

Only Russia voted in favor of them. These intransigent attitudes from Moscow and Peiping appar-ently slammed the door on hopes for an easy, negotiated withdraw-al of Red Chinese from Korea, Diplomata began seaching for some other solution which would still be short of all-out war. The speeches by Malik and Wu helped to solidify non-Cominform sentiment. It was apparent that the 43 nations who have backed the U.N. action in Korea have no intention of retreating. Britain's Sir Gladwyn Jebb warned that Peiping's interests "may well suffer and suffer acute-ly" if Chinese Red troops keep pouring into Korea, India's Sir Benegal N. Rau urged Wu to atudy the American people who he said are "warm-hearted and the very reverse of imperialistic." Delegations here were aware that the most importast decisions --such as whether to use the atomic bomb and whether to bomb Manchuria would be made in Washington. The entire strategy, they felt, would become much more clear after week-end confer-ences there between President Truman and Prime Minister Cle-







# **Of Television And New Draft Law**
