



The word from Postmaster General Elmer T. Klassen is that the cost-control program in the Postal Service has been so successful it is no longer necessary to seek an additional one cent an ounce in first-class mail rates next year.

The service had previously announced plans to ask the supposedly independent Postal Rate Commission to raise the present 8 cent an ounce charge to 9 cents on first-class letters and packages beginning next January.

That will not be necessary now, Klassen said, adding a couple of ominous qualifications: 'Unless somebody incurs a financial obligation I'm not aware of now." And unless the postal unions, whose contracts expire next July, demand and get increases that require higher

In other words, first-class mail will remain t 8 cents until after the election and perhaps a while longer. Big deal. - Montgomery (Ala.)



With Agnew, It's A Noncampaign

Going around with Vice President Agnew is what you might call Phase 2 of th noncampaign of 1972. Sen. George McGovern has a lock on Phase 1. But the quietness of it all seems to be working more for Nixon-Agnew In three days, the vice-president traveled nearly 5,000

miles. He "covered" just two crucial states, Texas and Illinois, and no lesser ones. He made exactly four speeches and held one airborne press conference with a limited group of reporters. That works out to one event for each 1,000 miles of travel. The logistics of the trip suggested the urgency of earthshaking events. Sometimes there were more typewriters and plane-side telephones than there were reporters to

file stories. Highly efficient aides barked orders and shouted "Let's go!" when in fact our next objective was a three-hour waiting period in some hotel. Now, four years ago a stretched-out schedule for Agnew was known to be a deliberate effort to keep him under wraps after he'd committed a series of gaffes which were interpreted widely as racial or nationalistic slurs. But in 1972 he is President Nixon's chief campaign surrogate with major responsibilities in the assault on McGovern. It is probably inescapable, therefore, that many of the reporters following the vice-president regard all the surface sound and fury as faintly ludicrous. It's a little like a hurricane. At the center, all is calm and nothing is

Agnew's speeches tend to be long, statistical recitals of claimed administration accomplishment in such fields as agriculture and care for the elderly (now being billed as He told us in his plane that he can't understand why we

should dismiss these recitals as boring. They are, he says, he "meat" of the campaign. Maybe this "meat" is indeed better fare than the thin gruel of empty generalizations Agnew says he is trying to avoid. But it is tough to chew. Most of his statistics

never make print. Nevertheless, all this grousing about boring speeches and swirling logistics may be missing the real point. If Agnew is right in saying, as he does, that the "tone of the country is quieter," then a noncampaign may be an inevitable consequence. Real political combat develops when the country is either torn apart or deeply stirred. That does not seem to be true today, for all the reported discontents and the talk about the Vietnam war, the

flawed economy, and the decay of the cities. So, again, this campaign may not be about much of anything. The voters, all samplings indicate, have plenty of troubled things on their minds. But they don't seem to feel that the balloting on Nov. 7 is going to ease their

In that circumstance, the incumbent team of Nixon-Agnew has to be enormously advantaged. A noncampaign at root is a campaign whose most likely result is to leave the incumbents in office. McGovern has just five weeks or so to stir millions of American voters into a mood of real urgency, and to per-

suade enough of them that he should be their chosen instrument of action. In the meantime, because tradition or habit or something demands that we conduct full-fledged fall campaigns, McGovern, Agnew, Sargent Shriver and to a small extent the President himself are dashing about the land, creating a lot of commotion but giving us little substance. According to Stephen Hess, one-time White House aide to President Nixon, if his former employer reduces international tensions to the point where foreign policy fades as an election issue, he will increase the possibility of his defeat in November. "That most paradoxical of American presidents could

be faced with his final paradox: The more successful he is at international crisis management, the less likely is fcreign policy to dominate the campaign; the less foreign policy dominates the campaign, the more likely is he to Writing in the fall issue of Foreign Policy magazine,

Hess notes that foreign policy was dominant in four of the last five presidential campaigns. Significantly, the 1960 election, which Richard Nixon lost to John F. Kennedy, was the only one since 1952 in which foreign policy did not But though foreign policy issues have been dominant in

most recent elections, Hess cautions that they have not necessarily been decisive. In each election since 1952, he says, "foreign policy as an issue boiled down to who was most apt to get or keep

us out of war." American actions on issues of great importance, such as Bangladesh or the world monetary situation, "may affect almost no votes at all." This is because the public is so poorly informed in this area, says Hess, because so much information is classified and complex and particularly because "the purpose



Ban On Sportscars?

Car and Driver Magazine has called attention to a very interesting state law which just went into effect in New Jersey. This law says that if your car doesn't pass a new emission test which is run by the State that you are warned to take remedical action. As of July, 1973 if you do do not pass the State emission requirements you are given 14 days to get rid of your car or face criminal action from the state. This law does not take into account what year car you may be driving. The law is aimed at seeing that all vehicles eventially meet the emission standards by 1975. A similar federal law may be placed before Congress this year or in 1973. My complaint with the law is that it doesn't take into account that John Doe's 1969 Z-28 Camaro won't be unalbe to pass an emission test because that year the car wasn't equipped with the necessary pollution devices. Furthermore it would be impossible for the owner to get the devices placed on the engine and even if he did they wouldn't be that effective for a very important reason. The Camaro engine that year was a high compression engine.

I am in favor of controling and stamping out pollution. I am not in favor of laws either State or Federal that would actually force a car owner to get rid of his car or face State or Federal Criminal charges. If we auto enthusiasts aren't vigilant concerning this type of legislation the Sportscar will be legislated right out of existance and to own a Sportscar or high performance car may turn out to be in VIOLATION OF THE LAW! Think about it. Auto sports as we know and understand it may cease to exist if we don't begin protecting our
