

Water Quality Bill Near OK

WASHINGTON (AP) — By near unanimous vote, Congress has sent President Nixon a \$24.6-billion antipollution bill which aims to purify the nation's waters by 1985.

The three-year authorization measure must be backed up with appropriations.

Final passage in both houses came within three hours Wednesday evening. The House passed the bill 366 to 11 and the Senate followed with a 74-0 vote.

If fully financed, the water-quality bill would provide \$9.7 billion in fiscal year 1973, \$9.95 billion in 1974 and \$7.65 billion in 1975.

It would allot \$336 million for the current year for waste-treatment works already authorized.

Other facets of the bill include: —A requirement that industries discharging waste into waters apply the best practicable control technology by July 1, 1977 and the best available by July 1, 1983. —\$18 billion in grants to municipalities to build waste-treatment plants and improve sewage collection. The federal government would pay 75 per cent of the cost of building waste-treatment plants.

Continuance of current water-quality standards plus limits on how many effluents a plant may pour into the nation's waters.

—Required government approval of state guidelines for issuance of permits for disposing effluents.

—Administration by the Army Corps of Engineers of a separate permit program for disposal of dredge and fill material in certain areas.

...While In Seminole County

On the local level, the second of three meetings was held yesterday at the First Federal Savings and Loan Association building in Altamonte Springs, expressly for Seminole County municipalities.

An earlier meeting involving Osceola County had 100 per cent representation. Tomorrow, the municipalities from Orange County will hold their meeting of the Orange-Seminole-Osceola water quality management study committee.

This program design study has a fixed cost of \$350,000 and covers the period following for the next 18 months.

Although all six Seminole municipalities received written invitations including each of their five elected officials and/or their representatives, out of a possible total of 30 persons only three persons attended representing Oviedo and Sanford. Sanford City Commissioner A. A. Clamham, City Manager Warren Knowles and newly elected Oviedo Councilman Arthur Evans.

There was no representation from Altamonte Springs, Casselberry, Longwood or Winter Springs.

Sewer Ban Hits Economy

Swafford Predicts

LONGWOOD — Financial disaster for families of construction workers with severe damage to the economy of the entire state was predicted by Altamonte Springs Mayor Lawrence Swafford in the Oct. 1 moratorium on sewer system connections throughout Florida.

