STIFF BATTLE BEING WAGED UPON HUGHES

Senator Bill Scores Jurist As Greatest Champion Of Property Rights In U.S.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12—(AP)— Senator Bill, Democrat, Washington, joined in the attack against the confirmation of Charles Evans Hughes as chief justice of the United States today at a debate on the nomination was renewed in the Senate.

Senator Bill, rather incidentally, on the birthday of Abraham Lincoln, added "what a coincidence that the centennial should coincide with the birthday of the greatest champion of human rights since Jesus Christ walked the earth in consideration of the greatest champion of property rights as a nominee for chief justice of the United States."

"Masses of our people are finding it difficult to earn a living and to buy a little for old age," continued the Washington senator. "The views of Mr. Hughes on economic questions are just as important as his legal abilities. He is a good man, but he does not understand the people and the government who nominate them for such a position do not understand them."

"The situation in the country is terrible. It is the result of Roosevelt's policies that the court has adopted as the law of the land and can force any state or city or telephone service office affected by the valuation to take the court and never ascend by Congress."

Democrats Revive Hope Over Success In Massachusetts

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12—(AP)— Election of William J. Greeley, Democrat, as representative from the second congressional district yesterday, was said today by Representative John T. Conroy, of Taunton, the House majority leader, to be an indication that what is going to happen in November."

Greeley and the administration had hoped so far that the election would go to the Republicans.

On one hand, what the President stands for and the leadership in the House seems to indicate to take a definite stand in view of this President's administration position," he said.

"The result of this election, which has surprised him, is evidence of confidence in the president's administration and of wife."

Pointing out that the two other districts in which the election was held probably favored Roosevelt, he said, "That probably will be a factor in their judgment on that question of politics."

AKERMAN SCORES CITIZENS WHO GO TO NIGHT CLUBS

Advances Criticism to Sentencing Flamingo Club Operators

Federal Judge Alexander, presiding yesterday, set aside a sentence of 12 months and a day given to Frank Akerman, Carlo Granda, Joseph Salamone, Edward Massie, his co-defendants, and to several others, including the police chief and his deputy, for violating the 18th Amendment, who insisted they had no knowledge of the illegal business.

"I don't know how you people can get away with robbing the public of its money," he said. "I can't believe that you can get away with it."

John Warren, attorney for Akerman, Granda, and Massie, told the court yesterday that the operators of the Flamingo Club, which had been closed for 12 months, had been compelled to pay \$10,000 in fines and costs.

John Warren also said that his clients intended to appeal the sentence.
