yesterday that he believes that conditions are developing which would warrant the granting of temporary rebates.  
The Treasury surplus this year, it was said, at the White House will approximate \$750,000,000 and a refund of 10 to 12 per cent will mean the return of between \$200,000,000 and \$250,000,000 to the taxpayers.  
Receipts of the Treasury will make the deficit for 1926, but at the Treasury White House announcement was made that some purpose, as Secretary Mellon and other fiscal officials have declared repeatedly that at present it was too early to make a reduction to be considered for 1927.  
It is the Treasury estimated that the surplus for the fiscal year ending June 30 next would be \$1,500,000,000, but many signs since have pointed to a larger surplus, and Democratic leaders, including Senator Simmons, North Carolina, tax legislation spokesman, for that party, have demanded an immediate tax reduction running as high as \$200,000,000 in some instances.  
To date the levy cut ordered by Congress in the individual income tax for 1926, individual return receipts have been higher than had been anticipated, the bulk of the increase being attributed to the levy on corporation taxes, the levies on which were raised from 12 1/2 to 13 1/2 per cent, to counteract the effect of the 10 per cent tax. The surplus of the Treasury will be made up of the surplus of the special dividend tax, including the surplus on the estate and ad valorem taxes, and the surplus of the regular tax.  
The proposed tax reduction will be considered by the House and Senate in the next session, which convenes in December.

October Report of The City Food Inspector Details Changes Made in Dairies To Safeguard Milk Supply

Minor improvements in the dairies which deal milk in Sanford are being made, according to the October report of Dr. Baker, city food inspector. The improvements under way or already completed will result in additional safeguards for the sanitary handling of the milk supply in the Sanford territory.  
Merritt's dairy is moving to a new and better location, Dr. Baker reported, the location being on a sandy hill which is considered desirable from a sanitary viewpoint. The milk rooms and facilities come up to the requirements, the report said.  
To milk sold by eight dairies in Sanford was inspected on different days by Dr. Baker. The results of the analysis is as follows:

With the selection of a 1927 convention city and the choice of officers for the coming year, the tenth annual session, Florida Association of Real Estate Boards was to be brought to a close here this forenoon.  
In session since late Wednesday the Florida realtors have heard numerous inspirational addresses dealing largely with the optimistic outlook for Florida.  
As the sessions came to a close, the convention was addressed this morning by Peter O. Knight, of Tampa, recognized as one of the leading business men of the state and a close observer of commercial conditions. The subject of his address was "The Business Outlook," and association spokesmen had awaited it as the "most concrete available assurance of Florida's future."  
The convention was also addressed this morning by Herman A. Dann, St. Petersburg, president of the State Chamber of Commerce and one of Florida's greatest boosters; by Walter W. Rose, of Orlando, and Arthur E. Curtis, Miami.  
Under-currents of politics had been particularly noticeable last night and this morning, largely in connection with the selection of the convention city, Tampa and Hollywood vying with each other for this honor as well as representation among the association officials.

### ENFORCEMENT AGENTS FIRED BY DRY LEADER

Quartet Is Dismissed for "Conduct Distinctly Unbecoming to U. S. Officers," Asserts General Andrews

### Chief Denies Coast Guard Has 'Sold Out'

Dry Chieftain Admits Some Defections But Says Force As Whole Deserves Praise

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—(AP)—  
Prohibition again was brought into the limelight today at the head quarters of the enforcement of the law.  
While Assistant Secretary Andrews in charge of enforcement was denying that the coast guard had "sold out" to the bootleggers and was making known his determination to seek legislation next month giving the government greater control over medicinal liquor, it was revealed that the chief of the prohibition machinery in and around the District of Columbia, and three of his agents had been dismissed for conduct "distinctly unbecoming to federal officers," when they held up with drawn revolvers an automobile containing an unidentified but reported prominent government official.  
Reports that the coast guard forces had decamped to the liquor law violators were laid by Gen. Andrews to "bootleggers who need advertising for their home made foreign liquor."  
While not referring specifically to the latest instance, that in Boston where four coast guard men are held for aiding occupants of rum row, Gen. Andrews conceded that there had been some defections, but that the organization under Rear Admiral E. C. Billard, merited praise for its activities.  
Gen. Andrews said that he would again urge Congress at the next session to pass the prohibition enforcement re-organization measure and the bill to strengthen the Volstead Act, but that the only new measure he will propose would give the government greater control over the rapidly vanishing supply of medicinal liquor.  
The dismissed agents here were Robert L. Livingston, deputy prohibition administrator for the district, and agents J. Carter, James Cook and John Fitzpatrick.  
"Agents may not rush about city streets and country roads holding up automobiles without the slightest cause, using drawn revolvers and talking abusively to occupants of the automobiles they stop," said Gen. Andrews in connection with the dismissal. "Such conduct is not becoming to a federal officer and must be stopped."  
While none of the three agents ever will be reappointed to the federal service under any circumstances, he added, Livingston may be given another chance and transferred to some other enforcement field.  
The name of the occupant of the seized machine was not revealed but officials said that they desired to lay all possible emphasis upon the dismissal of the agents, and not on the prominence of the automobile's occupants.  
"The same thing would have been done," they commented, "no matter whose car had been stopped in such a manner."