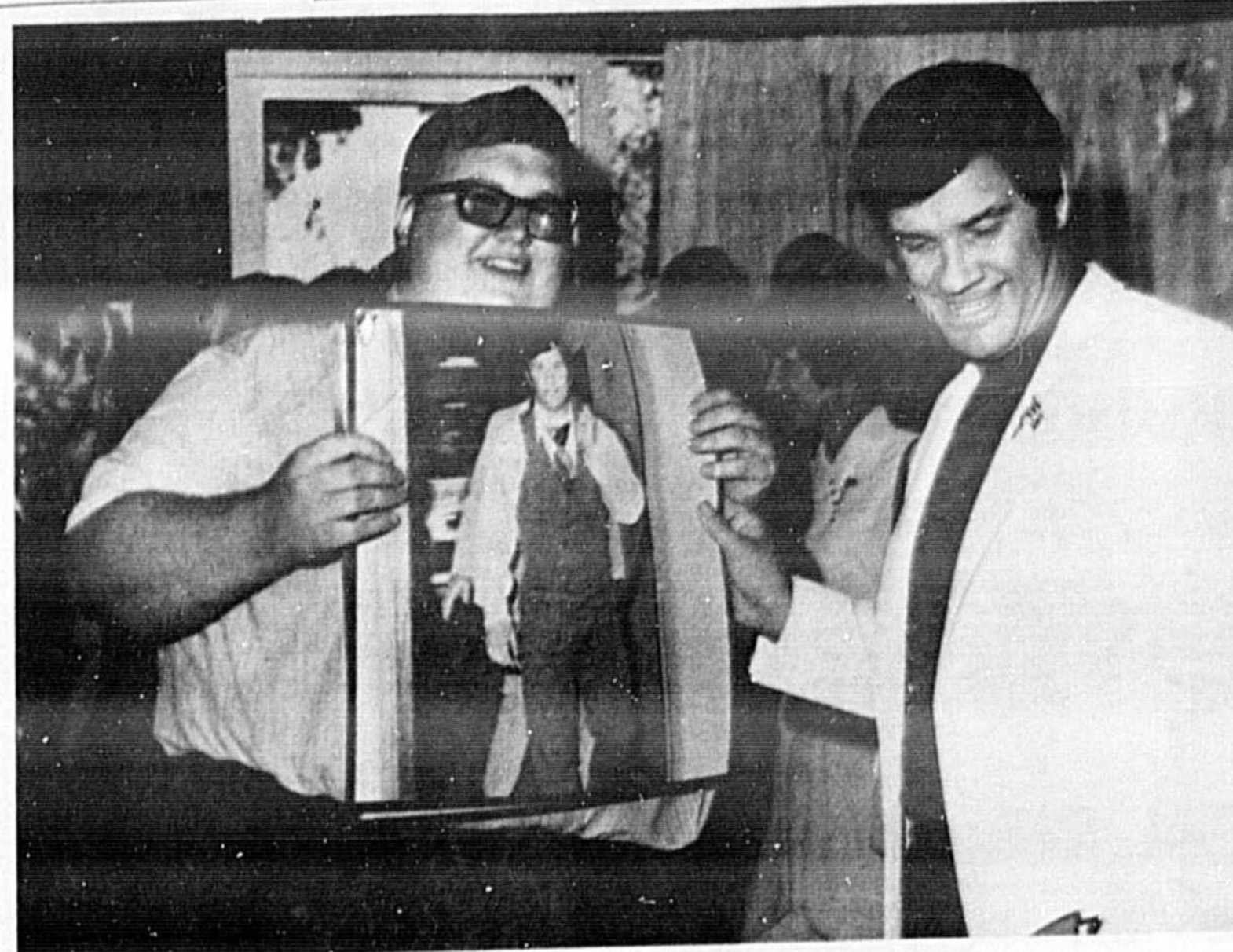
Swafford, in discussing the moratorium on new construction sewer connections to systems considered inadequate, said the \$1 billion annual construction industry is the largest employer in the state at this time.

He continued that in short order, with the moratorium, thousands of workers will be jobless and unable to pay house payments, car payments, medical expenses and all the other necessities of life.

Swafford interpreted the action as a way of putting pressure on the federal government to give two-thirds grants to pay costs of updating sewer treatment. "Good will come from this," he said.

As for his city, he said the sewer treatment plant cited by the state-Spring Valley-is operating at 90 per cent capacity, and plans are to update it by adding new machinery, pumps, etc. "But we are not about to close the plant," he declared. He pointed out the Spring Valley facility, recently acquired by the city, has a 100,000-gallon daily capacity.

The West Altamonte (San Sebastian) facility will be full before the city goes to construction on increasing capacity at the main sewer plant from 1.2 million gallons to 3.2 million gallons daily.

'Mystery Man' In Turner Case

Wednesday visits by a mystery man to two former Glenn Turner officials' homes to "talk" over the coming trial of Turner on 86 counts of violating Florida's securities laws has prompted a third former Turner Enterprises official to contact Seminole County authorities.

Seminole Deputy David Zorian answered a call last night to the home of Ronald Hallman, 1805 Briarcliff Road, Altamonte Springs, Turner Enterprises assistant controller, who resigned his office, along with Antonio Lopez, Turner controller, and William Nusbbaum, assistant treasurer, both of Winter Park. Hallman told Zorian that Nusbbaum and Lopez had received visits from a man who would not identify himself but who wanted to learn what form of testimony they would give in the Turner trial.

The deputy advised The Herald that Hallman told "me all he had to do is 'truth' to get Turner off."

Zorian in his report listed the tag number of the car driven by the man calling on Nusbbaum and Lopez as 12W-2898, which was copied by one of the men and relayed to Hallman, who, in turn, gave the number to Zorian.

Today, to whom the license was issued and was informed it was out of Lake County and belonged to a car owned by the State Bureau of Motor Vehicles.

In checking with the State office at Tallahassee, this newspaper was informed by a department employee that the file listing the car is "missing" and she would have to hunt for it. The employee promised to return the call when the information was found.

Zorian, in his report, said Hallman was "scared of threats" and advised he was one of three persons having to testify against Turner when his Pinellas County trial is finally underway.

Turner was sentenced to 150 days in jail without bond Wednesday by Circuit Judge William A. Patterson in Clearwater, who held him in contempt for refusing to testify about a demonstration by 600 women just before Turner's securities violation trial was to begin.

"What action was committed in front of Judge Patterson?" asked McNulty, who said it was arguable whether simple refusal to testify constituted contempt.

The prosecutor answered that he could not argue outside the bounds of the written order but that transcript of the entire contempt hearing would be delivered to the court.

McNulty Wednesday night freed Turner on a temporary bond of \$2,000 pending the outcome of the appeal.

The three judges retired to deliberate the appeal and said they would issue a written order in the case.

Turner spent five hours in jail after refusing to testify about the disturbance outside the Pinellas County Courthouse.

When he handed down the contempt citation, Judge Patterson commented, "I'm not going to preside in a zoo."

'Internationalism' Extolled By McG.

Sen. George McGovern spoke today of a "new internationalism" to supplant President Nixon's foreign policy which he described as "unconscious isolationism."

But while Democratic presidential candidate McGovern was giving his first detailed account of his foreign policy plans, Vice President Spiro T. Agnew strongly denounced him.

"Nobody can believe George McGovern," Agnew said, adding that the McGovern's policies only "make him very popular in some segments of North Vietnam."

At appearances in South Dakota Wednesday, Agnew said McGovern is "stirring the suspicions of people around the land and relying solely on a campaign of fear and innuendo."

McGovern, in a speech for the City Club of Cleveland today, said the Nixon foreign policies are isolating the United States from allies and trading partners.

"We are isolated from reality by the insistence that tough talk and big Pentagon budgets are somehow synonymous with national manhood," he said.

He urged rejection of "this unconscious isolationism in favor of a new internationalism based not only upon our vital interests, but also upon the kind of nation we can and should be."

The Democratic vice presidential candidate, Sargent Shriver, expressed support in Denver for a decision of the Colorado Labor Council to endorse McGovern against the wishes of AFL-CIO President George Meany.

"If any labor leader, no matter how high he is," Shriver told the council, "tells you to vote for Richard Nixon he is telling you to vote against your own best interests and against the best interests of every worker in the country."

Shriver was to fly to San Jose and Los Angeles today.

Meanwhile, an internal confrontation was building up within the AFL-CIO over Meany's orders to state groups to repeal resolutions urging defeat of Nixon.

He has issued such an order to the state AFL-CIO in California and Oklahoma, and similar orders were expected in Minnesota, North Carolina, Nebraska, Iowa and Texas, where the state labor conventions have called for defeat of Nixon.

Meany Fighting Own Labor Units

WASHINGTON (AP) — AFL-CIO President George Meany is steaming toward a confrontation with state labor units smarting at his orders to repeal resolutions urging the defeat of Richard Nixon.

Meany reportedly has ordered a half-dozen or more state labor councils to abandon "dump Nixon" campaigns on grounds that such efforts violate the national federation's policy of neutrality in the presidential campaign.

"I don't have the authority to rescind the resolution. I'm going to work on it but we are busy trying to elect a U.S. senator down here and if I can find time, I'll do it," grumbled Oklahoma AFL-CIO President Henry L. Likes in a telephone interview.

"It's incredible," said a staff member of another state AFL-CIO council that has urged defeat of Nixon. "Everything Meany does is neutral in behalf of Nixon."

Food Prices Spiral Again

WASHINGTON (AP) — Prices of a broad range of wholesale food, industrial raw materials and manufactured products rose an average of three-tenths of one per cent last month, the government today.

The report by the Bureau of Labor Statistics said the increase included a rise of six-tenths of one per cent for farm products, processed foods and feeds, while industrial commodities increased two-tenths of one per cent.