### French Aroused By Charges Of Alleged Spanish Conspiracy

QUEEN CONFIDENT OF BREACH BEING HEALED SHORTLY

### Friendship and Loyalty to Her Expected to Draw Two Members of Royal Party Into Settlement of Row

PARIS, Nov. 6.—(AP)—  
Queen Marie traveled back to the United States today from Vancouver, B. C., confident that the breach between Samuel Hill, her host on the far western lap of her tour, and Maj. Stanley Washburn, her special aide, would be healed by the same elements that she believes caused it—friendship and loyalty to her.  
Although Marie plans to take no public notice of the dispute over the present control of her travels, a spokesman for the Queen indicated that she expects the situation to be improved when the royal train leaves Seattle tonight for the East.  
The solution is thought to lie in the contemplated departure of Mr. Hill at Seattle and the retention of Maj. Washburn as aide, the major has agreed to remain with the party, at Marie's request. Marie regrets that the two men, both her friends of world war days and both anxious to make her tour a success, have been unable to pull together. Her only suggestion to them was that they share for a time the responsibility of guiding the party. It was her wish that Col. John H. Carroll, official aide to the Queen and Maj. Washburn, permit Mr. Hill to handle the entertainment program of the Spokane-Portland-Seattle-Vancouver leg of the journey and that Washburn and Carroll resume their regular roles after today.  
Although disturbed by the controversy, Marie was her usual calm self as she received Vancouver's greetings yesterday, apparently unaware that the reception program itself was near collapse, until nearly the last minute. Because of the dispute on the train, Vancouver officials were not advised until late Thursday that the program previously arranged was acceptable.  
The first scheduled stop on today's itinerary was Blaine on the Canadian-American border, where Mr. Hill several years ago built a peace portal and which was dedicated by President Harding.

### Quality Of Water Good Last Month Inspector Reports

Examination of the city's well water at intervals during October by Dr. C. W. Baker, inspector of the milk and food supply of Sanford, revealed that the quality of the water was "good," according to his report filed today with City Manager W. B. Williams.  
"The lake water," Dr. Baker reported, "has not been used by itself long enough to produce more than a small per cent of gas, which was not considered enough to grade. The new well had only three parts of hardness per million."  
The new well referred to in the report was completed about eight weeks ago, but last Saturday it was disconnected, when it was discovered that the water had disagreeable taste and odor. The supply had an excessive hardness, according to City Manager W. B. Williams, who sent specimens of the water to E. L. Filby, chief sanitary engineer of the Florida State Board of Health.  
Before the new well was tapped, the sanitary engineer analyzed the water and said that the bacterial count was satisfactory. The hardness found in the specimen, he said, is typical of the drilled wells in this section. City Manager Williams regularly sends specimens of water to Jacksonville, every two weeks as a matter of precaution.  
The bacterial per c. c. of the specimens examined by Dr. Baker last month was Spigot number one, 100 c. c.; spigot number two, 88 c. c.; Spigot number three, 100 c. c.; and at reservoir, 80 c. c.

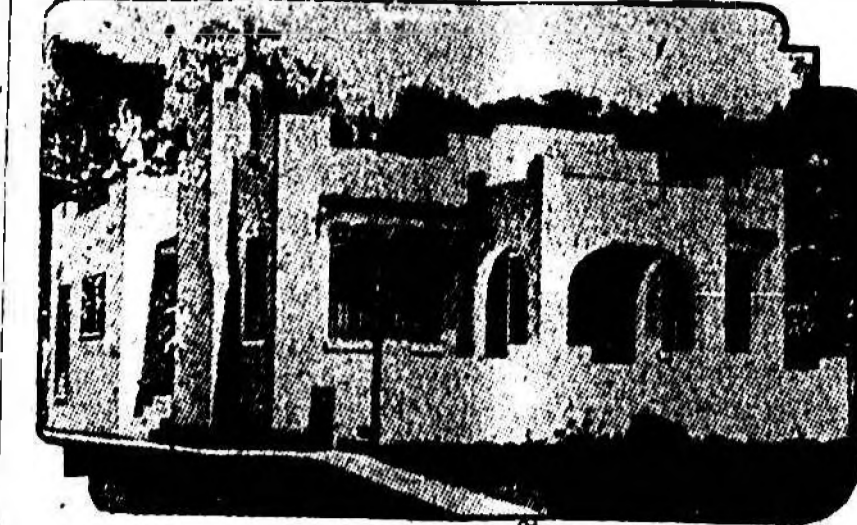

## Police Advocate A War On Obnoxious Automobile Slogan

There was a time when a decorated automobile was considered original and attractive, but as fads have a way of dying from over use and abuse the decorated car is now considered in the same class with the one infamous expression, "So's your old man."

The person who paints signs and pictures on his car no longer is considered front rank man in the legion of America's humorists.

The idea of painting a slogan on a car was originated in the United States by pioneers who found a certain amount of inspiration from the sign "Pike's Peak or Bust" which they painted on their covered wagons.

The fearless motorist, in cotton duster, goggles and motor cap, who traveled many years before the world war in a huge-horseless carriage, was next to adopt a slogan. He was proud of the sign, "Excuse my Dust."

This was usually accompanied by pennants pinned on the car. There were pennants from Niagara Falls, Atlantic City and Philadelphia, proving that the motorist had traveled some in his day.

Many years after came the era of cheap used cars, and college youths seized upon heaps of junk which could be bought for \$25. Such cars immediately were painted (by the owner) in college and fraternity colors and each car was given a name, such as "Julia," "Lona" or "Lizette."

Manufacturers next saw the possibility of advertising and began to put the car's name on the spare tire cover.

College students again saw greater possibilities in auto decorations and signs. The country was covered with wise-cracks and epigrams. "Chicken, here's your coupe," "In case of fire throw this in," "Baby, aveledh'k'f'eser'hae-b'atfttuenderpd here's your rattle," and many others.

After the wise cracks came the stickers, the most popular of the bathing girl. The stickers were pasted on the front and back glass plates and pictures were drawn on the car.

Here the police stepped in. They saw danger in windshield stickers. As a result, many states and cities are considering laws to prohibit sign sticker and slogan.