The report said that in the past three months, wholesale prices rose at an annual rate of 6.7 per cent compared with 4.9 per cent in the first and second quarters of the year, and at an annual rate of 17.4 per cent in the third quarter.

In the 13 months so far of President Nixon's wage-price controls, wholesale prices have risen at an annual rate of 4.3 per cent, compared with a rate of 5.2 per cent in the nine months prior to the controls.

The September increase brought the government's Wholesale Price Index up to 120.2 of its 1967 base of 100. This means it cost wholesalers \$120.20 last month on the average for goods worth \$100 five years ago.

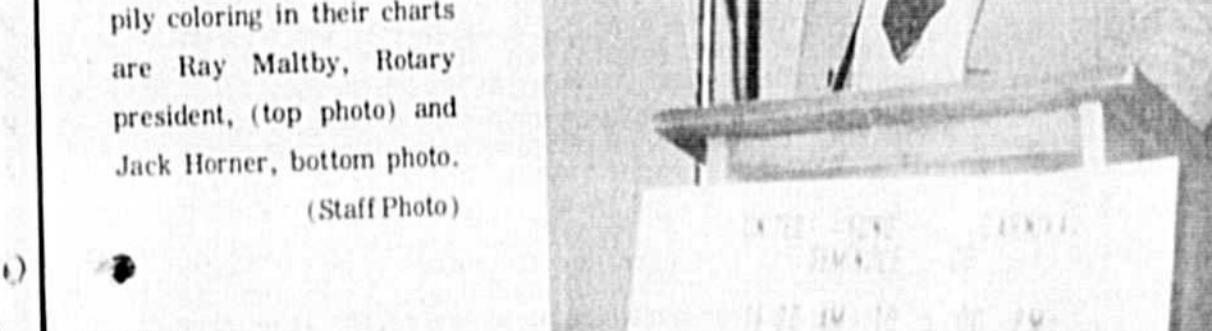

Ban On Sportscars?

Car and Driver Magazine has called attention to a very interesting state law which just went into effect in New Jersey. The law says that if your car doesn't pass a new emission test which is run by the State that you are warned to take remedial action. As of July, 1972 if you do not pass the State emission requirements are given 14 days to get the ride of your car or face criminal action from the state. This law does not take into account what year your car may be driving. The law is aimed at seeing that all vehicles eventually meet the emission standards by 1975. A similar federal law may be placed before Congress this year or in 1973.

My complaint with the law is that it doesn't take into account that John Doe's 1969 Z-38 Camaro won't be able to pass an emission test because that year the car wasn't equipped with the necessary pollution devices. Furthermore it's not possible for the owner to get the devices placed on the engine and even if he did they wouldn't be that effective for a very important reason. The Camaro engine that year was a high compression engine.

I am in favor of controlling and stamping out pollution. I am not in favor of laws either State or Federal that would actually force a car owner to ride his car or face State or Federal Criminal charges. If it auto enthusiasts aren't vigilant concerning this type of legislation the Sportscar will be legislated right out of existence and on a national level high performance cars may turn out to be in VIOLATION OF THE LAW! Think about it. Auto sports as we know and understand it may cease to exist if we don't begin protecting our interests.

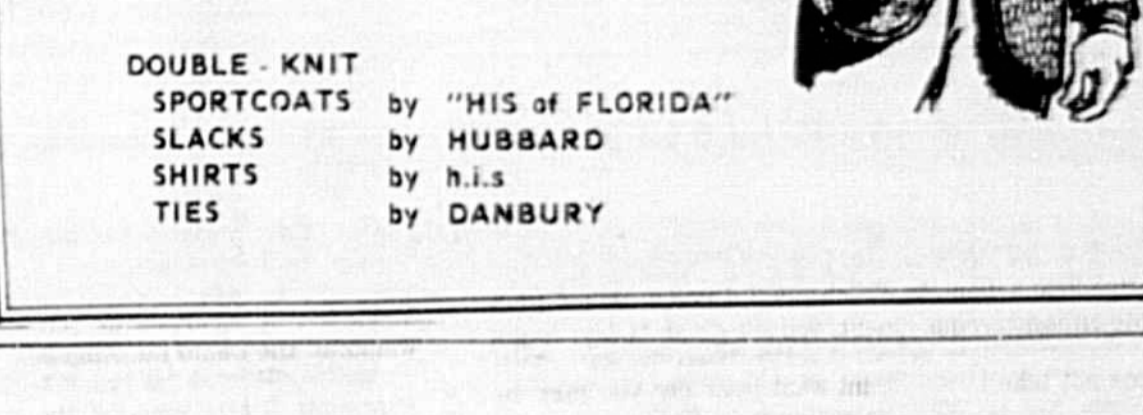

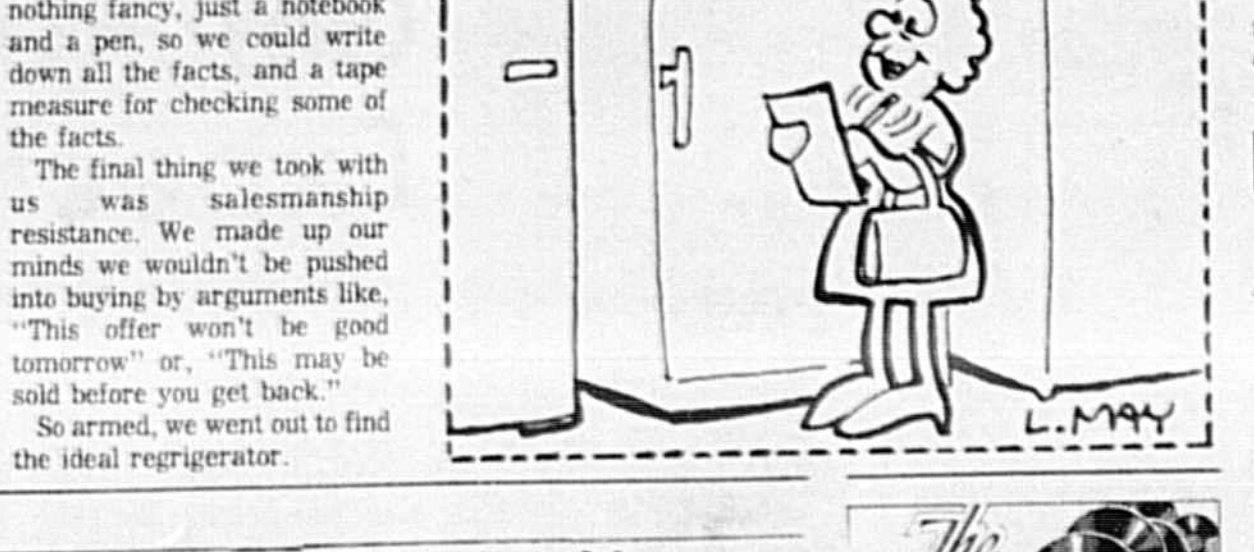

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The Weeder's Guide

Just as the artist uses pigments to paint beautiful pictures, so does nature use them to color your autumn. Of course weather and the breakdown in chlorophyll play their parts. This is how the autumn drama unfolds:

Many pigments that contribute to fall color are in the leaves from earliest spring but as spring progresses into summer the green pigment (or chlorophyll) dominates. As the chlorophyll breaks down in summer it is replaced steadily and the leaves remain green. But as the days shorten in September, production of new green slows and all the chlorophyll dissipates. Then other pigments take over, bringing a bright autumn color scheme.

Cool nights and warm days enhance carotenes, flavonoids and purples. Cold, below-freezing temperatures kill the leaf cells and eliminate new color formation. Genetic makeup and the amount of moisture in the soil are other color factors. The reason no two falls are exactly alike is that each tree has its characteristic colors and conditions vary annually.

Barth's Legends Fall Flat

CHIMERA By John Barth
Random House, 308 Pages \$6.95

Near the end of "Chimera," Barth's latest work of fiction, one of the characters remarks, "It's a beastly figure, ill-proportioned, full of longeurs, lumps, lacunae, a kind of monstrous mixed metaphor..."

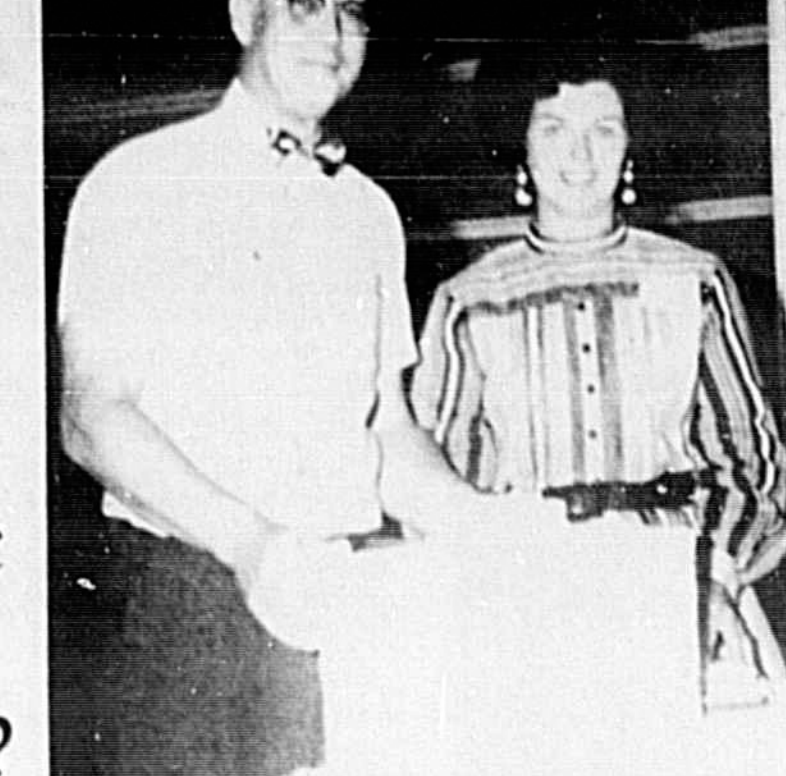
The remark isn't directed at the book, of course, but it could be used to describe large portions of the text — although, in fairness, there are scattered sections which are witty, well-written, thought-provoking.

Over-all, however, Barth's efforts at retelling three legends — often in contemporary idiom — fall flat, especially when that which is meant to amuse fails to do so.

The myths involved are those of Scheherazade, the comely lass with a flair for story-telling; Perseus, slayer of the turkey-to-stone-with-a-look-Medusa, and Bellerophon, rider of the winged-horse Pegasus and slayer of the fire-breathing Chimera.

The Scheherazade episode, narrated largely by the tale spinner's kid sister Danyazade, is the least interesting of the three segments, taking some 50 pages of convoluted prose to argue — fall flat, especially when that which is meant to amuse fails to do so.

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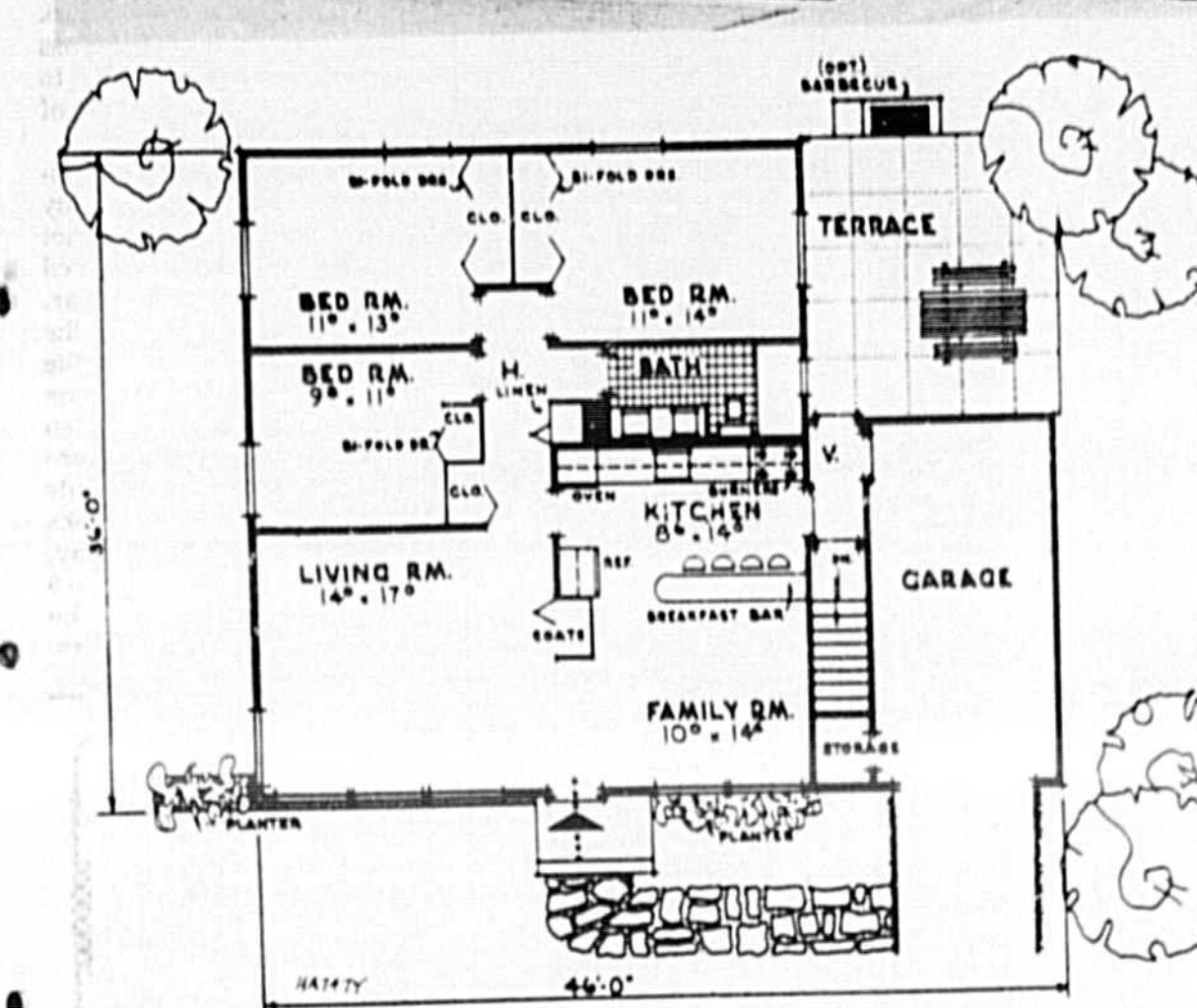
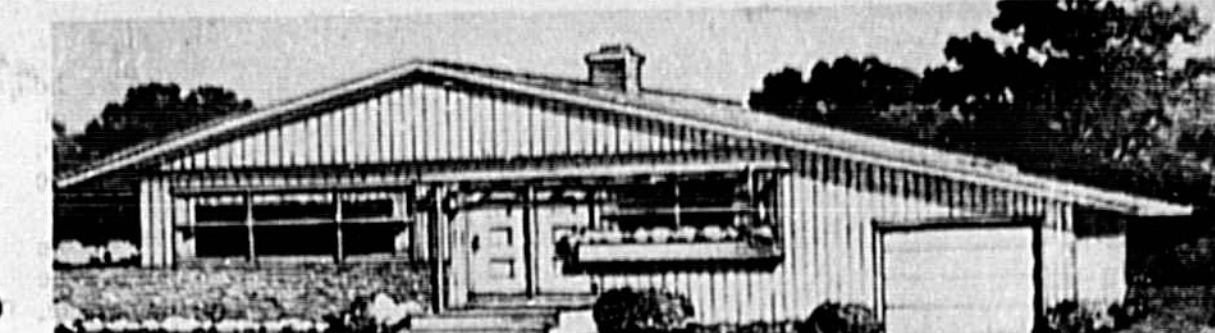

The Federal Home Loan Bank Board is pursuing a policy that is likely to result in savings and loan associations establishing many more branches, faster than in the past, and for a lot less money in the way of inflation.
